





Many Foods Go In Byrd Larder

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — Admiral Richard E. Byrd carried with him to the Antarctic several new food concentrates prepared by Agriculture Department food experts to add variety to the diet of his expedition.

Some of the foods have not been placed on the market as yet. In a year or two they probably will be a staple grocery in commonplace use, food experts predicted.

Most of the foods were developed in the federal bureau of dairy industry laboratories and represent the efforts of dairy scientists to devise new ways to utilize skim milk and whey as human food.

The list includes a new kind of dried pea soup, made with whey powder; a new kind of wafer which is a mixture of potatoes, skim milk and salt; and new kinds of candies which contain whey solids.

Skim milk and whey are waste products of dairies. Millions of pounds of the two milk by-products now are thrown away or fed to hogs. Use of them in foods would open up a vast new market for the dairy industry.

The dried soup is a pre-cooked dry powder which makes a complete soup when one can of the powder is mixed with four cans of water and boiled. It contains 65 per cent split pea solids, 25 per cent whey solids and 10 per cent fats.

The skim milk potato wafers are similar to potato chips, but contain no fat and therefore do not become rancid. The wafers are made by drying or toasting a mixture of boiled potatoes, skim milk and salt.

Two kinds of candy — caramels and fudge — were made by formulas that include 25 per cent whey solids. The whey candy is superior

Forces Plunge Into Oklahoma Repeal Battle

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (U.P.) — Repeal forces, fighting prohibitionists as well as bootleggers, are waging a torrid campaign to legalize liquor in Oklahoma, one of the three remaining dry states.

Oklahoma turned thumbs down on a repeal proposition three years ago by an overwhelming vote and has stayed dry along with Kansas and Mississippi.

This time, however, the repealists as proposing to balance a state deficit with liquor revenues and are generally considered in a better position than they were in 1936.

Gov. Leon C. Phillips, an avowed dry, announced he would submit the question at a special election probably in the spring if other initiated measures are ready for a vote.

After an initiated petition, amending Oklahoma's constitution, is circulated, prohibitionists may challenge the signature before the state supreme court.

Phillips' promise to submit the question if other issues are ready for a vote brought a storm of protest from prohibition leaders.

Many of them refused to support Phillips last year because, as a state legislator, he was co-author of the act legalizing 32 beer.

W. L. Losinger, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, charged that Phillips has deserted the dry cause and is playing into the hands of the wets.

Some Drys Support Phillips. Dry leaders who did support Phillips say the governor is only following the "principles of democracy" in agreeing to submit the question to a vote.

The governor's political enemies, including A. L. Crable, state superintendent of schools, and U. S. Sen. Josh Lee, quickly took advantage of the governor's slight concession to repealists by declaring themselves ready to stump the state against legal liquor.

The proposed repeal amendment would provide for state control, with a commission directing enforcement.

Bootleggers, running liquor into Oklahoma from Missouri and Texas, were said to have contributed heavily in the 1936 campaign to stave off repeal.

Radiation Rays Attack Cancer

BERKELEY, Cal. (U.P.) — The most powerful forces known to science are undergoing experiments in the radiation laboratory of the University of California in an effort to find a cure for cancer.

This new attack on the dread malady is being carried on by Dr. Margaret Lewis, research fellow in the laboratory, and Dr. Warren Lewis of the Carnegie Institute in Washington.

Their findings are being reported to and checked by Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence, director of the laboratory, recent Nobel prize winner, and inventor of the cyclotron, which through the breaking of atoms releases a degree of energy that proves them to be the most powerful forces in the world.

To date, cancer treatment has met with its greatest success in the use of radium and X-rays.

Experiments, however, have demonstrated that the neutron ray, which is formed when Lawrence's cyclotron breaks up an atom and releases an energy hitherto undreamed of, constitutes the most powerful radiation ray known.

To Test Full Effect. The experiments being made are to determine the full effect of these neutron rays not only on human cells but on cells from vegetable life as well.

The life cells used for the experiments are ones that are taken from the human body and then developed in an artificial media.

A cell-by-cell examination of the effects of the neutron ray on both normal and malignant human tissue is being made and it is hoped to demonstrate the precise effect which the rays have on cancerous growths.

