By Bill Ellis ALL OF THE HOOP-LA leading up to Texas Tech's participation in this year's Cotton Bowl game for the first time since 1939 set Ye Editor to reminiscing recently about the time he spent on the Tech campus, and we even learned some things about folks we had known for a number of years.

During his career at Tech, Ye Editor had a lot of chances to learn a lot about the history of the college, which is now a sprawling university, especially in the realm of athletics.

My first job while a freshman and sophomore at Tech was as assistant to the Sports Publicity Director. We did a lot of research for our friend and employer, the late Bill Holmes, and helped him get out his press guides, weekly press releases, and during the football season, even the football programs.

One of our menial tasks on Saturdays was to go by old West Hall (which was the football dormitory), to pick up sandwiches and snacks for the Tech press box. Ye editor had to carry all of this, along with drinks, game programs, etc., up to the press box and distribute them for the writers and broadcasters who would cover the

The best part was that we had a regular spot in the press box, and were able to watch first-hand some of the guys whose by-lines we knew, and whose broadcasts we listened to on a regular basis. That more or less solidified my interest in being a sportswriter.

During our time at Tech, the University was admitted to the Southwest Conference, which had been a goal of the Raiders and their followers for years. The Municipal Coliseum was built, giving Tech the best (at the time) basketball arena in the state.

Ye editor served as sports editor, and later editor, of Tech's college newspaper, The Toreador, and as a senior was editor of the yearbook,

During our year as yearbook editor, our faculty sponsors told us one day that they had a bunch of old yearbooks in the Journalism Building's basement that were about to be disposed of, and we could help ourselves to as many as we wanted.

Always being a pack-rat, Ye Editor picked out one of each year represented, which went all the way back to Tech's first year--1925.

This past week, we dug out our copy of the 1939 Tech yearbook to see the coverage they gave the Raider footballers. The team had the first undefeated season in the school's history at 10-0.

They beat Montana, Montana State, Wyoming, Duquesne, Oklahoma City University, Texas Mines (now UTEP), Loyola of the South, Washington State, New Mexico University and Marquette.

The team made trips to Montana, Pittsburgh (Duquesne), New Orleans and Albuquerque. And this was before the days of jet planes. Most of the out-of-town trips were by train.

We were surprised to learn that George Philbrick, who was Tech's tennis coach while we were there, was a member of the great '39

team. The old yearbook also revealed that at that time there was a Parmer County Club, which had its own page in the college yearbook. Members pictured were Walther Thompson, Carthon Phillips, Bill Roberts, Bertram Jack, Gordon hackleford, Lorene West, Noel enger, Roberta Rushing, Eric Jushing, Kenneth Grissom, ernon Loveless, Lee Spring, Harold Lillard, Ira Benger, Robert Wilson, Lora Jean Smith, Lois Sheehan, Geraldine McFarland,

Audy Henson and Fay Thompson. We enjoyed our stroll down memory lane provided by the old Tech yearbook. Brought back a lot of fond memories of our own college days in Raiderland some 20 years later.



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ASCS Gives Deadlines For Program Benefits

FSA came to be last month when President Clinton signed into law a restructuring plan for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

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The FSA will administer commodity price and income support programs, farm ownership and operating loans and the Federal crop insurance program.

The new agency combines all or part of three agencies familiar to farmers and ranchers--the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Farmers Home Administration, and the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. Other loans offered by the former FmHA will be assigned to a new rural development agency.

In addition, the FSA will offer conservation cost-share assistance under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), as well as costsharing and land rental payments for the Conservation Reserve Program

one-stop basis. The whole purpose of the new FSA is to be able to provide better, more efficient service and to make it easier for farmers to use government programs.

headquarters first. The combination of staffs and functions at the county level will come in time. For now, farmers can receive service as usual at their county office.

Disaster Program

Farmers suffering crop losses in 1994 due to adverse weather conditions may apply for emergency assistance at the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) from now through March 31, 1995.

Interested producers may want to get required insurance appraisal worksheets and production records together prior to signing up.

The 1994 program is similar to those of recent years. Farmers with crop insurance who suffered crop USDA reorganization did not losses greater than 35 per cent of eliminate any programs. What will normal production (or 40 per cent

partial reimbursement.

This year's election for positions on the Parmer County ASC Committee, which was to be held The agencies are merging at in December, is being rescheduled to accommodate changes brought on with last months enactment of the law to reorganize the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The change in the election schedule is nationwide and is authorized under regulations issued by USDA. Current members of ASC committees will continue in their posts until the new election is held next fall.

The new committee system, when fully implemented under the new reorganized USDA, will exercise increased responsibilities in its enlarged role. Rescheduling the elections on a nationwide basis avoids confusion which could occur from hastily drawn rules and regulations, and will create efficiencies by using funds which would have been spent on this year's election process to be used in training committees in performing their added duties.

1995 Farm Program

Preliminary provisions of the 1995 farm program are as follows: wheat, 0%, 0/85; oats, 0%, 0/85; barley, 0%, 0/85; corn 7.5%, 0/85; sorghum, 0%, 0/85; cotton, 7.5%, 50/85. The final planting date for wheat, oats and barley for Parmer County was November 15.

Parmer County was declared eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) disaster emergency loans on October 24, 1994. Generally, that means that farmers who have lost at least 30 per cent of their production due to the drought and severe weather conditions are eligible for FmHA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance and the PIK program are taken into consideration when determining



Failed Crops
Operators are reminded that any crop certified for harvest that fails and will not be harvested must be reported before plowing, grazing or destroying the evidence of the crop. This is the same rule that has applied for several years. Crop losses must be due to natural causes such as drought, hail, excessive

Farmer Owned Reserve Program

Producers may now place 1994crop corn, sorghum, barley and oats into the Farmer-Owned Reserve (FOR). Producers can earn quarterly storage payments of 26.5 cents per bushel for corn, sorghum, and barley and 20 cents per bushel

Producers must file intentions to place grain in the reserve by April 30 at the local office of the FSA, formerly the ASCS office. Although filing an intention does not obligate a producer to place grain in the reserve, a 9-month Commodity Credit Corporation price support loan agreement must be executed before the intention is filed. Producers may not obtain the FOR loan until the expiration of a 9-month nonrecourse price-support loan. For further information contact the local FSA office.

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

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
