

Additional Facts Concerning The Management of Our School System

For some reason a desperate attempt has been made to mislead the citizens of the Midland Independent School District into believing that an audit of the school system has been made. First one report and then another has been produced in an attempt to prove that point. If an audit has been made it would have been produced in the first instance.

There was mentioned in an advertisement, appearing in yesterday's Reporter-Telegram, a report known as Form A-I. S. D. This is merely a statement of the funds delivered to the Depository Bank and a list of checks drawn against the accounts. The Depository Bank does not and is not expected to determine whether all of the receipts have been placed in the Depository. Neither is it required to determine whether all of the checks presented for payment are proper expenditures and have had the approval of the Board of Trustees. THIS CANNOT IN ANY MANNER BE CONSTRUED AS AN AUDIT.

With reference to a charge that all members of the Board joined in a resolution to audit the Tax Collector's Office, we wish to advise that we voted for a complete audit of the school system notwithstanding the minutes of a meeting reported. The above mentioned Form A-I. S. D. was approved by us to expedite the receipt of State Funds, available for the system, with the understanding that a complete audit of the system would follow. The Superintendent of Schools, not the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, keeps the minutes of all meetings. They are never read at the succeeding meeting for approval, therefore a member of the Board has no way of determining whether they are correctly written or given a chance to protest against incorrect minutes.

The undersigned have been severely criticised on account of a contract given the Superintendent of Schools for a term of three years at a salary of \$4,500.00 per year. Heretofore it has never been the custom of this District, according to our knowledge, to elect any employee of the district for a period of longer than one year. We wish to make it plain that we did not join in the approval of this contract.

Criticism has also been pointed at us for the payment of a \$500.00 fee to one member of the Board of Equalization, although this party has taxes assessed against him which have been delinquent for several years. We wish to advise that we were not a party to this transaction and protested vigorously against the size of the fee.

With your support in electing W. B. Simpson and Lewis C. Link to the Board of Trustees we believe that we can give you a more efficient administration than has been carried on in the past.
