## For J. P. Macon Funeral Monday

J. P. Macon, 83, prominent Bovina resident and pioneer grain dealer here, died Friday at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

Mr. Macon owned and operated Macon Elevator on Highway 60 in Bovina from 1943 until he sold the business to Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc. four years ago, in 1963.

He moved to Bovina in 1948 from Texico, where he had lived for the previous 26 years and was in the grain business. He came to Texas from Tennessee, where he was born in 1884.

Mr. Macon had been in failing health for the past few years but he was active until the day before his death, which was attributed to a heart attack. He was admitted to the hospital Thursday night prior to his death at noon Friday.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at First Baptist Church of Bovina. Officiating was Rev. John Ferguson of Denver City, a former pastor of the church here. Rev. ## 12 Cattle Killed On Highway 60

Twelve head of light cattle were killed west of Bovina on Highway 60 Thursday night when they were struck by trucks.

The cattle were owned by Pete Davies and Woodrow Fleming. They were chased out of a corral at Davies' place on the east side of town by dogs.

Two trucks killed six of the cattle each, according to City Marshall Bill Denney, who aided in the investigation. The accidents occurred about 1:30 a.m. Friday just west of the park.

The cattle, terrified evident-

ly by the dogs, broke out of the corral and went down Highway 86 to Highway 60 and then continued west.

One of the trucks involved was transporting Tender Crust bread. The driver suffered slight injuries, according to Denney, and was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona for treatment.

The other vehicle which hit the cattle was a livestock hauling truck from Roswell. The driver of it was uninjured.

A total of 80 cattle were chased from the corral by the dogs, Davies said.

# Grain Producers Meeting Friday

Producers of grain sorghum Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico will gather in Amarillo Friday. Approximately one hundred are expected to participate in the fourth Quarterly Board of Directors meeting of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association at the Herring Hotel at 10 a.m., according to Elbert Harp, the association's farmer-elected president from Abernathy.

Harp indicated that the officers of the county organizations will be asked to give direction on several items of business including: changes in the grain standards, bargaining powers for farmers, membership and budget development, as well as subjects suggested by the participants themselves.

The morning session of the 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. meeting will be utilized to gain expert back-

ground and technical information on sorghum related subjects of current interest, according to Bill Nelson, executive vice president of Amarillo. He said the new sorghum disease found in the area, "maize dwarf mosaic virus", will be discussed by the man who confirmed its presence, Dr. Robert Toler, virologist of Texas A&M University, and Dr. Tony Bockholt, also of A&M. Russell Bean of Lubbock will show slides about Water, Inc. and discuss proposed importation of surface water to the area. The new service programs for area feed lots will be outlined by Lloyd Bergsma, executive director of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

Both morning and afternoon sessions are open to anyone interested in the subjects being discussed, Nelson said.

Following last week's windup of men's softball league, Bovina Gin Co. and Three-Way Chemical Co. are deadlocked for first place.

