PRESIDENT CLINTON'S cabinet members have been much in the news for the first two years of Clinton's administration. To those of us out in the nation's heartland, the cabinet could almost be called "Misfits and Oddballs, Inc."

Perhaps never in our nation's history have we had such a collection of strange and unusual people. Oh, well: P. T. Barnum and his partner, Mr. Bailey, perhaps had a group that could outdo the current cabinet, but they were rightfully displayed as "circus freaks," and weren't empowered with the authority to run certain segments of our nation.

Texan Lloyd Bentsen, the Secretary of the Treasury, is no doubt wondering why he agreed to join this cabinet. We never have been much of a Bentsen fan, mainly because his vote always cancelled out the conservative votes of our other senators from Texas, including the late John Tower and present senator Phil Gramm.

But compared to his cohorts, Bentsen almost comes across as Thomas Jefferson.

At the present time, at least two cabinet members are under fire: Housing secretary Henry Cisneros, and Agriculture Commissioner Michael Espy.

Cisneros, the former mayor of San Antonio, is under fire for possibly misleading FBI agents about his financial arrangements with a former girlfriend, Linda Medlar of Lubbock. Late last week, Cisneros admitted that he paid Medlar \$50,000 on three occasions after he took over the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). He had denied this as recently as two months previously.

Espy is under fire for accepting unlawful contributions from private industries, such as Tyson Foods, and for illegal use of government equipment and vehicles. He has made considerable amounts of restitution in recent weeks, but many insiders feel that Espy has been hurt to the point that he may have to be replaced.

Then there is our Surgeon General, Joycelyn Elders, who has managed to insult virtually all americans with any amount of character, in her approach to controlling teenage pregnancies. Ms. Edlers feels that the best approach is to hand out free condoms in our public schools. Her own son has been arrested on drug charges, but it doesn't seem to bother her.

Ms. Elders is somewhat like the mother in New York who wanted to hold the city responsible for her son's murder, after the youth was killed by rival gang members. Never mind that he had an arrest record as long as your arm. People are going to have to admit sooner or later that the shape of our nation and its character begins at home, where the child has to receive some guidance and teaching about right

Clinton made it clear that he was going to appoint cabinet members who were "politically correct." In other words, he wanted a proportional number of blacks and other minorities represented, as well as a good women-to-men balance.

The current cabinet is an excellent example of what happens when you strictly follow the "affirmative action" theory of hiring, where you have to have a fair proportion of members of ethnic minorities, women, etc. It is becoming more blatently apparent as times passes that many of the Clinton appointees were made more on the basis of their skin color or sex (or both) than their qualifications.

Don't get me wrong, I'm all for hiring a proportionate number of minorities and/or women. But the Cabinet, as well as the Supreme Court, is a tough place for on-the-

job training. Attorney-General Janet Reno, after shouldering much of the blame for the Waco disaster early in her term, has managed to stay mostly away from controversy, as have (Continued on Page 3)

Stanberry, Frances Johnson, Debbie Raymond, Jeanne Kerby and Donnie McDonald. Ten contestants picked eight



desired) Grate cheese. Mix all ingredients together well and shape into small balls. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. These freeze well.

CHEESE KRISPIES 2 cups grated Cheddar cheese 2 sticks margarine

2 cups Rice Krispies Cayenne, salt and Tabasco sauce to

Cream first two ingredients. Add to Rice Krispies and mix well. Add cayenne, salt and Tabasco sauce. Make into small balls and place on ungreased cookie sheet. With fork, gently mash down. Bake at 275 degrees for 10 minutes--no longer.

CHEESE GRITS

6 cups water 2 teaspoons salt 1-1/2 cups long cooking grits 3 eggs 1 pound Longhorn cheese

3 teaspoons savory salt Dash Tabasco sauce Dash paprika 1 stick butter

Bring water to a boil; add grits slowly and cook 30 minutes or until done. Add salt, grated cheese, remaining ingredients and beaten eggs. Stir well and put in oblong Pyrex dish. Bake at 250 degrees for 1-1/2 to 2 hours. Good served with barbecued ribs or chicken and a tossed salad for a backyard supper. SAUSAGE CHEESE BALLS 1-1/2 pounds mild sausage

2 cups Sharp cheese, grated 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper 2 cups biscuit mix 2 tablespoons water

Fry sausage in a skillet, stirring until crumbly and well cooked. Drain. Combine sausage, cheese, pepper and biscuit mix; add water and mix well. Form into one inch balls. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until light brown. Yields five dozen. Can be frozen.

