Properties of Oil Companies In Mexico are Expropriated

Firms are Surprised By Action

Word From Agents Awaited Before Any Moves Made

NEW YORK, March 19 (A). surprise by the action of the Mexican government in expropriating foreign oil properties, awaited word today from their agents before announcing a plan of action. Intervenors Expected.

Spokesmen for several companies said they had expected the govern-ment would place intervenors virtual receivers—in the companies to supervise receipts and expenditures, but had not foreseen the drastic move by which President Cardenas declared the holdings were the property of the republic.

The 14 American owned compa nies and three British, with Mexican properties valued at \$400,000,-000, accounted for three fourths of the country's petroleum production They employed about 18,000 workers and paid wages they claimed were the highest in Mexican indus-

It was said in the oil industry that expropriation might mean bankruptcy for foreign oil interests or might result in outright confis-cation, which would compel the ican government for a fraction of the value of their holdings.

Under the so-called agrarian reforms in Mexico some foreign owned agricultural properties were takpromised compensation, but final disposition has yet to be made.

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









Another instance the health official related concerned a Veteran of the World War who, after rearing a family of three children, found that he had been registered at birth as a girl child. The experiences of workers with vital statistics are rich with stories of persons vainly seeking to establish their rights to property because of neglect of their parents or attending physicians to register them properly at time of birth.

The law requires the births of all Texas babies to be registered with the local registrar, who is the Justice of the Peace in rural areas, and City Secretary in incorporated towns, within five days after the blessed event takes place, and form are furnished physicians and mid-wives for this purpose. A copy of the registration is returned for permanent filing. These records are "vital" not only to the individual from a legal standpoint, Doctor Cox said,

but to the state as well. "We must know how many babies are born, how many die and from what causes mortality occurs if we are to accomplish the best results from a public health standpoint. Such a program obviously needs the interested support of every Texan. Our Bureau of Vital Statistics is only too glad to cooperate in 'getting the record straight'.'
