Frances "Sissy" Farenthold continues to run an amazing campaign in her bid for the governorship of the great State of Texas.

Picked to finish last in a field of four serious candidates back in the first primary, she upset the odds and ran second. That qualified her for a run-off position in the second primary with the first round leader, Dolph Briscoe, prominent South Texas rancher-banker.

On the surface, it would appear that Mrs. Farenthold doesn't have much chance to defeat Briscoe. He easily led the field in the first go-round and it would seem that most of the backing which went to Barnes and Smith in the opening primary would go for him this time instead of "that lady."

And while we're admitting that Mrs. Farenthold's chances don't look good now, we'd say they look better than her chances for making the run-off did back before the May election.

With a light voter turnout come Saturday, her chances will still be better. It says here that Mrs. F's supporters will be more dedicated than will Briscoe's and therefore more faithful in marking their ballots. Too, the Briscoe people could easily be over-confident. You couldn't blame them for that.

The Farenthold folks won't fail to get their ballots marked and counted. You can be sure of that.

The longer the campaign goes on and the more issues Mrs. Farenthold has time to explain her position on, the better she sounds.

Some people hold the fact that she's a woman against her. On the other hand, no doubt, some people will vote for her because she is a woman. She should be able to break even on that score.

Much of Briscoe's support comes from the rural sections of Texas. We hope he remembers that if and when he's governor.

A race we consider more important than the one for governor is that for U. S. Senator as Ralph Yarborough and Barefoot Sanders seek their party's nomination, also in a run-off.

With the nomination of the Demos, we think Yarborough has a good chance of defeating Republican John Tower come the general election in November.

Yarborough is a veteran politico and bears the scars of many hard-fought campaigns in the state. Besides that, he did a fine job of his Senatorial duties for some 13 years. He deserves the nomination of the party and the opportunity to go back to the Senate.

Sanders is an opportunist-type politician and is extremely fortunate to be in the run-off with Yarborough. The former senator missed getting a majority of the first primary votes by less than a percentage point.

Until recently, we felt that the senator's race in Texas this year would possibly be decided by the outcome of the presidential race. In other words, if Nixon runs strong, we thought he might carry Tower back in on his coat tail.

We're about to change that thinking, however. Unless Nixon does something between now and election time to excite the voters, he isn't apt to run strong in Texas, in the first place. In the second place, Texas still favors Democratic candidates, everything else being equal, and we think that'll apply to a race between Yarborough and Tower also.

Yarborough has a much better chance of beating Tower in November than does Sanders.

Let's give Yarborough our support Saturday. He'll again make a good senator for Texas.

One of the most heated races is that for Lieutenant governor where Wayne Connally of Floresville and Bill Hobby of Houston are battling it out for Saturday votes.

Hobby is a rich newspaperman and Connally is a brother of the former governor, etc. This race is more important than it appears at first glance because the winner is at a distinct advantage to use the position as a stepping stone to a higher office.

We could well be deciding who the next two governors of Texas will be when we vote Saturday.

