Two New Wells Started Near MBK J. M. Gist Extension in Ector

Two new tests have been started in the vicinity of M. B. K. Drilling Company No. 1 John M. Gist, Ector producer which recently extended the Foster pool over a half-mile east. Rotary is being rigged up for Arrow Drilling Company No. 9 Foster, a west offset to the first Gist well. It was staked 2,310 feet from the south, 330 from the east line of section 8, block 42, township 2 south, T. & P. survey.

One-quarter mile north of No. 1 Gist, M. B. K. is digging cellar and pits for No. 2 Gist, 990 feet from the north, 330 from the west line of section 9, block 42.

Half-mile east extension of south end of Ector's North Cowden pool was assured as Cities Service Oil Company No. 1 Rhodes filled 900 feet with oil in drilling to 4,128 feet in time. It was drilling at that depth this morning. Operators plan to bottom the well at around 4,200 feet, then will give it a nitro shot. First pay was encountered from 4,077-82, with broken increases below that point. Steel line corrected 4,094 to equal 4,097 feet, and at that depth, the well had 300 feet of oil in the hole. It had 500 feet in the hole at 4,113, representing some 12 hours accumulation.

Record potential for the North Cowden pool was set by Texon Oil & Land Company No. 5 Midland National Bank which flowed 2,975.47 barrels of 33.4-gravity oil in 24 hours, with gas-oil ratio 880-1. It was shot with 480 quarts in pay zones between 4,220 and 4,380 feet, the total depth. Previous largest producer was Stanolind No. 2 Cowden, with potential of 2,301 barrels daily.

Search Given Up for Ship Sending SOS

No Wreckage Found By Vessel Reaching Scene Reported

CHATHAM, Mass., Feb. 23 (AP)—A search was abandoned today for an unnamed vessel which yesterday cracked out an S. O. S. reporting she had been torpedoed near the Azores.

The search in the area given by the message revealed no wreckage. All vessels believed near the location were accounted for.

Concerning possibility the message might have been a hoax, officials here said the S. O. S. itself was undoubtedly genuine.

The unnamed vessel had reported she was struck below the water line by a torpedo from an unknown submarine and was sinking 360 miles south of the Azores.

Perkins No-Billed By Grand Jury for Slaying of Traynor

Col. John Perkins, Midland attorney, was no-billed by a district court grand jury here Tuesday following investigation by the group of the alleged slaying last December 29 of Don Traynor, 27, Perkins' son-in-law and former member of the Whittaker, Perkins and Turpin law firm.

Meanwhile, the grand jury brought in five indictments, including three for theft one for forgery and one for driving while intoxicated.

Preparedness Talks Feature Program at Rotary Club Today

Preparedness was the subject of talks at the Rotary club today, culminating observance of National Defense week. Col. John Perkins was in charge of the program, with talks by Tom Sealy, T. Paul Barron and the chairman.

Speaking first, Barron advocated a middle ground between militarism and pacifism, pointing out that a rich country which was weak in defense would whet the appetite of nations or rulers ambitious for power and riches.

Sealy used as his subject George Washington's motto for defense, "In Time of Peace, Prepare for War," saying that preparedness was especially important to the United States since the recent "Peace of Munich" in which Germany gained what was asked for through "forced" accord from democratic nations of Europe.

The governor sent speaker Morse a box of letters and postcards and petitions and suggested any interested house members look through them and then make them available to the senate.

