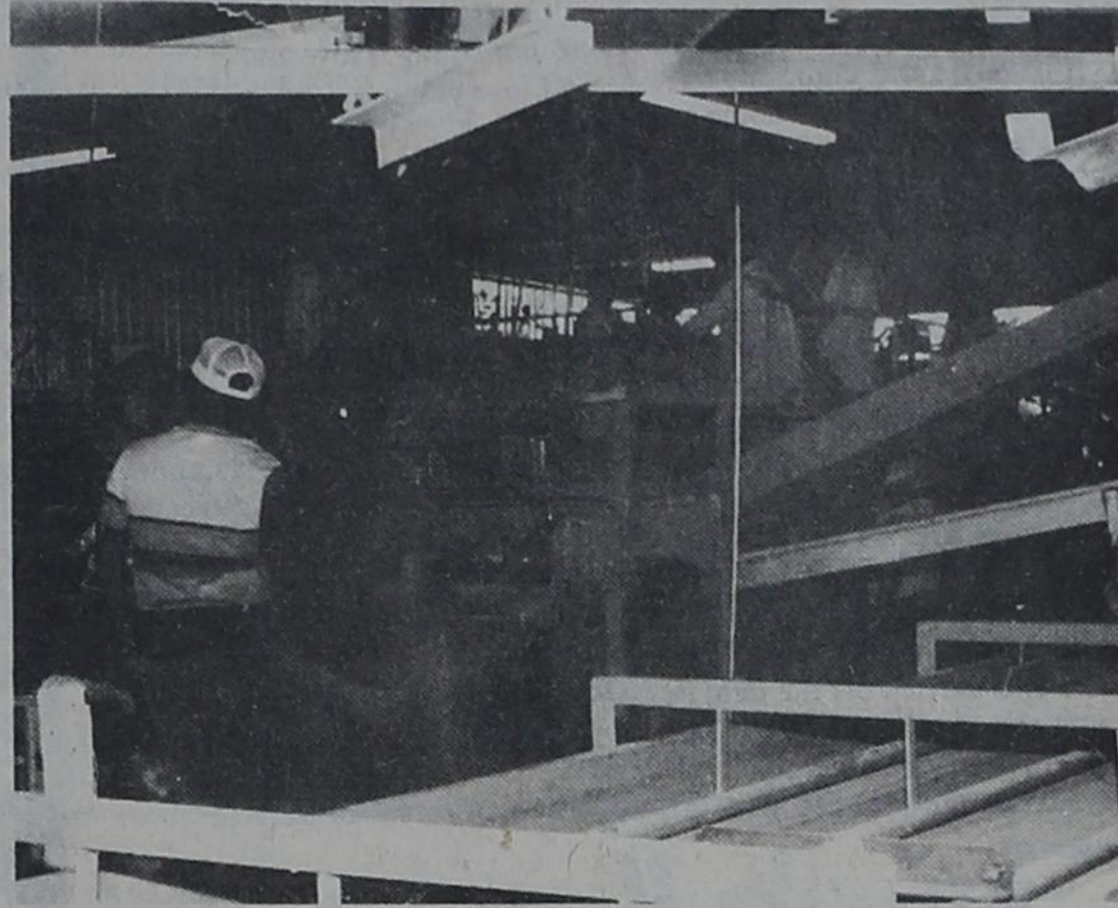
## Three Are Arrested On Theft Here

Warrants were issued Tuesday, July 19, for the arrests of Richard Moar, 25, of Bovina; Juan Sanchez and Lalo Sanchez, field workers and U.S. Citizens, for the theft of two hogs belonging to Lawrence Widner and valued at \$2,000.00.

Officer Mel Clark stopped the men in the 200 block on Second Street on July 18 at 1:27 a.m. driving a pickup truck with expired license plates. Clark had issued two warning tickets prior to this time.

The vehicle was then impounded and shortly afterwards, the hogs were discovered in the bed of the pickup. The hogs had been stolen from the Widner farm west of town. They had been shot and their throats cut.

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts set bond at \$3,000 each. The men were taken to Parmer County jail but later posted bond and were released pending action by the Grand Jury.

## Commission Re-Invests Certificates

County Commissioners voted to pay the county's annual sponsorship donation of \$2,430 to the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center of Plainview at its meeting on July 11. The county is one of nine counties who sponsor the center.

Boarding care bills of \$2,073 for the county's foster children were approved. This amount is reimbursed to the county.

Approval was granted Friona State Bank to substitute \$500,000 in U.S. Treasury Notes maturing May 31, 1985 for \$500,000 Treasury Notes which mature August 31, 1983.

Benna Felts, county treasurer, presented the quarterly report on county finances. Motion was passed approving the statement, with notation that the report be published in the three Parmer County newspapers.

At the suggestion of Mrs. Felts, a motion was approved to reinvest \$100,000 in Farm to Market Road funds in a certificate of deposit to mature in 14 days. Another \$100,000 in Farm to Market funds were re-invested in a C.D. which will mature on August 23, 1983. Also, \$100,000 in General Funds were re-invested in a 14-day certificate, and a like amount was placed in a new C.D. maturing August 23, 1983.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Jim Bishop met with the court to discuss the lease on the radar units used in the county, which lease was about to expire. After discussing details involved, the court voted to renew the lease on the radar units.

