BOO! SCARED YOU, didn't I? It's time to roll up the garden hose, park the bicycles in the garage, hide the lawn furniture, lock the dog in the bathroom, and stock up on snacks and goodies because the little spooks and goblins will be roaming the town on Saturday night.

By the way, kids, if you do not need to paint on a moustache because you are now growing your own, it means you are too old to go trick-or-treating this year.

The older youngsters usually enjoy touring a "haunted house" or watching a scary movie with friends on Halloween. Even adults like getting up in costumes, attending parties and acting totally uninhibited. But most of us dull folks just stay home and answer the doorbell.

The local Halloween Carnival is a nice safe, highly-recommended alternative to all of the above.

We seem to enjoy the fantasy of trying to scare others and ourselves because it makes the warmth and safety of our own everyday lives seem all the more secure by comparison. It is good that the celebration of "All Hallow's Eve" has evolved into one autumn evening of innocent pranks and silliness. It was not always thus.

Superstition, fear of the unknown, religious intolerance, and loathing for those who are "different" were once the basis of this annual event.

One of the earliest forms of religion known to man was a sort of nature worship where the believers met outdoors for a festival during times when the seasons were changing. The ancient Druids, a priestly sect of the Celtic people of ancient Gaul and Briton, held such festivals twice each year; on the eve of May Day and on the eve of All Saints Day (Oct. 31). These pagan people believed that on this night, those who had died could return to Earth in some strange form such as cats, birds, goblins or ghosts.

This date marked the end of summer when the sun retreated before the powers of darkness and the evil ones became free for one night of wicked triumph. Any sort of light could offer protection against the evil and so grew the custom of building bonfires and carrying torches and candles. Today we carve funny faces in pumpkins (a carry-over from the ancient harvest celebrations) and light them to frighten off the "ghouls and ghousties and things that go bump in the night."

When Roman civilization took over Britain about 54 BC, the old religions were banished, but did not die out completely, as some people continued to practice the old rites in secret.

From time to time, Roman knights or monks would swear that they had come upon a clearing in the woods and had seen a group of witches dancing around the devil. What they probably saw was a group of old people celebrating one of the ancient festivals led by a priest of the heathen religion, dressed in an animal skin.

These were somewhat similar to the tribal rites practiced by American Indians led by their medicine man. The animal, killed for the sacrifice would most often be a bull or a goat.

So when the priest donned the animal skin complete with horns on the head and with tail hanging down, it would indeed appear as though the devil himself were leading a flock of people in devil-worship.

During the middle ages, fear of the unknown, led to terrible atrocities and the wrongful persecution of entire races of people. Unaccountable hardships such as disease, plagues, defeat in battle, crop failures, storms, infant deaths, physical deformities, etc.; these had to be blamed on someone. The obvious "someone" to be blamed and hated would be those who looked different, or adhered to some belief different

Bovina Is Leading District 2-A Race

Bovina High School's Mustangs will visit Whiteface on Friday. The Mustangs will be shooting for their seventh straight win of the season in their last scheduled road game of the year.

Whiteface is struggling with a 1-5 season record, and the Antelopes are winless in district play at 0-3, compared to Bovina's 6-1 and 3-0.

The Antelopes have scored only 32 points while allowing 163 for the season. They broke into the win column with a 16-14 victory over Lorenzo last Friday.

With a 3-0 district record and standing atop the district standings, the Mustangs are beginning to think "playoffs" with three games left on their schedule.

The last district championship in

football at BHS was in 1972, so if "timing" means anything, it should be Bovina's time to make the grade.

"The kids are getting excited. I've seen them come a long way (from a winless year) to the point they are now. They've earned everything they've accomplished, and I can't say enough about them," Coach Talley says.

Mustangs Top Sudan 20-15

The Bovina Mustang football team scored a big district 2-A win over the Sudan Hornets here last Friday, in a thrilling come-from-behind 20-15 victory.

Sudan scored first in the game, taking the opening kickoff and driving for a touchdown and point after.

The Mustangs answered with a drive of their own. Fullback Todd Ware, who was the team's workhorse for the night, capped the drive by running a yard for the score. Bud Venable kicked the point for a 7-7 tie.

Bovina got the ball deep in their own territory in the second quarter, but didn't stay there long. Ware broke loose for a 75-yard run, and Venable's kick gave the Mustangs a 14-7 lead that stood up until halftime.

Twice in the first half, the Mustang defense was called on to stop the speedy Hornets. Bovina stopped one drive at their own 35, but fumbled three plays later and had to stop the visitors' attack again.

