Heiling Anschluss Victory



If Chancellor Adolf Hitler seemed a bit absent-minded about his salute as he talked with Propaganda Minister Dr. Paul Goebbels when this picture was made, it may have been because Dr. Goebbels regarded the success of the German-Austrian plebiscite as a foregone conclusion. The two are pictured in the Sportsplatz, Berlin, where Hitler's address was one of the series which whipped up an overwhelming vote in Germany and Austria for the Anschluss. Hitler has told interviewers he can hold his hand straight and high in the Nazi salute for two hours at a time.

Japanese in Retreat as Sinos Rally

Chinese Recapture Key Cities Taken By the Invaders

SHANGHAI, April 14 (AP).—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's advancing Chinese legions were reported today to have stormed two Japanese central front strongholds in an attempt to force the invaders into combined retreat. Chinese, who sent word they had surrounded the walled cities of Yhsien and Siaoehwang, had high hopes their warrior hordes would defeat Japanese again before reinforcements could arrive from Japanese bases to the north. The reports said Chinese troops had killed 1,500 Japanese in a battle at Tsaohwang and thwarted Japanese attempts to re-establish communications between the two beleaguered cities.

Yhsien is 25 miles north of Tsaohwang, where Chinese last week routed a Japanese advance unit thrusting through southern Shantung province toward the vital Lunghai railroad. Tsaohwang is 13 miles still farther to the northwest.

The three cities had been taken by Japanese attempting to conquer the Lunghai area separating Japanese-occupied portions of north China and the Yangtze river valley.

Japanese worked feverishly to repair the Tientsin-Pukow railway line over which reinforcements from the north must come. But while repairs were made on one section, Chinese said Chinese guerrilla bands busily destroyed another.

Roosevelt Says Monroe Doctrine Will Be Upheld

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP).—President Roosevelt declared today American nations would not permit the peace of the western hemisphere "to be endangered from aggression coming from the outside." Speaking of Pan-American day to the governing board of the Pan-American union, the President asserted in a few words the historic Monroe doctrine—without naming it—and placed it on an inter-American basis.

Holy Communion Service Will Be Held at Revival

Perhaps the most beautiful and sacred service of the year will be held at the First Christian church tonight, following the sermon by Dr. James T. McKissick, who is conducting the revival at the church. Rev. J. E. Pickering announced today. It was on Thursday night before the crucifixion, and the night in which the Saviour was betrayed, that he called His disciples to the "upper room" and suppered with them. Rev. John E. Pickering, pastor of the church, in commenting on the service said: "There is no Scriptural authority whatsoever for observing this blessed memorial on Thursday night! We desire to make the service sacred and beautiful that we may the more call attention to the fact of the death of our Lord and that it was upon this night some two thousand years ago that Jesus Christ was betrayed and crucified Friday morning. It is only to remember our Lord's sacrifice that we call the people together in this sacred service."

British-Italian Pact to Be Signed In Rome Saturday

ROME, April 14 (AP).—The foreign office announced today that the Anglo-Italian accord, designed to end two years of friction between the two powers, would be signed Saturday at Chigi palace by Foreign Minister Galeazzo Ciano and the Earl of Perth, Britain's ambassador.

Sweetwater, seeking the 1939 convention, nominated Miss Margaret Eife, University of Texas freshman, as its community queen. Big Spring, likewise bidding to entertain next year's WTCC meeting, named Miss Charlene Fallon as its nominee. Abilene, third city in next year's convention picture, has not yet named its beauty queen.

Other nominations today were those of Billie Marie Miller, to represent Coleman; Helen Knox, Graham; Margaret Stacey, John Tarleton College, Stephenville; and Martha Dublin, Howard Payne freshman, as Miss Brownwood.

Entries also mounted to fourteen in the bands contest. Paul Seeds, Director of Paul Seeds Texans, of Wichita Falls, contest chairman announced.

Would Spend Way Out of Recession

Measures Offered Congressmen by the President Today

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP).—President Roosevelt proposed today \$7,000,000,000 (billions) recovery program, embracing \$5,000,000,000 (billions) of federal spending and lending and \$2,000,000,000 expansion of bank credit.

Setting forth measures to congress by which he said the government could "help to start an upward spiral" and summoning a "united national will" for a vigorous attack on the business recession, the president declared:

"Our capacity is limited only by our ability to work together; what is needed is the will." The President divided his program into three groups:

The first involved mainly additional appropriations for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The second called for immediate expansion work on housing, public roads, flood and reclamation projects;

The third referred to private credit. It involved deserialization of gold and reduction by the federal reserve board of member bank reserve requirements.

Mexican Silver Not Barred on Markets, Morgenthau Avers

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP).—Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau said today that the treasury had not barred Mexican silver from sale in the United States, clarifying an announcement the treasury was suspending arrangements for the purchase of 5,000,000 ounces of silver monthly from Mexico.

Morgenthau said Mexico can still offer its silver for sale to the treasury on the New York silver market.

