IF YOU LISTEN to the news each day, or read it in the papers, you have to wonder every now and then if our leaders have taken leave of their senses.

President Carter, for example, has announced plans to sell refined petroleum (heating oil and kerosene) to Iran, a nation which has in recent years been the big cause of our energy crunch.

In fact, Carter has promised to send 1.5 million barrels of heating oil to Iran. He argued that the sale was necessary, "because damage to a refinery in Iran had left many poor people without fuel."

That's all well and good, but we haven't seen the Iranians doing us any big favors lately.

The oil export comes at a time when our own fuel supplies are not too overwhelming, in fact, if we have a hard winter, we could be short of this commodity in our own country.

Some of the political leaders, especially presidential candidates, have voiced their displeasure at the move, but it apparently is going through as planned.

Meanwhile, closer to home, our state's beaches and coastal fishing industry are being ruined by a runaway Mexican oil well, and our leaders are tip-toeing around the fringes, fearing to say anything at this point which might make Mexican leaders angry.

Our own governor plays down the Mexican liability, calling the spill an unfortunate accident. Maybe we have things all screwed up, but we have always thought that even where an accident occurs (or especially where one occurs), someone can be held liable.

Of course, the fact that the governor's drilling company, which drilled the faulty well has to be taken into consideration. It could be that the good old drillers also could be held liable for the spill. This would encourage Clements to take more of a cautious approach to the problem.

What ever happened to the Teddy Roosevelt-type leaders, who believed in "speaking softly and carrying a big stick?"

If this were still the Roosevelt era, could you see the United States pushed into a corner by a second-rate Middle-eastern nation?

Or, would Teddy have stood idly by and refused to comment while a neighbor's faulty oil well was fouling up America's shores? Hardly, we would like to think.

Of course, we gave away his canal, so you couldn't expect our country to attempt to keep such things as his political philosophies.

The world was much simpler when Teddy Roosevelt was president. But we'd bet that our country commanded a lot more respect, as well as self-respect, during those times.

Mustangs, Sudan Are Scoreless

The Bovina Mustangs and the Sudan Hornets hooked up in a scrimmage session last Friday at Bovina.

Although neither team did any scoring, Mustang Coach Monte Barnes said he was well pleased with his Bovina team's play, and thought there were several bright spots.

The only drawback to the scrimmage was an injury to fullback Doug Roming, who re-injured a knee on which he had surgery during the off-season. Roming was to go for a checkup on Tuesday to find out the extent of his injury.

"We ran the ball 40 plays on offense, and gained 180 yards. This was a good offensive showing," Barnes commented.

Bovina drove the ball down to the Sudan ten-yard line on one drive, but

picked up a 15-yard penalty, which killed the scoring threat.

Another time, when the Ponies were on defense, Gabriel Guevera intercepted a pass and ran it all the way to the Sudan five-yard line. Under scrimmage rules, the ball was brought back to the original line of scrimmage.

"If it had been a regular game, I feel we would have scored two or three times," Barnes said.

The Mustang coach praised the work of center Richard Lowe, offensive guards Jody Watts and Eddie Garcia, and runningback Doug Roming on offense.

"Roming ran the ball well, as did Harvey Shepherd. Lynn Read did a good job at quarterback, operating the offense well," Barnes added.

Standouts on defense were Garcia, Lowe, Roming, Michael DeLeon, Guevera and Doyle Garner.

Sudan moved the ball well just a time or two during the entire scrimmage. The Hornets made a 10 or 12-yard gain on their first play, but Bovina answered the challenge by shutting them down for most of the rest of the scrimmage.

This Friday, the Mustangs travel to Friona, to scrimmage the class AA Chieftains, in a session which begins at 7 p.m.

School Term Begins In Bovina Monday

School gets underway in Bovina on Monday, September 3, at the starting time of 8:20 a.m. Buses will run for the first time on Monday, and the school cafeteria will also be in operation.

High school students, as well as those in grades seven and eight will register on Friday, August 31. High school students will report to the school auditorium at 9 a.m. on Friday. Grades seven and eight will report at 10:30 the same day.

Grades kindergarten through six do not need to register until September 3 unless they did not attend Bovina schools last year, according to Superintendent Bob Owen. Any student who is new to the system is asked to report to their respective principal to pre-register, Owen said.

Teachers in the Bovina ISD system have been taking a week of in-service training this week, receiving training in a number of areas related to their work.

All students attending Bovina schools will need to meet the immunization requirements of the school district. These requirements are printed elsewhere in this edition. New students and/or their parents are asked to familiarize themselves with the requirements, as they will have to be strictly enforced.

