WASHINGTON, June 17 (A) — The house, after a 14-hour session, one of the longest in recent years early today passed a bill providing \$1,735,000,000 (billion) for relief during the year starting July first The measure abolished such WPA

The act now goes to the senate where leaders promised swift con-sideration in order to replenish WPA coffers when the current ap-

One regulation requires that building projects financed wholly by the federal government must cost more than \$50,000, and that on projects paid for in part by states or localities, the government's contribution must not exceed \$40 000. Another limits the cost of ma terials to \$7 per month per WPA worker.

In addition, tentative approval was given to an entirely new administrative setup for WPA. Instead of the one-man administra-tor, first Harry L. Hopkins and now Col. F. C. Harrington, the bill would establish a bi-partisan, three-

Snow All That Was Lacking to Make The Day Complete


Midland residents underwent all kinds of weather Saturday except snow.

To start with, the sun came out bright and hot on schedule and increased the intensity of its heat as the day wore on-until the mercury reached 103 degrees-only three less than the peak reached Friday.

No visible relief was in sight until shortly after six o'clock when clouds began to "bank up" in the south. A short time later all the skies were overcast, then came a shower that lasted for approximately five minutes. After "letting up" for a few min-utes, rain and hail stones fell for approximately another five minutes. Inside of 15 more minutes, it was practi-

cally clear all around. A survey showed that -the rain did not fall west of the baseball park, and only a few blocks north of Wall street. To the south for about three miles and to the east for about five miles the rain apparently was even heavier than in town.





Dust is an enemy to good results in varnishing, so when a job of this kind is undertaken it is well to remember that all materials and tools used should be kept as free from dust as possible.
