Chinese Admit Loyang May Be In Jap Hands

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's uest for airbases ever nearer the Philippines moved westward Friday to New Guinea's coast and there were signs he was about ready for a 200-mile invasion leap into tha aeriallystrategic Schouten Islands. Allied troops reached the edge of Maffin's Bay airdrome after overpowering Japanese defenders at Tirform River. Its capture seemed imminent on the basis of a Mac-Arthur communique Friday. Maffin Bay is opposite captured Wakde Island off the New Guinea coast 110 miles west of Hollandia and 200 miles east of the Schoutens

Biak, larger of the two Schoutens, suffered another of the air raids which since May 1 have undertaken to soften it up, presumably for invasion. Heavy bombers struck in a night raid at supply and camp areas. In addition, Noemfoor Island, 60 miles west of Biak, was attacked and 19 parked planes were destroyed

From captured Cisterna, American armored infantry is pushing on toward Velletri and gaining ground. Velletri is seven miles up the Via Casilina, Highway 6, from Cisterna and 18 airline miles southeast of Rome.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES—(AP)—Allied forces rolled back the Germans Friday in swift new advances toward Rome at both ends of the Italian battle line.

Fanning out swiftly from the former Anzio beachhead area, now linked to the main front, Fifth Army troops captured Cisterna in heavy fighting and plunged forward more than three miles, cutting two important roads leading northward and northeastward.

On the north, the Eighth Army captured Aquino and Piedimonte, the last remaining strongholds of the enemy's once-vaunted Hitler line,*

and Canadian troops won a bridgehead across the Melba River, in the Liri valley, 13 miles west of

Cisterna, which had constituted one of the kingpins of the enemy's line around the Anzio beachhead, fell Thursday after a savage four-hour battle in which heavy casualties were inflicted on the defenders. American infantry and armor had been battering the town for three days.

Southwest of Cisterna, the Fifth Army occupied Littoria, Mussolini's model town in the ancient Pontine marshes, without opposition.

Roosevelt Calls Monetary Parley

WASHINGTON -(P)- President Roosevelt Friday called an international monetary conference to meet

in this country beginning July 1 to discuss postwar financial problems. Invitations were issued to 42 countries and the French Committee of National Liberation Friday morning.

The conference will be held at Bretton Woods, N. H., and the American delegation will be headed by Treasury Secretary Morgenthau The official name of the meeting will be the "United Nations Mone-tary and Financial Conference." Wants Huge Fund

Last month Morgenthau presented to Congress for informal study broad principles of a proposed \$8,-000,000,000 gold-based stabilization fund which would be used to restore international finance and promote world trade.

That outline was agreed to by Treasury technicians of 34 nations Under it the United States would put up around \$2,500,000,000, Great Britain about \$1,250,000,000 and to Dodanella, three miles off the Russia about \$1,000,000,000. The balance would come from other participating nations.

First reports on G-5, the American and British armies' corps of civil government specialists, are encouraging. G-5 is faced with the appalling job of bringing speedy and orderly government to liberated Europe. But the announcement of its general plan indicates better preparation and promises less confusion than has prevailed in Italy since

The general aims seem to be these: to turn over details of local government to acceptable leaders as soon as possible (except in the case of Germany) and to make sure that resumption of civil life does not interfere with military

For France it is indicated that an earlier American position will be reversed and that G-5 will deal through the National Committee of Liberation at least to the extent of the committee's specific knowledge of the loyalty of local officials. There will be no contact with the Vichy

Exiled governments and loyal groups will be deal with in Belgium, the Netherlands, Denmark and Norway.

The G-5 decision to let the citizens of these countries dispose of their own war criminals is sound. Those who have suffered will know best which of their countrymen Thursday contributed most to their suffering. And it is only just that they should supervise their trial and punishment under a

Germany presents a particularly complex problem. Stern military rule will have to be enforced, and the opposition is bound to be fierce and determined. But certain civil functions are to be entrusted to natives who can convince G-5 officers that their Nazi party membership was a means to employment rather than a political conviction.

This is not ideal, but the only alternative is complete chaos, with G-5 not only combatting opposition but bogged down in the endless details of hundreds of local administrations. It is not wise to spend time, money and energy on a Victory Garden, and take no steps to control insects that bring it all to nothing, If gardeners have not started insect control already they are advised to start it now.

In small gardens hand-picking is an effective control for many of the most injurious insects Squash bugs are easy to catch and destroy; their eggs are laid in clusters on the underside of leaves of the vine crops, such as squash, pumpkin and cucumber.

Cabbage worms are easy to destroy. As soon as the first sign of damage occurs, the underside of the leaves should be examined for small worms.

The eggs of potato beetles are laid on the foliage of potato plants soon after they come up. The eggs are orange in color and are laid in clusters on the lower surface of the leaves. They and the beetles should be destroyed. Gardeners, don't neglect to en-