The Bovina Cafeterias will begin normal operation Monday, September 3. Increased food prices have forced an increase in lunch prices for 1979-80 as follows: 75 cents for kindergarten through sixth grade, 85 cents for grades seven through 12. Teachers' lunches will be \$1.00 each, and other adults will be charged \$1.50.

Bovina Schools will make available the breakfast program for the 1979-80 school year. The breakfast price has been set at 50¢. This program probably will not be kicked off until the second week of school to give faculty and administration an opportunity to work out the final details.

Immunization Requirements

Bovina School officials and the school nurse want to remind parents of additional immunization requirements becoming effective this school year. These requirements are state law enforced by the Texas Department of Health and the Texas Education Agency.

The new requirements concern the addition of mumps vaccine for kindergarten and first grade, and the necessity of a doctor's written verification that the child has had mumps or measles illness in lieu of the vaccine for all students entering kindergarten and first grade.

Parents are reminded that to enter their child in kindergarten or first grade they MUST bring immunization records and an original copy of the birth certificate.

Immunization requirements are: DPT or DT--at least three doses, the last being during or after the month of the fourth birthday, and a booster in ten years.

Oral polio--at least three doses, the last being during or after the month of the fourth birthday.

Red measles or rubella--one dose for all students under 13 years old. It must have been given after the first birthday. All children under 7 years old who have had the measles illness must provide a doctor's written verification.

Three day measles or rubella--one dose required for all children under 12.

Mumps--one dose required for children under seven. Those who have had the mumps illness must provide a doctor's written verification.