CHEESE STICKS

Butter and sprinkle Parmesan cheese on slices of fresh white bread. Cut into sticks. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Turn heat off. Set bread in oven and leave overnight. Sprinkle with garlic salt.

HOT DOG RELISH

4 cups ground onions 1 medium head cabbage or 4 cups ground cabbage

10 medium green tomatoes or 4 cups ground tomatoes

12 green peppers 6 red peppers

1-2/3 cups sugar 1 tablespoon celery seed

2 tablespoons mustard seed 1-1/2 teaspoons turmeric 4 cups cider vinegar

2 cups water

Grind vegetables. Sprinkle 1/2 cup salt over them and let stand overnight. Rinse and drain. Combine remaining ingredients.







The new Miss America, crowned in Atlantic City is hearing impaired. But she, Heather Whitestone of Alabama, refuses to admit that she is handicapped! "The most handicapped (person) in the world is a negative thinker."

Instilled with her mother's determination, she was told as a child, "the last four letters of 'American' spell 'I can!'" Our new Miss America is living proof that handicapped people can be both beautiful and intelligent.

But life will not be easy for Heather Whitestone, as she has already found out in her dealings with the press. Not everyone understands or appreciates the difficulties that hearing impaired folks experience daily.

I myself have worn a hearing aid for the past thirteen years. Although my hearing is impaired, I am not totally deaf (although I have been accused of being dumb a few times!)

My condition is hereditary and is apparently a sex linked gene, i.e., it runs in the male side of the family. Both my dad and my brother, as well as myself, have been plagued with hearing problems caused by nerve deafness. My mother and sisters through the years have had good hearing.

I first became aware of my hearing loss when as a boy I could never quite hear the TV programs that everyone else was enjoying.

Later, after Velma agreed to marry me, I was with her and her family as my future mother-in-law sat across the room and talked to us very seriously for a long time. I nodded my head a lot, but never heard a word she said! (Sometimes even a handicap can be a blessing! six extra seconds to be sure the hard Windom and the family stayed at Ha!)

But it was during church business meetings that I really began having problems hearing what was going on! (I still do sometimes, but the good folks here at First Baptist have been very considerate of my problem.)

At my previous church, a kind lady came to me one day and said, "Bro. Richard, I've noticed you seem to have a hearing problem. If you are willing to go have your hearing checked, I will pay the cost." I did and she did! I owe her more than just money.

Since then I have worn a hearing aid. For me it helps a lot, although I still have a hard time hearing on occasion. Like glasses, I really don't notice it most of the time, and have even tried to take a shower a few times with it still in place!

Remember that it is just as much an annoyance to those who are not hearing as it is to you. It is never enjoyable to be in a crowd which is laughing at the speaker's joke when you have missed the punch line!

Sometimes Velma gets peeved with me and resorts to yelling at me! (Yes, kind, sweet, loveable Velma also has a temper. But I get my revenge by turning my hearing aid off when I don't want to listen!)


But usually anger can be avoided by remembering to look at the hard of hearing person when you speak, by not covering your mouth with your hand, and by not letting your voice trail off at the end of

Also, turn down background noises such as TV, fans, air conditioners, etc., whenever possible. People with hearing aids will greatly appreciate it!

And give the person with the hearing problem the benefit of the doubt. He or she probably has no intention of slighting you -- we probably just didn't hear!

Again, I emphasize patience. We, the hearing impaired, want to hear what folks say as greatly as those speaking want to be heard. Miss America is teaching us all to be patient with the hearing difficulties.

After all, it took her six years of speech therapy to learn how to say her last name. Surely we can take of hearing understand what we say!