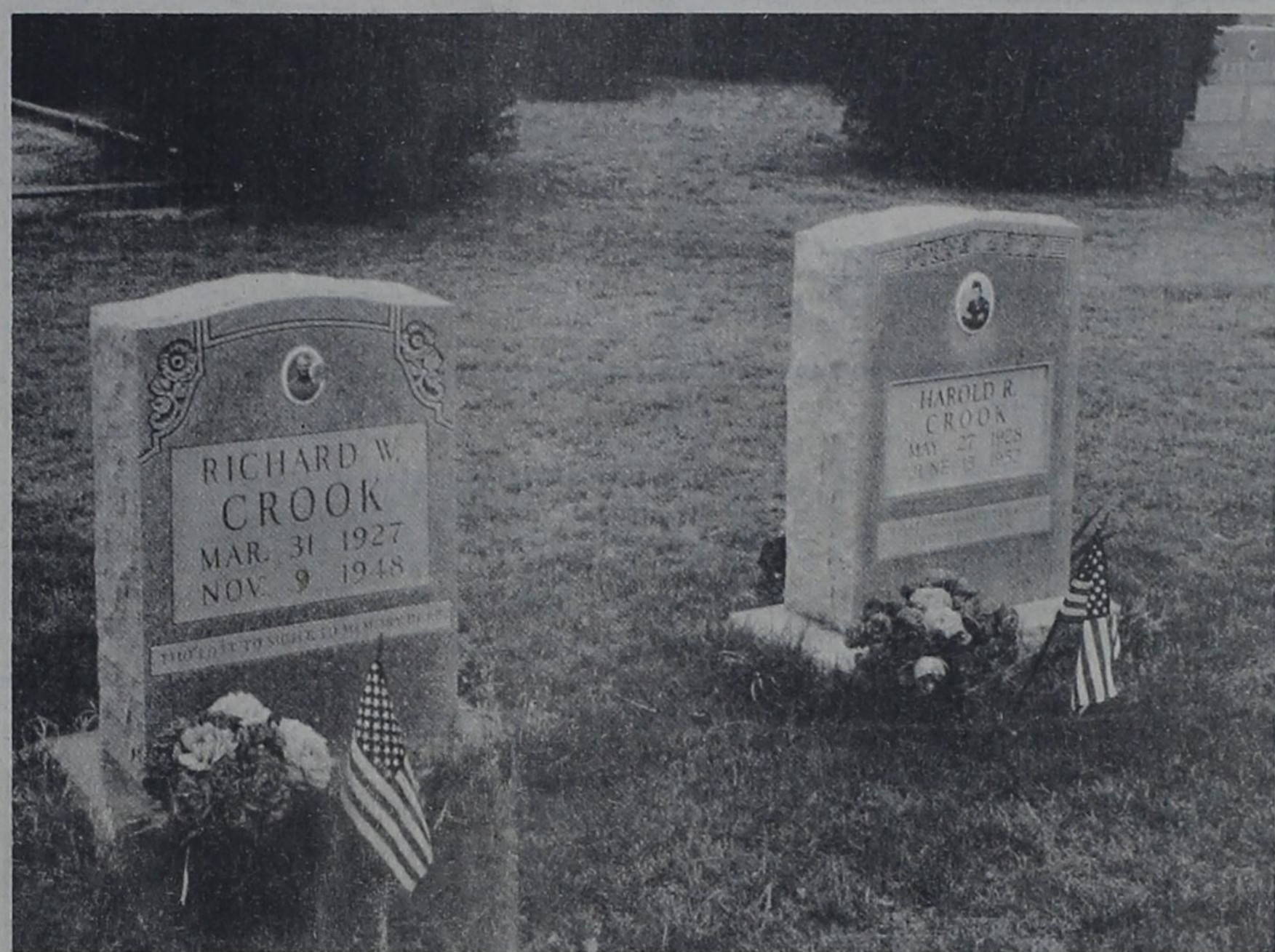

Republicans will seek to name a gubernatorial candidate in the second primary election set Saturday at Bovina Schools.