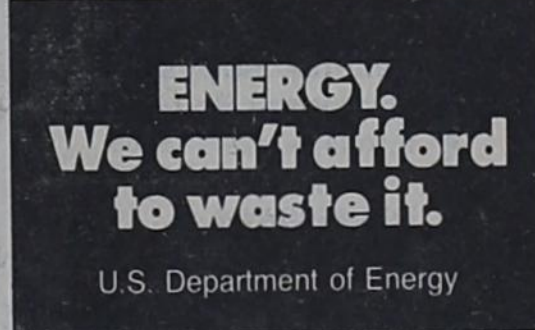

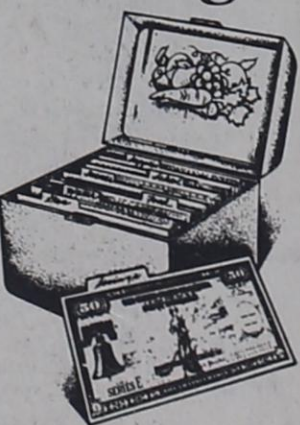

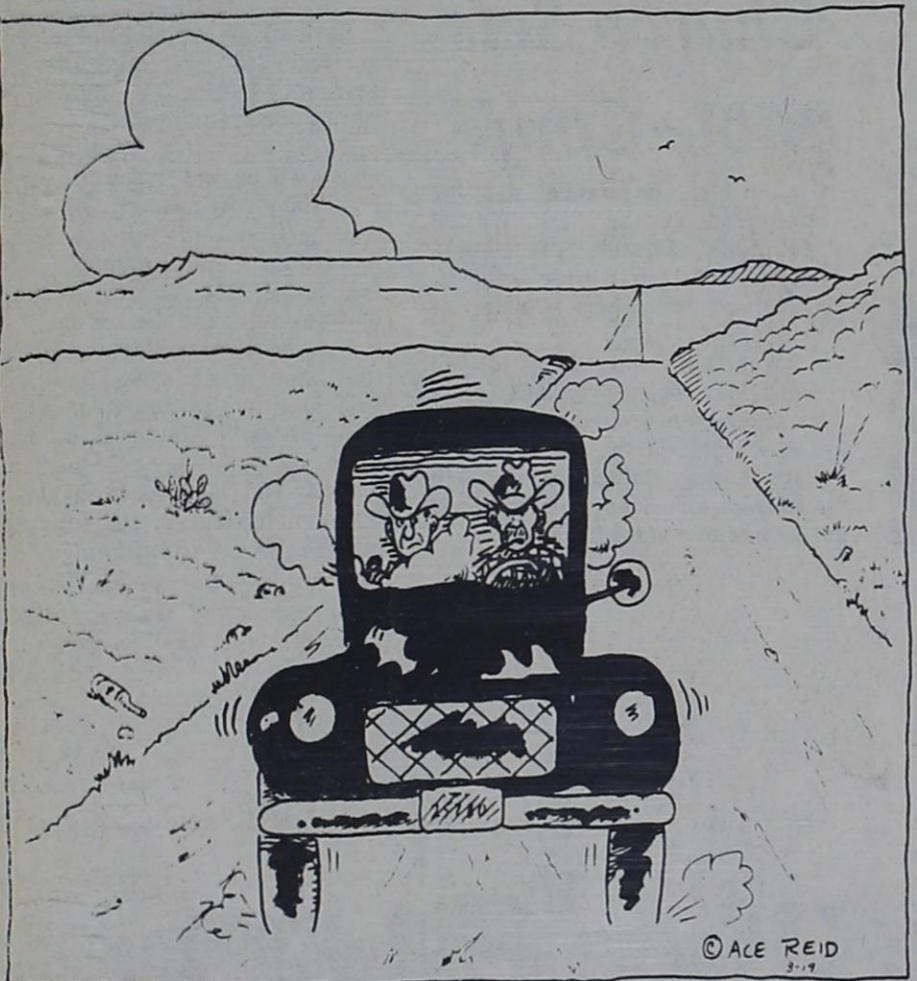

Man Convicted For Fraud In SS Receipts

A 21 year old New Orleans resident was sentenced in Federal Court Friday for defrauding the Social Security Administration.

Alexander L. Tour was given a nine-month suspended prison sentence and was placed on active probation for four years by U.S. Magistrate Ingard Johannesen.

Tour was ordered to live in the Volunteers of American Halfway House until further notice, and to repay the \$3,180 in Social Security benefits he illegally received.

Tour pled guilty July 12 to a charge of falsely stating he was a student at Delgado Junior College in New Orleans, in order to receive Social Security student benefits.

Social Security branch manager Carl Thompson of Clovis said the Tour case should serve as a warning that the Federal Government is committed to preventing fraud by persons not entitled to benefits.

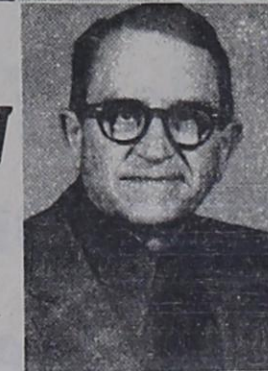

If you have any questions and wish to talk with Brenda you can call her or bring books by her room which is number 111 in Junior High.

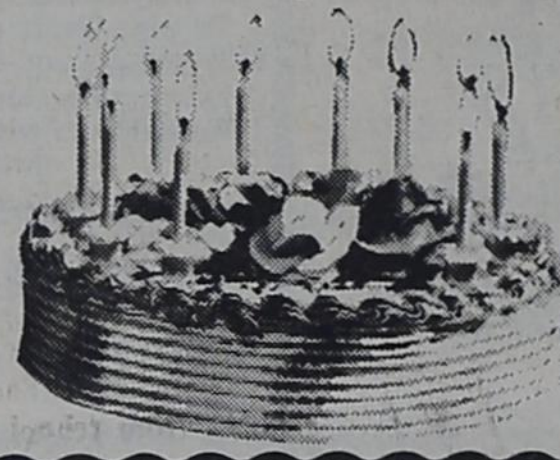

The Lonely Heart



Around The House

By LAURA JACOBS

Whatever "jean look" you want to create, the jean-fashion menu has it--so choose those that flatter you.

With jeans still a "staple" in the clothing "diet," more varieties are on the scene from the very bland to the very gourmet.

To look your best and feel your best, consider how jeans make you look and choose the right ones for you.

Think color first. Light colors generally make an area look larger, while darker ones look smaller.

One way to look slender starts with choosing traditional navy-blue denim. However, watch out for the now-fashionable bright, eye-catching colors, unless you want added emphasis.

Think texture next. Medium weights are the most flattering. On the other hand, today's shiny look "adds" pounds.

Consider line and shape, too. They're created by seaming.

Generally, the slimmer the leg cut, the wider the hips look.

For added height, look for lengthwise topstitching, piping and slanted pockets.

For more width, choose jeans with crosswise patch pockets, especially those that are brightly decorated. You'll also look shorter in jeans with this feature.

Finally, don't overlook the back view--it's just as important as all other considerations in choosing jeans.

In choosing upholstery fabrics, ask yourself how much wear and tear the fabric will receive. Then select one that can "take the action" at your house. Read hangtags for fiber content.

For low-to-medium cost fabrics, nylon, vinyl or olefin make reasonable choices, but cigarette burns will melt these fabrics.

If vinyl is the choice, be sure it's expanded vinyl with a knit fabric backing for long wear under hard conditions.

In studying different fabrics, consider those with tightly twisted fiber and firm weaves. These wear well.

Also, look for a fabric made of same-size yarns rather than fabrics with heavy yarns running one way and lightweight yarns another way.

Check to see how much light comes through the fabric. Looser weaves show more light, a sure sign they won't wear well.

