LONDON, Nov. 2. (A). - Premier Chamberlain, declaring the Spanish war is "no longer a menace to the peace of Europe," today demanded parliament approve conclusion of his friendship pact with Premier Mussolini. Chamberlain based his argument

for such action, which would let him continue his search for general European appeasement, on "most definite assurances from Chancellor Hitler and Mussolini at Munich that hey want no Spanish territory.





Father Hated Music, So

THE greatness that George Frederick Handel achieved in the world of music came from no inspiration received from his father. For the barber-surgeon emphatically disapproved of music and wished that George Frederick

would take up the law. But the little boy was obstinately determined. His soul cried out for music and training and expression, and a friend provided the way. He smuggled a clavichord into the lad's attic. On this instrument, inaudible behind a closed door, the youth practised secretly.

Before he was eight George Frederick had advanced remarkably. He was ready for higher instruction. It came in a curious manner. His father one day went to visit a son by a former marriage who was a valet-de-chambre to the duke of Saxe-Weissenfels. In vain the little boy begged to go, and at last when his father departed without him he followed the carriage on foot, so far that he was finally taken the rest of the distance.

Once at the duke's, he met the court musicians, arranged to practise on the great organ. Then the duke heard him and, immediately recognizing talent, persuaded George Frederick's father to educate his son in the art. So began a brilliant career, one of the greatest the world has ever known. Handelian opera is today immortal. Best known of his myriad works is "The Messiah." The com-