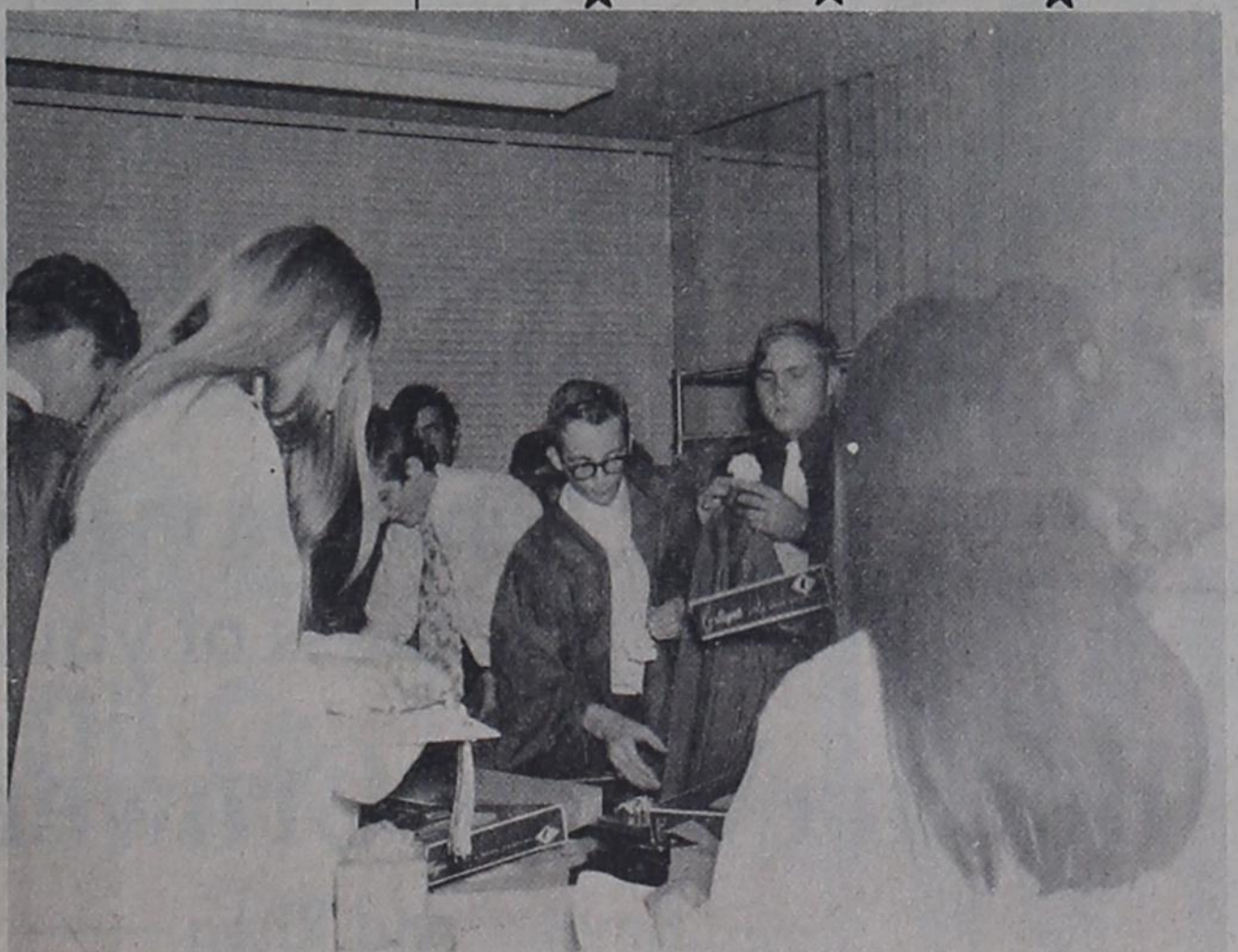
The polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Ballot Features 4 Races

The second Democratic primary election in Texas will be Saturday.

Voters will name a candidate for governor, lieutenant-governor, United States senator and comptroller of public accounts to run against the Republicans in the general election in November.

Polling place in Bovina will be the American Legion Hall on Third Street from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Election judges are Dolph Moten, Democratic precinct chairman, and Johnnie Horn.

With no local elections in the run-off primary, voting is expected to be much lighter in Bovina and the remainder of Parmer County than was recorded in the May Primary.

Supporters of both gubernatorial and senatorial candidates view the possibility of a light turnout at the polls as a threat to actually voting the will of registered voting Texans.

Democrats will vote at six boxes in Parmer County rather than eight in Saturday's primary.

The Rhea and Black communities will not have boxes, but have agreed to vote at the Friona box.

The Democrats choice for governor will be made between Dolph Briscoe and Mrs. Frances "Sissy" Farenthold. They emerged from a field of seven candidates in the first primary.

In an unexpectedly light turnout at the polls in the May primary, Parmer County voters gave overwhelming support to Briscoe for governor. He carried each of the county's eight voting boxes and was the top vote-getter across the state.

