City In Danger Of Losing Post Office

JUST PRIOR TO press time this week, Postmaster Laura Bartlett called with the disturbing news that the Grace Commission has recommended the closing of the post offices in Bovina and Lazbuddie.

Mrs. Bartlett correctly states that if we lose our post office, we lose a vital center in our community, and the closing would cause considerable hardship on all who receive and send mail through these centers.

We will print the addresses of those who need to be contacted, in regard to this threat. Please let your elected officials hear from you on this matter. We would assume that if these offices are closed, they would remain closed for good.

There was no mention as to how the local postal patrons would be served should the local post office be closed.

OFFICIALS OF Parmer County Community Hospital have alerted us to a situation which taxpayers in Parmer County need to be aware of.

The Texas legislature is considering two bills which would amount to a tax on the sick and injured of the state.

One of the bills is a proposal which would place a one per cent tax on the state's hospitals' net revenue to totally or partially fund a dedicated indigent health care and treatment fund.

The bill proposes to raise around \$75 million a year, of which 50 per cent would be returned to the hospitals.

The trouble with this program is that it would tax the very institutions which have already been burdened with bills which those unable to pay for medical services have made.

In addition it is pointed out that a similar program has been instituted in Florida, requiring hospitals to pay a 1.5 per cent tax. The governor of Florida is presently proposing to increase this to 2.5 per cent, while at the same time reducing the state's revenues going into the Medicaid program. The same thing could happen in Texas, opponents of the bill warn.

Another piece of legislation, Senate Bill 789 and HB 1845 would mandate that hospitals provide services or funding to qualified indigents equal to three per cent of the facility's adjusted operating costs.

Here again, the state would be shifting its obligations to society by mandating in law the practice of cost-shifting to the sick, injured and dying.

Those hospitals and institutions not rendering services under the proposed legislation would be required to make an equivalent payment to the Department of Health.

The Texas Hospital Assn. has vigorously opposed both of the proposed legislative packages, and urges voters to contact their state senator and representative.

At a time when hospitals, especially in the rural areas, are finding it hard to continue operating, they hardly need a new tax, which would amount to "double taxation" in most cases.

In addition to contacting your senator and representative, voters are also urged to contact the governor, lieutenant governor and Speaker of the House, to let them know of their stance on the subject.

A New Mexico State Police Officer Allan Collier saw the suspect's vehicle in Texico and began pursuit.

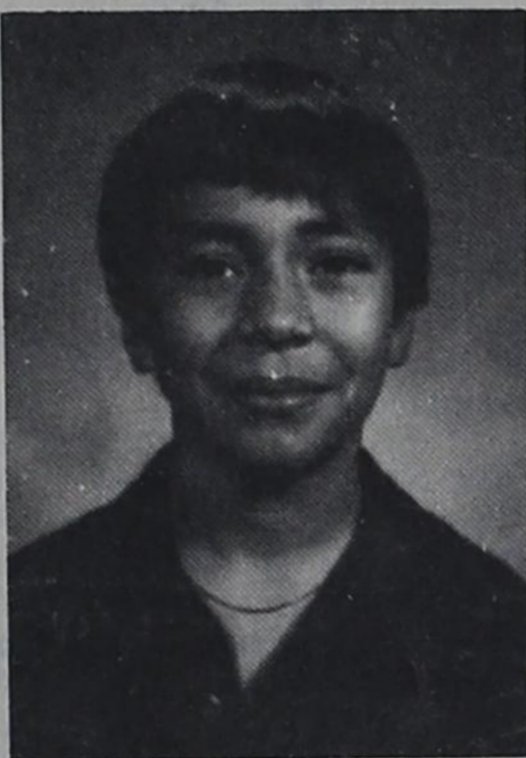
The suspect drove into Texas, and Parmer County Sheriff's Department and Texas Department of Public Safety officers began chasing Bishop as well.

