

# BRITISH TANKS CAPTURE AMIENS

## Russians Believed To Be In Bucharest

MOSCOW—(AP)—The Red Army was believed Thursday to have entered Bucharest, capital of Romania, after capturing the great Ploesti oil fields and preempting perhaps a third of the German petroleum industry.

At midnight, the Russians were 17 miles from the city of 648,000 after an advance of nearly 40 miles in a day through the capitulated Balkan kingdom.

An official announcement was not yet made, but Muscovites kept their radios tuned for an order of the day.

"With the fall of Ploesti, the way to Bucharest is open," Red Star said.

**Oil Fields Are Damaged**  
Izvestia reported from captured Ploesti that the abrupt Red Army drive had prevented destruction of the Ploesti oil fields, but added that serious damage had been done.

Romanian oil workers helped the Russians put out tremendous fires and civilians directed Soviet troops to a large group of Germans dressed as civilians, applying the torch right and left.

The dispatch added that a plane trip over the fields, greatest in Europe except for those in Russia itself, disclosed that the Germans did everything possible to destroy wells, pipelines, derricks and equipment.

A Reuters dispatch to London from Moscow Thursday quoted the Soviet Army organ Red Star as saying that German forces had set the Ploesti oil wells afire in Romania before withdrawing and that Russian troops had to fight their way into the area through a sea of flame.

Forces of Gen. Feodor I. Tolbukhin were pushing through level plain country along with those of (Continued on Page 4)

## Tests Scheduled In Winkler And Yoakum Wildcats

Drillstem tests are to be taken shortly on oil indicating zones in the San Andres section of the Permian line in wildcat projects in Southeast Winkler County and in West-Central Yoakum County.

The Texas Company No. 1 Hogg, section 24, block B-10, psi survey, one mile north of the discovery well for Tubb production in the North Monahans area in Southeast Winkler, was on a bottom of 4,135 feet, in lime.

A core at 4,115-35 feet had a 100 percent recovery of the formation with a slight show of oil, but lacking porosity. Operator is to check that section and then possibly will core again.

This prospecter is contracted to drill below 6,000 feet to test for pay found in the Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Sealey-Smith, the initial producer for the North Monahans pool from the section around 6,100 feet. Nearest San Andres production is a considerable distance away.

**Will Unload Hodges**  
Skelly Oil Company No. 1 Hodges, section 446, block D, John H. Gibson survey, about six miles west and slightly north of Plains, in West-Central Yoakum, and about the same distance from the closest production in the Wasson field, was drilled ahead from 5,302 feet to a new bottom at 5,360 feet, and the operator has decided to unload the hole, and start a series of tests to determine if the development can be made a commercial well.

On a drillstem test from 5,245-5,302 feet, a small amount of free oil and 125 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud were recovered during a one-hour period.

Unofficial sources reveal that drilling samples from the recently open section of the hole showed some of the same petroleum signs as were found in cores taken before the drillstem test was run.

**Pecos Test Swabbed**  
Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 State National Bank of El Paso, trustee, section 7, block 140, T&SL survey, in Central-North Pecos, swabbed 14 hours and recovered 60 barrels of fluid. Included was one percent drilling mud and 19 percent wash water—leaving 80 percent as oil. That indicated a natural yield, as is, of about three and one-half barrels of oil.

Shutin tubing pressure was 400 pounds. Swabbing continues. The (Continued on Page 5)

## Norther Clears West Texas Skies

Farm and ranch lands over portions of Texas generally benefitted Thursday from rains as the Pedernales River returned toward normal after a flash flood and the Rio Grande continued to flood.

## Lt. Gen. Bradley Heads U.S. Forces In North France

Almost 300 ocean-going ships were knocked out of the Japanese merchant and fighting fleets in August.

A recapitulation of Allied communiques Thursday with reports for the month not yet complete, disclosed at least 175 of these were known to be sunk, including 18 combatant vessels.

The figures do not include more than 500 barges, luggers, sampans and river boats sunk or damaged, mostly in China.

