

## School Bd. Will Have 3 Openings

Superintendent Sue Nuttall announced that the Bovina ISD will have three places expiring on the local school board this year. Members whose terms are expiring are Joe Steelman and Ricky Jamerson. Mike Beauchamp has resigned his position as of May 8.

Two of the board positions will be for a three year term and one will be for a one year term.

Anyone interested in being a candidate may pick up an application at the superintendent's office. The first date to file for a place on the ballot is February 21. The deadline for filing is March 12.

Holdover members of the school board are Norma Whitten, Rick Anderson, Susan Kerby and Josie Alonzo-Coffey.

The search committee for a new superintendent has now narrowed the applicant list to six. A total of 18 applications were received to replace Sue Nuttall, who is retiring as Bovina ISD superintendent as of March 1, 2000. Bob Owen will serve as interim superintendent until a new one is selected.

The six applicants will be interviewed, then the list narrowed to three finalists who will then return for a final interview before the candidate is hired.

## Building Airplanes Is A Hobby For Active Friona Octogenarian

Lew Longmire is building an airplane in the garage at his house on Columbia Street in Friona.

At the age of 82, and after building 30-40 airplanes during his lifetime, Lew says this will be the last one. After visiting with him this week, I wouldn't count on it.

The airplane he is working on now is 15 feet long, will have a 19 foot wing span and carry the light weight of only 400 pounds. He says it will cruise at 135-

140 miles per hour.

In the past, Lew has built two 2-seat airplanes and the rest have been single seaters. This one he says he will fly 25-30 hours of flight time, then fly it to Albuquerque (about 2 hours away) and turn it over to his son.

It is one of several hobbies and avocations this energetic octogenarian keeps busy with.

Lew Longmire came to Friona with his family in 1936. He worked for Floyd Reeve, Sr., Grandpa Reeve as he calls him.

He said Grandpa Reeve sent him to a National Youth Administration (NYA) school in Canyon where he studied mechanics and developed an interest in airplanes. The NYA schools were trade schools developed by President Roosevelt to train young people during the depression years.

In 1940, he entered the military where he served from 1940 to 1945 in the Army Air Corps, flying missions throughout the Pacific area.

He returned to Friona until 1952, when he moved to Albuquerque and took a job at Sandia Labs, a nuclear weapons laboratory. He remained at Sandia Labs for 22 years, retiring in 1973.

After retirement from Sandia, he worked in the private sector, managing a machine shop that manufactured equipment for Sandia Labs and others.

During his career, Lew kept building airplanes in his garage. He developed a keen interest and expertise as a Ham Radio operator. Lew still "talks to people all over the world" every day over his shortwave radio station set up in an extra bedroom.

He is proficient in Morse

Code, tapping out messages to far-flung friends over the radio just to keep in practice.

While in New Mexico he expanded his interest in astronomy and still has several high-powered telescopes, one an 18-inch diameter model that is about six feet long.

In his bedroom radio station he also has an oscilloscope, a device that measures variations in electric and magnetic current by recording the lines across a cathode ray tube. He said having an oscilloscope really comes in handy.

I shrugged and smiled politely, pretending to know what he meant.

As if he wasn't busy enough, he also "ties flies." For the non-fisherman, that means he makes the fishing flies used by serious fly-fishermen. During my visit, he was about to sit down and tie a bunch of flies using a new design he created.

Then he was going to jump in his new little pickup with the camper top on it that he built himself, and go fishing. "I love to fish", he said, "and I needed a place to sleep so I built the camper myself." I wasn't surprised.

A bookshelf that takes up one entire wall in his den holds his prized collection of scientific books. Topics range from physics to calculus to astronomy. Many are textbooks, too large and too deep for an average newspaper guy like me.

The book collection is impressive. He is obviously very proud of it, gently pointing out a few of his favorite volumes and some of the more rare editions.

As if all of this isn't enough, Lew is also a

## Warrants Issued In Vandalism Spree

Since December, a string of vandalism and burglaries have plagued Bovina and the area. Bovina Police Chief Leon Saddler says since December the vandalism has included windows broken on a school pickup; windows broken at the gymnasium and the school building; spray painting graffiti at the school track and the baseball field.

A burglary at the school included several items taken and the candy machine in middle school and elementary school cleaned out.

Windows broken and spray painting graffiti at Sherley Grain elevators and office resulted in at least \$600 in damage according to elevator manager Harry Johnson. "We've had to replace broken windows for a third time and are painting over graffiti now for the third time," Johnson said on Wednesday.

Last weekend, vandals caused about \$2,000 in damage at the Bovina Fire Department fire station. Windshields and windows in two trucks were smashed, including a vintage 1949 truck and a tanker truck.

# Paul Jones Buried In Bovina Sunday

Funeral services for Paul Jones, 88, were held at the Bovina Church of Christ Sunday, February 13, with minister Jeff Procter officiating.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Jones was discovered dead at his residence in Bovina on Friday, February 11, 2000.

He was born September 29, 1911, in Bogata, Texas. He married Ola Lee Calaway September 14, 1933 in Hugo, Oklahoma.

The Joneses moved to San Diego, California in 1942, where both worked in defense industries during World War II.

Following the end of the war, they moved to Bovina in September of 1945, where they bought a small service station from Herbert Potts. They built a new station in 1956, and owned and operated Paul Jones Texaco on Highway 60 until retiring in 1993.

He was a member of the Bovina Church of Christ, and was a longtime member of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

## Cities Get Tax Rebate

Comptroller Rylander delivered \$316.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,105 Texas cities and 119 counties.

This month's payments include sales taxes collected by monthly filers in December and reported to the Comptroller in January.

Parmer County cities received a total of \$30,897 for this current period which is almost \$8,000 less than received during the same period last year.

Farwell's taxes decreased by 38.91% and Friona fell by 18.66%. Bovina's taxes received were up 7.14%.