Experiments so far have determined that the neutron ray has distinct advantages over the most powerful X-rays in the breaking down of malignant tissue cells, but this advantage, it is added, is not maintained in the reaction of the ray on normal cells.

It has been found necessary as a result, the university has announced, to study in the most detailed manner possible the reactions of the neutron ray on both types of cells so that this new therapeutic force may be developed to the best possible advantage.

It is explained that the cells still are in an active stage and are being grown in an artificial media outside the human body.

Simultaneous experiments on the action of the neutron ray on vegetable cells are being conducted in an effort to round out the entire picture of neutron and X-ray radiation on cellular growth.

The most powerful X-rays attainable have been established in the laboratory so that comparison in both types of radiation may be made.

War Headlines Of 1870 Read Like Those Now

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (U.P.) — Mrs. V. F. King read this in her morning Fort Wayne Gazette: "War—Reported Outrages by the Prussian Army."

And under a Paris dateline: "The removal to a safe place of the masterpieces of the Louvre has begun. The precaution is timely. Are not invasions of barbarians always fatal to arts and their most beautiful productions?"

The newspaper was dated Aug. 29, 1870, and referred to the Franco-Prussian war. In one instance it differed from the current European conflict.

The Prince Royal of Prussia declared: "Prussia makes war against the Emperor and not the people of France. The People have nothing whatever to fear."

Both sides reported atrocities. Americans in France were reported organizing an ambulance corps to aid the wounded of both sides.

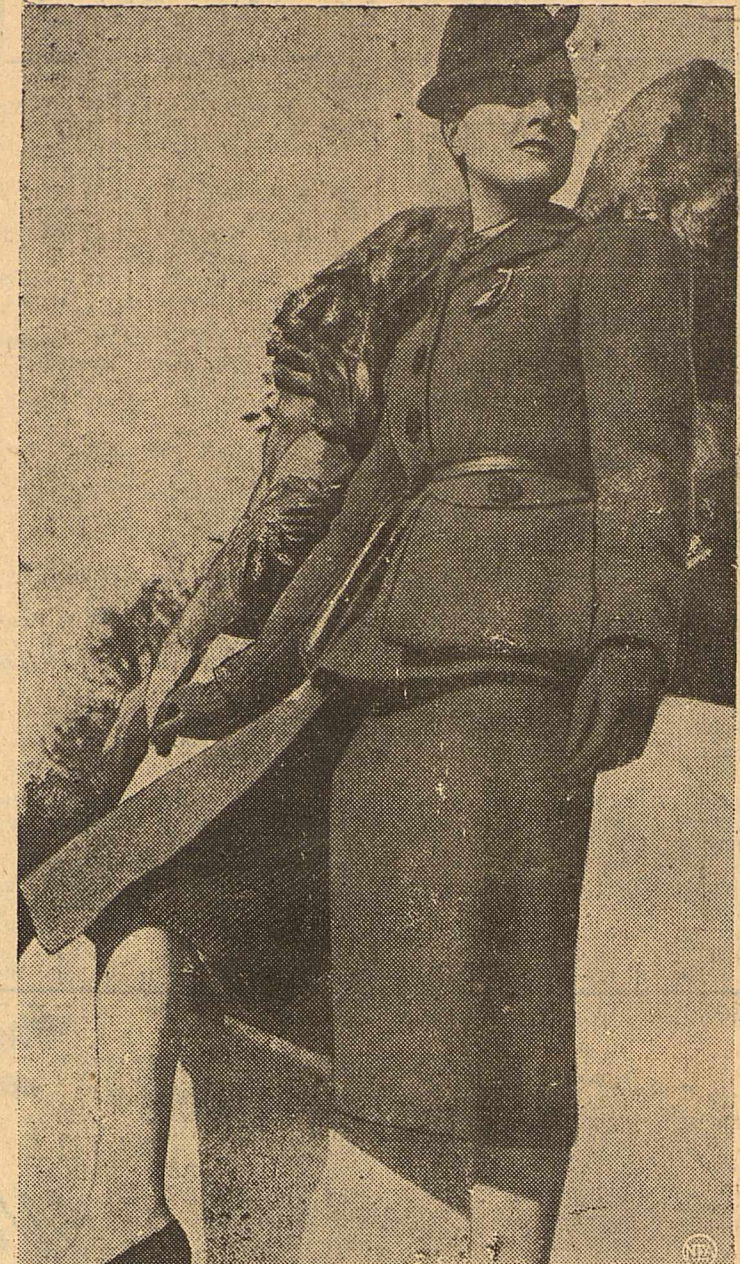
Mr. and Mrs. Halferty will visit Southern California on a wedding trip, after which they will be at home at Odessa.