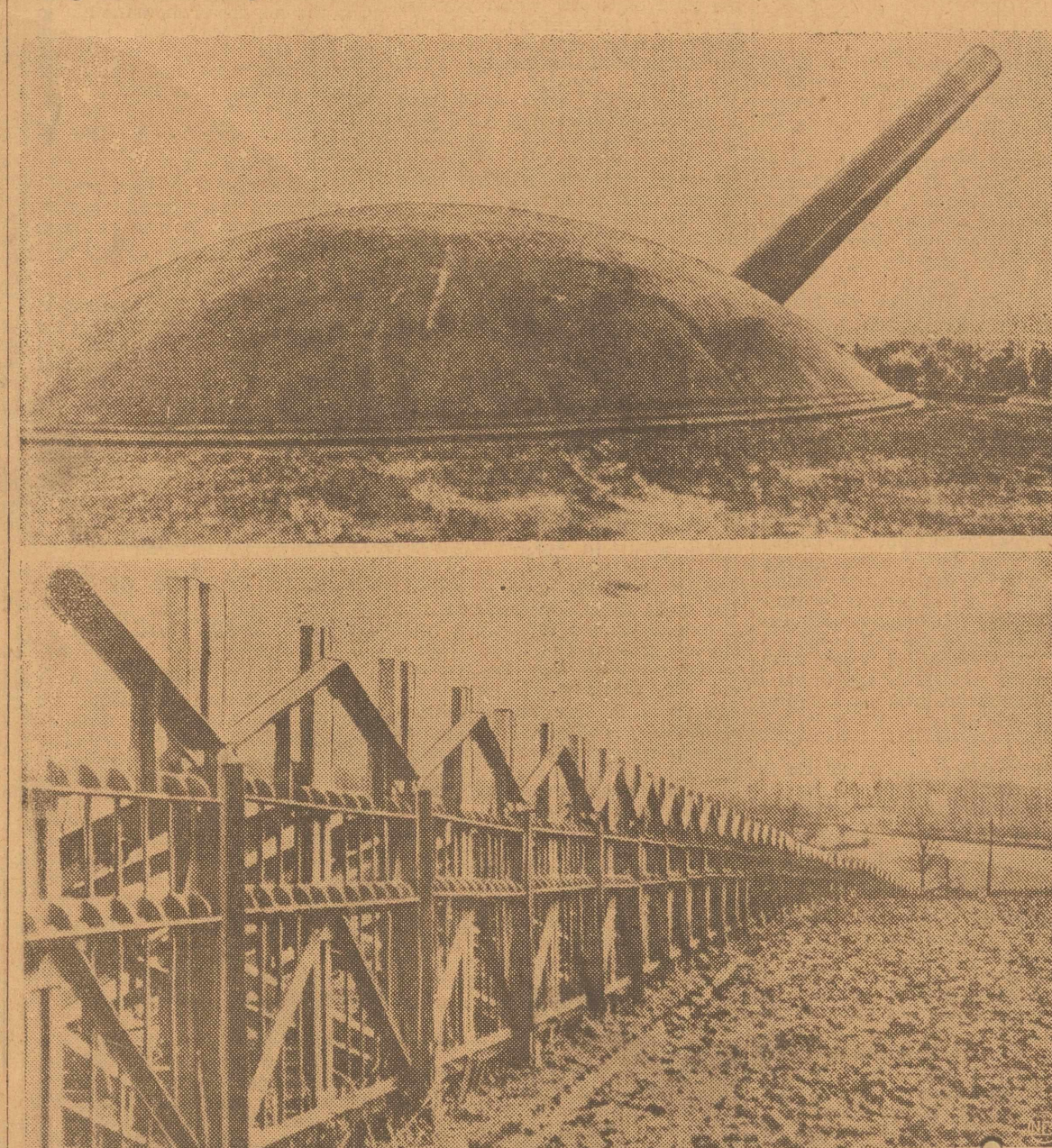

Lost Tourist Mystery Again Revived as Skeleton Found

LOS LUNAS, N. M., Feb. 23 (AP)—Authorities differed last night over the possibility of connecting a skeleton found in a Rio Grande sand bar with the baffling disappearance four years ago of four Illinois tourists.

The skeleton was found by two boys near Eelen bridge. District Attorney John Baron Burg regarded it as a clue to the fate of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Heberer and Mr. and Mrs. George Lorus of East St. Louis, who dropped from sight while motoring through New Mexico in May, 1935.

Burg said the skeleton appeared to be that of a woman, and that the skull showed a bullet hole. Undersheriff Henry Jaramillo of Valencia county expressed belief the bones were older than a four-year-old skeleton and that they belonged to a woman much younger than either Mrs. Heberer or Mrs. Lorus.

Jaramillo also said it would be difficult to identify positively the small hole in the back of the skull as a bullet hole.

The only clue of any nature to the fate of the two couples was the discovery of some burned clothing, identified as belonging to them, on the mesa east of Albuquerque. Later, some traveling clothes belonging to Lorus were cashed in Texas, and his automobile was found abandoned in Dallas.

Goodman Asks New Judicial District For West Texas

AUSTIN, Feb. 23.—A bill to create a new judicial district and to reorganize the 70th and 100th judicial districts in West Texas has been introduced in the legislature by Rep. James H. Goodman of Midland.

The new district would be the 128th judicial district. It would be composed of Ector, Ward, Midland and Crane counties.

Under the reorganization the 70th and the 128th would have concurrent jurisdiction in Midland and Ector counties, and the 100th and the 128th would have concurrent jurisdiction in Crane and Ward counties.

