British Sea Might in Panorama From Heights of Gibraltar



This picture, taken from the heights of Gibraltar, shows British tars looking out over the Mediterranean at Britain's vast display of her naval power. The Home fleet and Mediterranean fleet were brought together for what was considered the most strategically important maneuvers since the World War. At the time of the sea power exhibit, Britain was negotiating for a settlement of her difficulties with Italy, foremost among which is the question of how far Italy shall go toward usurping Britain's domination of the Mediterranean.

FDR Denies Desire to Be A Dictator

"No Qualifications" For Such a Job, He Declares in Letter

WARM SPRINGS, Ga. March 31 (AP).—President Roosevelt, in charging organized opponents of his government reorganization program had planted bogies under every bed, asserted in a letter made public today that he had "no inclination to be a dictator."

The letter, addressed to an unnamed friend, urged approval of the measure "in its present form" and replied to charges the legislation would make him a dictator.

The president said his knowledge of existing dictatorships made him against any form of dictatorship for the United States.

"I have none of the qualifications which would make me a successful dictator," he wrote.

Rotarian Tells of Recent Visit to Atlantic Seaboard

Impressions of the eastern seaboard of the United States were recounted by George Abell in a talk to the Rotary club today. Abell recently returned from a four weeks vacation trip and told of interesting and historic spots in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, and of the cities of Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York City. Abell's own deductions from the places visited were interspersed in his talk.

Six Women Succumb After Treatment Given for Cancer

ORLANDO, Fla., March 31 (AP).—Six women died Wednesday from tetanus (lockjaw) after being given injections of a serum for the treatment of cancer.

Five other women were in hospitals with serious cases of tetanus. They, too, had been given serum injections.

Physicians said all were treated from one bottle which apparently had become contaminated. They expressed fear other patients may have been given injections from the same bottle.

The Orange County Medical Association, State Board of Health, American Association and Federal Food and Drug Administration joined in an inquiry. Coroner Eugene Duckworth called a jury into session. Autopsies were ordered.

When the jury met, however, Coroner Duckworth informed the jurors the undertaker had refused to wait for autopsies and already had embalmed the six bodies. Duckworth said he had instructed the hospitals to hold the bodies of any other victims if there should be additional deaths.

The coroner's jury viewed the bodies and recessed its investigation.

Dr. T. A. Neal of Orlando said the injections were administered from a bottle of fluid called encol at his clinic. He said 10,000 injections had been given through the clinic in two and a half years with remarkable success and with no previous ill effects.

He said he believed the serum in one bottle was contaminated.

Bombing Plane Falls Into Sea, Five Lives Lost

HONOLULU, March 31 (AP).—The navy sent 240 planes into the air and dispatched surface vessels to the northwest Oahu islands today in the search for six bluejacket fliers who vanished last night in a bombing plane.

The disappearance of the plane occurred only five hours after another bomber crashed at sea with the loss of five men.

A heavy rain squall, the big twin-engine fighter, crashed off Waianae, on the northwest side of Oahu, principal island of the Hawaiian group.

Witnesses said the plane struck at tremendous speed. Seven men were aboard. Three of them apparently succeeded in climbing out on a wing of the partially submerged wreck.

One of these, radioman, G. J. Milles, of Wilmette, Ill., swam 150 yards to shore. H. F. Bartz, aviation machinist's mate of Houston was washed ashore unconscious and was taken to a hospital.

Aviation Chief Machinist's Mate G. H. O'Neil of Trumbull, Texas, the third man to reach the wing, apparently perished.

The other four presumably were trapped in the cabin and were believed to have drowned. They were Lieut. L. O. Crane of Nashville, Tenn.; Aviation Cadet W. H. Lear; Navigation Pilot B. I. Windham and Radioman V. A. Luciana, who has relatives in Baltimore.

It was the second of the big bombing planes to be lost at sea during the maneuvers and the fifth of its kind wrecked in Pacific naval operations this year, with an indicated total death toll of 24.

Navy physicians also reported a tonsillitis epidemic which affected 500 men among the aircraft carrier Lexington's crew of 1,800 had been brought under control, there having been only one new case aboard yesterday.

Full Compensation for Oil Properties Asked by Hull

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP).—The United States called upon Mexico Wednesday to give "fair, assured and effective" compensation for American oil properties expropriated by the Mexican government.

