We'd hoped that Humphrey's lead would be more substantial than the poll reflected, but, frankly, we'd wondered if he'd have a lead at all at this stage

We were amazed at the number of people who said they were undecided at this point. The fact that 24 of 50 said they were still in the undecided category is indicative of something. What that is we don't know.

We'd guess that neither Humphrey or Nixon has captured the imagination of the socalled independent voter. They're running sensible, reasonable campaigns without a lot of fanfare up to now. This is certainly good, but not the best way to get a bunch of dedi- Pupils Still

cated, diehard followers. Humphrey and Nixon seem to be leaving the circus stuff and the ultra-wild promises to the Southerner, Wallace, and he's used his methods to obtain quite a few followers -- many more than he's deserving of, in our estimation.

A vote for Wallace is, at best, a protest vote.

But what are we protesting? We think people in our area will be better off with a Democratic administration during the next four years. To us, this stands to reason, We realize, of course, that some folks don't reason as we do.

Humphrey is a highly qualified candidate. His political career has been a series of successful accomplishments the likes of which few others can match. He has demonstrated his leadership ability throughout his climb of the ladder of political success.

As we see Humphrey, he's a Democrat's Democrat and an American's American, Some criticize him for being too liberal while others fault him for being too conservative. Such is the case with most people who are in a responsible leadership position and making an honest effort to do "what's right."

Humphrey's background for the presidency, nevermind his ability, is most fitting. From mayor of Minneapolis, he advanced to senator from Minnesota and then to the vice presidency. He did an outstanding job in all three of those positions. That sounds from here like a pretty good series of training steps for a president of the United States.

Up to now, he hasn't made any political mistakes in his career -- like being rejected by the people as a gubernatorial candidate in California, for instance.

Got a nasty cut in camp and no antiseptic handy? Most modern toothpastes contain high-powered, effective germicides. Smear some on the cut. Danger of infection goes down.

RAILROAD SPIKES FOR TENT STAKES

Driving wooden tent stakes into hard ground is tough. Rustle up a set of old railroad spikes. The lip won't let the tent ropes slip off and you'll never bend them driving 'em in hard dirt.

CORK KEEPS CALL CLEAN

If your game calls get filled up with pieces of dust and tobacco from your pockets, try sticking a cork in the bugle end. Keeps one clean.

COWBELLS FOR KIDS

If you're taking your kids to camp or on a bankside fishing trip, try this trick used by hunting-dog owners. Attach a small, sturdy bell on the back of the child's jacket. Then as he moves about you can hear him heading for trouble and forestall.

PLIERS AS HOOK REMOVERS Needle-nosed pliers are great for removing a

hook from deep inside a fish.

COFFEE CAN FOR ANCHOR Make an economical boat anchor by taking a pound-sized coffee can and filling with cement. Add a hook of heavy wire in the wet cement for

an eye to which to attach the anchor line. LOSS PREVENTATIVE

One way to keep from losing a predator call, is to tie it on a string and carry it around your neck, or attach it to the buttonhole of your camouflage clothing.

SALT SHORTAGE CAUSES THIRST

On hot days when you can't seem to get enough, to drink, try adding a pinch of salt to your water. Lack of salt, curiously enough, causes the thirst.

Irrigation requirements for Kenaf are similar to cotton although one or two additional late season irrigations may be required for maximum production of dry matter.

No serious infestations of insects have been encountered in the limited plantings of Kenaf. Since kenaf is primarily grown for vegetative production, insects which damage the fruiting of cotton should not be a particular problem in kenaf.

Kenaf seed should be treated with a fungicide prior to planting to avoid seedling diseases. The presently available kenaf is susceptible to the root knot nematode and possibly other neunbranched stem when grown in matode species.