gravity oil per day and gas-oil ratio of 675-1. It was shot with 50 quarts in pay zone between 1,466 and 1,481 feet, total depth.

D. Breeding No. 4-J University, in Pecos Taylor-Link pool, pumped 48 barrels of oil and 96 barrels of water on 24-hour natural test, bottomed at 1,757 feet in lime. It topped pay at 1,635 feet. Oil tests 30-gravity, and gas-oil ratio is 450-1.

An Ordovician test two miles southwest of the Apco Ellenberger pool in northern Pecos, Olson Drilling Company and Bryce McCandless No. 1 V. W. Crockett, is drilling past 4,025 feet in lime.

**"Spendthrift" Trait With Water Is Cited**

HOUSTON (AP) — Americans have a "spendthrift" attitude toward the consumption of well water, Dr. O. E. Meinzer of Washington told the Houston Engineers club.

Dr. Meinzer, geologist in charge of the under ground water section of the United States Geological survey, said there has been a great increase in the use of underground water in the United States, due in part to improvement of pumping methods.

Subterranean water reservoirs have definite limits and can be depleted by excessive pumping in a concentrated area.

"Houston is the largest city in the United States depending entirely on underground water for its supply," Dr. Meinzer said.

No matter how productive the artesian reservoirs that supply Houston's water, "there is a limit to the amount they can hold and to their rate of recharge," or rainfall, he said.

Dr. Meinzer assured the engineers there was no emergency here regarding the water supply, but declared "the people of Houston should make careful plans for the future and carry them out deliberately."

**Philadelphian Navy Yard Reaches New Job Peak**

PHILADELPHIA (U.P.) — Civilian employment at the Philadelphia Navy Yard has reached an all-time peak of 11,038.

Under construction are the 35,000-ton battleship Washington and two destroyers, the Rhind and the Buck. This 45,000-ton battleship North Dakota will be started shortly, and the keel of the mine-layer Terror will be laid this autumn.

During the World War, civilian employment in the industrial department reached a peak of 9,600 and the aircraft division 3,556, but not at the same time.

**Journalism Students Rank European War as Number One Story; Embargo Repeal Second**

PORT WORTH — "There shall be wars and rumors of wars" might be taken as the text for the news columns of 1939 as evaluated by the students in the Department of Journalism at Texas Christian University.

Seven of the stories rated by the students as the "Ten Best of 1939" have to do, directly or indirectly, with the fighting in Europe.

The war between Germany and England and France rated almost a unanimous first choice as THE story of the year. No student placed it lower than second.

The three non-war stories placed among the first 10 included the visit of England's royal couple to America, the "New Deal Thanksgiving" and the death of Pope Pius XI.

Big news breaks were so plentiful during 1939 that 32 stories were nominated for inclusion in the first 10.

Among those that just missed being included were the stories of the attempted assassination of Hitler, the financial scandals in Louisiana, the Dies Committee investigations, the Chino-Japanese war, the "mystery" of Roosevelt's third term and the two world's fairs.

The "Ten Best" stories, in the order of their rank and with typical student comment, are as follows:

- 1.—Germany vs. England-France: War has come again in Europe and might come again to the nation that only yesterday fought a war to end all wars.
- 2.—Repeal of the U. S. Arms Embargo. By the passage of this legislation the U. S. placed itself definitely on the side of England and France as a neutral. One of the main ideas is that there are to be no war debts.
- 3.—Visit of the King and Queen of England. For the first time in history an English monarch and his queen set foot on American soil. The pageant of 1939.
- 4.—Sinking of the Athenia. First major casualty of the war. The loss of American lives under similar circumstances touched off the war spirit two decades ago.
- 5.—Russia's war on Finland. The Reds get on with their dream of conquest. Might may not make right, but it certainly makes headlines.
- 6.—Germany's invasion of Poland. Hitler's blitzkrieg against Poland and Russia's "hogging in" left most

of the world breathless. One wonders, does crime pay?

