Russo-Jap Pact Ends in **New Incident**

Border Incident Recorded After 2 Days of Peace

A new border incident involving Japan and Russia was reported today from the Sakhalin Islands where Japanese and Soviets divide control. Japanese press reports declared Russo-Japanese tempers had flared again over the alleged shooting of a member of a Japanese "inspection party" by the Soviet secret police. The inspection group was said to have included numerous prominent

The text of the third truce conference, released today in Tokyo, ndicated Japan made most of the concessions ending hostilities.

Although the truce was still ob-served on the border, Tokyo newspapers reflected doubt the truce would end all troubles.

Japanese raids were called more daring and destructive than any before in China. Today, they set fire to oil tanks believed belonging to American companies on the outskirts of Hankow. A heavy casualty toll was feared in the tri-city area.

A. E. (Bud) Taylor, 26, manager of Firestone Auto Supply and Service Stores here, died in a local hospital at 11:30 this morning two hours after he received a bullet wound in the head from a small

County Attorney Merritt F. Hines declared this afternoon a verdict of suicide would be the finding of Justice of Peace J. H. Knowles.

Taylor was declared to have shot himself in a small ante-room at the Firestone station, and was found shortly afterwards by two other employes, Preston Stanley and Jake Gore. Both were reported to have told officers Taylor went into the room, only a few feet from where they were sitting, but that neither heard the shot. Officers surmised he shot himself as he slammed the door. Becoming cognizant of labored breathing from the room, Stanley and Gore investigated, finding Taylor lying on the floor. An ambulance was called and he was taken to a hospital, living for about two hours. He suffered bullet wound directly over the right

Something Brewing

When two or more statesmen are found in close proximity away from their respective offices, a vigorous denial from both that their conversations are strictly social is almost always a sure sign that something really vital

Thus the imagination is staggered by the possibilities conjured up by such denials from a cozy bunch of neighbors that have been discovered on the French Riviera. Their numbers include two American statesmen, a cabinet member (Secretary Morgenthau), Douglas Fairbanks, the Windsors, Marlene Dietrich, Sonja Henie, and Maurice Chevalier. All deny speaking to one another on a business

What does it mean? Is Sonja Henie teaching the statesman how to skate on thin ice without disaster? Is Washington getting pointers for its lady politicians from Marlene Dietrich on how to exude "umph"? Are the moving picture people as a group teaching the secretary of the treasury how to make money? Or is Douglas Fairbanks giving instructions in diving through hoops of fire with the grace of the political big-wigs of Italy?

Only time will tell.

Poverty in Costume

It's pretty hard to overtake a fast-traveling gypsy on a capricious route, but it has been done.

The dilemmas and demands of a complex industrial society, which have been on the gypsy's heels for some years now, have finally overtaken him and got him down. At least half of the 30,000 gypsies who had struggled to preserve the nomadic Romany tradition in the United States are stranded in the big cities, and a good proportion of them are on relief. Of the 100,000 gypsies of all kinds in the country, approximately half have dropped from sight in the American melting pot.

The gypsy's situation is peculiar at this stage. In most communities he finds himself unwanted as a group. As an individual he has a background and temperament which makes the process of self-adjustment to an urban, industrial civilization highly difficult. He is untrained as a worker, usually illiterate, and a non-conformist.

Once his rootlessness and hand-to-mouth existence gave him a romantic air, and that was an undeniable asset. Those qualities of his life don't set him apart any longer, though. There are too many other many without work and without homes, and the gypsy is only another member of that unassimilated army





Police Prepared to **Evacuate Citizens** In Hurricane Area

AUSTIN (A).—The Texas police system has cheering news for residents of the gulf coast area—it is prepared to give quick and ordinated evacuation and relief service should a hurricane strike.

The coast hopes to escape a disastrous "blow" this summer as it has for several seasons and the state police would be pleased to forego indefinitely an actual test of their hurricane aid organization. Meanwhile they are entering the season of tropical storms better equipped for an emergency than ever before, and in the words of Homer Garrison, assistant director "The boys in South Texas are ready

Garrison said that in the past one of the chief obstacles to effective hurricane evacuation and aid lack of communication facilities, with its resulting confusion.

'Our new portable radio transmitter gives us a long start on solution of that problem," he said. "The boys have done a lot of experimenting with it and can send short wave messages to distant states. It is on a fast truck which can move from Austin to the coast within a few hours.

"The increase in our personnel authorized by the last legislature has aided a great deal. Within four hours, we could assemble 100 men in any part of South Texas. The United States weather bureau usually is able to give a warning several hours in advance that a hurricane is headed for a certain vicinity. As soon as we receive such a warning on a Texas storm we will rush men to the area.

ing first aid and carry first aid equipment wherever they go. We are trying to have everything worked out in advance so there will be a minimum of confusion when a hurricane hits." Other state police officials said