Also, raised yarns will snag and pull, and they generally do not wear well.

A rubberized backing can help fabric keep its shape, but beware of too much backing--it may be holding together a fabric woven too loosely for long wear.

Ask about finishes that will protect fabrics from stains. Olefin is naturally stain resistant. Others may need some type of added protection.

I just learned something you may not know either. Bee and wasp stings usually account for more fatalities than do poisonous snake bites. Recently Texas recorded nine deaths from bee, wasp, and insect bites, and six deaths from snake bites, in one year.

A couple of precautions can help prevent the bites and stings of mosquitoes and bees and other insects.

Yellow-jackets and bees love ground clover, so wear shoes when you're outdoors.

Some insects are drawn to scents, so avoid scented soaps or perfumes. Mosquitoes, on the other hand, are drawn to perspiration.

If you are stung, be sure to get treatment for it quickly. A recent study showed 65 of the deaths from stings involved people who received no aid in the first hour. Do not squeeze the bite, since that will inject more venom into the site. Wash the area thoroughly. Ice may reduce pain and swelling.

If you have a history of allergic reaction to insect bites you might want to wear a medical information bracelet.

We all react to stings and bites to some degree. Avoid the more traumatic and even fatal reactions by knowing how to handle these situations.

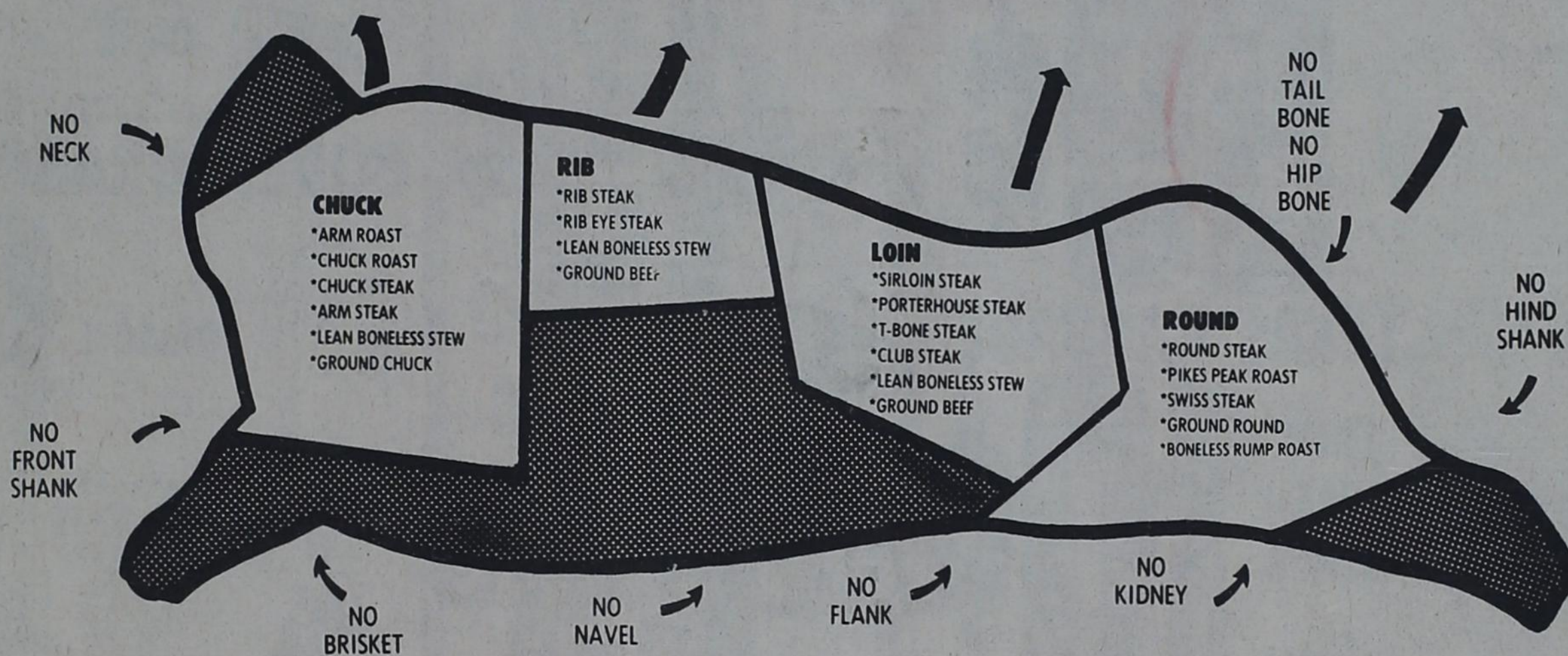
