Epochal Tour of the Rulers Ended After Stay of One Month

HALIFAX, N. S., June 16(P)— With King George saluting from the bridge and Queen Elizabeth standing on a stool and waving in excitement to a crowd of 150,000 which cheered a farewell, the brilliantly white Empress of Britain sailed for England last night, bringing to an en dthe epochal tour of the first British sovereign to visit America. Not tall enough for much of her

figure to show above the railing, Queen Elizabeth yielded to cries from the crowds to stand up higher, as the majestic steamer was about to sail, and mounted a stool brought by an officer.

She thus "stole the show" of the last moments of their stay in Canada, as she had attracted attention throughout their 9,000-miles railway and motor tour to the Pacific and to the United States.

The King stood erect at her side, his face alternately serious and wreathed in smiles, as the crowd cheered and sang such songs as "Auld Lang Syne," "God Save The King," and "Tipperary."

Earlier he and the Queen had broadcast to the British empire and to the United States a farewell message expdessing their "comfort and inspiration" at the peace in this part of the world and their Pushed Through in gratitude for their reception throughout the tour.







as his first equipment. Success followed hard work and Dr. Sealy was nized throughout the Southwest as an outstanding institution.

Dr. Sealy had received his degree being an honor graduate in the class of 1904. He broke prior scholastic records at the University, after which followed study and experience at clinics in New York City, Chica-go, San Francisco, and New Oreans. He took post-graduate work in several cities in this country and abroad at Glasgow, London, Paris

A student of medicine as well as a psychologist, Dr. Sealy gained friends rapidly, and as his practice became established he acquired a name which drew many patients from Central West Texas and out of the state.

Married In 1905

In 1905 he married Miss Bessie Harper, a Santa Annan, at Colenan. His bride was the daughter of a Coleman county pioneer and director of the First National Bank

The Sealy Hospital was founded in 1917 at a cost of more than \$65,000 but in that year the physician volunteered in the World War and soon was commissioned a first lieutenant in the medical corps. He was promoted to captain in May of 1918, and a year later to a major. Dr. Alexis Carrell trained him in New York, and he was placed in charge of a hospital overseas. He received praise for his supervision of the hospital and returned after the war to open his own institution in July 1919. By 1928 the capacity of the hospital was doubled. That year he founded a school of nursing, and two years later erected a \$10,-000 nurses' home. The nursing school as discontinued in 1938 because of Dr. Sealy's failing health

Dr. Sealy was born in Lexington, Tex., Feb. 19, 1880, the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Sealy, who were natives of North Carolina and Virginia, respectively. The father, a minister, came to this state in 1866. Dr. Sealy attend school in Milam county, finishing high school at De Villa, the university. Before the turn of the century he volunteered in the Spanish-American War.


