SATURDAY WILL BE a busy day in Parmer County and throughout the area.

For one thing, it's the opening day of the 1977 pheasant season. For another, it's the day set for the runoff election for the state senate, where Bob Price and Bob Simpson will square off.

The candidates hope that the pheasant hunters will pause long enough sometime during the day to cast their ballots.

The opening of pheasant season may detract somewhat from a vital election that may have trouble attracting a very large percentage of voters.

Less than one-fourth of the eligible voters went to the polls during the special election on November 8.

Runoff **Vote Set**

The special state senate runoff election will be held Saturday, Dec. 10.

According to Jay Sherrill, election judge, the voting place will be the American Legion Hall on Third Street and voting hours will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

So far as is known at this time, Mrs. Marie Venable will be election clerk.

Voters are alerted that they may

underway Saturday, Dec. 10, and continue through Sunday, Dec. 25, spanning three weekends this year as it has in the past four years.

An excellent pheasant crop is forecast for the 1977 hunt. According to Jack Patterson, who has been close to the pheasant program since its inception, the pheasant population seems to rise and fall with the area's winter wheat crop, which was good this past year.

It will mark the 14th annual pheasant season for hunters in Parmer County.

More than 2,000 pheasants were released in the county by the game association in 1962 and '63, with the population growing steadily since then.

The more colorful male pheasant is the only legal game for hunters, with the hens being protected by state laws.

The limit this year will be two

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Friona, Bovina and Farwell again this year, with three cash prizes offered for the longest tailfeathers.

The hunter turning in the longest feather in each town will receive a \$15 cash prize, with second place awarded \$10 and third place, \$5. The hunter with the longest tailfeather in the county will receive an engraved plaque from the Parmer County Game Management Association.

On Saturday, the Bovina Jaycees will sponsor an early morning Pheasant Hunters' Breakfast, to be held in St. Ann's Parish Hall from 4:30 a.m. to 10 o'clock.

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CONGRATS TO Allen Cumpton, who not only held on, but won the Blade's football contest "going away." Allen, the only repeat weekly winner the event had during its 13-week run, won by a final margin of five points. That was in contrast to last year, when the tie-breaker scores had to be consulted to separate Greg Hromas and Wayne Gilliland after those two contestants had finished deadlocked.

The winning score of 134 was the highest ever in the contest. It was up from the score of 114 posted last year by Hromas and Gilliland.

Cumpton "came out of retirement" to score his second "grand prize" win in the 18-year history of the event. He had previously won the contest in 1965. But he had not entered the contest for the past ten years, Cumpton said.

Emphasizing his long-term 1977 dominance, Cumpton won the \$7.50 top prize, predicting 23-14, one point off the actual 24-14 Dallas-Philadelphia score. Sherrill had 21-10 (7) and Myrna Cain, 31-14 (7), while Carpenter predicted 42-20 (24). They share the \$8 second and third prizes. Twice this season the Grand Prize winner has finished first in the weekly games and once he shared the third-place money with Ronnie D. Wines.

Steve Cockerham gave the **District Awards and Mike Read was** recognized as the District Star Chapter Farmer.



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
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
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


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