Soil conservation work was approved for four county farms, depending upon availability of machinery; such work to be paid for by the farmers involved. The requests approved were on the farms of G.F. Trimble, Larry Scott, Billy Sudderth and the Jerrington farm.

## City Woman's Nephew Dies In Accident

Richard Tidwell, 23, of Nowata, Oklahoma, was fatally injured in a skiing accident Sunday, July 24. Tidwell was struck by an oncoming boat near the one he had been waterskiing behind. His brother, David, was riding in the boat that had been pulling him, and watched as Richard was killed.

Tidwell was survived by his wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Tidwell of Nowata; three brothers and one sister.

Services were held in Nowata Monday of this week.

Richard was Bessie Webb's nephew.

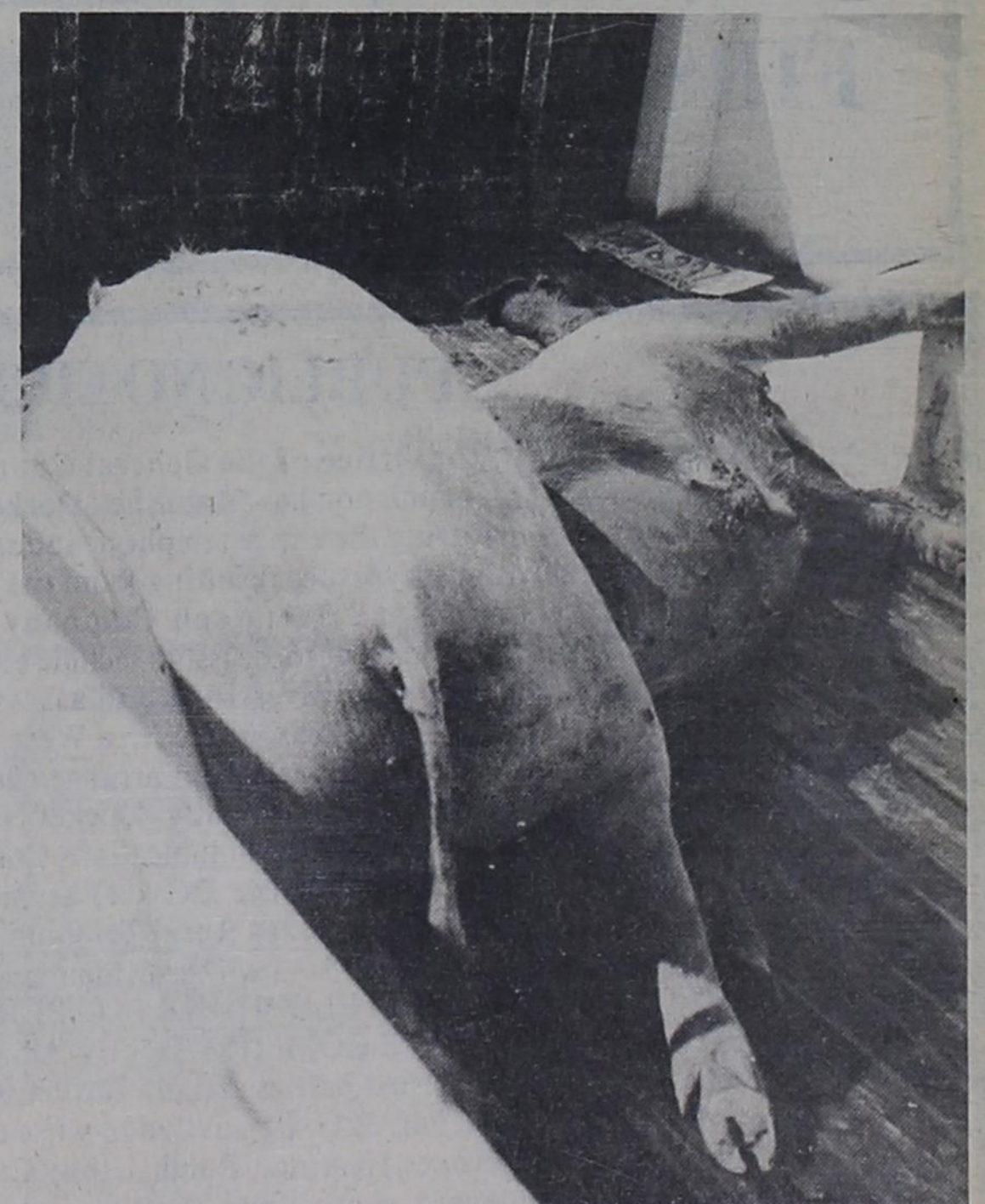
Operations began on July 12, and approximately 35 people have been employed at the company.

Although vegetables had a slow start due to the cold spring, it was stated that potato yields were running 200 to 250 bags per acre.

Buck Neil of Farwell is serving as manager of the vegetable shed, and his wife Nancy is bookkeeper.

