We get so caught up in our frenzied pursuit that we sometimes lose signt of the intended goal. We spend money we don't have to buy things we don't need to impress

People put all sorts of alarms and devices on their cars to try to keep people from stealing them.





3 pounds chili meat 1 chopped onion 6 cups pre-cooked chili beans 8 full match New Mexico red

1/4 cup chili powder Salt to taste