Communiques Thursday and Wednesday listed 36 ships destroyed or crippled. They included 17 by submarines, which sank 52 in August for their biggest month of the war.

**U. S. Still Builds Ships**  
Damaging Japanese losses contrasted sharply with the report of Navy Secretary Forrestal that the United States Navy has 65,000 vessels including 1,150 aircraft carriers, battleships, cruisers, destroyers and submarines, with its building program "little more than half finished."

American bombers, softening up the approaches to the Philippines, delivered their fourth heavy blow within two weeks at the stepping-stone island of Halmahera. In that period 514 tons of explosives blasted Japanese defenses on the island.

"Damage was heavy and widespread," Gen. Douglas MacArthur said, in the latest raid aimed at the heart of the island.

Other Southwest Pacific bombers ranged on again at Davao, southernmost important city in the Philippines and a Japanese town in pre-war days.

**Liberators Raid Air Field**  
Central and North Pacific air forces maintained their threatening aerial shows on Japan itself. Liberators were unopposed in a night raid on Iwo air field, 750 miles south of Tokyo. Three A-24s based planes were damaged in attacks on Paramushiro.

An American observed in China said incessant air battering and the hammering blows of Chinese infantrymen threatened to bog down Japan's drive into Southeast China, designed to bisect China. The Japanese were engaged in bitter fighting ten miles south of Hengyang (Continued on Page 4)

## Plans Are Made For Paper Drive

The urge to save waste paper is expected to be more unanimous for this drive because of the cigarette shortage. Press reports have said the shortage is largely due to the scarcity of paper.

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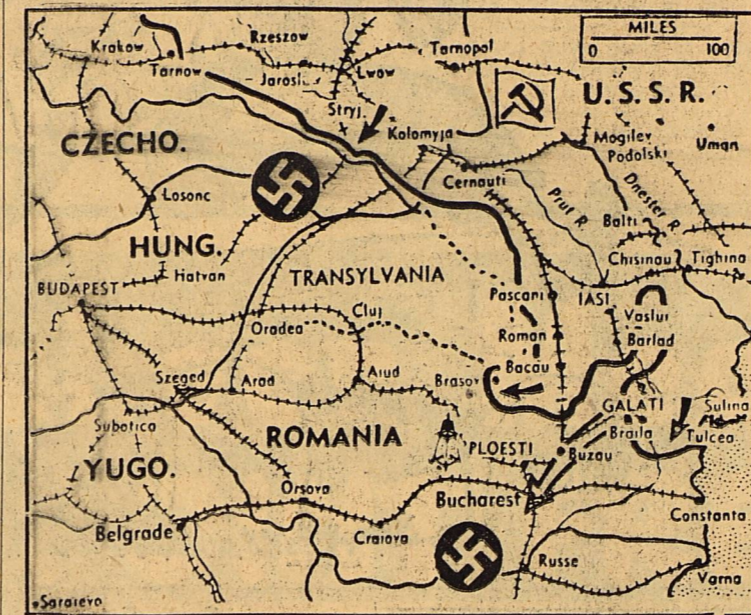
## Midland Awakens With Shivers, Thursday

## Soviets Accuse Bulgaria Of Aiding Nazis After Protesting Neutrality

LONDON—(AP)—Moscow Thursday accused Bulgaria of aiding the Germans after protesting neutrality, with the Russian press declaring the only hope for the Bulgars to save themselves would be by active war against the Nazis.

This sharp rebuke came as a Bulgarian armistice delegation was held virtually prisoners in Cairo awaiting Allied terms. The formal presentation was delayed pending return from America in a few days of Lincoln MacVeigh, U. S. Ambassador to the exiled Greek and Yugoslav governments.

Consultations with some of the Allies, especially the Greeks and Yugoslavs whose lands have been occupied by Bulgarian troops, were believed not yet completed.

Moscow press stories charged that Bulgaria, after declaring her neutrality, had made an agreement with the Germans whereby Hitler would be allowed to withdraw troops and munitions from the country.

Sofia's failure to intern armed German ships and crews in Bulgarian waters, and the role Bulgars played and are playing in Greece and Yugoslavia will not be forgotten, they asserted.

