Everyone is invited to come to the High School Gym on Thursday evening, 6 p.m. for four games of volleyball.

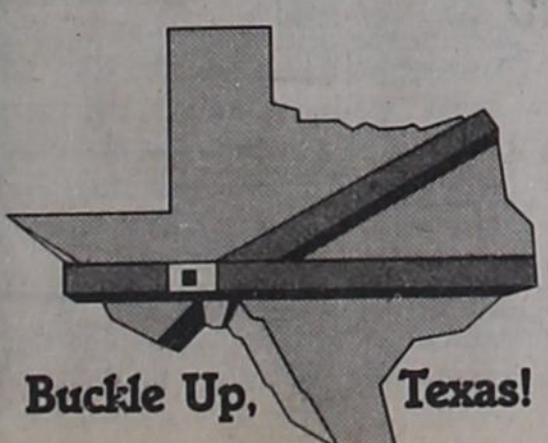
Commodity Distribution

Crash Kills 20-Year-Old

A 20-year-old Cannon Air Force Base woman was killed early last Monday morning in a car-truck crash near the Black community, six miles northeast of Friona on U.S. Highway 60.

AIC Renee Endrea Annis was enroute from Cannon AFB to catch a plane at Amarillo International Airport at the time of the wreck. She was on leave, and was travelling home to visit her family in Hollis, Maine.

Investigating officers blamed high winds as a possible cause of the accident. Miss Annis' vehicle somehow was sideways of the highway on the wrong side of the road when it was hit by a westbound cattle truck.

At the time of the accident, the wind was blowing very strongly out of the north and a light rain was falling.

The area around Black on Highway 60 is noted for having bad wind currents. It is one of the danger spots on the busy two-lane stretch of the highway.

Miss Annis entered the Air Force in September of 1984. She had been assigned to Cannon Air Force Base's hospital since February of 1986 as a radiologist specialist in the X-ray clinic.

Her small (Nissan) car was completely demolished, and had to be brought back to Friona on a trailer.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 17, 1957

Bovina city commissioners passed a resolution calling for a paving election for Bovina Thursday, May 2. The action was taken at a called meeting of the commission Monday night in the City Hall. Election will be in the City Hall.

Leveling and resodding work on Mustang Field began Tuesday morning. Work is being done by Billie Sudderth. Also, the area south of the field house is to be sodded and will be used as a practice field.

Four teachers in Bovina Schools, including High School Principal R.E. Everett, have asked the school board not to consider their contracts for renewal.

Saturday marked the first day for Bovina to feel the effects of postal service curtailments ordered by Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield as a budgetary measure. The window of the local office was closed all day Saturday.

Damages amounting to about \$650 were done to a pickup and household appliances Friday night when the pickup overturned in Menard. E.A. McCallum, manager of Bovina Sales and Service and Arlie Draper were not seriously injured in the accident.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 18, 1962

A plan is being put into action to bring cable TV to Bovina. O.M. Hammonds had had a city franchise for such a project for the past few years. Recently, the idea received support of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture through directors of the organization.

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 20, 1977

JH Girls Are Dist. Runner-Up

The Bovina Junior High girls made themselves proud as they participated in the district track meet this past Tuesday and Thursday at Sudan.

Bovina accumulated 96 points in this tough eleven team district, and finished in second place behind an extremely fast Petersburg team with 108 points.

Coach Kathy Rundell made these observations about the final meet of the season. "I was extremely pleased with all the girls. Almost all the girls achieved personal bests at this meet.

"Three Bovina girls became district event champs as they won their individual events. These outstanding performances all came from seventh graders, which is even more impressive considering seventh and eighth graders all compete together.

"Donna Griggs once again won the high jump with a leap of 4'8". She also ran her fastest time of the year in the 100 meter hurdles as she won in a time of 17.23. Beliza Torres ran a strong 400 meters to win in 64.89. This was three seconds faster than she had ever run. Finally, Veronica Patterson ran a consistent strong pace to win the 1200 meter run in 4:38.76. This too, was her best time of the year.

"Our other big point getters came when all of our relays ran personal bests and finished in the top three every time. The biggest relay improvement came when the 800 meter relay foursome of Keri Mitchell, Nita Marshall, Donna Griggs and Mona Martinez, shaved four seconds off their previous best time and ran a 2:01.40. The sad thing was that we won our heat, but the winner of the second heat was one second faster, therefore, we placed second overall.

"Personally, I feel this has been a very successful track season for the girls. I'm hoping the interest and hard work they have shown will continue down the line and will lead to possible state champions of the future. I think one parent summed it up best when she said, 'It's nice to see maroon finishing first again!'"

Traffic Death Toll Lowest In Decade

The 1986 traffic death toll in Texas was the lowest it has been in ten years, according to DPS Director Col. Jim Adams.

The number of persons killed on Texas' streets and highways has decreased 3.1 per cent--3,568 for 1986 compared to 3,682 deaths in 1985, Adams said.

"We are very pleased with this decline, though the number of people who died in traffic accidents in Texas last year is certainly still of tragic proportions," he said. "The good news is that it is getting safer to drive in Texas."

The death rate on Texas' roadways, another measurement of traffic safety, reached its lowest point ever--2.4 deaths per 100 million miles traveled.

From 3.9 in 1981, the death rate in Texas has dropped steadily each year. In 1985, the rate was 2.6.

"Not only was the 1986 fatality count the lowest in the state since 1976, last year's figure represents 1,133 fewer traffic deaths than recorded in 1981, the worst year in Texas traffic history," Adams said.

"It's hard to assess a single cause for this reduction since so many factors are involved,"

Adams said. "Speed law enforcement, DWI enforcement and a greater public awareness of the consequences of drinking and driving all play a role. An additional factor has been the seat belt legislation, which went into effect September 1, 1985."

A comparison of the final fatality figures for the first year the safety belt law was on the books with the same period the year before shows the number of persons killed in the front seats of cars and light trucks declined by seven per cent.

"That seven per cent amounts to 157 lives arguably saved by seat belts," Adams said. "The safety belt law is working. Unfortunately, a survey conducted for the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation has indicated a slight decrease in seat belt usage in Texas. We hope people realize this law definitely saves lives."

In 1986, 1,304 fatalities in Texas were listed as DWI-related, compared to 989 in 1985. Adams said the DPS feels that increase is largely due to better reporting of alcohol involvement in accidents, rather than a sharp increase in DWI.

Funeral services for Gladys Martin Eaves, 77, of Clovis, were held last Monday at Steed-Todd Chapel in Clovis.

Burial was at Rest Lawn Cemetery in Hereford, with the Rev. David Snyman officiating and Steed-Todd Funeral Home handling arrangements.

Mrs. Eaves died Friday, April 10 at Clovis High Plains Hospital. She was born in Sulphur Springs, Texas December 18, 1909, and lived in Clovis since 1965. She married Harold Eaves May 15, 1976 in Albuquerque.

She was a retired owner of Martin's Ready-To-Wear Dress Shop in Hereford, and Gladys' Dress Shop in Clovis. She was a member of Trinity United Methodist Church and the Order of the Eastern Star.

She was preceded in death by her first husband, Archibald Grady Martin, in 1964.

Survivors include her husband, Harold, of the home; two sons, Archie G. Martin of Fort Wayne, Indiana and Leon D. Martin of Camarillo, California; two daughters, Anna L. Martin of Albuquerque, Linda Caster Todd of Levelland, Texas; eight grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

She was Carlene Jones' sister-in-law.