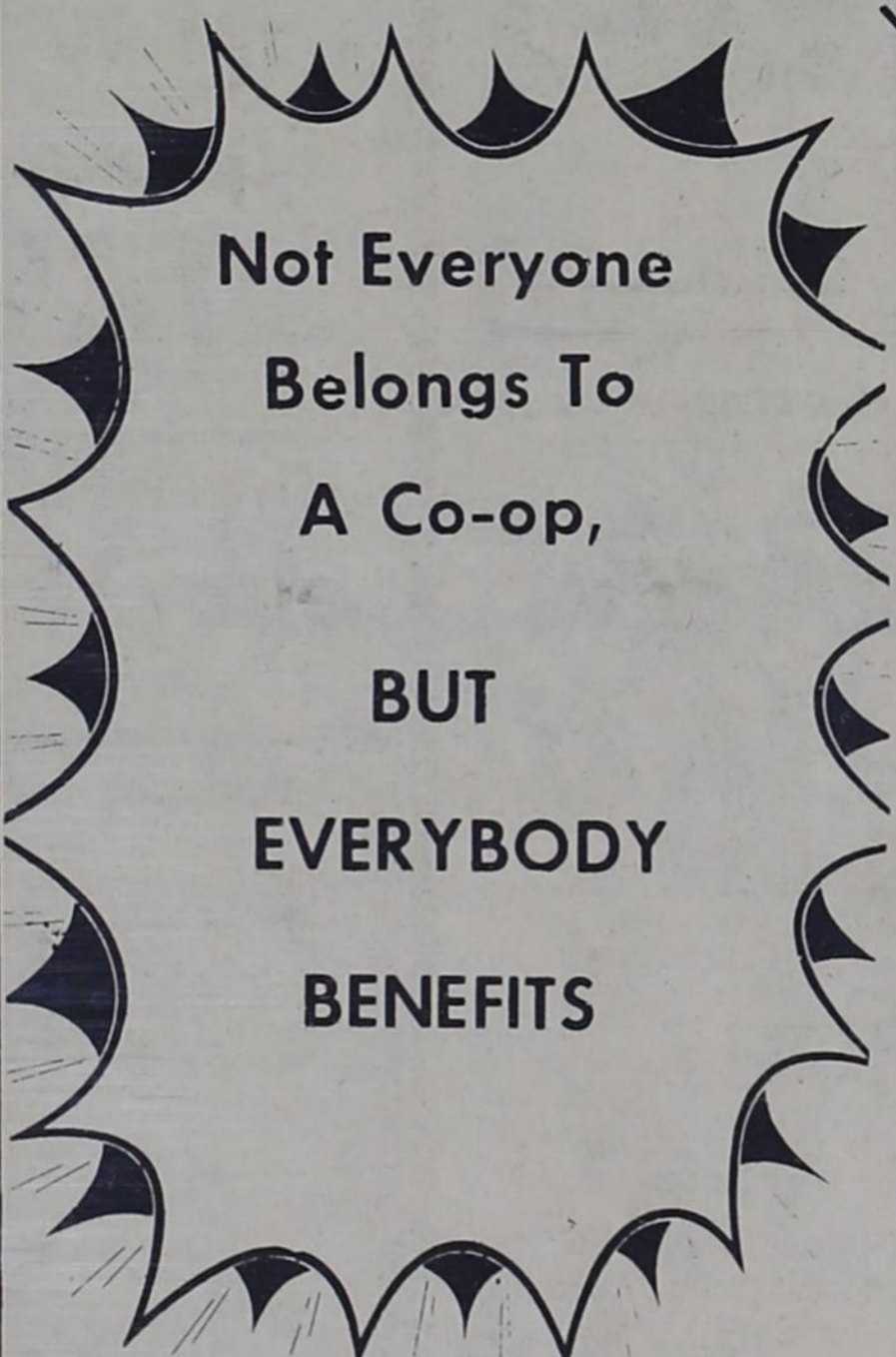

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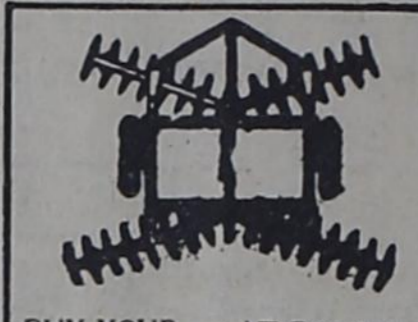

