

Browns Couldn't Get Hutchinson So They Took His Battery Mate, Hal Spindel, From Seattle Team

The St. Louis Browns couldn't get Freddie Hutchinson, who went to Detroit for a chunk and players, so they did the next best thing. They drafted his catcher, and Fred Haney suspects that his new club could have done worse.

Haney figures that no pitcher as young as Hutchinson could win 25 games in his first year for Seattle or any other AA outfit on his own ability and knowledge alone.

The chances are that somebody contributed a lot to his success. And Hal Spindel caught every one of Hutchinson's engagements and his 310 in 122.

Good catchers are as scarce as heavyweight fighters who can hold up their hands.

The Tigers need one badly. Having gone so far to obtain Hutchinson, it might have been well for them to have closed the deal before the draft . . . and brought his battery mate along.

The Browns appear strongly equipped behind the plate regardless of how capable Spindel turns out.

Joe Glenn did an excellent job of spelling Bill Dickey in 1938 . . . was an outstanding star of the Yankees' key series in Cleveland.

Hank Leiber says that he is in better shape than at any time since he was struck on the head, by one of Bullet Bob Feller's pitches in an

"My legs are sound and I am finally free of the severe headaches that bothered me for two seasons," explains the center-field-

er. Leiber considers himself extremely fortunate in that it wasn't one of Feller's fast ones that laid him low. It was a half-speed curve that put him in the hospital for weeks brought on a temporary paralysis.

EXPERIMENTING WITH STANCE DISASTROUS TO LEIBER

Leiber blames himself for getting hit. He was experimenting with his batting stance . . . trying to work out a change.

"Before that game Earl Averill and some of the other Cleveland players advised me not to fool with a new stance against Feller," he relates. "They said they never got close to the plate or dug in very hard against him even in practice. 'But I tried the new stance anyway, and it was because of the unfamiliar position that I couldn't duck the pitch.'"

Leiber believes he will hit better at Wrigley Field than he did for the Giants in the Polo Grounds because he is a center and left-center-field hitter.

A 400-foot drive in that area is an easy putout at the Polo Grounds. A 400-foot smack will be out of the park in most sections of Wrigley Field . . . will at least hit the wall in the deepest portion.

Livestock Shipments In State Increase

AUSTIN.—Spring round-up has apparently started early in the Texas cattle industry. For all classes of livestock moved to market last month in far greater numbers than in January last year. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research said today.

Reports to the Bureau, in conjunction with the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics, received from all shipping stations in the State showed total shipments to Fort Worth stockyards and interstate points of 6,000 carloads, 23.3 per cent greater than in January, 1938.

Cattle shipments gained 23.3 per cent to total 4,473 cars; hogs bounced upward 35.9 per cent, totaling 972 cars, hogs increased 15.9 per cent, to 635 cars; and sheep, 520 cars, increased 13.3 per cent.

Receipts of Texas cattle and calves at the Fort Worth market were moderately below those of January last year, but receipts of hogs and sheep at that market were sharply above those of a year ago.

127 Corporations Get New Charters

AUSTIN.—A total of \$1,869,000 of capital stock was invested in 127 new corporations receiving charters during January to operate in Texas, the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas announced today.

This capitalization represented an increase of 27 per cent over that recorded in December, but a drop

of 9.3 per cent from January, 1938. The number of new concerns was 4.6 per cent above the preceding month but a slump of 17.7 per cent from the corresponding month last year.

"The principal gainers were the corporations classed as real estate-building, and transportation," the Bureau's report said.

Galento and Louis Meef Next June in New York, Agreed

DETROIT, Feb. 28. (AP).—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis will defend his title against Tony Galento, the rotund Orange, N. J., contender, in New York in the last week in June. Joan Rozborough, manager of the negro boxer, announced last night.

Galento has been seeking a bout with Louis for several months and a deal was finally completed between Promoters Mike Jacobs of New York and Herman "Mugsy" Taylor of Philadelphia; Joe Jacobs, manager of Galento, and Sol Straus of New York who is Jacobs' personal attorney. Taylor enters the picture because he holds a contract giving him exclusive rights to Galento's service for five years.