**Romanians In Moscow**  
Thus as a Romanian delegation reached Moscow to formalize that country's armistice and Red Army forces drove more deeply into Romania and Transylvania, the stage was set for collapse of Hitler's Balkan ramparts.

An Ankara dispatch said Romanian signature of an armistice in the Russian capital appeared likely within 48 hours. Romanian troops already are fighting beside the Russians.

Ankara reports said the Germans bombed Bucharest, causing heavy damage in residential districts. These same reports said General Gesteberg, head of the German air mission in Romania, was taken prisoner but escaped.

Additional hundreds of vehicles and guns knocked out by Allied planes littered the roads throughout the valley and 200 enemy dead were found in the same area.

Wednesday morning the Germans locked in sharp battle with an American column in the vicinity of Livron on the North banks of the Drome river, 11 miles South of Valence. In the afternoon the enemy broke off contact and fled North when the avenue of escape was threatened by another Allied column that punched into Chabeuil, six miles Southwest of Valence.

**16 KILLED IN SOUTH AMERICA**  
RIO DE JANEIRO—(AP)—Sixteen persons were killed shortly after midnight Thursday when a transport plane of Panair Do Brasil, affiliate of Pan American Airways, crashed near the Sao Paulo airport.

**Armed Services Casualties Now Total 343,191**  
WASHINGTON—(AP)—Reflecting the period of heaviest fighting in Northern France, total Army casualties jumped to 284,838 on August 13, an increase of 23,249 over those reported just a week earlier.

Coupled with Navy casualties of 58,353, the latest overall figures for the armed services is 343,191, compared with 317,846 a week ago. All figures are on the basis of those officially reported to next of kin and represent a lag of three weeks or more behind action in the field.

Reports received by the rodeo committee from racing fans who have seen the horses say the race between Jap Holman's "Yankee Doodle" and Roy Adams' "Pinto Joe" over the quarter mile course will be a thriller.

Jim Bain of Albuquerque is bringing "Black Bottom" to Midland to race against "Bounding Main," entered by Dr. W. M. Bloss of Midland. Ranchmen, cowboys and horse lovers in general are looking forward to the roping horse race over a 350 yard course. Entries in this event will be from horses used in the calf roping contests.

Clyde Burk of Comanche, Okla., and Troy Fort of Lovington, N. M., will contest in the feature event of the day, roping 12 calves each for a \$2,000 purse.

## Germans Are In Full Flight To Nation's Border

SHAEF—(AP)—British tanks captured Amiens and smashed across the Somme River Thursday in a lightning 60-mile drive in 48 hours which found the Germans in full flight back to the Reich before four onrushing Allied armies.

The British raced with American columns which overran Laon and stabbed on north along the last 30 miles to Belgium with such bewildering speed that they overwhelmed three trainloads of German soldiers trying to escape.

The speed of the advance, virtually uncontested along a 150-mile arc at the Somme approaching the Meuse River, indicated the Germans had given up the last pretense of a rearguard stand and were in open flight through Belgium back to the imperiled homeland.

The Somme had been considered a natural barrier along which the enemy might try to fashion some sort of a stand, but the capture of the city of Amiens, which straddles the river, blasted this possibility.

**Ahead Of Schedule**  
Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared that now the Allied campaign to liberate Northern France was at least five days ahead of schedule, and it appeared that the Germans were not trying to sidetrack it.

With the Canadians mopping up the big river port of Rouen, 25 miles inland from Dieppe, and the British 25 miles inland from Abbeville at Amiens, half the German robot bomb coast and day forces garrisoning it seemed doomed.

There was no rest anywhere for the disorganized Germans, and Allied drives mushroomed over battlefields of the first World War, covering in an hour territory that it once took days and weeks to conquer.

**Capture St. Dizier**  
One force of Americans, heading east for the German frontier, seized St. Dizier, 18 miles southeast of fallen Vitry and pressed on to within 40 miles of the reversed Maginot Line. The Saar border of Germany was 87 miles ahead of this force.

