White Collar Hearings

America's white collar workers are finally going to have a chance to speak their piece about wartime wages and prices. The opportunity will come in Washington, when the Senate Committee on Wartime Health and Education holds hearings on the plight of these estimated 15,-000,000 small-salary workers and small-income pensioners.

It is high time that this was done. For too long the white collar worker has been hopelessly caught in the middle of the price and pay squabble, like an undersized referee being belabored by both principals of a heavyweight prize fight. Certain congressmen, backed by pressure groups, have forgotten him in asking for an end of price restrictions on this commodity or that, and have cited instead the boom prices in war industries. Certain business groups have wept over him in an effort to prove that labor's exorbitant demands have driven living costs upward, And certain government groups have perpetuated the fiction of small, controlled, about-to-be-rolled-back price rises at the white collar worker's expense, in an effort to keep labor in line.

Budget And Post-War Plans

The most complete statement yet made on the Roosevelt administration's program for post-war readjustment and preparation for peace was buried in the middle of the President's budget message to Congress. Being less spectacular than the acrobatic juggling of the billion dollar figures on the cost of the war and the public debt, this orders. middle section on reconstruction received scant notice.

The President made no estimate of what this proposed post-war program would cost, but the whole thing bailed out an average of one and was summarized under the heading of contract termination, disposal of surplus property, industrial reconversion, manpower demobilization and re-employment, public works planning, veterans' legislation, social security, and problems of international readjustment.

Of these eight principal divisions, the one subject of interest to most people is this question of manpower de-mobilization and re-employment. All the other seven subjects are dependent on it and it is dependent on them.

This demobilization has already begun, the President points out. Already a million men and women have been discharged from active duty because of age, physical and mental disabilities. All need help in finding their way back into peacetime employment. But this war, says the President, "is causing substantial changes in geographic, technological and market structures of industry." Faced with this, the budget measure declares, "It is imperative we be on guard against any weakening of the administrative agencies which have been established for the purpose of job placement, counseling and training."

This can be taken to mean a post-war strengthening of the U.S. Employment Service, manpower controls, training-in-industry programs and all the other wartime stimulants to labor supply. As far as the USES is concerned, it can be interpreted to mean renewal of requests that this employment service be permanently federalized and completely divorced from state control.
