## Supply Officials Agree On End Of British Capital Goods Shipments

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Virtual elimination of capital goods shipments to Britain under lend-lease is understood to have been agreed upon by British and American supply officials here. The decision is one of numerous adjustments being made to keep lend-lease exports closely geared to military needs.



# Nazis Launch New Blow At Bridgehead

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES - (AP) fierce battle has broken the lull on the beachhead south of Rome with the Germans launching heavy attacks in the northern sector, but all evidence Thursday indicated the Allied forces were holding their own against continuing

An announcement at headquarters said the Germans struck Wednesday morning after a heavy artillery preparation. Both sides threw tanks into the heavy fighting. The Americans and British were said to be grimly

It was the second all-out German attempt to smash the Allied beachhead. The enemy was said to be throwing his full force of infantry, tanks and artillery into the struggle which was hourly increasing in violence.

## Daring Catalina Navy Crew Dares Jap Shore Guns To Save 15 Fliers Shot Down In Attack On Kavieng

Associated Press War Correspondent SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA—The Navy Catalina, "Arkansas Traveler," weathered stiff fire from shore batteries of the Japanese at Kavieng, New Ireland, Tuesday—also 15-foot swells on the water that burst some of her rivets to make the most spectacular rescue of downed American airmen of the Southwest Pacific

Members of that crew, led by Lt. (jg) Nathan G. Gordon, 27, of Morrilton, Ark., a former end or the University of Arkansas football team, told Thursday of rescuing 15 fliers. That entailed making four landings in the face of shore

The rescuers came during the height of massive air blow by Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Mitchells of Kavieng Tuesday before noon. Bombs still were falling on the flaming townsite as the Catalina made the hazardous landings. Several of the rescued Americans had been injured seri-

Six men were sighted on a lift raft two miles off shore. Gordon and his crew circled for the dangerous landing in 15-foot swells.

When the "Arkansas Traveler," a pig painted on her sides, hit the surface some of her rivets broke and she began to take water. The plane taxied to the raft which contained several injured men. Life preservers on lines were tossed

"We had to hurt a few of the injured to get them aboard," Gordon said in an apologetic tone After being 20 minutes under fire of shore batteries, the Catalina took off while billowing smoke from badly-hit Kavieng was swept before a stiff wind.

Then a Mitchell pilot radioed that another crew was spotted on the water. Closer in to shore, three men were seen floating in the water. Ten minutes later they had been taken aboard.

The big Catalina got off again. I was happy as hell it was all over, Gordon "I at first had been nervous; then I was so busy that I forgot that; but when we got the second batch aboard I began to have nervous in-

## Overseas Editorial

Whether justified or not, someone will inevitably make the charge that the Church of England is trying to influence the Democratic convention in June, and the national election in November, in the wake of an editorial in the Church of England Newspaper expressing a hope that President Roosevelt would be elected for a fourth term.

Such an editorial seems to indicate an ignorance of Americans and American politics, rather than an attempt to apply trans-Atlantic political pressure. And that ignorance is not peculiar to any one person or country. In spite of all the inter-dependent aims and efforts that unite the Allied nations in the war, few citizens of one nation know very much about the domestic pullings and haulings in another. Fewer still would feel capable of didactic editorial comment upon them.

Of course, the result of the November vote is going to have world-wide significance, whoever is elected. But the vote itself is a purely domestic function, based on domestic as well as international issues. Most of us, proand anti-fourth-termers alike, feel that a presidential election, even in wartime, is strictly our own business.

The Church of England Newspaper has every editorial right to hope that the President is re-elected, and to call his third term "an untold blessing and benefit to humanity." But it takes a bolder step than any American paper to date, when, in a clairvoyant session on the end of a limb, it picks both presidential candidates, and then weighs the issue accordingly.

'History has not killed the desire and will to (American isolation," the editorial states, "which in the post-war situation will take the form of narrow, unimaginative, reluctant concession to new demands. 

## Expect Children To Get Low Cost Clothing Soon

By ANN STEVICK NEA Staff Correspondent

WASHINGTON-The first question popped to 4935 householders in the Consumer Requirements Survey was, "What are some of the shortages that have bothered you most?"

In the hit parade of 16 shortages most commonly mentioned, the only children's item was under-wear, which came out fifteenth. However, the survey included a representative 46.5 per cent of families with no children under 18, so the poll reveals great concern among people with small children. Babies' waterproof pants, for in-

stance, showed the highest dissatisfaction rating with 83 per cent of the buyers dissatisfied. One out of four mothers looking for children's snow-suits could not find suitable ones. Diaper statistics showed that 35 per cent of shoppers were unable to get what they wanted. Expectant mothers were left behind Bright Colored Net in the race, with 41 per cent failing to find needed diapers.

A definite program of production for essential children's clothes has been set up. New allowances of waterproofing materials have been made for pants and sheetings. Some snew-suits got into production this year by making linings available to manufacturers with wool on hand. A directive is being prepared to get more wool melton cloth to manufacturer's for next year's

Win Cooperation Eighteen million yards of cloth has been allocated for specified types of children's low-cost garments. Manufacturers took it up enthusiastically, perhaps because the incentive was offered of having workers declared essential if they participated in the low-cost

Some other children's goods was discussed in the survey. A large share of buyers seemed to agree with a woman who called her "Victory - model" baby carriage "Pretty sorry." Pre-war carriages and strollers have been put back into production from replenished

Infant's play pens showed a large percentage of people failing find them. Children's cribs were fairly high on the dissatisfaction list. But play pens and cribs are still limited by the wood furniture order. This regulation has been relaxed 5 per cent, and children's goods probably will come in for first attention when additional lumber can be allocated to furni-



Regional WLB Gets



Keeps Lincoln Alive In Death

SPRINGFIELD, ILL. - Abraham Lincoln still lives in the mind of the man who is closest to the Great Emancipator in death. That man is 85-year old Herbert

Wells Fay, a grey-haired Illinois

country newspaper editor who for the last 22 years has been the custodian of Abraham Lincoln's tomb. While the nation prepares to commemorate the Civil War president's 135th birthday anniversary Fay devotes himself to his hobbya collection of more than a million photographs, clippings, books and letters dealing with Lincoln's life—and in retrospect lives in the days when Honest Abe rode the circuit to backwoods courthouses or stumped the state in brawling political campaigns.

Lincoln is no mythical figure to the frail custodian who has guided some 3,000,000 through the shrine in the last two decades. Poring over Lincoln's letters and newspapers, Fay finds a man as real to him

"Certainly Lincoln is alive today -at least his spirit is alive," he staunchly tells visitors. "He's a living force in the United States. All over the world we see people fighting for the things he stands for." Fay treasures 52 original letters written by Lincoln to friends and office seekers. Although he lives with enjoyment in the past, Fay has plenty of contact with the present. 