Forty-five miles ahead of the American drive was the gateway city of Sedan, where the Germans (Continued on Page 6)

**Losses Heavy**  
Equally impressive were the material losses of the enemy.

In a pocket of slightly more than 11 miles South of Livron, losses inflicted by our ground forces included 2,000 motor vehicles, 1,000 horses, 27 five millimeter antitank guns, 12 seventy-seven millimeter guns, three batteries of field artillery pieces, six railroad guns, 40 twenty millimeter antiaircraft weapons, eight self-propelled guns and a trailer with a printing press," Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's headquarters said.

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**Blalock Suggests New Type Ballot**  
AUSTIN—(AP)—Democratic National Committeeman Myron G. Blalock thinks one solution to the Texas elector muddle would be printing of the names of the presidential candidates, rather than the electors, on the November election ballot.

Here for a conference with Gov. Coke Stevenson, he suggested that statute permitting this practice to be valid, despite conflicting opinions by two former attorney generals.

"There's nothing the matter with that law," he said.

"It would seem logical to print on Texas ballots the names of the presidential and vice-presidential candidates rather than the names of the electors.

"This would be a more binding instruction than that given the electors by the May 23 convention."

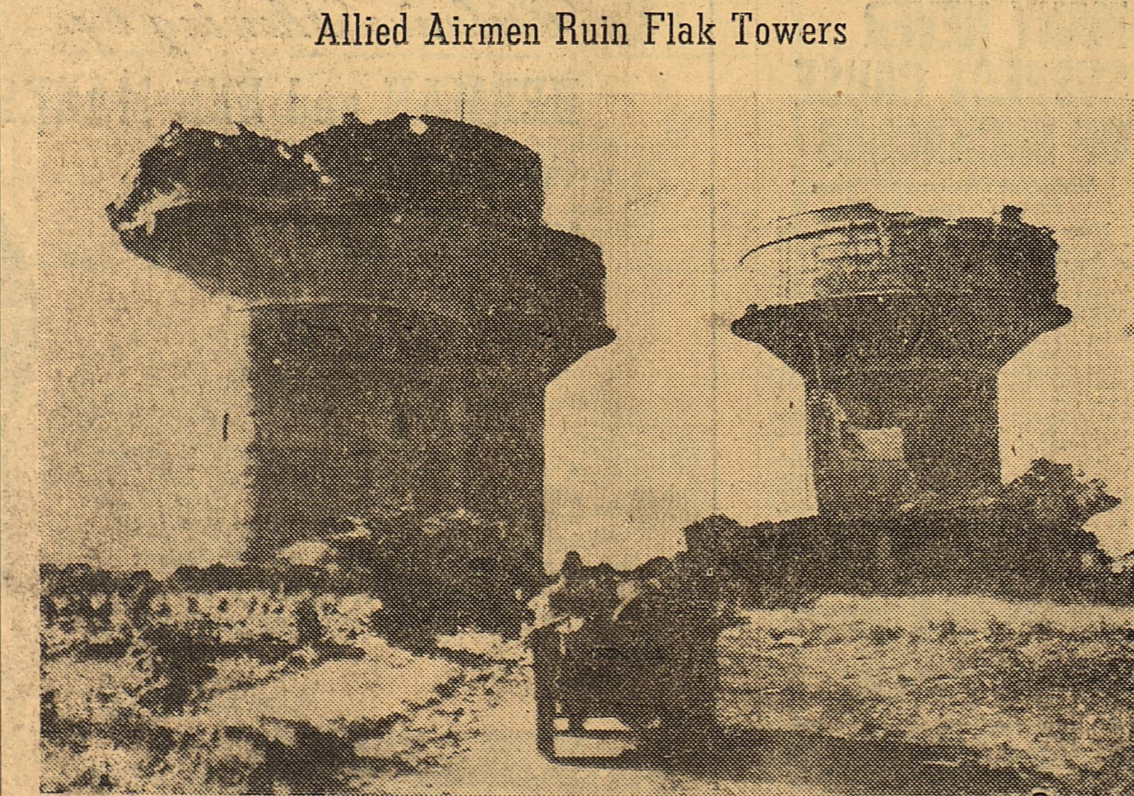

**War Bulletins**  
MOSCOW—(AP)—American and British flags flew in Poland for the first time Thursday since the German conquest of 1939. The flags, together with those of Russia and Poland, were unfurled at Lublin at the unveiling of a monument to Red Army fighters.