Secretary of State Hull issued a statement acknowledging Mexico's right to expropriate the properties, but insisting on full compensation not only for the oil properties but also for some \$80,000,000 worth of American farm lands seized in recent years.

Mexican officials have estimated value of expropriated properties—American, British and Dutch—at approximately \$150,000,000. Workers on the other hand, claim the total valuation is not more than \$270,000,000. All figures are exclusive of rights to oil lands leases.

Thus Mexico may be called upon to pay something like \$250,000,000 for the American property seized.

It was made plain the United States would not be content with the system of compensation followed in the case of expropriated farm and ranch lands. Mexico gave the proprietors bonds in exchange for the land, but the bonds are practically worthless and have not borne interest since they were issued.

Assurance of compensation can be had only by another form of guarantee. Officials are working on it now. One suggestion is that the Mexican government retain title to the oil properties but permit the American companies to operate them, sell the oil and apply profits and surplus to a sinking fund to pay themselves off.

In senior boys' declamations, Donald Griffin won first, Jack Walton second and Ed Dorsey, third.

Winners of first place in each division will represent the local school in the district meet, along with Allen Wemple, who won first place in the junior high school boys' declamations and Frances Ellen Link, who won first place for girls in the junior high girls' declamations.

Alpine Youth Put In El Paso Jail on Extortion Charge

EL PASO, March 31 (AP).—Fifteen-year-old Raul Gonzales, a little homesick was brought to the county jail here Wednesday for federal court trial on a charge of attempting to extort \$500 from an Alpine, Texas, hotel man—"because mother and the rest of the family needed the money so badly."

Deputy United States Marshals brought him here from Marfa where he was held after his arrest March 22 while collecting a package of currency prepared by Clay Holland, hotel operator, under threat of death to his 16-year-old daughter, Virginia.

It was to help swell his mother's \$4-a-week salary—earned in a laundry—that he attempted the extortion scheme, he told interviewers who visited him at the jail.

"Mother was trying to support six of us children on that," he said. "Father went to New Mexico six weeks ago, and he hasn't been able to send us any money."

"I knew Mr. Holland had lots of money, and I didn't think he would miss \$500. I never had any intention of hurting Mr. Holland's daughter—seven if he hadn't put the money in the hole like I wrote him."

"Last week I read a story in a detective magazine about a fellow who wrote a letter and got a lot of money. The police finally caught him and sent him to jail, though."

"I had a feeling that I would be caught, too, but I went through with it. The kids were hungry at home and mother was worried because we needed clothes and things. And I was going to have to quit school because there wasn't enough for that and to feed the family, too."

England, France Notified U. S. to Build Bigger Ships

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP).—The United States formally notified England and France today of this country's intention to build battleships bigger than 35,000 tons.

England is expected to take the same action. The belief Japan planned larger fighting vessels was given as the reason for the move.

Many Rabbits Slain In Drive Wednesday

One of the most effective rabbit drives of the season was reported Wednesday, in the Salt Lake area south of Midland. The hunters turned out strong and the nearby pastures apparently were well stocked with rabbits, prior to the drive.

In a cat-claw section, Gilbert Brunson was reported to have stood in one place and killed eight rabbits without moving from his tracks. Other hunters were reported to have had similar success. The drive started at Pat O'Neal's farm and a barbecue dinner was served at noon at the Lewis Smith place.

It was expected that the rabbit drive season is practically over, due to the fact that most hunters are putting on so much foliage that hunters will have difficulty in bringing the rabbits out of hiding.

A drive is being held today, however, in the Faskan area east of Andrews.

Tennessee Negro's Age 'About 125' As Shown by Social Security Files

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP).—Jim Johnson, gray-bearded Negro who was born in Africa, brought to America at the age of 3 and who was nearly 40 years old when the Civil War began, is believed to be the oldest person in the South to receive Social Security benefits.

According to records of the Social Security board, Johnson spent more than a third of his life in slavery and was sold four times.

Case workers who investigated his assertion that he was over 85 were amazed to obtain documents that showed he was probably close to 125.

Because there was little compulsory birth registration prior to 1872, two Brownsville citizens were required to sign affidavits in which they said they had known him for the past 50 years and that when they first saw him he appeared to be about 75.