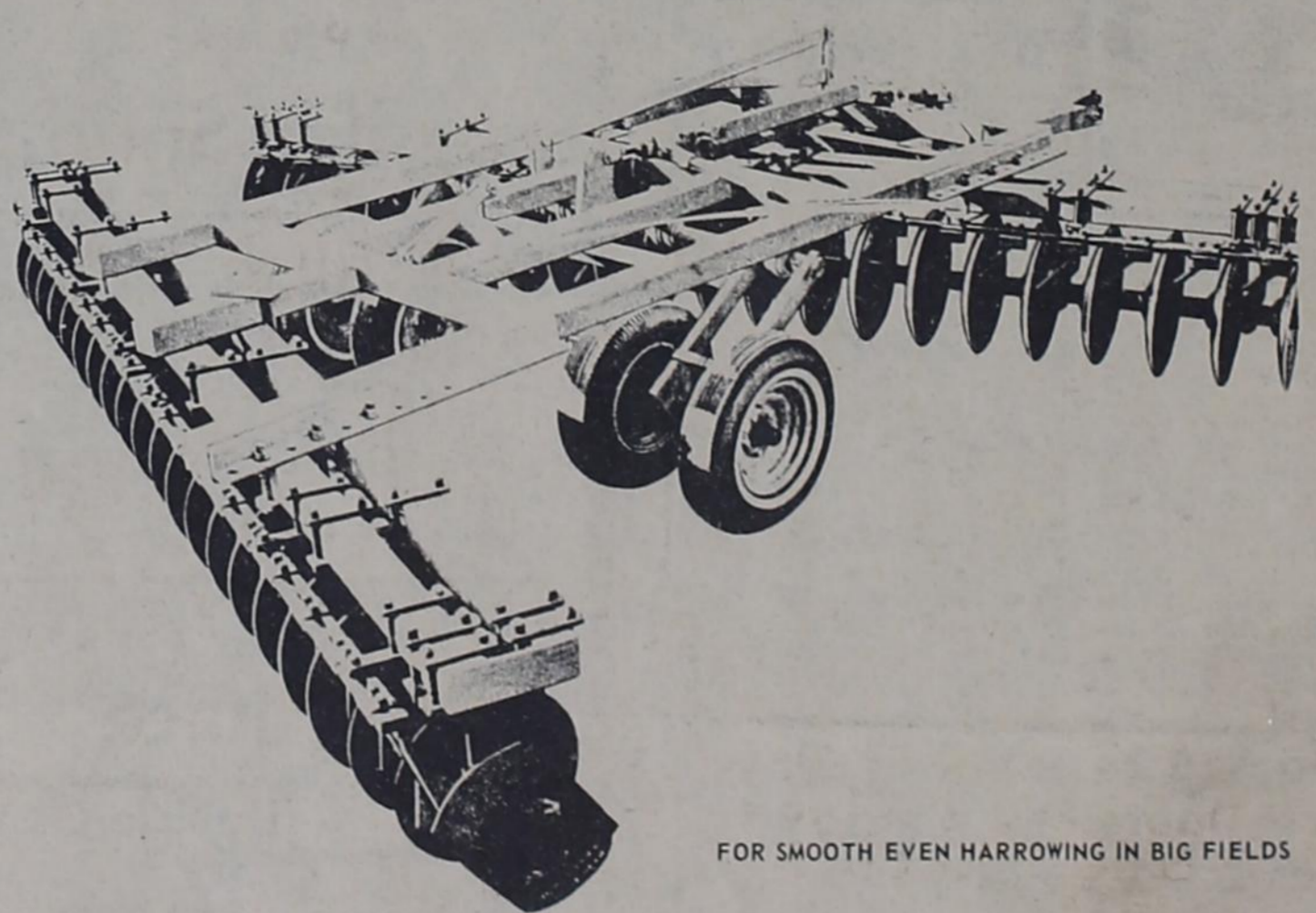
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### At Home In Parmer County

Vacation, camps, reunions and many activities are in full swing. Everyone is trying to keep cool. Leaders, parents and 4-H members left for camp this week, high in New Mexico mountains east of Pecos. They will keep cool, no doubt about that, especially at night.

After a two weeks vacation, part of which was spent in the mountains my return to the Extension office found a desk piled high with mail that will require some hours to reduce. Vacations are wonderful, but work is too, because it makes one appreciate just "being lazy" for awhile.

**KEEP SUMMER FOODS COOL**  
With many summer activities, food is a major concern. People will use more foods such as chicken, tuna, egg salad for cold plates and sandwiches. Remember this, these delicious foods are subject to bacteria growth that cause food poisoning.

In tests with chicken salad the researchers found that the most critical factor is the time required for cooling from room temperature to refrigerator temperature. About 3 hours are required for chicken salad four inches deep to reach refrigerator temperature of (41 degrees

F.) after it has been moved from room temperature.

Put the salad in shallow pans or dishes so that it will cool rapidly. Don't make up too much at a time. Serve promptly after removal from refrigerator.

Frozen sandwiches are high on list for picnics, provided they are eaten as soon as they are thawed.

It's well to remember that many of the illnesses in summer, some time called the "summer complaint" or "upset stomach" can be the result of rapid bacterial growth in summer foods. Keep them well refrigerated for safety.

**HELPFUL BRIEF NOTES**

What a child wants for breakfast and what mother wants him to eat often are nutritionally equal. A breakfast of hot dog, bun, milkshake and an orange is the same nutritionally as a breakfast of orange juice, egg, cereal and milk.

To remove a meat juice stain from a white or colorfast cotton tablecloth, first sponge the stain with cool water. Or soak the cloth in cool water for 30 minutes. Then rub detergent into spot and laundry the cloth in hot suds.

