

Body Found By Searchers Near Ralls

Woman Murdered as She Pleaded With Spouse Not to Shoot

RALLS, May 3 (P).—The body of Jim Wright, about 45, farmer of the Emma community southwest of Ralls, was found with a bullet wound in the head in a barn a mile from his home today.

The discovery ended a search which started last night after Wright's wife, Mrs. Rosie Wright, 37, had been shot to death in their home and T. J. Burks, neighbor, had been wounded critically in his

residence nearby.

Mrs. Wright was shot twice at her home about 7:30 o'clock. By the time a physician arrived she was dead. Children at the scene of the shooting said after she was shot once she fell and pleaded with the man not to shoot again. She died after a second shot

A 16-year-old daughter of Mrs. Wright, Ruby Pearl, said Wright shot six times, once at her as she

A short time after Mrs. Wright was killed Burks, sitting with his wife at a dinner table in his home, was shot in the back from outside the house. The shot came through a window while he was studying cotton reports with his wife, it was reported.

Wright reputedly had had "petty troubles" with Burks. The bullet, believed to have been fired from a .38 calibre pistol, entered Burks' back near the left shoulder blade and lodged near the surface of his eft chest after passing through his

A surgeon who removed the slug said "it must have grazed his heart." The bullet was removed after Burks had been rushed in an ambulance to a sanitarium at Lub-bock. Burks had first received emergency treatment here.

Politics---South of the Rio Grande

It's a One-Party Show in Old Mexico; And the Big Task of Leaders Is to Keep The Class Struggle Within Legal Bounds

By WILLIS THORNTON NEA Service Staff Correspondent.

MEXICO, D. F .- The political party which keeps President Lazaro Cardenas in power and which will attempt to elect him or some one else with the same program in 1940, is like nothing else on earth.

It is called the Partie de la Revolucion Mexicana (PRM), just reorganized from a predecessor called the Partie Na-

cional Revolutionaria (PNR). It is the only political party in Mexico at the moment—that is, the only one that polled more than a hatful of votes at the last election, and the only one given a chance of polling more than a bushel-basketful at the present time. Luis Rodriguez is the party's president, and he works in close co-operation with Cardenas.

The change in the reorganization just now being completed is greater than the change in name from the National Revolutionary Party to the

Party of the Mexican Revolution might indicate.

The great change is this: a Mexican now has no political existence as an individual. His party membership comes to him not as an individual but as a member of a group, such as his labor union, his community farm group, his co-operative, or his trade association. The composition of the party is an express acknowledgment of the class struggle, however which party leaders say they wish to keep within legal bounds, without diolence, and without disruption of the economic life of the country. The Reorganization.

This is how Mexico arrived at such a political point: from 1911, when revolution was made, until 1928 when President Obregon was shot, Mexico was run by a succession of "strong men."

To prevent anti-revolutionary forces from seizing power, to back up the elected president, and to consolidate the principals of the revolution, a convention was held in 1929, and a plan laid out saying what was to be done to solve the farm problem, the industrial workers' problem,


