Governor's Investigation of Major Traffic Wreck Informative

Investigation of Texas' most tragic automobile collision in 1938 has been completed by a special committee appointed by Governor Allred, and immediate release of the report and recommendations made by Carl J. Rutland, chairman of the committee and president of the Texas Safety Association, Inc.

Governor Allred created this committee to investigate an automobile crash at Highway 80 and Belt Line Road, near Dallas, on May 5, 1938, in which six people were

killed and two badly injured. This is the first case on record of an investigation of an automobile accident by the governor of a state, and the committee, composed of C. J. Rutland, Albert Sidney Johnson, of the Public Safety commission, Harry Hines of the State Highway commission, and Judge Ben Fly of the Dallas county commissioners' court, devoted its efforts to learning the fundamental causes of the fatal crash and drafting a number of recommendations for the prevention of such tragedies in the future.

In its report, the committee named violation of a boulevard stop sign, speed too high for safety, driving while under the influence of intoxicants, and ignoring a crossroad sign as the immediate cause of the fatal crash.

In its conclusions the committee charges the traffic system of the state with failure to educate the driver to the dangers of these violations—failure to enforce the traffic laws, and provide certainty of punishment for violators, together with need for further traffic engineering for safety on streets and highways.

The committee recommended a state-wide traffic survey, county by county, perhaps through WPA funds. It points out the need for a substantial increase in the state highway patrol personnel. It urges adoption of an anti-ticket-fixing pledge by all city councils and county officials in the state.

Complete scrapping of the state traffic laws and adoption of the Model Code as recommended by the National Conference on Street and Highway Safety, was urged

A definite program of education for motorists, a revision of the driver's license law, giving the Texas department of public safety authority to suspend licenses, with the right of appeal, and providing for a small fee to be charged for each license issued, were recommended.

A copy of the published report of this committee's investigation and recommendations has been mailed to every official in the state concerned with traffic matters. Ten thousand copies have been printed for distribution.

The committee calls attention to the fact that the annual number of traffic accident victims in Texas is over six times as great as the number who perished in the New London school disaster and it appeals to every public official and every citizen of the state of Texas to join the committee and the governor in demanding that these rec- cast much and B. Pension Issue Tops Ballot For Colorado

DENVER. (U.R). - Colorado voters vill decide at the polls in November whether to continue the most ambitious social security experiment in American Mistory.

Two years ago a law providing \$45-per-month payments to every resident past 60 was written into the state's constitution. A proposal to repeal that law will appear on general election ballot this

With the election still weeks away, the proposal already out-ranks the New Deal and a torrid Republican-Democratic battle over selection of a U.S. senator and a overnor as a campaign issue.

Thousands of dollars are being pent by sponsors of the repeal clan to finance a statewide publicity campaign. Sound trucks, speaking tours, radio programs and news paper advertising are being used

Pension Groups Active.

sworn to uphold the present law, have announced that they will send a crew of 30,000 pensioners from door to door in their anti-repeal

Back of their repeal battle is an increasing shortage in state funds which has forced pension payments far below the \$45 mark.

The constitutional amendment approved by the voters in 1936 guaranteed to needy aged residents pensions of \$45 a month. The figure was half again as much as the nighest award under the federal social security act. The amendment also reduced to 60 the age at which pensions would begin. The federal minimum is 65.

The payments were to be financed by a clause which set aside 85 per cent of all state excise taxes. including sales and liquor levies, the

Reserves Built Up.

The \$45 plan took effect las September, A large reserve had been accumulated under the old \$30-a month system and state officials had no difficulty in meeting the higher

A unique "jackpot" clause in the new law, however, forced officials to divide the entire surplus among the pensioners last January. The 'jackpot" resulted in the highest monthly pension ever paid-an average of \$67.36 per person.

In a few cases where both husband and wife were eligible for the full pension, the "jackpot" payment to \$145.54 per family.

The "jackpot" totaled \$960,147.-75 and it wiped out the surplus. Since then payments have been cut sharply. The pension fund has been "living from hand to mouth" and a slump in tax collections made the month of the "jackpot" the last month of full payments.

Checks Reduced To \$25.75.

The state's 37,329 pensioners received an average check last month of only \$25.75, nearly \$5 below the federal standard.