In the third quarter, Sudan threw a short pass which turned into a long gainer when the receiver dashed all the way to the end zone to complete a 68-yard scoring play. The Hornets dialed a reverse pass on the PAT attempt. The play worked, and Sudan took a 15-14 lead.

Bovina answered the challenge. The Mustangs took the kickoff and began a sustained drive which covered 68 yards.

On a big third down play during the drive, Denver Riddle and Scott Scaff kept the drive going when Riddle made a "super" catch on a pass from Scaff.

Ware got the touchdown from three yards out. The team went for a two-pointer to try to neutralize Sudan's successful conversion, but Ware was stopped a half-yard short, for a 20-15 lead, with 7:14 left in the game.

Bovina managed to keep the Hornets backed up in their own territory for the rest of the game.

"I thought being able to come

from behind--twice--for the win showed a lot of character for this team. I was just as proud of this character as I was for the win. I felt we have 'arrived' as a team," said Coach Bill Talley.

Talley said this was the first time the Mustangs had been called upon to make a come-from-behind effort against an outstanding team, and they did it.

Talley said that quarterback Scott Scaff was getting better every week in running the team. He said that Scaff did a good job on the option play.

The Mustang coach also complimented Bovina's offensive line. "We ran 69 offensive plays, and only three were stopped for negative yards. I thought the line did a great job," Talley said.

Ware gained 202 yards on 23 carries, and for his efforts earned the "Player of the Week" honors from the Amarillo Globe-News this week. Noseguard Tom Fuentes, who had 12 tackles in the game, gained "honorable mention" plaudits.

Venable gained 96 yards on 22 carries, Scaff added 36 on seven attempts and Riddle had 37 on seven tries. Scaff completed three of ten passes for 43 yards.

Scaff's punting also was a factor in the game. The Mustang field general booted three times for a 45-yard average, including one punt that he had to get off while under pressure after a low snap.

Door prizes will be awarded and a quilt will be raffled off at the dinner.

