A former county judge of Smith county and long active in highway matters, Gentry was the governor's Wood of Timpson, whose six-year term expired February 15.

Carr P. Collins of Dallas and J M. West Sr. of Houston were rejected by the senate while the nomination of J. C. Hunter of Abilene was withdrawn at the latter's request because of opposition within the senate.

The confirmation was at a brief executive session and the only announcement was that the appointment had been approved.



Jews Protest Arabian Rule In Palestine

Demonstrations in Jerusalem Made as **British Move Made**

JERUSALEM, May 18 (AP).—Jews of all ages, estimated by leaders to be 175,000 strong, marched and shouted in demonstrations throughout Palestine today, protesting Great Britain's decision to establish an independent Palestine under Arab

Up to noon the demonstrations were free of disorders such as a clash last night at Tel Aviv in which 25 were injured

Few Arabs appeared and non-Jewish traffic was diverted by police from the main streets.

The British government in a historic pronouncement of policy Wednesday night outlined plans for turning strife-torn Palestine over to its Arab majority, stinging Jewish leaders into bitter declarations of

A white paper setting forth Britain's final plan indicated Britain was obligation to facilitate the further development of the Jewish national home (in Palestine) by immigration. Unable to obtain agreement between Arabs and Jews, Britain announced its own solution for the political future of the Holy Land wracked by virtual civil war for

Jews will be limited to one third the population of the country which Britain wrested from Turkey during the World War and now controls under League of Nations

The proposal for establishment of an independent Arab state, the whit paper said, would involve consult of Nations with a view to the term nation of the mandate.

The current week has been set aside in Texas for observance of the wenty-fifth anniversary of the signing of the Smith-Lever act, creating the Extension Service which has rendered invaluable aid to agricul-Practically every rural aid community in the State is holding some

Although the law, which established extension work in agriculture nd home economics as a definite division of the land grant colleges signed by the late President Wilson on May 8, 1914, advisory aid for mers actually began in 1903. In that year the boll weevil was spreadacross Texas, and the United States Department of Agriculture sent Seamon A. Knapp to see what could be done

After a conference in Terrell in February, 1903, the first privatelyned and operated "demonstration farm" was established, and its suc-s led to the founding in 1904 of the Farmers' Co-operative Demonstra-Work in the Bureau of Plant Industry. The first county agents, 33 number, were appointed by Dr. Knapp to travel from county to unty and make demonstrations. The first county agricultural agent work exclusively in one county was appointed for Smith county in 06. Boys' corn clubs were established in 1908 and girls' canning clubs 1912 as the forerunners of 4-H Clubs. By 1938, every county in Texas d an agricultural agent and 182 counties had home demonstration ents; white agents enrolled 24,970 club boys and 32,425 girls, and negro ion program reached 336,713 white families and 23,521 negro familie The quarter century of progress in extending helpful, scientific ormation to the masses of rural America through the Extension vice—in Texas under the auspices of A. & M.