ROME—(AP)—The Adriatic port of Pesaro, one of the eastern anchors of the Germans' Gothic line, has fallen to Polish troops, and Allied forces now are in contact with strong enemy positions further inland after storming across the Foglia River on broad front.

SHAEF—(AP)—The American First Army, in a swift dash toward the Belgian border, caught three trainloads of German soldiers about to pull out of the Laon station and killed or captured them all.

ROME—(AP)—German resistance has been overcome north of the Drome River in Southern France after heavy fighting and the Allied advance up the Rhone Valley continues.

## Will We Remember?

If victory in Europe is in sight as General Montgomery says, it is coming none too soon. For a Germany somewhat farther removed from defeat would surely unveil new types of destruction more frightful than anything yet seen. The flying bomb is a good sample.

These missiles have taken nearly 5,000 lives. They have destroyed or damaged 1,000,000 dwellings. They have forced evacuation of more than 500,000 persons from London, and preparations to evacuate a million more.

Hitler's "secret" weapons are no longer a joke. Some have failed, like the small remote-control tank. Others, such as the one-man torpedo and the radio-controlled bomb, have been only slightly effective. But the jet-propelled fighter plane is not to be laughed off. Neither is the possibility of the "V-2," probably a rocket bomb or a big pilot-guided version of the flying bomb.

What else may be in store is limited only by the time and ingenuity at Hitler's disposal. Certainly no humanitarian considerations will deter the Nazis from fulfilling their promise to make the last days of the Third Reich a bloody nightmare for Europe. Hints of chemical or bacterial attacks are too frequent to be entirely ignored.

Fortunately Hitler did not give up hope of victory by traditional warfare until too late. When he did, in the case of the flying bomb, British espionage and British air power threw him off schedule and relayed the robot attacks until after the French invasion. Even so, the flying bomb, though apparently too inaccurate for anything short of large city areas, has brought much disruption and has tied up a sizable segment of air power to fight it.

Time, power and ingenuity are on our side today. While Hitler puts his last hope on secret weapons, the United Nations are crushing his armies and finding antidotes for the new destruction he has displayed.

But will the world consider what might have been? Will the world believe that such horrors will be the weapons of another war, just as the wood-and-canvas airplane of the last war became the thundering sower of death in this?

Will the world remember that another war will bring prodigal slaughter and destruction hitherto undreamed of? Will it remember this not for months and years but for decades, and work unceasingly for peace and strike swiftly and fiercely at any threat against it? Will it remember how it said, between 1918 and 1939, that "another war will be so terrible that no government will dare to take the responsibility of starting it?"

## Londoner's View

The trans-Atlantic edition of the London Mail carries the answer of its New York correspondent to a question frequently put to him on his return to London: "How does Britain at war strike you as compared with America at war?"

Here is the answer: "There is no comparison. The American civilians—all of them, not just those with big bankrolls—are living a life hardly distinguishable from peacetime existence. There are mountains of food and acres of clothing for everyone. Rationing is the merest pinprick.

"There are plenty of luxuries. More money is being made by the entertainment, catering and clothing industries than ever before. The war is remote. Almost it does not exist in a physical sense. Psychologically it is close—for remember there are 10,000,000 Americans or more in uniform, and their relatives belong to nearly every home in America."

Exaggerated, would you say? Not to a man who has seen wartime London—just the daily living, not the blitz and the robots. It might be well if we would try to look at ourselves now and then through a Londoner's eyes—we who gripe and grouse and gouge and strike.