Briscoe received 128 votes in Bovina and 978 in the county for over 60 per cent of the vote. Mrs. Farenthold ran behind Ben Barnes and incumbent Preston Smith at the Bovina box and across the county. She received 24 votes here and 143 in the county.

In the United States senatorial race, voters will choose between Barefoot Sanders and former U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough.

Bovina followed a long tradition of backing Yarborough with 106 votes cast for him at Bovina as opposed to 92 for Sanders. However, Parmer County gave a majority to Sanders with 820 votes across the county to 555 for Yarborough. Three other candidates for senator received only 20 votes at the Bovina box.

The run-off for lieutenant governor will be between Wayne W. Connally and Bill Hobby.

Connally carried Bovina and Parmer County with 88 and 762 votes, respectively, to 63 and 331 for Hobby. Six other candidates for the lieutenant governor's post compiled a total of 71 votes in Bovina and 425 in the county.

In the fourth spot on the ballot is the run-off between incumbent Robert S. Calvert and James (Jim) Wilson for comptroller of public accounts.

A sample ballot with voting instructions appears elsewhere in this issue of The Blade.

Voters in the Saturday runoff elections were warned last week by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."

"Every voter needs to know that if they voted in the Republican primary on May 6, they cannot vote in the Democratic runoff. And if they voted Democratic the first time, they cannot switch and vote Republican on June 3."

Bullock stated this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$500.

"We hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting. If we find it still takes place, we will have no alternative but to pass this information along to the proper prosecuting authorities," Bullock said.

"Certainly, any crossover voting would distort the true strength of a candidate in the other party. I think the low-key campaign by the Republicans lends itself to making a Republican want to switch over -- if only for excitement's sake."

"We want election officials to know that there is a law behind them and they should not permit this practice. This will be the only way we can preserve the integrity of the Texas election process."

 June 1, 1966


Rain, that natural source of moisture which Parmer County farmers talk about a lot but get little of, fell here in small amounts last week.

OL Pastor To Accompany Scouts On Alaskan Tour

The longest day of the year -- June 22 -- when the sun never sets in Alaska and her neighboring countries, 21 scouts from Oklahoma Lane - Farwell - Texico and their sponsors plan to view the spectacular midnight sun at Anchorage, Alaska.

Boy Scout Troop 200 has been working for the past two years to raise necessary funds for such an expedition. The entire community has joined the scouts to make the trip a possibility.

The scouts have involved themselves in various jobs -- such as cleaning bricks, selling candy, stationery and tickets to district scouting events, rummage sales, odd jobs for friends, neighbors and relatives, collecting empty beer cans and other jobs to raise funds for the venture.

The Farwell Youth Commission has been a chief contributor with donations from firework sales in June and July. Many people in the area have given of their time and personal

resources towards the Alaskan expedition.

Accompanying the scouts will be Rev. Bob Roberts, pastor of Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church; Gene Bitner, scoutmaster and employee of the Texas Highway Department in Parmer County; and Gary Howell, 17, of Littlefield. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Howell.

Before returning from their 33-day road trip, the scouts plan to visit 13 states, two provinces and one territory with the highlight of the trip the summer Equinox of the sun. Some of the historical sights and points of national interest they will tour include Salt Lake City, Yellowstone National Park, Boulder Dam, Banfill National Park, Mt. McKinley, King's Mountain and the Grand Canyon.

"Wheels" for the trip will be a 1964 54-passenger school bus bought by the troop in 1968. A renovation of the bus, including bunkbeds, new floors, new tires and a stereo tape player,

was completed about a year ago.

"The troop that's going places" is the slogan of the scouts and they have become well-seasoned travelers with trips to San Antonio, Galveston and Houston in 1970-'71.

The boys plan to handle house-keeping chores themselves on the long trek to Alaska, including cooking, laundry and cleaning.

They are taking exchangeable items such as badges and neckerchiefs on the trip in hopes of meeting many scout troops along the way.

The agenda calls for the Far-

well troop to attend a district scout meeting at Grande Prairie, Alberta. The Rotary Club there has invited the troop for two meals while they are in Grande Prairie.