Reasons cited by Goodman for the proposed creation of the new district were (1) rapid increase in population of the West Texas counties, (2) great increase in litigation accompanying oil development, and (3) unprecedented increase in business.

The Midland representative proposed to have the governor appoint a district judge and a district attorney for the new district to serve until the next general election. The new court would help clear a crowded docket in existing courts.

The new court would be in session in Ector county for a total of 22 weeks a year; Ward county, eight weeks; Midland county, eight weeks; and Crane county, six weeks.

Congress to Be Asked for Improvements

Administration Is Ready to Help Out, Secretary Avows

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP).—Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau told business men today they not only need not worry about new taxes but may hope for improvements in present taxes to help business.

Expanding on and endorsing President Roosevelt's statements last week that business men need fear no new taxes, Morgenthau said:

"I sincerely hope congress will take a careful look at tax laws and see if there are any deterrents holding back business and business men from making further commitments. I think the business man ought to feel the administration wants him to go ahead and take normal business risks and make money."

Chrysler Plant Is Closed Down After Union Forces Clash

DETROIT, Feb. 23 (AP).—Fist fighting on the assembly line in the United Automobile Workers Wednesday forced closing of the Chrysler corporation's Plymouth division and made more than 17,500 workers in four factories temporarily idle.

Ed Hall, an international vice-president aligned with the CIO-supported UAW faction, described the Plymouth trouble as a strike and placed pickets at plant gates urging men not to work.

Hall said the management had refused to recognize his group's bargaining committee.

A leader of the Plymouth faction supporting Homer Martin in the battle for UAW control said his group had "no dispute with the management and wants to work."

McCall Appeal Is Denied by Judge

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 23 (AP).—Judge Rufus Foster of the United States circuit court of appeals here again today denied application for a writ of habeas corpus which would have delayed the execution of Franklin Pierce McCall for the kidnap-slaying of five-year-old James Cash.

The judge, as he did yesterday, held sufficient reason for interference was not presented.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 23 (AP).—Judge Rufus E. Foster, senior judge of the United States fifth circuit court of appeals, late Wednesday denied an application for a certificate of probable cause which would have delayed the execution of Franklin Pierce McCall, scheduled to die at Raiford, Fla., Friday for the fatal kidnaping of five-year-old Jimmy Cash.

The certificate would have allowed McCall's counsel an appeal to the Florida supreme court for a review of the case.

E. C. Rutledge of Jacksonville, chief counsel for McCall, made the application before Judge Foster. Associate Counsel C. A. Averitt was in Washington seeking a stay of execution and a writ of certiorari from the United States supreme court.

### For All of Texas

(Amarillo Daily News)

It is not well for a state legislature to get into the habit of squabbling. Governor O'Daniel has been under fire for his appointments from the first hour he took office, and while some of the criticism and protests may have been justified, there should be an end to all things.

After his appointment of Carr P. Collins of Dallas as chairman of the highway commission was rejected by the senate, Governor O'Daniel named J. C. Hunter of Abilene. Now Mr. Hunter is a capable man, respected by the entire state. He will make a good commission chairman. But a group of East Texas senators are "leveling down" on the appointment, and are working behind the scenes to have Mr. Hunter rejected in the senate.

Amarillo wanted the chairmanship, too. We thought we had a perfect right after all these years of battling for highways in the Panhandle to have the job. And there were several Amarillo men available who would have filled the place with credit to the entire state. But Abilene's Mr. Hunter was named instead, and Amarillo bows out gracefully.

If East Texas would be as graceful, and if other sectional quarrels could be lifted out of politics and the petty squabbling in Austin reduced to a minimum, the legislature might have some substantial achievements to show for the money being spent at Austin. As it is, we are getting little except a bad name from coast to coast.

This business of sniping unnecessarily at the governor through his appointees does the state no good. The inter-play of politics, whereby one group says, "If he won't give us what we want, let's see that nobody else get it," is dog-in-the-manger stuff. A great deal can be accomplished in the supposedly dignified legislative halls at Austin by constructive politics, but this everlasting squabbling is helping nobody except the newspaper correspondents who thrive on such goings-on.

We are all Texans, whether we come from Amarillo or Tyler, J. C. Hunter of Abilene is a Texan and a capable one. Let's congratulate Abilene, then pitch in and help Mr. Hunter make good as a representative, not of West Texas, but of Texas.