- 7.—Signing of the Russo-German pact. The world still isn't quite sure just who was double crossed.
- 8.—New Thanksgiving. An emotional upset of the U. S. Evoked charges of sacrilege and provoked countless bum jokes.
- 9.—Death of Pope Pius XI. The death of this peace-loving Pope, while war clouds hung over many nations, caused the whole world to mourn.
- 10.—Sinking of the Squalus. The loss of life, the daring rescue of a few members of the crew and the attempt to raise the craft held the front page space for several weeks.

**Federated Rule Of World Urged**

SWARTHMORE, Pa. (U.P.) — The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom has a plan which it believes will provide "a permanent solution" to the problem of war.

The league's proposal embodies a conference of neutral nations, a call for an immediate truce in present conflicts and the eventual establishment of a Federated World Government.

Neutral nations would participate in a continuous conference and would offer their "good offices" for mediation of warring powers, according to the plan.

William I. Hull of Swarthmore College, noted pacifist and peace worker, whose death Nov. 14 ended a career of life-long devotion to the cause of peace, constructed the peace proposal.

"The future welfare of the world demands a peace that has not been won by victory in arms but in peace that is filled with the seeds of a permanent peace and not with the seeds of perennial war," the league said.

It also called for "a peace that is not dictated by victors, nor suddenly submitted to by the vanquished; a peace of negotiations on the basis, not of national interests, but of world needs."

The proposal pointed out that "such a peace can be made only by world participation," and recommends that "in the negotiation

**Navy Dirigible Broken Apart To Aid Science**

LAKEHURST, N. J. (U.P.) — The decommissioned navy dirigible Los Angeles will be piles of junk within a month. The once queenly ship is being sacrificed to science.

The former ZR-3, brought here from Germany where it was built in 1924, is undergoing a series of experiments designed to aid in building lighter-than-air craft. The final test made on the craft will be complete demolition.

The dirigible's nose torn out by force to test the strength of light aluminum alloy girders, the fabric covering torn away for inspection, the giant maid of the air lies awaiting the final experiment—the tearing apart with weights of the skeleton to test the strength of girders under pressure.

**Wind Tests Made.** Commander Jesse L. Kenworthy said the ship had been undergoing tests for several months. It has been repainted, the parts dismantled and reconstructed, hauled on the airfield for wind-resistance tests. The navy department recently au-

thorized dismantling of the ship, which has been in a hangar here since July, 1932, when it was decommissioned after eight years of service.

The dirigible, which has been viewed by many thousands of visitors at the air station, cannot be seen now because orders to close the field to the public went out shortly after the outbreak of war in Europe.

**From German Reparations.** Built in Germany in 1924 as part of Germany's reparations payment to the United States, the Los Angeles was flown here by Dr. Hugo Eckener, renowned German designer and authority on lighter-than-air craft.

On Nov. 24, 1924, the ship was christened by the first lady of the land, Mrs. Grace Coolidge, and started on its life trip of more than 140,000 miles.

The Los Angeles has been used throughout its life for experiments by the navy. It was the first lighter-than-air craft to be used in an experiment to hook airplanes to its underside.

With it, at various times on their visits to this country, have been berthed the German ships Hindenburg and Graf Zeppelin, which exploded and was destroyed while landing May 6, 1937.

**Victims of "Jake Foot" Still Receive Treatment**

WICHITA, Kas. (U.P.) — "Jake foot," the mysterious disease that struck drinkers of Jamaica ginger in the Middle West 10 years ago, still exists.

A survey made here where 500 persons were afflicted with or died from the malady, showed that many have recovered, but others have since died from effects of the drink that was a popular substitute here during prohibition.

Twenty victims of the disease still live and receive treatment at the "jake farm" established by the county for victims of the malady that caused loss of control of the foot and hand muscles.