Another place lending its facilities to the boys during the trip will be the First Methodist Church at Fairbanks, Alaska.

Says SCS --

Parallel Terraces Conserves Rainfall

According to the latest figures available Soil Conservation officials state, the underground water level is going down about two feet a year. Some wells are even drying up. This means it takes more time to water fewer crops resulting in less money for each farmer.

What is the answer? There is no cure-all answer, says Edwin Livengood of the Parmer County SCS at Friona. One possible remedy is to design irrigation systems to take advantage of the natural rainfall.

Another is the construction of parallel terraces. Parmer County has an average yearly rainfall of 17 inches. Of this, 10 inches run off most farms in the county.

J. P. Sims, whose farm is northwest of Friona, is constructing a system of parallel terraces. By constructing these terraces, Sims is saving 10 inches of rainfall which would normally run off. This is equal to a six-inch well pumping 38 days on 80 acres. The new design procedures for parallel terraces provide for even distribution of rainfall; also soil erosion is prevented and pollution is stopped. Another advantage Sims has found is the efficient use of large equipment.

With these advantages and water-saving prospects other farmers may want to see how this will apply to their farms. They may contact the Soil Conservation Service at Friona for additional information.

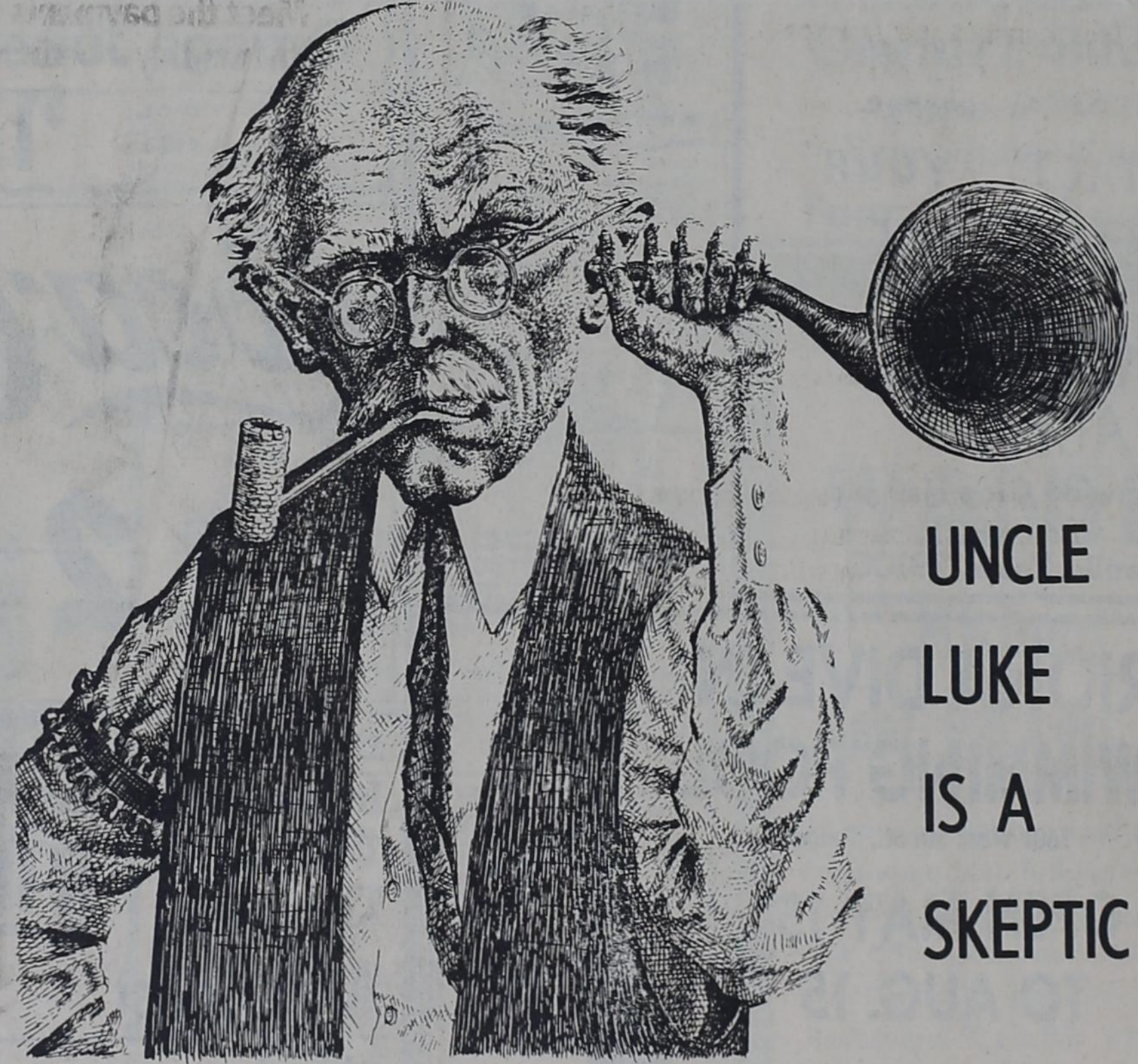

At Home In Parmer County

Herbicide run-off from farm land is apparently not a grave threat to the environment, according to studies by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers in the Panhandle. Dr. Allen Wiese, weed scientist at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, began a study in the spring of 1968 that has shown only minute amounts of herbicides dissolved in irrigation or rain water that ran off fields.

The chemicals used in the study included Treflan, Aatrex, and Milogard; all common weed control products. In the first season, the fields received either rainfall or irrigation water four to five times.

The first water samples after herbicide application contained the most chemical, but by fall no herbicides could be detected in the run-off water.

Milogard had the highest concentration in the water, which was less than a fifth of one part per million. The other two substances had much less concentration than the Milogard. That means that if there was one inch of run-off from 100 acres, only a little more than five pounds of the chemical would be collected, which is well below the danger level in the area's playa lakes.

