The Bartleys reported having had a good summer and have been busy gathering clothes, school supplies and other needed items for the school and ranch at Guatemala. Their hopes are to have a 40 foot container filled by August 1. This will cost \$5,000 to ship.

The couple has three children and now only one at home. Jennifer attended public school in Vinita this year and enjoyed it very much.

Bo and Jeanne invested in a small home in Vinita and said it had been built in the 1930s, so they had spent time working on it. Bo made two trips back to Guatemala this year taking down work teams. Edgar is the director of the ranch. Edy is the school director and the Guatemala board of directors made it possible for the Bartleys to be

away for a year.

They said they were looking forward to returning to Guatemala and plans are underway to start building on the six acres of land given by the city of San Andres. This will give them room to add a trade school, soccer field and more room to grow. They said they had outgrown the buildings where they were now and they were looking forward to having more extra land and room.

Another couple, Jody and Nancy Bentley of Claremore, Oklahoma are making plans to go to Guatemala toward the end of the summer. They are parents of two children, ages fifteen and thirteen.

The Bartleys will be assisting with the building of the new school and church in San Andres. They will also help with the trade school that is being started there.

The Bartleys said they were thankful for all the help they had received which included the computers, school supplies and clothes. Also, for the donation of dental equipment to the school and ranch and to the school at Vinita for donation of used equipment to be used in the school.

Bo was licensed to preach by the First Baptist Church in Vinita, Oklahoma in May of this year.

- 3 pounds chili meat
- 1 chopped onion
- 6 cups pre-cooked chili beans
- 8 full match New Mexico red chilies
- 2 good handfuls Juarez jalapenos and 1-1/2 cup juice
- 1/4 cup chili powder
- Salt to taste

Brown meat. Add onion, chili pepper and 2 cups water. Cook approximately 30 minutes. Add all other ingredients in slow cooker and cook for 30 minutes to one hour.

- 1 small bay leaf

Mix beef, bread crumbs, egg, onion, salt and dash of pepper. Shape into meatballs. Brown meatballs and pour off excess fat. Add remaining ingredients and bring to boil; reduce heat. Cover and simmer 20 minutes or until done.

Gradually blend 1/2 cup water into 1/2 cup flour; stir until smooth. Slowly stir into stew, stirring until thickened.

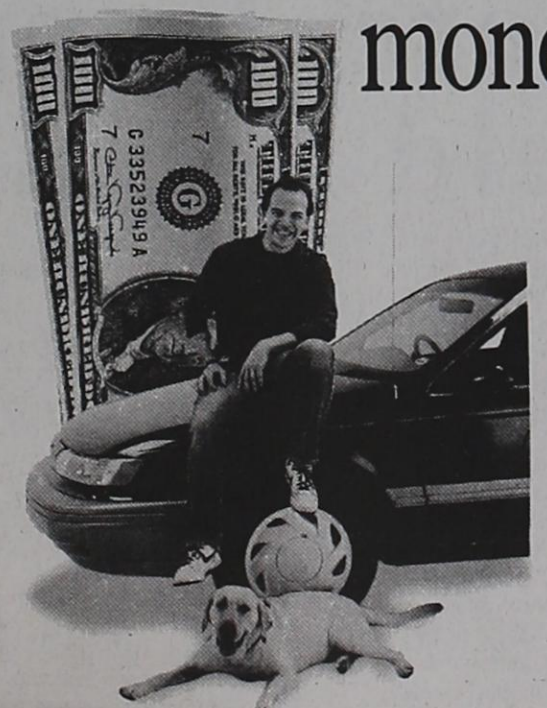

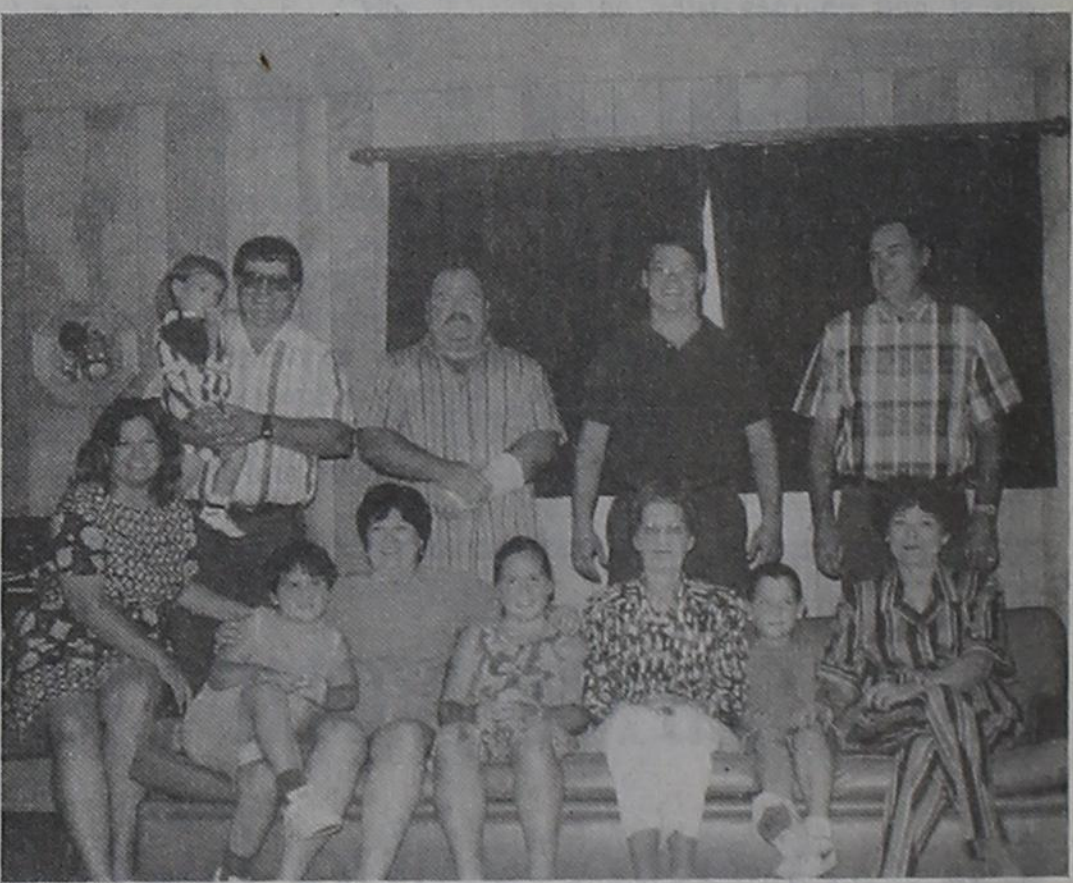
