

## "MY TURN"



SINCE MOST of us have about had it up to here with politics, let's something bale. about else...anything else.

Are you superstitious? Do you worry just a little bit when a black cat runs across the street in front of your car? Do you say "bless you" every time someone sneezes?

In spite of the fact that most of us deny having the slightest interest in superstition, half the people in our country today do believe that good or bad luck in our personal lives, can be attributed to an unknown "something."

A survey taken several years ago revealed that seventy-three per cent of the population emphatically denied, sometimes with indignation, that they were the Feature slightest bit superstitious. But the denials were weakened after close questioning revealed little habits or Film Series customs in their daily lives which indicated some degree of superstitious influence.

Most tall buildings do not number a thirteenth floor. That is not to say that there IS no thirteenth floor, but that it is just not numbered as such. Many hotels, hospitals and office buildings do not have a room numbered thirteen. Very few businessmen would dare venture to start a new business on Friday the thirteenth. Many people will not have a dinner party with thirteen people seated at the table.

Some of the most frequently practiced bad luck/good luck superstitions are: breaking a mirror brings seven years' bad luck; do not walk under a ladder; if you boast about good fortune, knock on wood three times to keep good luck from changing; make a wish when you see a falling star; lighting three cigarettes on one match is bad luck; when salt is spilled, you should throw a little over the left shoulder; carrying a rabbit's foot, four-leaf clover or horseshoe brings good luck; and never, never open an umbrella in the house. One of the mos persistant superstitions which alive and well today is the belie that bad things, such as deaths always happen in threes.

Some superstitions which are not as well known are: you should leave a house by the same door you entered; when leaving on a trip you should not go back into the house even if you've forgotten something important, like your Scott Scaff 1-1-28 yards. suitcase; when you give a friend a knife as a present, he must give you a penny, so it will not cut the Venable 3-12; Scott Sudderth 1-17; ties of friendship; never take the Robert Guevara 4-45; Corey broom along when you are moving Kirkpatrick 2-31; Manuel Porras to a new house; when cooking, 1-1. always beat your eggs, cake batter, or whatever in a clockwise direction; if you look at the new patrick 2-24; Denver Riddle 2-27; moon over your right shoulder Shaun Pinkston 1-27; David you'll have good luck for the next Bermea 1-25; Bud Venable 1-8. month; and never ever sing before breakfast.

Quite a few superstitions abound in the world of sports. The great American pasttime, baseball, leads all other sports in devotion to omens and eccentricities. Players will often use the same "lucky" glove for many years. When a player goes up to bat, he must leave his glove on the ground with the fingers pointing to his own team's dugout. Having a "southpaw" on the team brings good luck. A dog crossing the playing field brings disaster. If a man has the opportunity to touch the hump of a hunchback before going to the plate, he is sure to get a hit.

The Bovina Mustangs could use a bit of luck this Friday. Some of the superstitions connected with football are: no player ever wears the number thirteen; backfield men never step on the field lines; players always wear the same number for each game; players never have their picture taken before the start of a game; spitting on the hands before each play is good; a red-headed female fan in the stands brings good luck.