### Facts To Help Dieter

Fat content of home-baked goods can be cut up to 50 percent: Diet-conscious homemakers can leave half the fat out of cake batter and still produce a tasty, attractive cake, U. S. Department of Agriculture research shows.

A typical cake recipe calls for about one part of fat for every four parts of flour. But home cooks can safely make up a batter with one part of fat for every eight parts of flour, says Ruth Matthews, food specialist in USDA's Agricultural Research Service.

In addition to cutting the fat content, Mrs. Matthews, working in the ARS laboratories at Beltsville, Md., varied the type of fat in the test batters. She tried batters with all-vegetable shortening, blended vegetable and animal-fat shortening, butter, corn oil margarine, and regular margarine.

Cakes with half the usual fat content looked as appealing as regular cakes to members of the taste panel. Volume of low-fat cakes was similar to that of standard cakes, indicating that

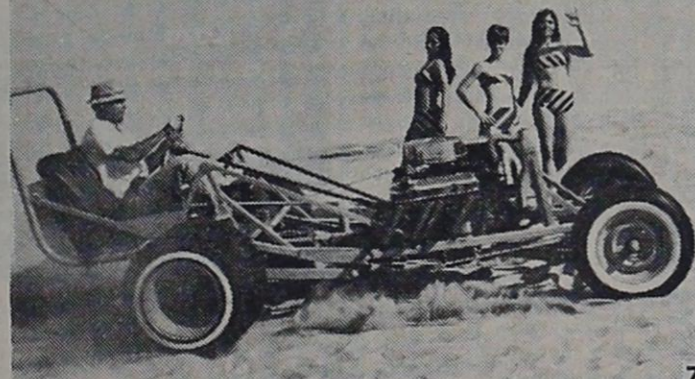
proper rising was no problem. Cake volume dropped from one-fifth, however, when fat content was reduced to one part of fat for every eight parts of flour.

The taste and feel of the cakes with half the usual fat content was rated a little lower than for regular cakes, the panel indicated, which noted a small reduction in tenderness and velvetiness. Machine tests for tenderness paralleled scoring by the panel.

The kind of fat did not significantly affect appearance of the cakes with reduced fat content. Taste and tenderness were highest with butter or margarine as the fat source in low-fat cake, the research data showed.

The food specialists also evaluated other low-fat baked products. Muffins, they found, can be made with half the usual amount of fat. Biscuits can be made with two-thirds and pastry with three-fourths as much fat. In each case, taste panels noted a reduction in tenderness and flavor, but they likewise found the products highly acceptable.

