How to Write an Editorial

(From Abilene Reporter News)

A collegiate young thing wants to know if it is difficult to write editorials, and if so how does one go about writing one of the things.

It's as easy as falling off a log, really. It's done with mirrors and a flick of the wrist.

The recipe is the same as the French recipe for making rabbit stew. First, catch your rabbit. In writing ar editorial, catch your idea. The air is practically full of them; all you have to do is survey the field, hum a tune to yourself, and then dab down suddenly and rake one in by the tail. Easy.

Then you just haul off and start writing. The recipe for writing, as you know, is simply putting one word down after another. Just keep going. Most editorial writers use an imaginary foot rule. One idea, one foot of 9x11 copy paper; an idea and a half, half a foot of copy paper; two ideas, one short paragraph. All over three ideas, close your desk and go fishing; something's wrong

Pay no attention to external sounds and arguments. The easiest way to ignore them is to answer questions. Be prepared at all times to stop in the middle of a sentence and assure somebody that the words benefited and combated really are spelled with only one "t" and that the diphthong "ei" in German surnames almost invariably has the long "i" sound, the diphthong "ie" vice versa. This takes only a moment, whereupon you return to your subject, pick up where you left off, and go sailing down the typewriter keys without missing a syllable.

Just a minute, please. (Yes, that was in 1878, the year of the July blizzard. No, it's spelled with an "r." The number's X-56789. She DID? Well, you never can tell about these quiet ones. Why doesn't somebody tell her, then?)

Wheat Research to Be Expanded Soon

COLLEGE STATION (A). - The wheat research program in the high plains region will be expanded immediately, says A. B. Conner, director, Texas agricultural experiment station. At the same time he announced the appointment of D. A. Reid as agronomist in charge of wheat investigations in West Texas with headquarters at the soil conservation field station at Bush-

"For several years we have recogsearch on wheat in the plains area,' Director Conner said, "but we have been handicapped in expanding our research program by the lack of field station facilities. For a number of years we have been conducting tests on farms loaned us by Price Memorial college at Amari and more recently on Amarillo ci owned land. With the establishme of cooperative relationship between the soil conservation service and the Texas experiment station we now have permanent facilities for conducting field experiments with wheat for the first time." Reid is a graduate of Kansas State

college and served there for several years as assistant to Dr. J. H. Parker, developer of the Tenmarq variety of wheat now grown by plains wheat men. He recently completed two years of graduate work at the University of Minnesota under Dr. H. K. Hays, who dethatched wheat. He began work





Life Saver--- If It Doesn't Scare People to Death





The weird contraption is supposed to help the man save people's lives—if it doesn't scare them to death first. At left, W. D. Wentzel, Columbus, O., fireman, climbs into the new-fangled breathing apparatus that enables the would-be rescuer to prowl a lake bottom for two-hour periods in search of ill-fated swimmers, as shown at right above. The large tank on Wentzel's back is a shield for a bellows which moves with his breathing. Below the large tank is a smaller one containing oxygen which feeds the swimmer's lungs. Exhalations are run through a special chemical back into the oxygen tank.
