Hull Urges Solidarity In Americas

Close Cooperation Among Republics Asked by Official

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP). The United States government bld Monday for close cooperation among American republic "to the exclusion of political principles and problems which are alien to this hemisphere." Secretary of State Hull announced this objective and made public a message from President Roosevelt to the President of Argentina, expressing eagerness to assist in the furtherance of inter-American soli-

Hull held aloof publicly from the European ferment stirred by Adolf Hitler's bristling foreign policy speech and British moves to negotiate a new friendship with Italy.

His expressions concerning the desirability of solidarity on this continent were linked with that situation, however, in the minds of many students of foreign affairs. They were read with special interest in view of a prediction by Senator King (D-Utah) that Germany had become the most powerful nation in Europe

"This is disturbing to me," said King, "because it means she will push her economic policies in Lain America, and two nations there have many German citizens already I refer to Brazil and Argentina.

"It means that she (Germany) will adopt a policy that will seek to undermine the influence of the United States in Latin America, as well as to undermine the Monroe Doctrine.'

That doctrine is that the western hemisphere is closed to further colo-

nization by European powers. Many members of Congress commented that Chancellor Hitler's speech would increase sentiment for the Roosevelt administration's \$1,050,000,000 naval expansion policy. At the same time Senator Adams (D-Colo) criticized Secretary Hulls' reciprocal tariff program as apparently more apt to "promote conflict and adversity than it is to advocate eace and prosperity

PARIS, Feb. 22 (AP). - The French abinet, in the face of grave international problems resulting from Great Britain's crisis and change in central Europe, approved today a plan for an independent national defense fund reported to total \$329.000.000.

The government urged parliament to give urgent consideration to the

Resignation of British Foreign Minister Anthony Eden, coming on the heels of Hitler's sarcastic attack on him, led to German hopes Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain would come to a "sensible arrangement with nazi Germany and fascist Italy.

The German foreign office was understood to believe the startling British development did not mean Britain would abandon France but rather would bring France with her into an understanding with the Rome-Berlin axis. Any such four-sided arrangement was expected to be based, in part at least, on colonies for Germany.

ANTI-NAZI DRIVE. STARTS IN BUDAPEST.

BUDAPEST, Hungary. Feb. 22 (P). Secret Nazi headquarters and meeting places were closed today by police making what was believed to be the first of a series of raids to suppress Hungarian Nazis.

Authorities disclosed 73 alieged Chinese Halt Jap Nazi leaders had been arrested. They were accused of operating secretely under false names after the Interior ministry decree prohibited Nazi activity last fall.

Indeed, the show was right on top of us before anyone heard of Mann's 15-round fight with Joe Louis at Madison Square Garden, Feb. 23.

This does not mitigate against Mann's chance, however, although I can't see that there is any great danger of his knocking the million-dollar June meeting between Louis and Max Schmeling into the ash can.

Mann has confined his operations to his native Connecticut and New York, and did not attract widespread attention in Manhat-tan until he dropped Bob Pastor to one knee and poked the Bronz boy around no little at the Garden in late November. That was no mean accomplishment and the feat that is putting him in the inclosure with Louis.

Built Like Boxcar.

Mann, whom the boys in New Haven call Boxcar and who looks like one, has the weapons with which to beat Louis. Cerainly he is better equipped and a more polished workman than Tommy Farr. He'll stir up plenty of trouble if it turns out that he can take it as well as the Welshman, who was still chucking punches at Louis in the fifteenth



Observations Thru New Telescope Lens To Start in Spring

FORT DAVIS (\mathcal{R}) . — Dr. Otto Struve, joint director of McDonald Observatory and the Yerkes Observatory, Chicago, who recently visited the Mount Locke plant near here, said astronomical observations through the 82-inch telescope lens are expected to start this spring. The lens still is undergoing polish

in laboratories in the east. Dr. Struve said the maximum departure from the true in the lens is about twice the maximum error that should be altogether desirable. "This, of course, is a very slight variation," he said, "and astronomers are constantly urging me to accept it as it is but we prefer to be extremely cautious."