Latin-America Institute Planned

AUSTIN.—Plans for establishment of a Latin-American Institute at The University of Texas were a step nearer completion today following endorsement by academic, business and graduate school faculties.

Such an institute was one of the points in a five-star expansion program for the University advocated by President-Elect Homer P. Rainey in his recent appearance before the Texas Legislature.

The plan drafted by a faculty committee of eight, appointed by President J. W. Calhoun last month, would provide for an undergraduate degree in Latin-American studies, compounded of work in Arts and Sciences and in Business Administration, and for both master's and doctor's degrees majoring in Latin American studies in the Graduate School. The new degree would stress work in the natural sciences, foreign languages, and the social sciences.

The School of Business Administration has also made plans to offer a new degree, a major in international law, with special emphasis on Latin-American countries. Advanced work will be possible with the cooperation of the Graduate School.

Efforts to establish the Institute first began in 1936 under the initiative of the Board of Regents. President Calhoun greatly accelerated the movement last year. On January 2, Major J. R. Parten, member of the Board of Regents, said

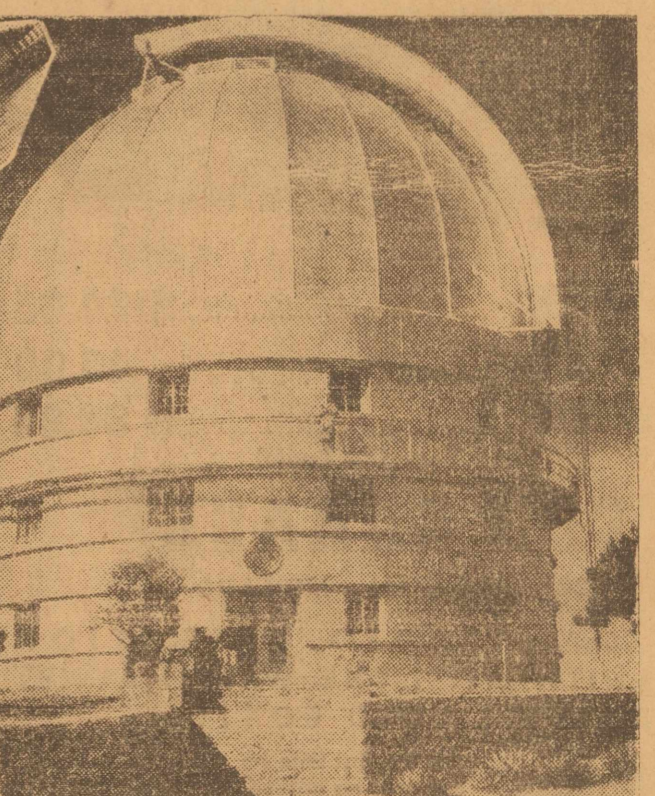
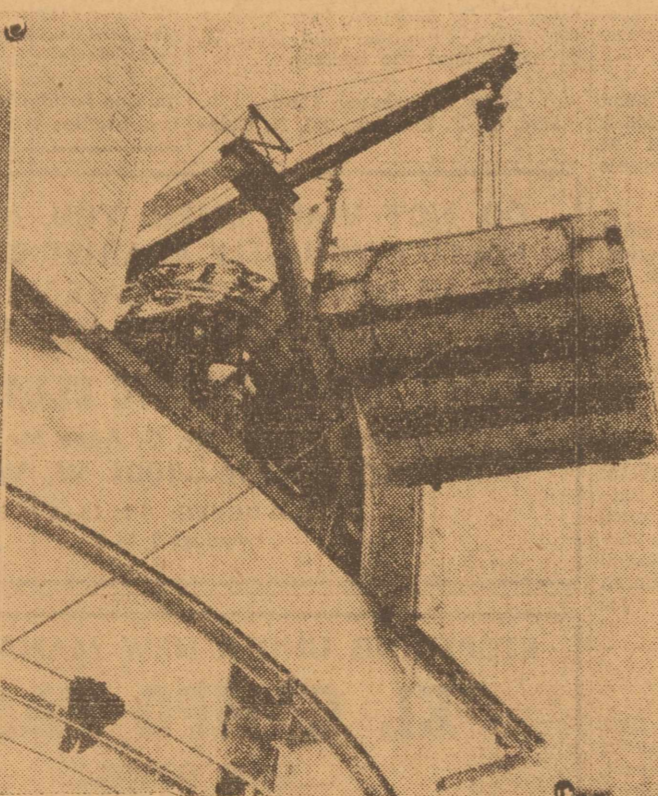
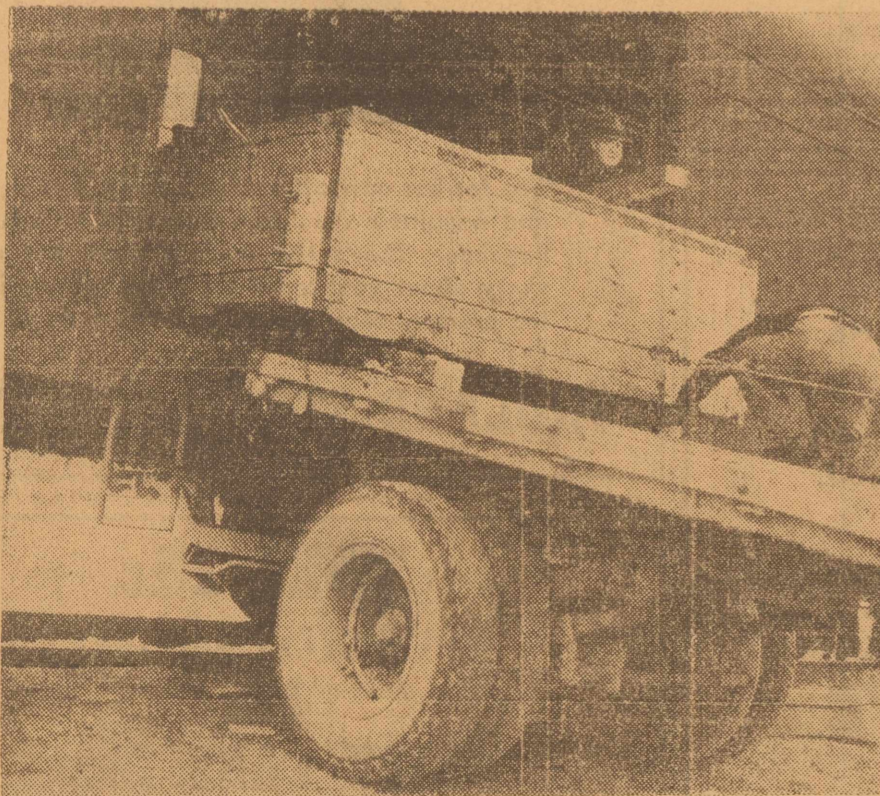