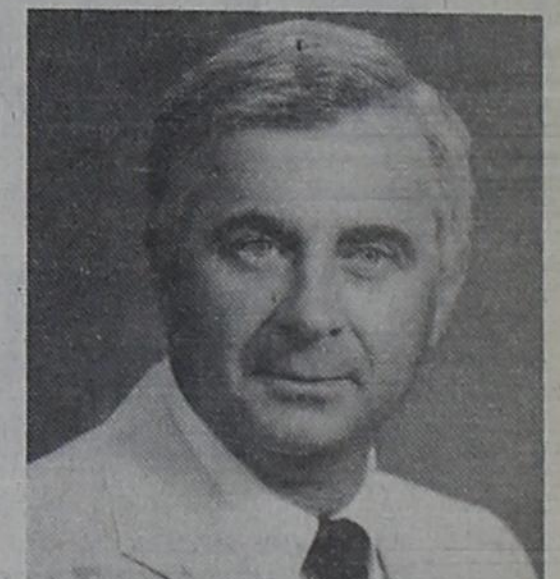
Bovina FFA Takes Orders For Fruit

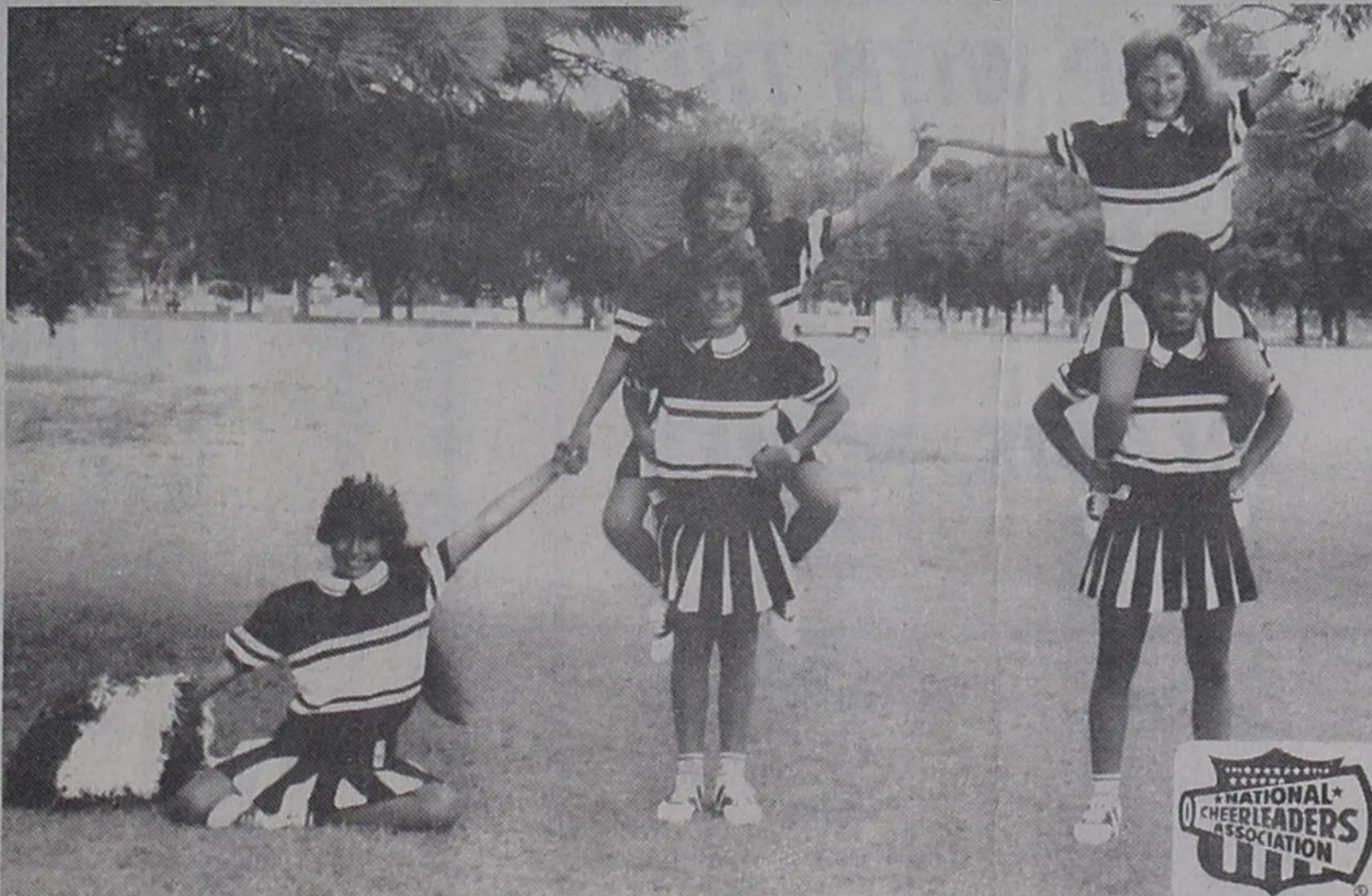
Church To Hold Fall Revival

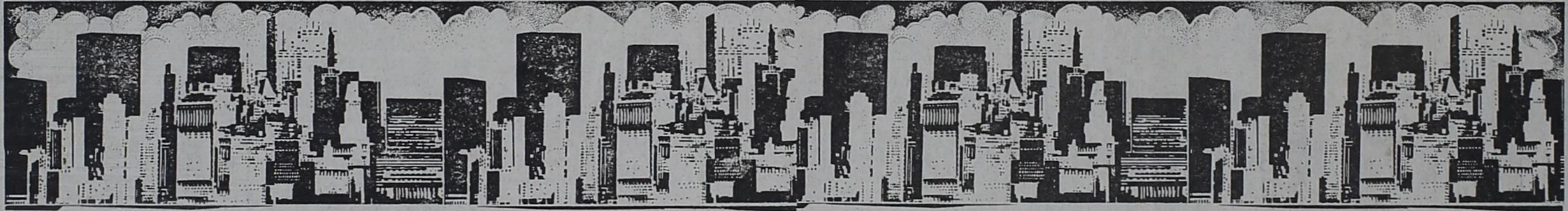

City Favors Third Cons. Amendment

Mayor Dudley Hughes of Bovina has expressed support for Amendment Number 17 on the November 3 general election ballot. The mayor said that Amendment 17 must pass if Texas cities are to successfully face the liability insurance crisis which has plagued municipal government for several years.

Amendment 17 would empower the state legislature, and not the courts to determine how much liability a city has for each of its activities. Some municipal activities, known as "governmental" activities, are subject to limits of liability. For other activities, known as "proprietary" activities, the city faces unlimited liability.

"This amendment will finally bring some predictability to the municipal insurance marketplace," the mayor said, "because it will allow the legislature to specifically determine which activities are governmental and which are proprietary. I believe that with predictability will come stabilized insurance costs."

Historically in Texas, the courts have decided whether a municipal function was governmental or proprietary. "Each court decision changed the playing field," the mayor said, "and insurance premiums continued to climb, if coverage was available at all."