As a further test, the researchers wanted to determine what would happen to herbicides in playa lake water. Small ponds 20 x 50 feet in size were constructed in a playa bed. Treflan and Aatrex were applied at a rate of one pound per acre to the bottom of each pond. In addition, one-half pound of the new brush herbicide Tordon was tested.

The ponds were then flooded with six inches of water and the bottoms were kept covered for two months. Six months later, the ponds were flooded again for one month. The Treflan disappeared from the water and bottom soil at the end of the first flooding period of two months.

The Aatrex and Tordon persisted for 90 days, but were no longer present in the soil after 18 months.

When it comes to caring for house plants, most receive either too much attention or not enough. Mistakes in watering, lighting and fertilizing create the most common problems.

If plants seem to be doing poorly, check your method of watering first. Leaves will drop off whether the plant is receiving too much or too little water. Most plants should be watered once a week. However, some plants such as cacti need watering only every three or four weeks.

When watering, completely saturate the soil. After a week, check the soil every few days. When it feels almost dry and crumbles easily between the fingers, it's time to water again.

Lighting is another critical item as far as the progress of houseplants is concerned. Some plants do well only in indirect sunlight. These include Chinese evergreens, Norfolk Island pines, Goldust acucuba, rubber plants and most philodendrons.

Boston ferns, begonias and aluminum plants do best in medium light (including two or three hours of direct sunlight). However, potted mums, ivies and geraniums like direct sunlight.

Since you are interested in keeping houseplants healthy rather than growing them, fertilizer should be used sparingly. Special houseplant fertilizer should be used.

Houseplants generally prefer the same temperatures as humans but have a liking for high humidity that is usually lacking in air-conditioned or heated homes. Plants such as orchids and ferns must have high humidity.

To increase the humidity around plants, place potted houseplants in a tray filled with gravel or peat moss that is kept wet. Water evaporating from the surface of this material can raise the relative humidity around plants and thereby create a satisfactory growing environment. Care should be taken to keep potted plants on top of the gravel or peat moss since a constantly wet potting soil is highly undesirable.

