#### 95 Per Cent Wrong

Senator Kenneth McKellar of Tennessee, acting chairman of the Appropriations Committee, has checked with Administrative agencies and reports that Senator Hugh Butler of Nebraska was "95 per cent wrong" in his attack upon our spending policy in Latin America.

Well, we wouldn't say that. Fifty-fifty, perhaps. Right in theory, for the most part; wrong in facts, almost

Instead of spending six billion dollars down there in three years, exclusive of purchases, we actually are spending either \$324,185,000 or \$178,593,000, according to whether military expenditures are included or excluded, says Senator McKellar.

On behalf of the Co-ordinator of Inter-American Affairs, it was suggested earlier that the figure was perhaps \$600,000,000. Of the three, that seems rather acceptable, so far as laymen are in position to judge.

Senator Butler is right in asserting that there is much waste. Evidences of boundoggling have been gathered and written by responsible newspapermen, but you haven't

They have been squelched by censors in Washington, though they had nothing even remotely to do with nation-They have been squelched by censors in Washington. al security, but only with protecting the political positions of the boundogglers.

It seems a shame, at a time when practical, sound economy is so badly needed, that a United States senator should have made such a botch of presenting the case for economy. Starting with a gross exaggeration of the aggregate expenditure, continuing with superficial sug-gestions as to where waste lay, Senator Butler ended up Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, new by playing squarely into the hands of apologists for boondoggling and waste. He scooped up a fumbled ball, carried it behind his own goal posts, planted it three, and began crowing: "Look. I've laid an egg."

But don't be sidetracked by Senator Butler's accident. He was only half wrong. We're still tossing money around both in Latin America and elsewhere.

It's a dollar-to-a-doughnut bet that Senator Truman could go down there and bring back the bacon—and neither OPA nor military censorship could prevent a senator from frying out the bacon fat and cooking a lot of blows in so many places, simul-