As New Giant Telescope Was Installed at McDonald Observatory



Installation of the 82-inch lens for the great telescope, second largest finished sky-instrument in the world, at McDonald Observatory will be completed this week. Operated jointly by the Universities of Texas and Chicago, the observatory is the realization

of a seven-year dream initiated by the bequest to the Texas institution of \$1,000,000 by the late W. J. McDonald, Paris, Texas, capitalist.

Reading from left to right:

1. Its cross-country rail journey completed, the

mirror is unloaded from box car to truck for its 32-mile mountainous trip from Alpine to Mount Locke.

2. The two and one-half ton mirror, encased in its elaborate packing, being hoisted up the side of the observatory dome.

3. Mounting for the 82-inch "eye" which will enable astronomers to keep watch on infinitesimal constellations and nebulae.

4. The 125-ton aluminum dome of the observatory, atop Mount Locke high in the Davis Mountains near Fort Davis.

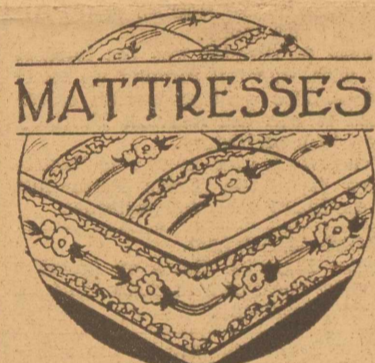

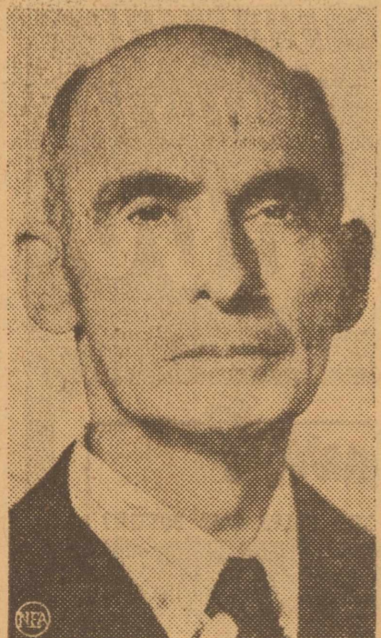

Drug Wakens His Memory



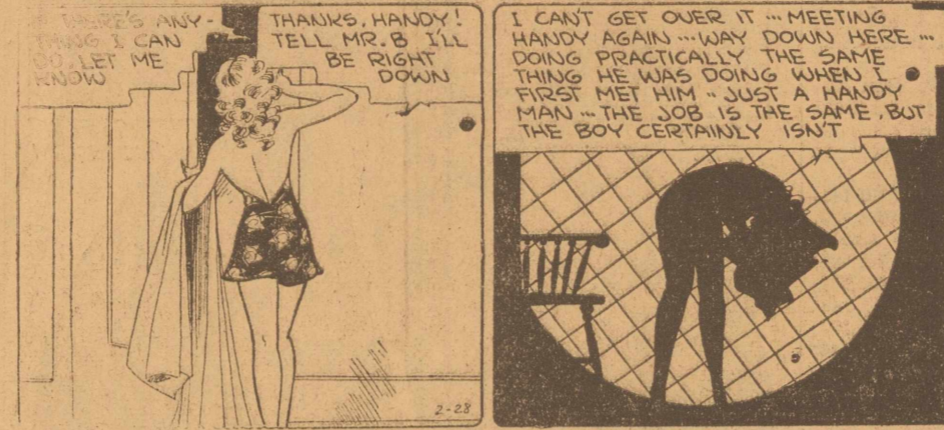

553 WPA Projects Completed In This Area Since PWA Start

SAN ANGELO.—Men and women, all of whom were jobless at the time of their assignment to WPA, have performed 14,660,242 man-hours of work to complete 535 public improvement projects in this section since the inception of the Works Progress Administration program, it was reported today by John C. Burnside, administrative officer.

Covering three and one-half years of WPA activity, Burnside's report detailed expenditures of \$7,002,907 in the 29 counties administered from the San Angelo office. Cities, counties and independent school districts provided more than one-fourth of this amount, expending \$1,982,139 as their share of participation in projects for which the Federal government supplied \$5,020,768.

Federal cost per man-hour of operating the WPA projects was 35.7 cents, Burnside said, 28.8 cents of this amount having been disbursed for labor in the form of security wage checks, and the remaining 6.9 utilized for material, equipment and supplies.

Number of Employed Men in State Drops

AUSTIN.—Despite gains in cotton textile mills, commercial printing establishments, brick and tile factories and cement plants, the number of workers employed in Texas dropped slightly last month, University of Texas Bureau of Research reported today.

Payrolls also slanted downward from the December level, San Antonio, 1938, figures. Representative Texas businesses reported a total number of workers 4.7 per cent below December and 1.7 per cent below last January.

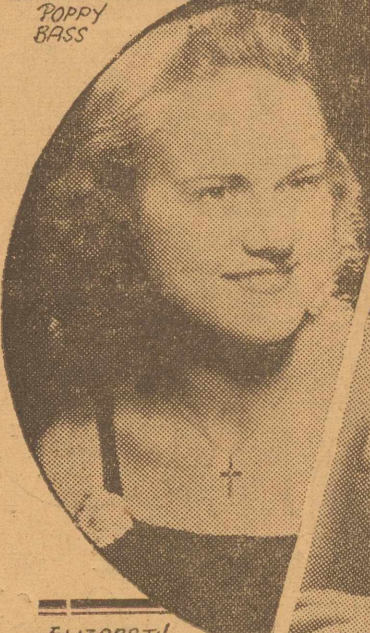