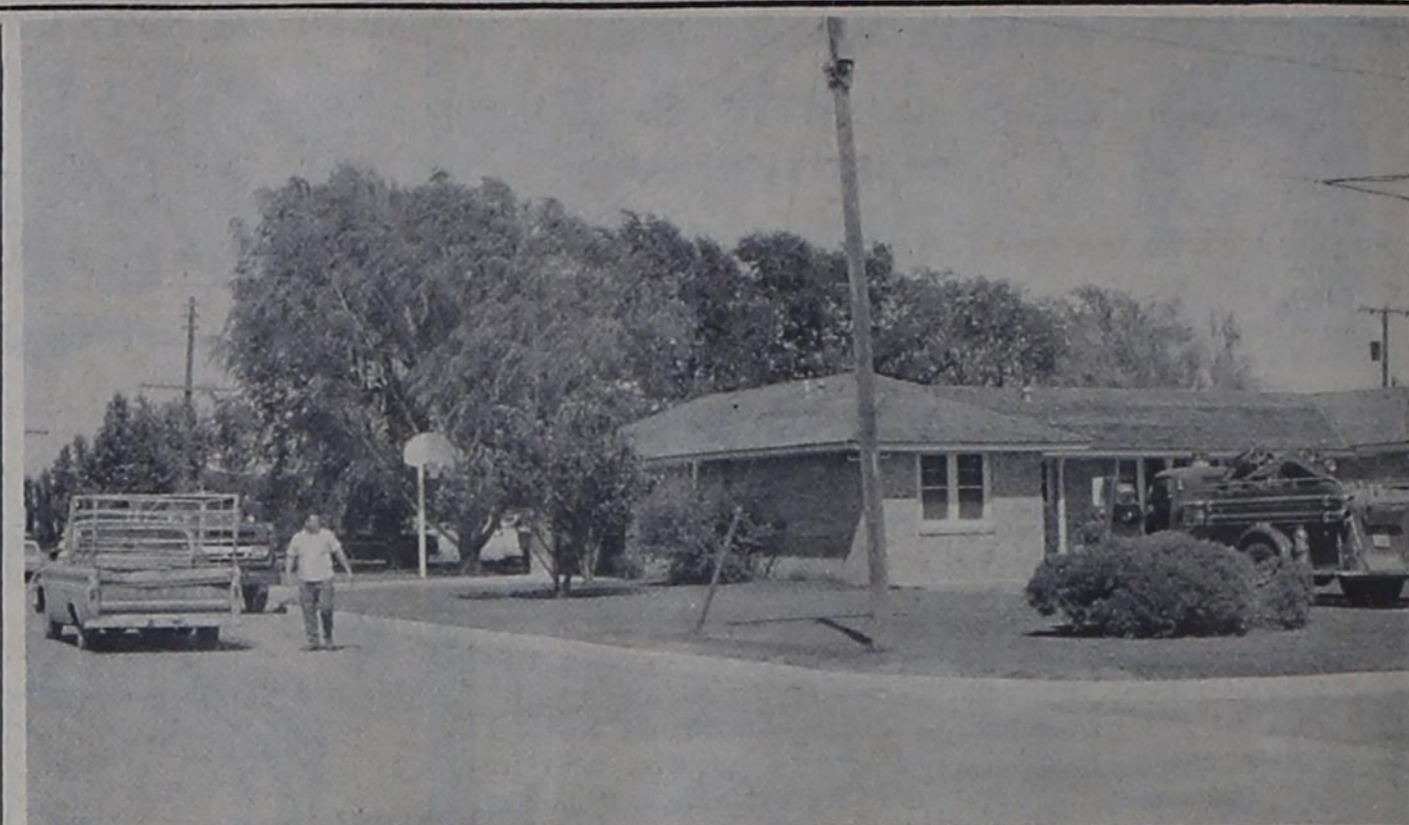

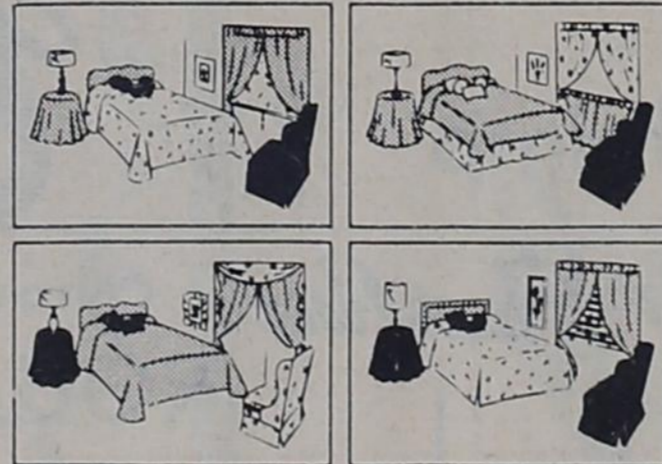

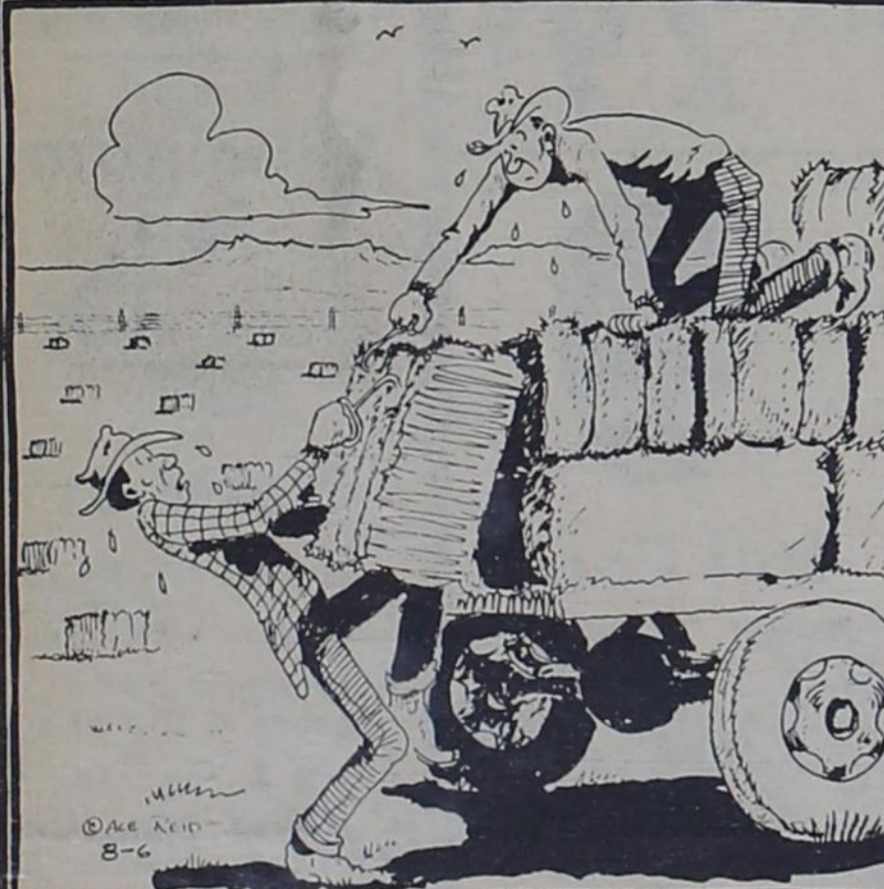

### Know The Truth

# New Crop Disease Suspected In Area

A disease new to the West Texas area is suspected in some corn and grain sorghum fields. The invader is believed to be maize dwarf mosaic virus, says Dr. Robert W. Berry, extension plant pathologist at Texas A&M University's South Plains Research and Extension Center. Fields heavily infected with the suspected virus have been found in the Hereford area, Deaf Smith County, as well as in parts of Parmer, Castro, Dallam, Moore, Donley, Hale, Crosby and Floyd counties.

Infected plants show a mottled pattern of light and dark green on the new leaves as they emerge from the whorl, explains Berry. In grain sorghum, infected plants will turn bright red or reddish-brown in cool weather. In corn, however, the mottling is primarily brown. Grain does not develop normally in crops infected by MDMW, points out the pathologist. On corn only a few grains may form on the cob while grain sorghum heads may be practically sterile.

This particular virus was first uncovered in South Central Texas last year in sweet corn

and losses ranged from 10 to 50 per cent.

MDMW overwinters in the rhizomes of Johnson grass and is transmitted by aphids, explains Berry. As the tender shoots of this grass emerge in the spring, the aphids begin feeding, acquire the virus and

move to susceptible crops where they transmit the disease.

There appear to be some varietal differences, adds Berry, but all varieties examined in the area are seemingly susceptible to the suspected virus.

At this time there are no con-

trol practices which will be of benefit to susceptible crops, the pathologist explains. Many specimens of infected plants have been submitted to Dr. Robert W. Toler, virologist with the Department of Plant Sciences at Texas A&M, for positive identification of the disease.

One of two Bovina entries in the eight-man pony express race event placed second at the Hereford rodeo Saturday night.