Intercession in Arrest of Citizen In Mexico Asked

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mex., April 13 (AP).—Intercession by the state department at Washington was asked Wednesday for William N. Fink, American mining company executive who was indicted and imprisoned by Mexican authorities in connection with the April 1 bomb assassination of Mayor Jose Borunda of Juarez.

Fink, vice president of the Maguarie Mining company, was held in the Chihuahua state penitentiary today at the order of Attorney General Lomei Kuaregi.

A request for U. S. investigation was made upon Secretary Hull by Fink's wife, living in El Paso, who described the indictment of her husband as "absurd."

Lee Blohm, American consul, said a complete report of Fink's detention was sent to Washington. He said the American engineer was arrested when Eiren Escobar, also indicted, told authorities he sent the bomb to Borunda at Fink's request.

Eugenio Caballero, Chihuahua City banker, volunteered last night to furnish bail for Fink, but the amount had not been fixed by the court.

Judge Elias Oaxaca ordered presentation of evidence against Fink within 72 hours or the prisoner released. This is in accordance with Mexican law.

Jones Prepares to Loan Billion and Half in Country

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP).—Jesse Jones, ready to loan \$1,500,000,000 to business men, states and cities today asked bankers to turn over to his corporation loan applications they cannot meet.

Security put up by borrowers must be reasonable, he said, "but naturally we expect to make loans which banks consider slow, frozen or unliquid."

President Roosevelt yesterday signed a measure making money available for loans on a long-time basis by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

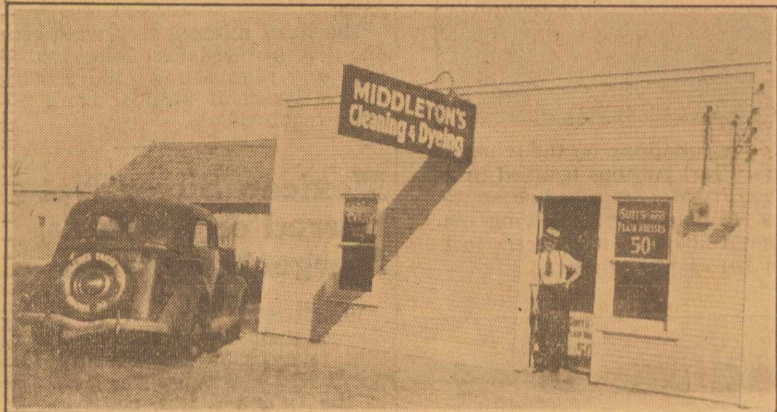

Heavy Strawberry Crop Being Shipped

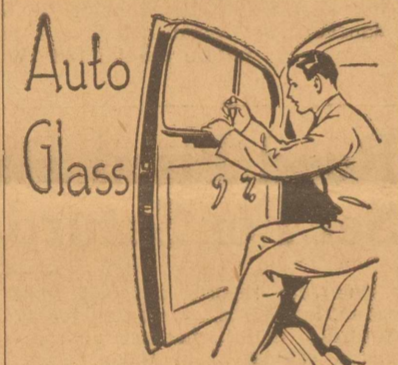
TYLER (AP).—About 75 crates of Smith county strawberries are being shipped daily from the Lindale area northwest of Tyler. Lemis Pierce, a buyer, says they are bringing from \$1.50 to \$2 a crate. The Lindale sector also is the center of Smith county's blackberry crop.

An unusually advanced spring indicates that an early variety of blackberry, the McDonald, will start moving probably by April 15. Hereafter, May 10 marked the ripening of this variety.

Pierce predicts the blackberry crop will be large because of recent rains. Pierce thinks if weather conditions continue to be favorable growers may expect to make as good or better crop as last year. As there is practically no hold-over from last year's crop, Pierce says growers expect a good price.

Claims Epochal Find in Medicine

Foreword of Book Written by Dobie

AUSTIN, Texas. — J. Frank Dobie, professor of English at the University of Texas, has written the foreword of a booklet of folklore rhymes, compiled by Ray Wood of Austin, who for several years has been in Federal Government service. This unique contribution to the literature of Texas and the South has recently come from the press. It was illustrated by Ed Hargis, a 23-year old window dresser at Beaumont, whose work shows he ranks high as an artist, although he has never had any technical training in drawing. The booklet bears the title of "Peckerwood Rhymes."

"When the American Indians told a story about the coyote, they spoke of him as Hermano Coyote—Brother Coyote," Dobie wrote in his introductory statement. "The Indians belonged to the good earth and the coyote belonged to the good earth, and the coyote and the Indians were brothers. I will confess that I fell much more brotherly towards rattlesnakes and buzzards than I do towards vote-seekers who go about over the country genera-

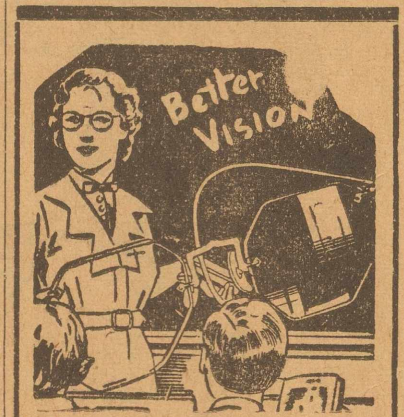
tion after generation prating of the public good—when all on earth they have at heart is a desire to push themselves up.