In 1887, these citizens said, Johnson's children were grown and married, with children of their own. For the past 65 years he has lived on a Haywood county farm in a cabin he built himself.

His first master, he said, was named "Mr. Witherspoon." He sold Johnson at auction to a Mr. Mil-

Hundreds are Homeless in The Midwest

Illinois Counts 12 Dead, Missouri Is Next Hardest Hit

Five tornado stricken midwestern states counted 32 persons killed and nearly 250 injured today with unofficial estimates of damage past the \$1,000,000 mark. Hundreds were homeless.

The storms, laden with hail, struck hardest in central Illinois, where 12 were killed. The next hardest hit area was in southeastern Kansas, where seven were killed. Pekin, Rushville and Astoria were the Illinois towns hit.

Columbus, Kansas, bore the brunt of a storm that struck in Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri. Seven were known dead in Columbus and six in Missouri. In Arkansas, four were killed at Heber Springs, one at Conway, two at Walnut Ridge.

Ten deaths occurred in and around Pekin, Illinois.

The strongest storm raged across the west end of Columbus, wrecking at least 50 buildings, and tearing open the Highland grade school, housing more than 100 children. The pupils were rescued without fatalities at the school despite the collapse of the roof.

The twister was accompanied by a severe hailstorm and high winds roared along the path of the tornado. Hailstones as large as marbles peppered the stricken town for 20 minutes after the storm had swirled past.

Three inches of rain fell in torrents over this lead and coal mining area. Ditches overflowed, stranding buses and automobiles. Ironically, a water shortage developed because the town's waterworks were damaged by the storm.

Viewed from the air, the storm's path was well defined by a narrow trail of debris ten blocks wide across a corner of the town. The tornado dipped into fields two miles southwest of Columbus, lifted, then dropped on the town, missing a brick high school building by a few hundred feet.

Homes Were Splintered.

Homes were splintered. Trees and sidewalks were ripped out and communication lines snapped.

The body of Joan Grizzle, 3, and her four-month-old sister, Barbara Sue, were found in a water-filled ditch in the storm area. Both had been crushed to death. Mrs. Joe Grizzle was not expected to live.

Mrs. Louis Ganfield, about 65, died in the wreckage of her home and doctors said her husband probably would die. Mrs. Clara Garrison, about 65, was killed as she lay in bed. Her husband, who had left home earlier seeking work, escaped the storm. Other dead were Jerry Lee Grayson, 2, and the small daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Crain.

John W. Allen, 81-year-old farmer, died of injuries suffered when a separate storm crumpled his home near Stephens, Mo. Mrs. Earl Lyons, about 40, died when she was blown out of her house at Republican, Ark., and crushed under a falling tree.

Culbertson & Irwin, Inc. Closes \$100,000 Deal with Montecito

Sale of half-interest in 320 acres in the Jal sand pool of southeastern Lea county, New Mexico, has been made by Culbertson & Irwin, Inc. to Montecito Corporation. Both firms are located in Midland. It was reported that \$100,000 cash and other consideration was paid for the interest.

Tracts involved are the Nora E. Alston 160-acre lease consisting of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter and the south half of the northwest quarter of section 26-258-37e and the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 27-258-37e, and the Liberty Royalty Corporation 160-acre lease, comprising the west half of the west half of section 3-255-37e.

The Alston lease has two producers, each with a daily allowable of 61 barrels, and third well now drilling. One producer, recently completed, is located on the Liberty lease.

Culbertson & Irwin, Inc., of which E. A. Culbertson is president and Wallace W. Irwin vice-president, is credited with having discovered the Jal sand pool two years ago in the No. 1 F. B. Stuart, large natural producer.

Ben F. Nysewander, Jr. is president of Montecito Corporation, and W. W. Laforce is secretary-treasurer. Both offices came from Midland last year from California.

Crockett Pool Looms.

Stir of excitement was caused today by the unconfirmed report that a wildcat southwest of the Hoover pool in northwest Crockett, the W. L. Bradley et al No. 1 A. C. Hoover, had struck an estimated 2,000,000 cubic feet of gas and was spraying oil. Gas was said to have been hit at 1,965 and oil increased as drilling progressed to approximately 1,400 feet. Operators were reported trying to rig up control head. The Bradley prospect is located 2,310 feet from the north, 330 feet from the west line of section 1, block 1, G. C. & S. F. survey, about two miles southwest of the nearest producer in the pool. Between it and the pool, Sindorf & Stone recently drilled a failure in their No. 1 Hoover, which failed to show in the regular pay horizon.

