

IF YOU HEAR strange, beeping noises these days when you come home from work, which sounds like ships from outer space have landed in your living room, that's a pretty good sign that your household was the recipient of one of the new video games this Christmas.

THE RE-APPORTIONMENT of the county, in order to get the four precincts as nearly equal, according to population, is causing considerable problems for our county commissioners' court.

Part of the problem lies in the fact that Precinct 1 (Friona's precinct), has roughly half of the county's population, and yet Friona isn't exactly near the geographical center of the county.

The first solution advanced by the law firm which the commissioners retained to re-draw county lines, was a situation which split the city of Bovina's voters and gave half of them to the Farwell precinct, and the other half to the Lazbuddie precinct.

Commissioner Jack Patterson, currently representing Bovina, would have had to annex the western part of Friona, and would have lost all of Bovina, under this original plan.

The Lazbuddie precinct, meanwhile, would have been roughly 50 per cent larger in size, in order to get this needed population, as decreed by Supreme Court decisions.

Another plan currently under study by the court, would leave all of Bovina intact in its voting precinct, and add a smaller portion of Friona

to Patterson's precinct. The Lazbuddie precinct would come up and take in a portion of the east side of Friona, in order to get its needed population. The Farwell precinct would be the least changed. In order to keep the commissioners from having to add great chunks of road areas which they would have to maintain, the new proposal would allow the precinct line to follow a highway into towns, where the needed population would be annexed.

Under this second proposal, Friona would find itself included in three different voting precincts.

There are problems involved in redrawing the precinct lines, any way you go about it.

As of Tuesday, January 12, 1982, a total of

# Bovina Police Dept. Gives Year's Summary

A ten month summary of activities handled by the Bovina Police Department was reported recently and the facts of this summary are outstanding.

In misdemeanor incidents reported to the Bovina police, 109 incidents were the number handled by police for the past ten month period.

Forty-three felony incidents were reported to the local police, and there were 56 total arrests stemming from these incidences.

There were twenty-four traffic accidents reported to the Bovina police in the past ten months and 134 assistance rendered calls handled by the five member force.

Police officers attended to 114

public relations functions over the past ten months and were responsible for catching 203 wandering, stray, or unwanted animals.

Totally, there were 741 calls answered by the Bovina Police Department, and this amounted to 2,172 man hours of labor by the regular officers and 1,464 hours worked by the reserve officers, of which there is four presently, with only 48 days vacation taken off by the regular officer in charge, Chief John

So, if there are any questions as to where the police officers are when they are needed...they are out in Bovina, on the streets, in the alleys, and in the public--enforcing the laws, as these statistics bear out.


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TRAPPED....It looks as though Lisa Shepherd has met a brick wall of humanity as she struggles to get past two Friona defenders. Bovina won the game.