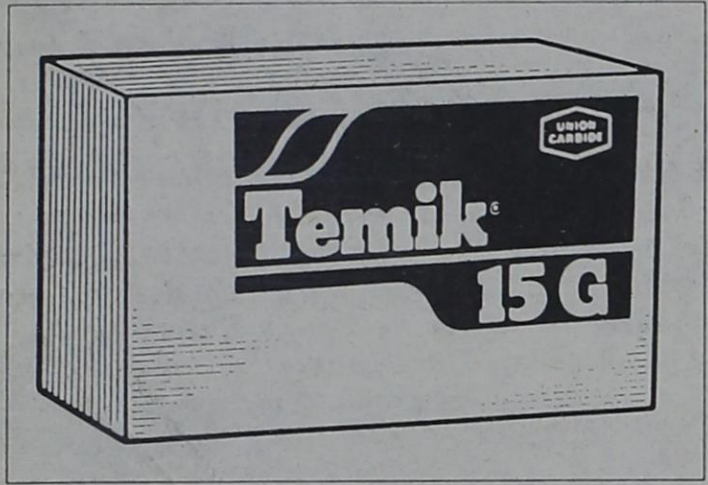

The Bovina Women's Study Club met Thursday, April 11 for their regular meeting.

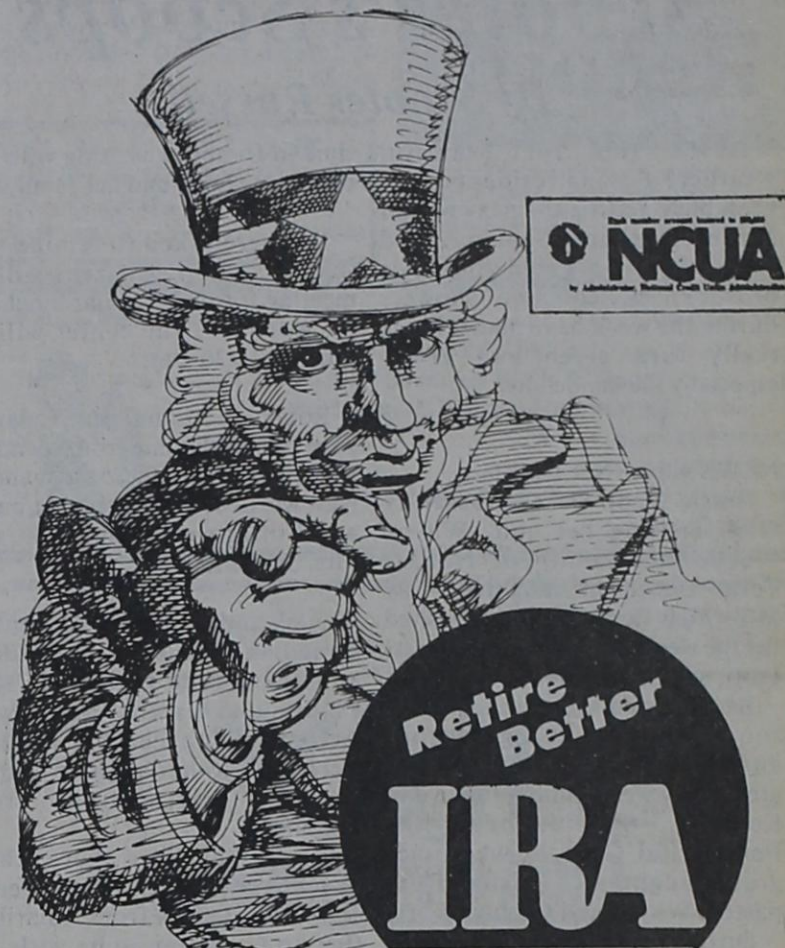
Charles Johnson spoke to the ladies about electrical safety. A short business meeting followed the program and refreshments were furnished by Irma Nabors and Thelma Barron.
