

Most critical international incident of the Sino-Japanese war resulted when the U. S. gunboat Panay was bombed and sunk in the Yangtze river, where it is pictured above, by diving Japanese war planes. American authorities, striving to find and aid survivors, feared many had been killed. One seaman was known dead, and the commander and executive officer were wounded. Several U. S. embassy officials were aboard the boats. Three U. S. merchant vessels, owned by Standard Oil Company, also were bombed. One was missing and believed sunk, one was burning, and the third was beached. Japanese accepted responsibility for the incident.

M. Maurice Damour, former French deputy and president of the committee for the monument, announces that the work has been completed and soon the memorial will be open to the public.







