## Nips Advance **Across Vital** India Road NEW DELHI — (AP) -

Allied troops have repulsed several small isolated Japanese attacks in the Imphal area in Northern India while further south patrols have been hacking at enemy communications lines west of the Chindwin River, Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters announced Friday.

American heavy bembers staged an attack on the new Japanesebuilt Burma-Siam railway on Wednesday, the communique reported. The planes destroyed three bridges and probably destroyed five others, while other direct hits scattered long sections of track.

Other Allied air formations caried out similiar missions in southern, central and northern Burma blasting river and bridge targets near Tangon and Nyigatha, and flew more than 800 sorties against the enemy since Tuesday at a cost of two Allied planes.



### It's Up To The States

During the past year or so there has been a growing chorus of demands for more state government and less bureaucratic edicts from Washington. They are perfectly legitimate demands, and they have now been answered with a man-sized chance to put them into action.

For finally, after more than three months of writing and rewriting, of debating and waiting, the soldier vote bill has become law. And it throws the biggest part of the job right into the states' laps.

It isn't a very good law. It couldn't be, leaving these two important questions unanswered: Will more servicemen be able to vote under it than the 1942 law? How many states will be willing and able, under their present laws, to use the supplementary federal ballot?

When the President polled the 48 governors last month, only five replied that their state was all ready to accept the short ticket for overseas voters. Acceptance seemed probable in a minority of the other states heard from. A few have no absentee voting law of any sort at present. Others would need a special provision by their

Thus far the armed services have successfully fought off all pressure for lowering their physical standards, and when you look at the reasons for the rejection of these 3,437,000 men, it isn't hard to see why. Broadly, there are three principal reasons for a man's classification as 4-F.

Physical and mental defects account for 2,565,400, or 74.7 per cent.

Educational or mental deficiency, including only those men who have failed to meet minimum intelligence standards from June 1, 1943 on, account for 472,200, or 13.7

Manifestly disqualifying defects, such as having only one arm or one leg or being deformed, 361,200, or 10.5 per

Other non-medical defects account for 38,200, or 1.1
