Inch Rain **Recorded** In **City Limits Ranges Benefited By Precipitation**

Wednesday Night

Beneficial rains varying from one third to slightly more than one inch fell in Midland and over this area last night. The official rain gauge at the Southern Ice and Utilities company here reported one inch of precipitation. At the airport the official gauge was .34 of an inch. According to an Associated Press dispatch, showers fell generally over all of North and West Texas.

Reports made today indicated rain fell over most of the county, with the heaviest precipitation being recorded in the northeast part of the county. The southeast part reported an estimated one-half.

Rainfall in the city did not last more than an hour but amounted to a virtual downpour at times. Streets were almost filled before the rain had stopped falling.

Ranges, although not greatly in need of rain, were benefited by the precipitation. Late feed also was relped by the fall. The rain was not heavy enough generally to ma-terially damage cotton, now being picked. However, picking will be delayed a day or two over most of the county



Handed Over **To Hungary**

Most of Territory Demanded Given by **Arbitration Board**

By Associated Press. German and Italian foreign ministers have assured Czechs that Germany and Italy is ready to guarantee Czechoslovakia's new frontiers, an authoritative source

disclosed today. Meanwhile Yugoslavia and Ru-mania feared they were next in line for Hungarian demands.

VIENNA, Germany, Nov. 3. (AP). -German and Italian mediators remapped the World War-created boundaries of Czechoslovakia Wed nesday, awarding Hungary the maj or portion of land and population i claimed from the shrinking republic. Official figures were lacking, but was estimated Hungary gained 4,875 square miles with 860,000 in habitants. Czechoslovakia already has lost Sudetenland to Adolf Hit ler and the Teschen region to Poland

FBI Head Seeks to **Connect Trio Up** With Levine Death

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP). - Police were digging in the cement basement of Ukranian Hall today seeking buried bones of possible victims of a "kidnap syndicate" federal agents had accused of slaying one man and collecting ransom for the

release of at least two others. Bones unearthed during the night, the first evidence of the search, were believed to be those of Arthur Fried, who was kidnaped last December and held for \$200,000 ransom.

22,589 farmers organized one-type cotton improvement comm nities and planted 623,897 acres to good staple. Adding this acreage to that planted to good staple on many one-variety plantations and individual farms, acreage in better staple in 1938 approximated 1,000,000, according to E. A. Miller, extension agronomist. One-type communities were organized in every one of the twelve extension districts, and as a result, the first report on staple classification for Texas showed only 1 per cent of cotton ginned to September 1 to be untenderable on staple. Later reports, of course, will increase this percentage as short staple districts make their reports.

Out of 222 one-type communities in Texas, twenty-nine have requested classification under the Classification Act passed in the spring of 1936. Other communities have organized and have sales days in which competitive bidding for uniform lots is asked. The records thus far show that this better staple is producing as much and more per acre as the mongrel or short staple seed, and that premiums have run from \$4 per bale and up.

With the start made in the production of more desirable staple, plus the increase in yield due to soil conservation measures, Texas will soon get back into the cotton business. Texas and Oklahoma staple, once in demand because of its high quality, dropped to a low demand in recent years, due to deterioration in staple length and spinability. These states can come back. Texas is on the way.



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
F. D. R.'s "Dream" Home Becomes Concrete Reality



"The racketeers operate in this manner," Harp explained. "Oil royalties are sold in small amounts under false representation of value. The returns are so small the investors can never hope to get back their principal, let alone interest.

"Assistant attorney general Mc-Call said officials agree sales of this type are rackets, pure and simple. They have grown to such an extent they exceed the numbers rackets in the amount of money of which suckers are fleeced and the total in people victimized.

"The federal securities exchange commission registers oil royalty units, or fractional interests in oil properties. Out of the first 500 registered after January 1, of this year, only five were from Texas, McCall

"In other words, only one per cent of the units registered were based on property in Texas, 99 per cent originating in other states. In all probability, this was due to the fact the Texas securities act requires careful checking of value to protect

"This was not the situation before the securities act became law. Then most crooked securities dealings in other states were based on properties in Texas, real-or-alleged.
