EVERYONE we've talked to the past couple of weeks has a tornado story to tell. . .whether it is about the recent big blow or one remembered from the past. Well, I've got one, too. We'll call it:

"The Tornado That Didn't Happen" When our first two kids got to be ages eight and five, or maybe they were nine and six, they thought they were getting too old to go to Pearl's World Famous Day Care Center. I was working at the paper about three days a week and Laura announced that she was perfectly capable of looking after her little brother, Stanley, after school. They would be at home unsupervised for about an hour and a half before I got home from work.

Back then (it was '69 or '70) in a small homey little town like this, you could leave your youngsters home alone for a couple of hours without any problems. Especially if they were good little kids and minded pretty well.

There was lots of good stuff for them to watch on TV every afternoon. Old reruns like: "I Love Lucy," "Andy Griffith," "Lassie," "Gilligan's Island," "Beverly Hillbillies." They may seem silly now, but those shows taught some good lessons to kids, such as: it takes hard work to achieve your goals. . . being dishonest gets you in trouble . . .stick up for your friends. . . a little kindness never hurts; etc. You don't see those kinds of virtues displayed in the talk shows that fill the afternoon airways now.

Anyway, the TV was a good babysitter in those days and we didn't want them playing outside while we weren't at home.

It was getting on toward the blustery time of year. The Ralph Taylors had a neighborhood storm cellar in their back yard that was for everyone in our block to use. They lived two houses down and we had made the trip to the cellar a few times when there were storm warnings on TV.

One of our trips to the cellar had been in a driving rain and everyone sat around soaked to the skin in the damp cellar while we waited out the storm. So I fixed up a big straw tote bag that we called the "storm cellar bag" and it was sitting right beside the back door, ready for a quick emergency trip. It contained snacks, flashlights, a small umbrella, towels, and sweaters.

We left the kids strict instructions that if a tornado warning came on the television, they were to grab the bag and go immediately to the cellar in the Taylor's back yard. Do not pass go, etc. etc.

One bright sunny, not-a-cloudin-the-sky afternoon, I got home from work about 5:30 p.m. and found no kids in the house.

"They're going to be in trouble if they're playing outside" I thought. No children in the back yard either. I checked with a few of the neighbor kids where I thought they might have gone to play. No luck. Just then I noticed the storm cellar tote bag was missing from beside the back door and then I knew where they were.

I got to the Taylors place about a minute or two after Juanita Taylor discovered a couple of little waifs sitting in her cellar. They had brought along their favorite doll and teddy bear. Big sister was reading a story book to little brother to keep him from being scared.

"Honey, there's not going to be a storm. You two can go on home

now," Juanita told them. Laura swore the television announcer had said we were having a tornado and should take shelter. I switched on the TV and sure enough, the weatherman was breaking in on the regular program every few minutes to discuss dire weather happenings. . .but it was way north of here in Stratford and the Okla-

homa Panhandle. Now, when I remind the kids of this event, they are thoroughly embarrased about it all. But we were pretty proud that they had heeded our instructions, and we were thankful that there wasn't actually a tornado that time.

content was 12.5 It was Tam 202 variety. Fowler's wheat made about 11 bushels to the acre. Harry Johnson, spokesman for Sherley Grain, said that the

prolonged dry spell really was hurtful, especially to the dryland wheat, as was a late cold spell.

Sherley had also received a load which was "just on the edge" of the irrigated farmland. It was irrigated only twice and made over 40 bushels per acre.

"Water goes a long way on wheat if it is applied at the right stage," Johnson said.

Electric Co-op Reviews Construction Proposals

Golden Spread Electric of Denver City. Cooperative received proposals on Friday, June 16, totaling 2,555 megawatts from bidders in response to a solicitation issued earlier by Golden Spread.

Golden Spread's solicitation was made in conjunction with an application filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for notice of intent to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant for serving peak loads. The notice of intent application was approved by the Commission on April 17.

Both the plan to construct new peaking generation and the West Texas Utilities Company for solicitation for alternative plans and proposals was made because area load forecasts show a need for additional capacity in 1998. In addition, Golden Spread is seeking to evaluate new opportunities within the electric utility industry for alternative power supply

Scheduled for initial operation in early 1998, the plant proposed by Golden Spread would consist of four 100 megawatt, simple cycle gas turbine powered generating units. Natural gas will be used as the primary fuel.

A final site selection has not been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. One site is located in Moore systems serve 94,000 retail County south of Sunray, and the other site involves properties in Yoakum and Gaines counties east

Beck. R.W. Beck will also compare the proposals to Golden Spread's generation plan.

The last day to make reservations for a booth is Saturday, July 1. The school cafeteria will be open at 7:30 a.m. Saturday, July 8 for you to set up.





Every once in a while I hear someone say, "An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth!" Maybe they do not actually quote that Old Testament law from Exodus 21:23 or Leviticus 24:20, but they say it in other words: "I'll get even!"

Revenge is a terrible task-Getting even demands that one nurse a grudge. Then, eventually, when the opportunity comes about, the injured party fulfills the vow, "I'll do the one who hurt me even worse!" Revenge refuses to let a hurt heal or a wrong be overlooked. It is the opposite of forgiveness.

If a person wants to be biblical, revenge is certainly con-vuluted thinking. One may grow bitter of soul and destroy their own self long before they have the chance to

get even.

Of course, hatred makes its own opportunities; it does not wait long! The desire for revenge will not only ruin your own life, but it also allows the one you so intensely hate to be in control of your emotions, your thoughts, and eventually, your actions.

Do you nurse a grudge? Are you now waiting your chance to "even the score?" The desire for revenge destroys relationships, marriages, homes and friendships. I have seen too many instances, some within my own extended family, of children whose lives have been made "hell" because dad and mom fought over custody of the kids after the divorce. Their parents were more interested in hurting each other as deeply as possible than they were in the true well being of their children. How sad. Revenge often backfires and cripples the innocent!

Recently I read of a young adult who refused to cooperate with law officers about a drive by shooting of which he had been the target. Never mind that several innocent bystanders had also been wounded. He would not identify his assailant: "I'll get him myself. It's no big deal. I'll see that justice is served!" No, he will not be serving justice--just his own primal instincts. Many more will probably be hurt before his revenge is satisfied.

We must realize that the 'eye for an eye, tooth for a tooth" concept is a primitive law. Unlike the Ten Commandments, the moral code of ancient Israel, the law of retaliation was a civil law meant to cause people to consider the seriousness of certain actions. But to take it as a personal vendetta instead of a corporate law for society is to take the Scriptures out of context. A text taken out of context soon becomes a pretext!

Jesus had a better idea. He understood that God, the Father, had meant the law to be for good, not a pretext for revenge. In the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5, Jesus states in verses 38 and 39. "You have heard it was said, 'Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth.' But I tell you, do not resist an evil person. If someone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also" (NIV).

We are taught as followers of Christ to love our enemies and to do good to those who do us wrong. Jesus said that we must forgive others their wrongs toward us if we ourselves expect to be forgiven of God (Matthew 6:14-15).

The Apostle Paul elaborated on this concept in Romans 12:17-21, when he stated, "Do not repay evil for evil...but overcome evil with good." Read the passage yourself. It tells you exactly how to deal with your primal urge for revenge.

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
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


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


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
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
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