Location has been staked for a wildcat a mile and a half southwest of the Bradley well. It is Ohlhausen No. 1 J. W. Owens, in section 12,

Way Is Cleared for TVA Investigation By Senate, House

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP).—The senate completed congressional action today on a resolution directing a board investigation of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

On a motion of senate leader Barkley, the senate accepted minor house amendments to the original resolution voted by the senate. The measure now goes to the White House.

The house rejected a republican effort to exempt the private power companies from the inquiry. It also defeated a move by western progressives and Farmer-Laborites to obtain a preliminary report on the qualifications of TVA's directors by June 1.

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP).—The senate finance committee completed work today on the house approved tax revision bill after voting down a proposal to lower income tax exemptions.

The proposal was offered by Senator LaFollette, Wisconsin. It would have added millions in new incomes to tax payers.

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Two Aldermen to Be Named Tuesday in City Election

Election of two aldermen is scheduled for Tuesday, in the annual balloting for city officials. The terms of T. R. Wilson, dry goods merchant, and Marion Flynn, automobile dealer, expire at that time and their names have been placed on the ballot for re-election. The election is held each year on the first Tuesday in April, and the officers serve for two years. The officers of mayor, three other aldermen and the city marshal do not come up this year.

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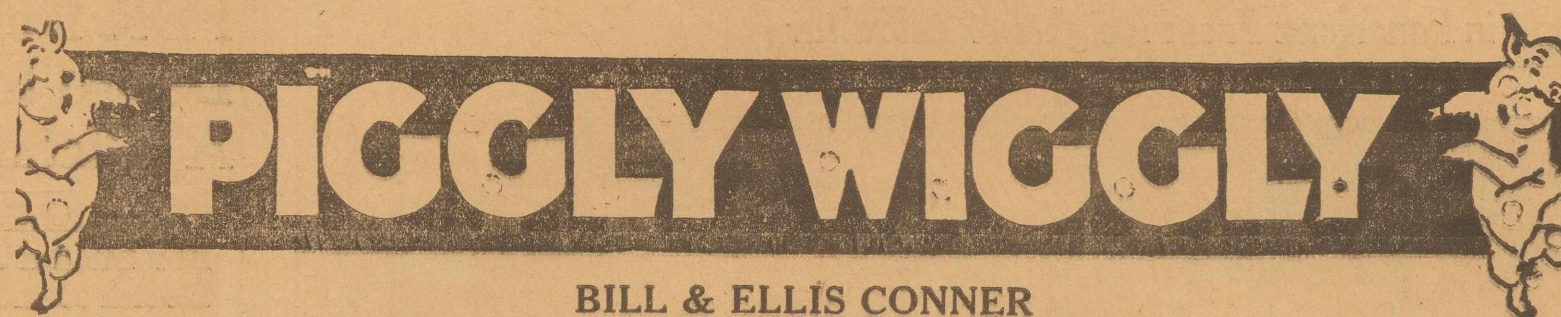

READ THE FACTS

The undersigned members of the School Board regret that three members of the Board have seen fit to bring up certain issues in the forthcoming election that have absolutely nothing, in reality, to do with the apparent motive they have in seeking to have two new members elected to the Board.

Why have Charles D. Vertrees, J. L. Greene and J. R. Martin made charges that they know will not hold water? We believe the answer to that question is that they are attempting to mislead the public into believing that irregularities have existed in the activities of the Board--EVEN THOUGH THEY ARE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD.

WHERE HAVE THE TAXPAYERS' DOLLARS BEEN GOING? Charles D. Vertrees, J. L. Greene and J. R. Martin know as well as we know that a complete audit of disbursements is made by the auditor for the State Board of Education every year.

This audit covers the issuance of every check issued; it lists the date the voucher was issued; it lists the number of the voucher, to whom paid, for what paid, date paid and the amount.

It was not the intention of the Board to have the Nolan C. Phillips Company make a complete audit. The sole purpose of this audit was to trace all tax collections in the district to the depository, which is The First National Bank of Midland.