### Basketball Comes Natural to Ace of Baylor Bear Club

WACO, Texas, Feb. 20.—Basketball just comes natural for Happy Shahan, outstanding performer of the Baylor Bears, for he has been playing it in some shape or fashion for the past 20 years.

It all began when James Tullis, that's what his mother and father call him, was in his grades. His father, J. W. Shahan, who was also somewhat of an athlete himself in his youth, gave him a small rubber ball to cut his teeth on. Shahan's mother maintains that Happy came through for his Dad by repeatedly chucking the small object at a knot hole in the wall.

Later, when Shahan was big enough to walk, his father gave him a much bigger ball and Happy spent many an hour battling the ball from one room to another. It just seemed that the Whitehouse youth was destined to be a court performer.

When the household furnishings became battered and torn by the constant batting of the ball, Happy's father decided that he needed a goal to shoot at so he nailed a barrel hoop to the smokehouse, and told Happy to start throwing the ball through the hoop. And today, that old hoop still hangs on the smokehouse wall.

Year in and year out, Happy concentrated on throwing the big leather ball at the hoop and before he was old enough to go to high school, he was fully capable of playing that class of ball. He would go to the high school and play with the older boys on the squad and time and again, they had to run Happy out and lock the doors before they could get down to serious practice.

Finally he got his first chance at the court game. Whitehouse organized a junior basketball team, and Happy was the mainstay of the team for three years, during which time, they won the County title for three consecutive times, without losing a game.

Then came high school and Happy immediately became the star of the team, and residents of the small East Texas town say that he is one of the best players to ever come out of that section of the state.

But during his third year in high school, he was in a car accident, and his crooked right arm is the result. After the accident, he thought that his basketball playing days were over but with a keen determination backed by ten years of basketball training, he started out again, and the only change was that when he entered Tyler Junior college, he was switched from a high scoring forward to a guard position where he was later to become one of the best all-around performers to play for the Green and Gold.

He became a star at Tyler almost instantly, and was an all-conference player for two straight years, being captain of the Tyler five his last year. From there, he came to Baylor and took to his basketball chores as a member of the Baptist freshman five.

In his sophomore year, Happy grabbed a place on the first string varsity quintet, and has been there ever since. Here at Baylor, he doesn't shoot very much but has become a great ball handler and all of the Bruin scoring threats are centered around the passing and ball shagging of the Whitehouse youth whom the Baylor followers know lives and talks basketball 12 months in every year.

Trained by W. J. Hirsch, Cien-cia is owned by Robert Kleberg of Texas.

