## McIntyre Died a 'Small Town' Man

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—New York has lost the dean of its day-by-day historians in the death of that eloquent boulevardier from the Ohio River town of Gallipolis-O. O.

Those of us who prowl the Big Town in search of metropolitan copy saw little of O. O. McIntyre in recent years. He was a recluse and the Tia Juana jail, seized a former invalid and he clung closely to his luxurious apartment. But his truancy from the restaurants, the night clubs, the theatres and the other vortices of the Manhattan whirligig made him despondent. And so he was wont to climb into his automobile every day as dusk fell and

ruminate about the town on wheels, observing scenes and people, in all corners of the city, for his daily

He wrote about New York as millions of faithful readers wanted him to write about it. He gave them a colored cross-section of the most exciting city in the world. 