At the Board meeting on November 29, 1937, it was decided by common consent to have the school audit and to ask for three bids. The records of the Board meeting of February 10, 1938, with all members present, reveal this fact: "The following bids were submitted on the school audit: 1. Nolan C. Phillips & Company, Sept. 1, 1936, to August 31, 1937, \$85.00. 2. J. A. Phillips and Company, Sept. 1, 1936, to Aug. 31, 1937, \$125.00. 3. Lyle R. Sproles: No bid on municipal work. On motion of J. R. Martin, duly seconded by Roy Parks, the audit was awarded to Nolan C. Phillips & Company, the vote being unanimous." Present at this meeting were: Foy Proctor, W. A. Yeager, Roy Parks, J. R. Martin, J. L. Greene, Charles D. Vertrees and W. W. Lackey.

The following is a copy of the bid submitted by Nolan C. Phillips & Co.:

January 15, 1938

Mr. Foy Proctor
Midland, Texas

Dear Mr. Proctor:

While the writer was in Midland this week he tried several times to reach you over the phone but was unable to communicate with you.

In talking with Mr. Lackey regarding the school audit we did not determine whether you wanted your Board date or the audit to close with the school year, August 31, 1937 or at some other date, therefore, in making our proposal below we have anticipated two dates for your consideration. We thought that if it were possible to obtain this work while in Midland this week that it would eliminate a return trip as we will be working in Central and East Texas for the next ten days or two weeks.

The service we propose is similar to that performed for the Midland Independent School District in the past which is a detailed examination of the Tax Collector's accounts reconciling the tax rolls affected and showing the disposition of funds by tracing all receipts into the depository. In the letter from Mr. Lackey he stated that only the Tax Collector's accounts were to be examined.

For the foregoing service for the period beginning September 1, 1936 and ending August 31, 1937, our fee will be the sum of Eighty-five Dollars (\$85.00) which shall include all expenses, transportation, meals and lodging in connection with the work.

For the foregoing work covering the period beginning September 1, 1936 and ending on any date designated by you within thirty days from January 31, 1938, our fee will be the sum of One Hundred Five Dollars (\$105.00), which shall include all expenses, transportation, meals and lodging in connection with the work.

As the Tax Collector will be especially busy for the remainder of the month of January, especially toward the close of the month and for the first few days in February closing his report, as a courtesy to him as well as a convenience, it is suggested that the work be begun after he has completed his January report.

Your consideration of the foregoing will be greatly appreciated with the assurance that the service proposed will be satisfactory in every respect.

This bid was presented to the Board members. It stated plainly what the nature of the audit would be. Any Board member had a right to object at that time if he did not approve of the nature of the proposed audit. And J. R. Martin was the Board member who moved that the audit be awarded to Nolan C. Phillips & Co. on the basis as outlined. That was the time to bring about an objection and not wait just before an election of two Board members.

The audit made by Nolan C. Phillips & Company was to account for all taxes collected and the money deposited in The First National Bank of Midland. The audit made by the State Department accounts for every cent that was deposited in the bank and for every cent that was checked out. 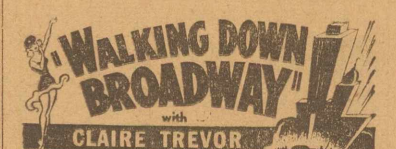

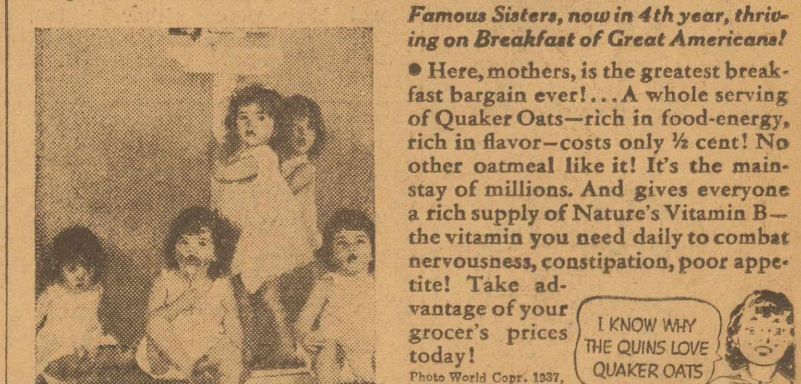
