# Soviets Aim At Danube River Rumania Aids

## Russians Push Toward Lwow Railway Center

LONDON -- (AP) -- Russian troops were reported fanning out beyond the Dniester River in Bessarabia Tuesday in drives aimed toward the Carpathian Mountains and the Danube Estuary as Moscow an nounced the crushing of two Rumanian divisions said to have been ordered to cover the German retreat.

At the same time other Soviet forces were reported surging on toward Lwow, big German rail hub in old Poland, in a continuation of a push which Monday swept up Korsov, 56 miles to the northeast and 49 other villages.

A Soviet communique announced 115 localities, including Vinnitsa, Nazi Ukraine stronghold 60 miles northeast of Mogilev-Podolski, were seized Monday along a 500-mile front from old Poland to the Black Sea. Mogilev Podolski, major base on the east bank of the Dniester, fell to the Russians Sunday, it also was announced.

German Ships Sunk In the Novo-Ukrainka sector, north of Odessa, the Russians overwhelmed two Rumanian trench lines and quoted prisoners as say-ing the Germans had shot Rumanians for failing to hold. More than 34 localities were taken south of Novo-Ukrainka in the drive which is pushing the Germans back on Odessa, the Russians said.

# 27 Jap Ships Sunk By Allies

The sinking of at least 27 Japanese ships was announced Tuesday by Allied headquarters—22 of them by submarines—as indications mounted that one of Japan's by-passed fortresses in the Marshall Islands was about ready for the final

American submarines accounted for 15 ships in Pacific and Far East waters, the Navy anncunced, bringing to 642 the number of Japanese vessels sunk, probably sunk, or damaged by undersea craft.

Included in the American submarines' toll were two transports, two tankers, and 11

## Phillips 1 Price Near World Depth Record In Pecos

Having drilled under 14,750 feet

and still going down, Phillips No. : Mrs. Ada C. Price, Southeast Pecos County wildcat petroleum exploration, was fast approaching the world depth record of 15,004 feet.

At the level reported for the proj-

ect Tuesday morning, Phillips was only 255 feet short of setting a new mark and indications were that a new deep level would likely be reached.

The world's record is now held Continental Oil Company No KCL 2-A, in the Wasco pool of Kern County, California. It reached 15,004 feet in 1938, but was later plugged back to 13,171 feet and completed as a producer.



## Oil Probers On Slick Footing

When the new 11-man Senate Committee gets going on the job of drawing up a national policy on U.S. Oil reserves, the first thing it will run into is an inability of the experts to agree on what those reserves really

Further, this situation has been tremendously complicated in the last few days by a lot of frantic revision of previous estimates, for motives and reasons that frank-

One of the most respected geologists in the business, E. L. de Golver of the government's Petroleum Reserves Corporation, now estimates known oil reserves in proved U. S. fields at 22 billion barrels. With crude oil pumped out at a billion to a billion and a half barrels during the last 10 years, that would mean this country now has re-

serves for from 15 to 20 years, which isn't much.

A year ago the Petroleum Reserves Committee of the American Petroleum Institute estimated reserves at over 38 billion barrels, but today has scaled this down to a mere 20 billion barrels—a scant 14-year supply. In spite of this, J. Edgar Pew of Philadelphia's Sun Oil Company,