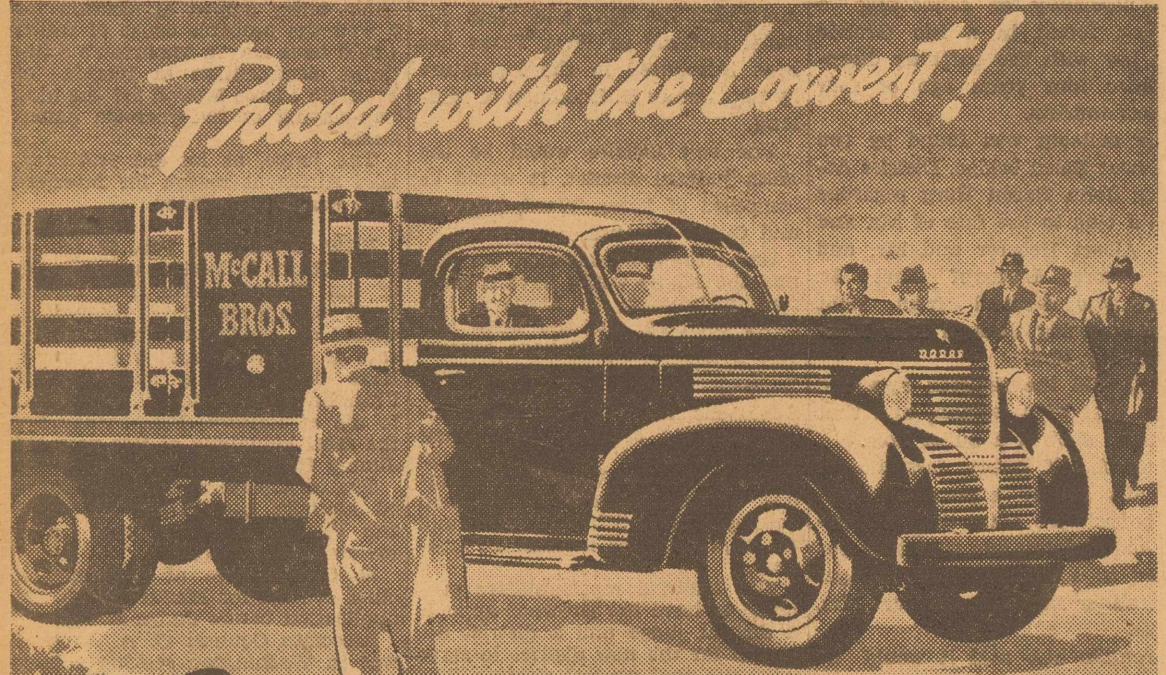

**College's Loss Faces Columbia**

NEW YORK, (U.P.) — New College, established at Columbia University as a progressive unit for the instruction of teachers, has been waging a losing battle for its life. After seven years, the college, faced with a \$57,000 deficit last year, probably will close this June unless an unexpected source of revenue is found.

William F. Russell, dean of Teachers College of Columbia University recommended discontinuance of New College in a report to Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia.

"We are confronted with problems which appear unsurmountable," Russell said. "We are convinced that only a subsidy of \$35,000 a year can provide the kind of program we want. We cannot look to the students. It would require double tuition charges."

Students, protesting the proposed dissolution, sent two statements to Russell, one from the student body and the other from the faculty.

The faculty said it thought the breaking up of the college would have a demoralizing effect on American education in general and teacher education especially. At this particular moment, when teacher education is on the point of moving forward, New College could undoubtedly have an outstanding part in the movement. The passing of New College will destroy the position of Teachers College as a leader in the education of new teachers and seriously damage its general standing throughout the country.

The student body, in its statement, pointed out that 67 articles had been written about New College, six of which appeared as chapters in books on education. The statement disclaimed the deficit as a reason for closing, contending that the deficit this year will be only \$15,000.

"We are interested in inquiring whether, if this deficit were reduced or removed, New College would continue," the students said. "The given cause is not, in our minds, sufficient reason for closing the college."

## Indecision May Mean Death From Disease That Is Curable

A few years ago a certain attorney told the following story: "A wood cutter had accidentally received a wound in his leg from a sharp axe, and an artery had been severed. His neighbors rushed him to town and called in the three advisors. The man was bleeding profusely—the advisors consulted—one wanted to use cautery to stop the hemorrhage—one wanted to use hemostat—and one wanted to use a ligature. While these men were debating, and before they could reach an agreement, the poor wood cutter bled to death."

As far as venereal diseases are concerned, there should be no disagreement, because all doctors know the specific causes for venereal diseases—they also know the correct methods of prevention—and they also know the modern methods of treatment.

Since there is no argument about the specific causes of venereal diseases, it would necessarily follow that we have two subjects to deal with: PREVENTION and CURE.

Abstinence from unclean contacts will reduce the incidence to a large per cent. This will leave only those cases that become infected innocently, and there are many, many cases of innocent infection. Therefore, it is impossible for any given person to state that he is free from venereal disease, unless he has had a complete examination by a competent physician. Your physician is the one in whom you can confide, and the one whom you should trust implicitly, and be guided by his advice in the diagnosis and treatment of venereal diseases.

Venereal diseases left untreated cause blindness, rheumatism, heart disease, mental and physical degeneration. It is the greatest wrecking of homes—killer of the innocent—stillbirth and abortions, and if venereal diseases are not curbed, will cause degeneration of the human family.

The American Legion is composed of fighting men and women. You have been tried in the balance and found to have unusual valor.

We are now engaged in this great fight to preserve humanity. Public conception on this topic is dense and dark. Many people think that all venereal diseases are one and the same—which is not true.

We cannot create enthusiasm without discussing this matter, and it should be discussed freely by intelligent people who are capable of explaining just what it is all about. We need enthusiasm—not only a State, but a National campaign that will result in every infected person being brought under treatment and continued under treatment until these diseases are eradicated.

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, announces that the State Health Department, using funds appropriated by the United States Public Health Service, is now assisting the physicians in some sixty counties in Texas in the diagnosis and treatment of venereal diseases.

Dr. Cox feels that the American Legion and Auxiliary of Texas are among the greatest exponents of public health in its warfare on disease in this State, and is very anxious for the American Legion and Auxiliary to sponsor, in their various posts and auxiliaries, educational programs to help humanity win this fight against itself.
