MIAMI, Fla., June 9 (AP).—The body of kidnaped James Bailey Cash, Jr., was found early today a mile from his Princeton home. Federal bureau of investigation agents said they recovered the

\$10,000 ransom yesterday that was paid for the boy's release, and that a suspect was arrested a week ago. The prisoner, Franklin Pierce McCall, 21, truck driver, a minister's son, was a former tenant of the Cash apartment house. Di-

rector Edgar Hoover announced McCall had confessed writing three ransom notes and collecting the ransom money. Sheriff D. C. Coleman said McCall, without showing emotion, led officers to a dense thicket where the body was found three minutes after midnight. McCall called Cash's attention to the third ransom

Because of the condition of the body, a physician said determining the cause of death was impossible. The father decided not to view the body when told of the condition.

Screwworm Warning Is Given Stockmen

COLLEGE STATION. - "Prepare for the screwworm in great numbers," R. R. Reppert, entomologist of the Extension Service at Texas A.&M. College, has warned Texas ranchmen.

The Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine of the U.S. Department of Agriculture has forecast a severe infestation, probably worse than that of 1935, in many parts of the Southwest, especially Texas and Arizona.

'The screwworm fly has started earlier than ever before. out, is to examine animals frequently so that wounds may be treated before they are seriously infested. Many ranchmen report that they have found it advisable to hold wounded or infested animals in small hospital traps, located on a high, open part of the range where lies are less abundant.

Report endorses the Bureau's recommendation for killing the maggots. The precedure is to treat the infested wound with 90 per cent commercial benzol. The wound is then plugged with clean cotton saturated with benzol. Reinfestations is prevented by lightly covering the area around the wound with dehydrated pine-tar oil of 1,065 specific

The advantage of benzol over most patented medicines lies in its low cost and in the fact that does not cause shock to animal tissue. It does not deteriorate with age but is highly inflammable and will evaporate readily. It is this last property which makes it valuable in screwworm control, for the maggots are killed not by the liquid but by the fumes.

Reppert also emphasized that the common pine-tar oil will often burn the animal while the dehydrated form will not.





Britain Shapes Work for All

LONDON (UP). - A \$5,000,000,-000 five-year plan to abolish unemployment in Great Britain, where there are still 1,500,000 jobless, is being drafted by the British government.

Government experts are now drawing up the full framework of the plan scheduled to go into operation at the beginning of 1939.

The main difficulty has been to co-ordinate plans for the future with the pressing work on rearmament and defense. While for the next two years defense works will have priority, the scheme for finding work for all unemployed will be put into effect simultaneously.

Unskilled labor forms the greater proportion of Britain's jobless. One of the tasks of the experts working out the government plan is to provide means of fitting the unemployed to their part in indus-To provide this training, the government is planning to open schools for workmen in various sections of the country. The cost of the scheme probably will be met partly out of the Unemployment Insurance fund.

Reports by the committee of imperial defense has shown that defense work is being held up in many cases by public work schemes put in hand by local authorities The government now has decided that all public works for the next five years will be scheduled in order of importance, and the government will decide in what order they will be carried out.