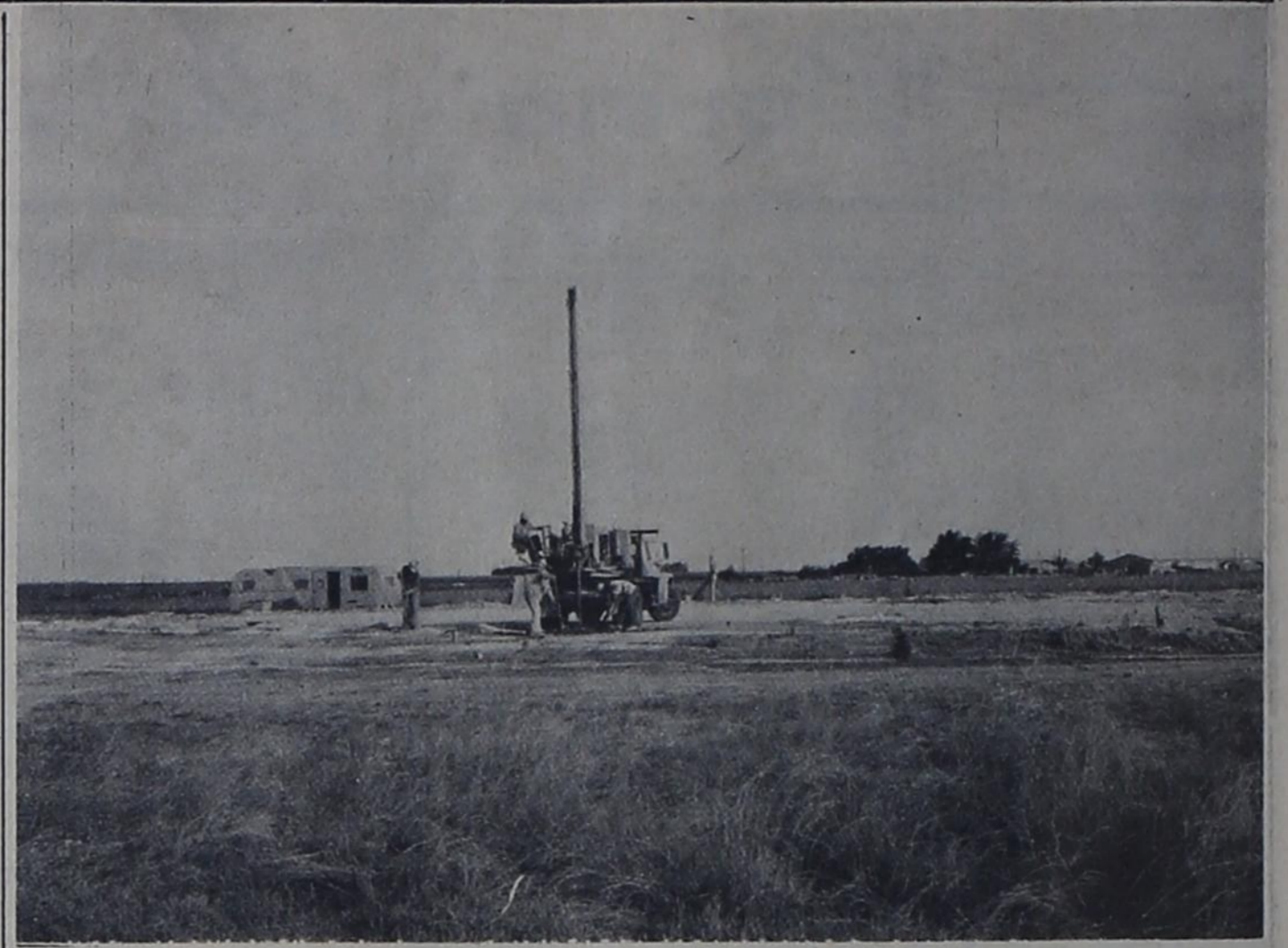
The team had the fastest time in the qualifying round, but placed second to Hereford in the finals.