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Irene Bruce Honored At Farewell Party

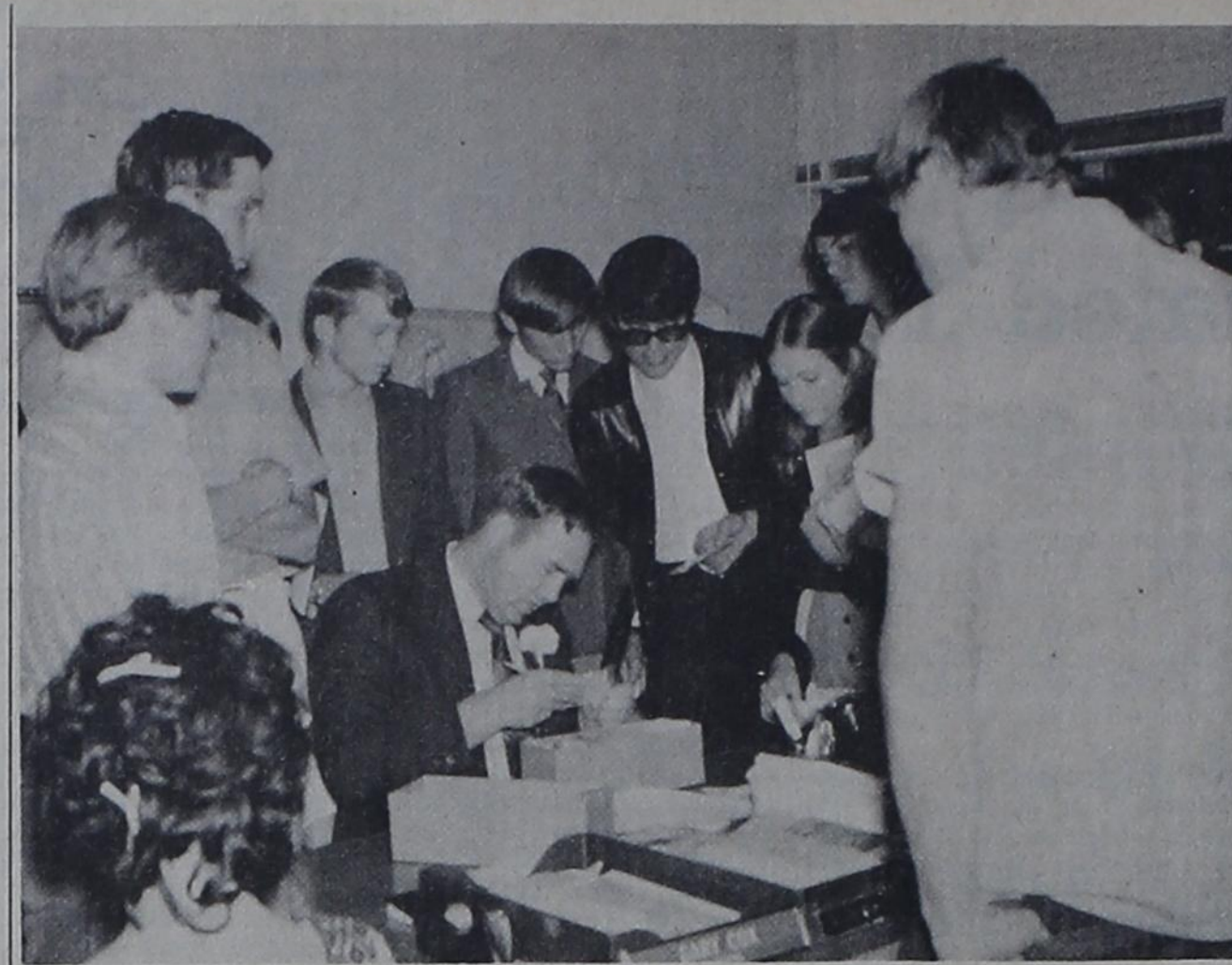
Mrs. Irene Bruce was honored with a farewell party Monday night of last week at the home of Mrs. Frank Smith.
