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Safety Programs in Industry Pay Human Dividends

Safety education pays dividends, for industrial deaths dropped from a probable 35,000 in 1913 to an approximate 19,500 in 1937. Furthermore, 285,000 people escaped occupational death and 28,000,000 more were saved from disabling injuries during the 24-year period; all industry put together has made good a decrease in casualty rate of some 18 per cent.

No dollars-and-cents figures can express what this has meant in reducing suffering, bereavement, lost opportunities, and blighted lives," declares Henry Morton Robinson, writing on industry's accident problem in the Rotarian Magazine. "Yet employers have also found that decreasing industrial risk is vastly profitable.

Industry's accident problem, varied as industry itself, divides into two classes: the slow injury to health due to bad working conditions, and the sudden jeopardizing of life or limb from purely fortuitous circumstance, according to Mr. Robinson. Safety engineers today are constantly on the lookout for unsafe practices and unguarded machines. More important than safety precautions is proper clothing such as special gloves, shoes, goggles, helmets, acid-resisting pants and aprons, asbestos suits, and masks for noxious gases and for dust.

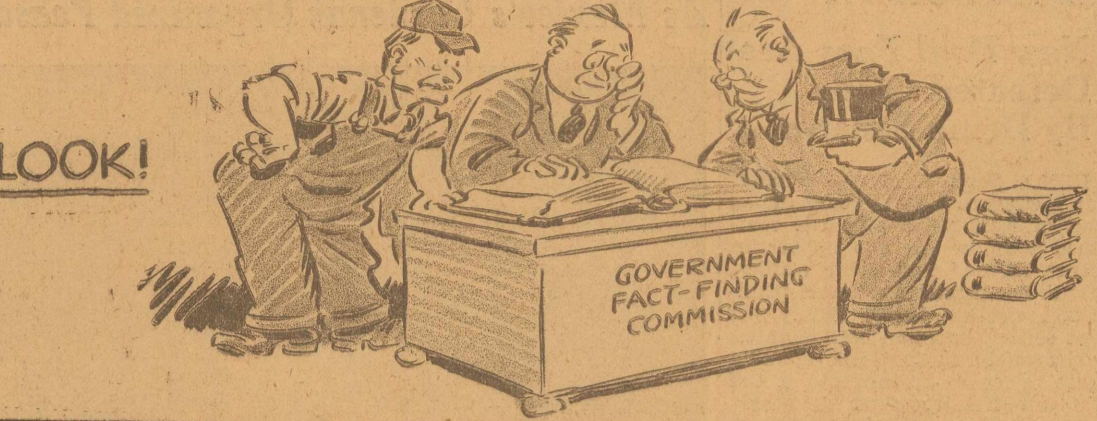

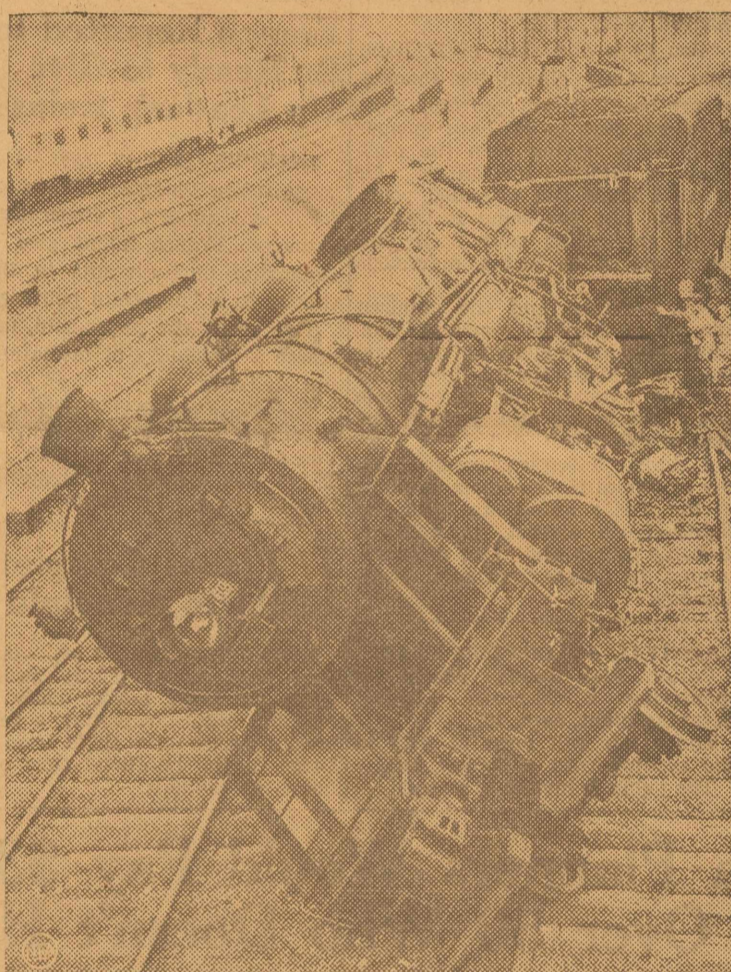

Vowed to Conquer Golden Peru

RUGGED adventurer, Francisco Pizarro first sailed for America in 1509. Four years later he had settled on a small land-holding in the new city of Panama, and from there he began a series of explorations to the south of the isthmus which convinced him the country was enormously rich.