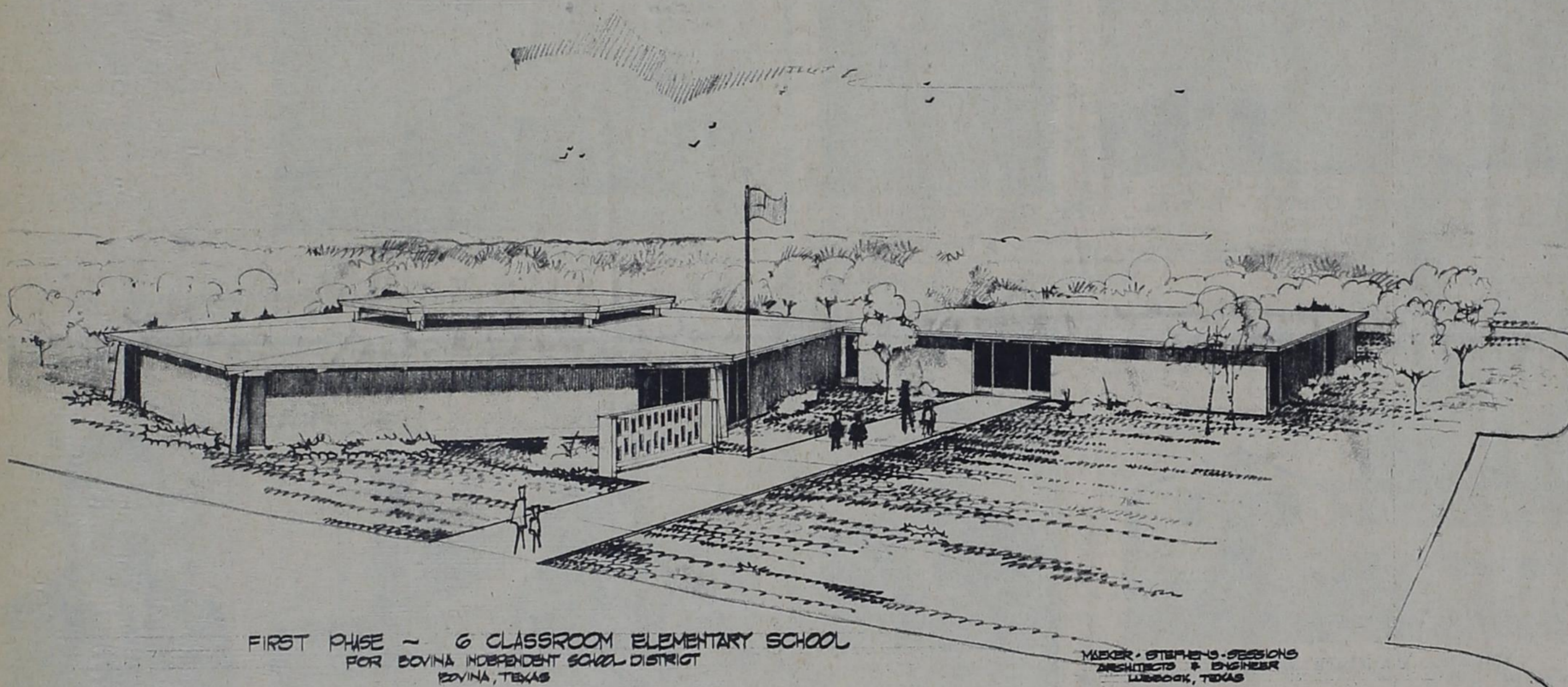

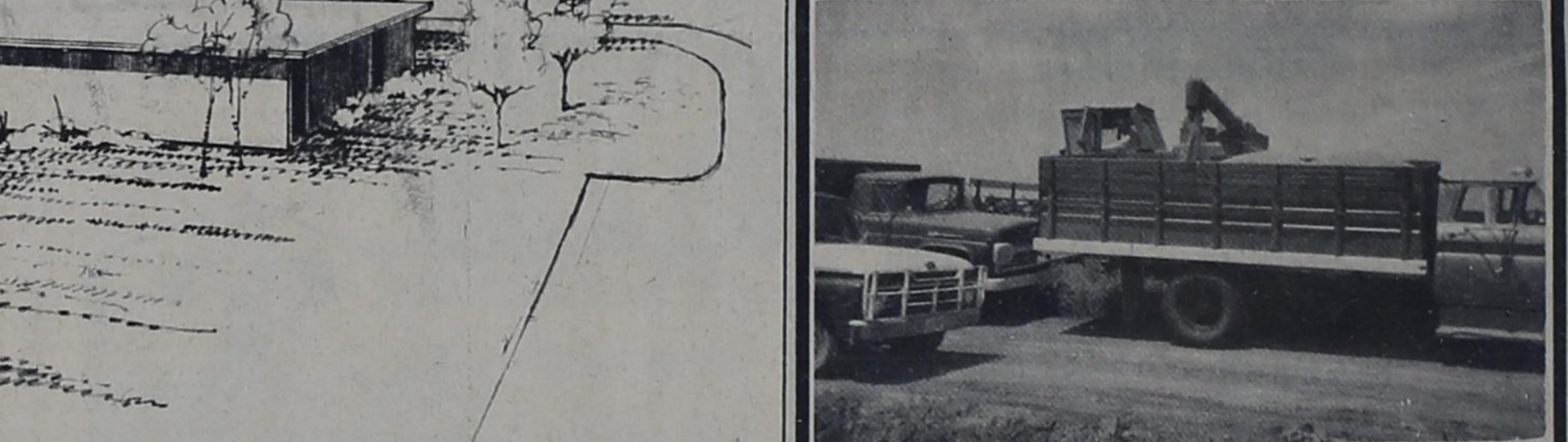