It was stated that there are approximately 450 acres of potatoes in the Bovina area this year. The yield from the acres harvested so far has been termed good, and the price has been "reasonable."

Currently, the processing plant is "between crops," as the early run of potatoes have been processed, and later fields are not quite ready.

Great-grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Pruitt of Bovina and Christene Pearson of Kerrville.

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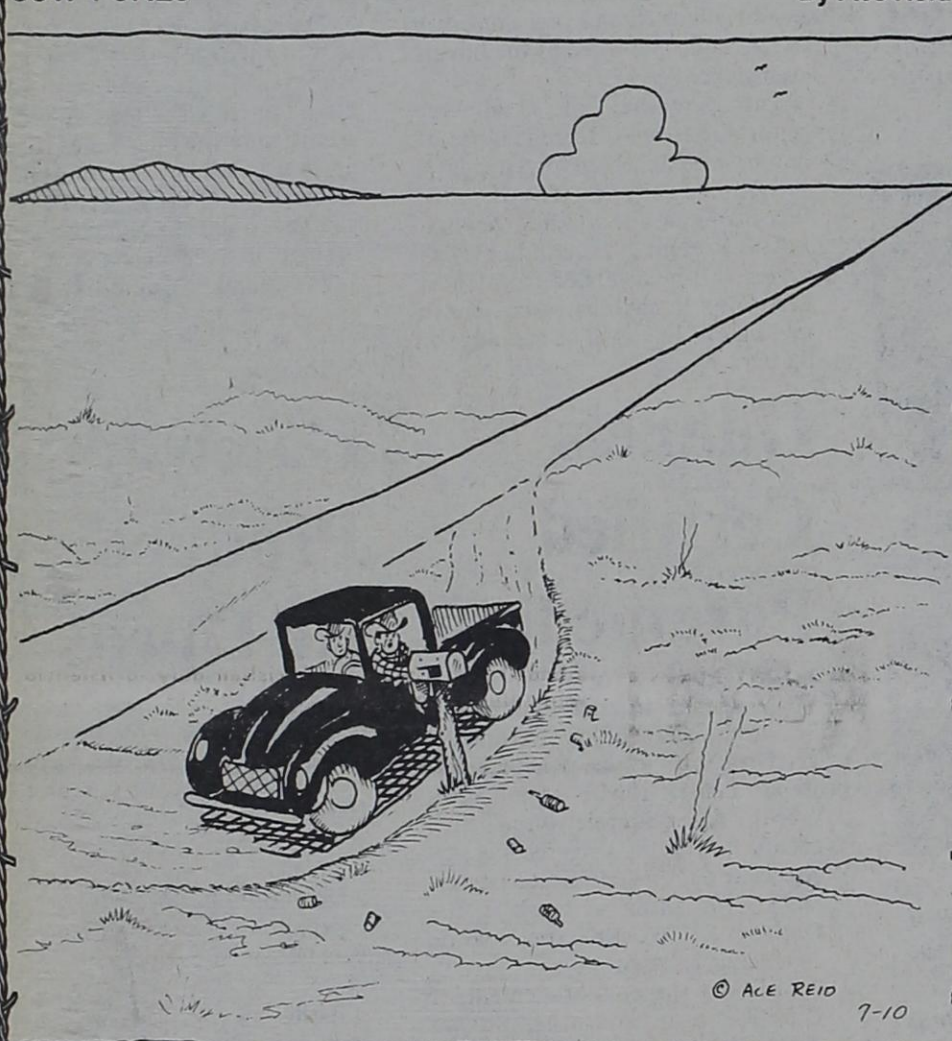

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## F. Bates' Rites Held

Frank Bates, 54, of San Antonio passed away July 10 and services were held July 12 at the Sunset Church of Christ in San Antonio. Bates was born near Bovina and attended school in Bovina. Survivors include his wife, Barbara and nine children, all from San Antonio.

He was known for his success and described by his brother Wayne, as a "self-made man who, like other businessmen figured out that the key to real success was to 'build a better mousetrap'."

In 1955, Frank opened a small restaurant that was to become the first of 21 Whopper Burger restaurants. His "mousetrap" was

the six-inch hamburger patty that soon became known as the "Whopper" Burger. The concept was so popular that Burger King, a Florida firm that has grown into one of the top three hamburger outlets in the country, copied the concept and purchased the rights to use the "Whopper" as the name of its deluxe hamburger.

Burger King agreed not to build any restaurants in the San Antonio area where the Whopper Burger restaurants are located, according to Wayne Bates.

Frank Bates spent his early years on a farm near Bovina. He spent time in the service and returned from Korea to start the fast-food chain with little more than "an idea, \$500, hard work and imagination." Besides being in this business he was also active in numerous community organizations.

Frank Bates was preceded in death by his brother, Earl E. Bates, in January of 1983. Earl was survived by his wife, Ann, two sons, four brothers and one sister. Earl attended Oklahoma Lane, Bovina, and Friona schools, and taught school at Rhea, Hollene and Clovis. He received his degree from West Texas State University in Canyon.