"The rabbit and the coyote, also the rattlesnake and the buzzard are natural creatures. They make no pretensions. They advance no false claims. They belonged to the good earth. Just so are these Peckerwood Rhymes." They have come out of the soil to which, despite billions of tons of cement and despite the complicated machinery of both factories and government, a

lot of us still belong. They contain no messages. But there is something in them as tonic as the call of the bobwhite at sunset. I like to hear a burro bray and a cricket chirp. These rhymes are as cheerful as the notes of a redbird in springtime.

"In gathering up the rhymes of people—the Peckerwood people—Ray Wood has been natural too, as natural as "three little niggers in a peanut shell." He is on his way to compiling the American Mother Goose.

"He is a kind of Rabelais in his gust for natural life. His Rabelaisian illustrator, Ed Hargis, knows bound dogs and razorback hogs and knows exactly what these critters do. His illustrations not only fit; they add. Just 'looky there' and listen."

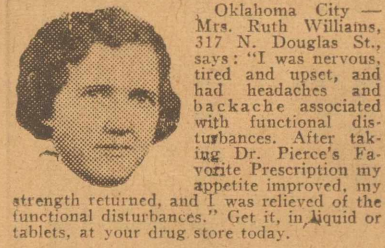

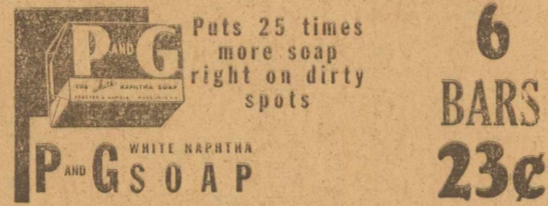

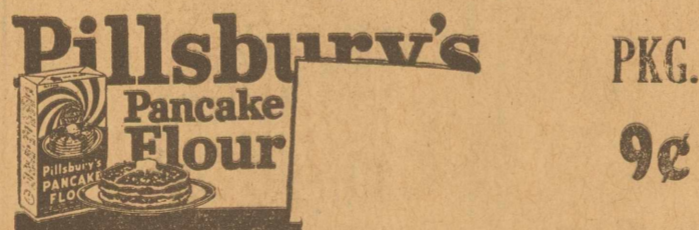

Behind The Scenes In Washington

Editor's Note: The opinions expressed in this article are those of Mr. Dutcher, NEA-Reporter-Telegram Washington correspondent, and are not to be construed as expressing the editorial policy of The Reporter-Telegram.

WASHINGTON, April 14. — The President and his adversaries have reached a new, feverish peak in their fight for power.

There is some reason to believe that the battle is taking place at the bottom of the present depression. But there is no certainty about that. And meanwhile the manifold uncertainties arising from general confusion in Washington, concerning which business leaders have complained long and angrily, have not been diminished by the bitterness of the struggle over the reorganization bill.

Inasmuch as there's general demand for presidential leadership to take the country out of depression, it's important to ask whether the revolt on the reorganization issue is going to leave Mr. Roosevelt in a more belligerent or a more conciliatory frame of mind as he deals with business and its problems.

Ready to Fight?

AS always, the President is beset by two groups of advisers. One asks him to reassure business to refrain from oratory of the type which disturbs business and to lay off reforms, at least until business can get on its feet again. The other group urges him to "go out and fight," to insist on mastery and a program of reform which he is told will rouse "the people" to his support.

Roosevelt from both sides, sometimes more from one, sometimes more from the other. Lately he has shown much willingness to compromise and has listened attentively to conservative advisers. But whereas a few weeks ago he was telling left-wingish visions persistently that he didn't want to say or do anything that would disturb business, his recent determination has been to fight, to get as much as possible of his reform program through Congress and to take the rest of the program to the country as a campaign issue.

South Retaliates.

HIS Gainesville "feudalist" speech may have helped him politically with voters in the mass, as it was meant to do. But it certainly had a bad rebound in the House. Southern congressmen felt they had received a swift kick when they least expected it and the trouble which this feeling made for Roosevelt in the reorganization fracas illustrated the old truism that you shouldn't kick anyone unless you're sure you can beat him when he turns around to fight.

One result of the reorganization revolt is to dim still further the chances of wage-hour legislation, for which the President recently promised to make a knockdown effort at this session. Another result is postponement of the White House recommendations for anti-monopoly legislation, now planned for late in April instead of during the first week after F. D. R.'s return from Georgia. The administration no longer hopes for any such legislation at this session.

History-Maker.

REVOLT and administration defeats on Capitol Hill, however, do not mean quiescence on Roosevelt's part. The President has left little doubt that he considers himself one of the great figures of history. To such a man it obviously seems a prime duty to vanquish the foes who obstruct him.

Each day brings new reports of efforts to nominate and elect pro-Roosevelt men, while defeating anti-Roosevelt men, for Congress. Increasing fire and furor is certain if the President insists on playing a leading role in the 1938 cam-