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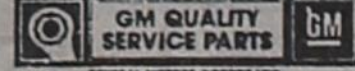

From those who happened to be in power at the time.

The superstitions which grew from dread of the occult, traveled across the ocean in the 17th century with the Puritans who colonized the New World, culminating in the famous witch trials of Salem, Massachusetts. The Puritans were anything but tolerant of dissent. The religious freedom they sought in America was for themselves only. It did not extend to those who disagreed with them. Blasphemy in the Massachusetts Bay colony in 1640 was a crime punishable by death.

In the colonies, being accused was the same as a guilty verdict regardless of the evidence. The charge of witchcraft allowed communities to rid themselves of dependent old or senile women, disabled people and poor widows. Those who could work and contribute to the community were seldom accused of any crime.

Contrary to popular notion, there were no witches burned at the stake in America. However, twenty people met death by hanging for the crime of witchcraft.

The Salem debacle is best known today, but an old woman was hung for witchcraft in 1688 in Boston, four years before the first execution in Salem. Also not well-known is the fact that all of the witches were cleared of all charges within a matter of less than twenty years. All convictions were reversed by Gov. J. Dudley in 1711 and compensation was provided for the heirs of those who had been hanged. Prosecution for witchcraft became illegal in 1736.

Ignorance and superstition have been almost completely erased in modern America and witches have become the charming villains of children's literature. Except for a few nutty folks who still believe in all that stuff, Halloween is now simply a time for fun and frolic with friends.

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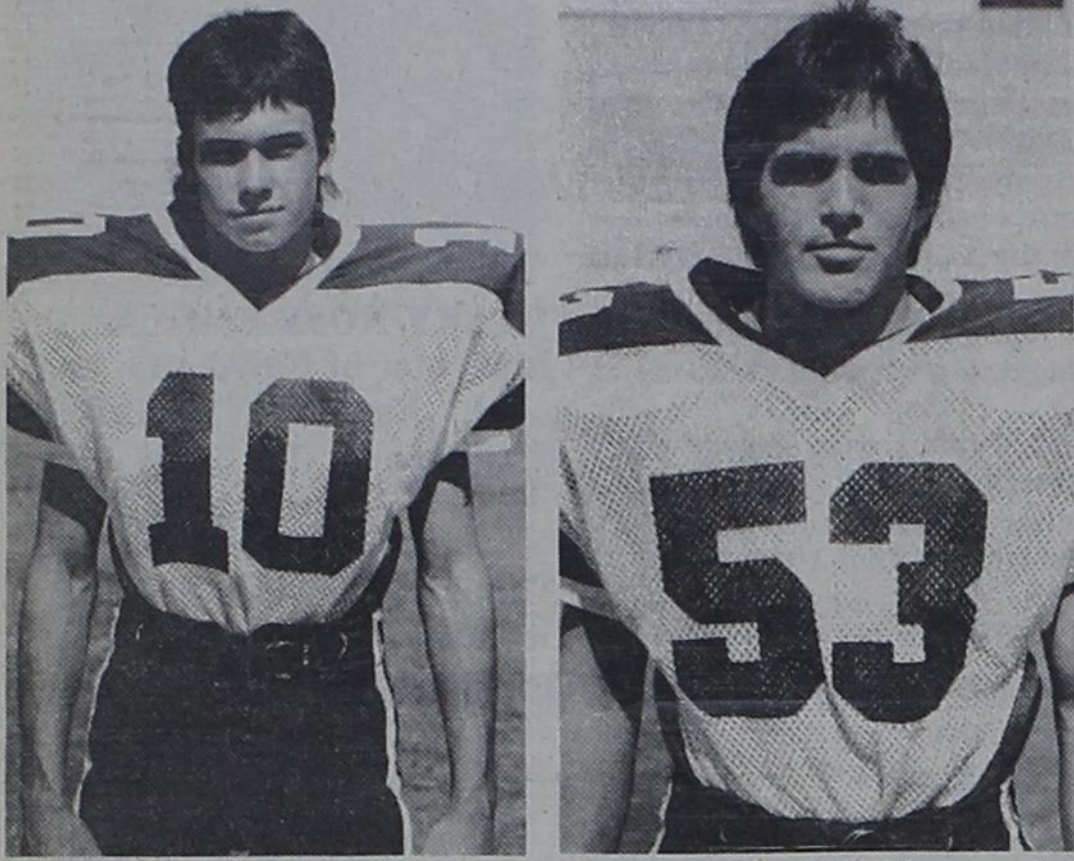


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BHS Mustangs Of The Week