But not until 1531 was Pizarro, with a small band of Spanish soldiers, able to invade Peru. He found the Incas in a virtual state of civil war. Atahualpa had completely defeated the forces of his brother, Huascar, and had taken him prisoner. Atahualpa was encamped at Caxamarca on the eastern side of the Andes. Pizarro set out for him with a force of only 102 foot soldiers, 62 horsemen and two small cannons.

Pizarro captured Atahualpa in the Caxamarca public square, but instead of releasing him after payment of a huge ransom in gold, he executed the Inca leader for refusal to embrace the Christian faith. Then, with re-enforcements, he entered the Peruvian capital, Cuzco, Nov. 15, 1533, stripped it of its hoards of gold, set up a puppet ruler, and proceeded to arrange conquests of other Peruvian cities. Meanwhile, for protection he built Ciudad de los Reyes, the present Lima. But by now the Incas were thoroughly aroused.

At the same time Pizarro faced revolt of his old friend, Almagro. In an ensuing civil war he fell beneath their swords. He was put to death finally in 1548. He is shown here on a Peruvian stamp of 1934. (Copyright, 1938, NEA Service, Inc.)

Declares Spaniards Brought Horses Here

COLLEGE STATION, (P).—There were no horses in America before the Spaniards arrived, Prof. Robert M. Denhardt, recently appointed instructor of Agricultural Economics at Texas A. and M. College, discovered in his studies on the arrival and spread of the horse in America.

Prof. Denhardt has gone deeply into the subject he took up as a hobby and has published more than two score articles on it. At present he is writing a book. At the opening of the book deals briefly with the horses the Spaniards possessed at the time of Columbus' voyage. How they were carried across the Atlantic, and where they were first bred in America.

It tells next of their movement to the mainland with Cortes and De Soto, and their amazing spread through the continent. So rapid was this movement that by the close of the seventeenth century the French in the St. Lawrence River Valley were trafficking regularly in horses with the Indians west of the Mississippi. "Curiously enough," he says, "the horse as a rule advanced ahead of the Spanish settlers, although the old idea that the Mesteno sprang from the strays of De Soto's and Coronado's expedition is false.

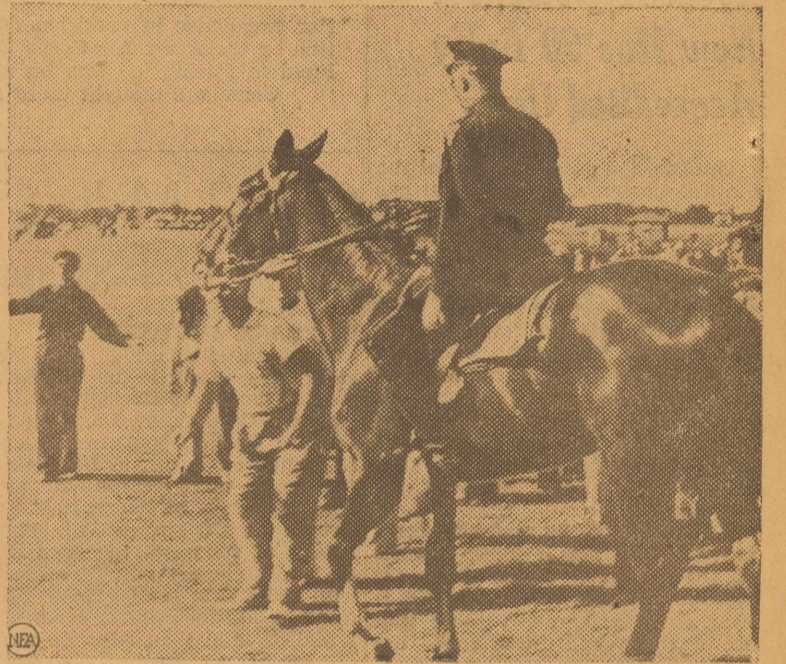

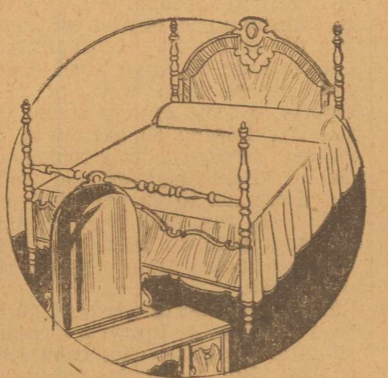
Shackleford Ranches In Perfect Shape
ALBANY, (AP).—Ranchmen say the supply of water on Shackleford county grazing lands this year is the best known. W. T. Magee, county farm agent, said more than 90 surface water reservoirs, or tanks, were built under the range program last year and 35 more were constructed conform to geographical lines, but to motor highway lines for the convenience of Americans, the Mexican Automobile Association announces.