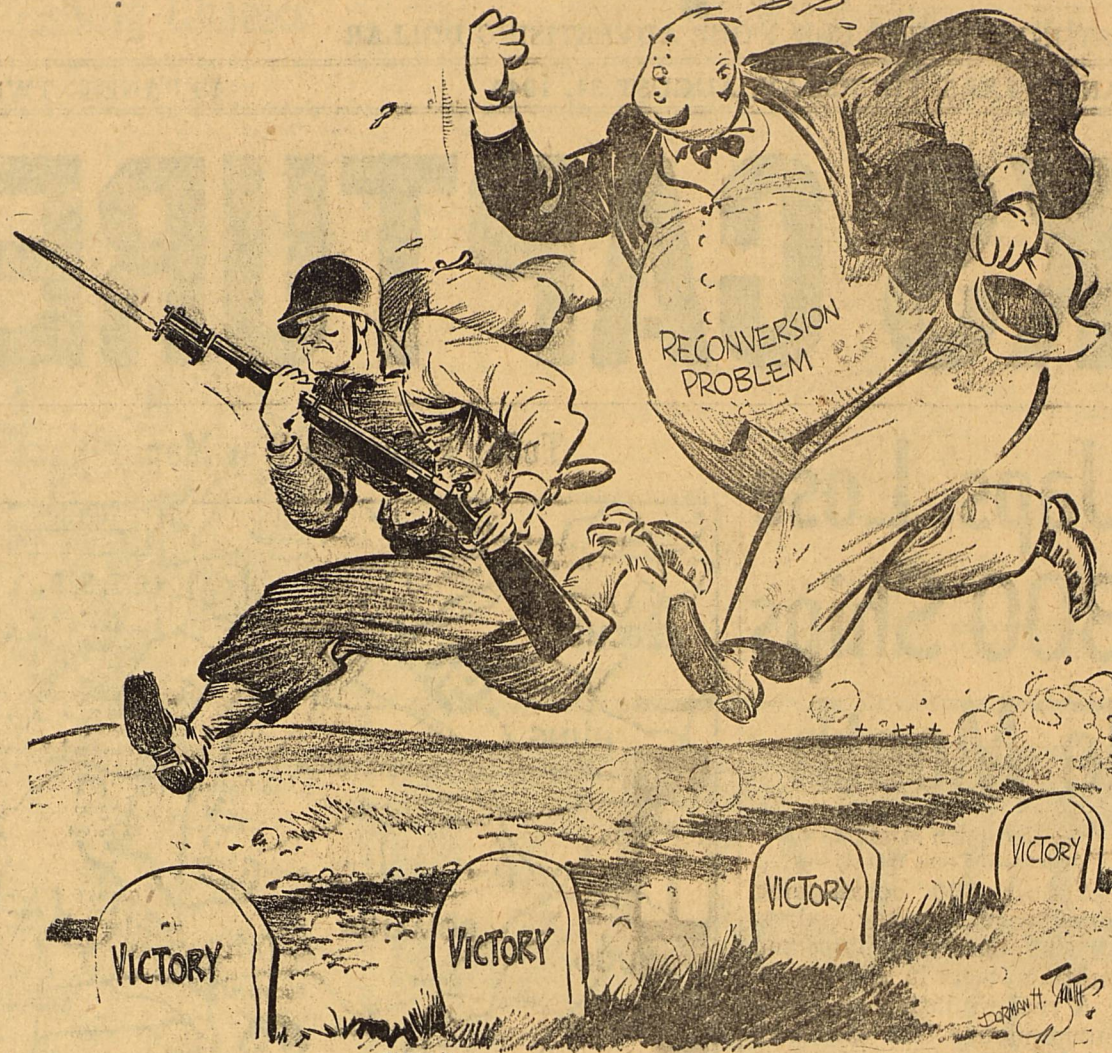
And as I watched that toast—Dee with his glass of beer, Jane with her buttermilk—I thought to myself—There's a recipe for

## THE WAR TODAY

Good news continues to roll out of Allied Supreme Headquarters in France and Thursday we have several announcements of vast and happy significance.

One of Patton's racing armored columns has driven northward beyond Laon, not far from the headquarters of the winding River Somme. This means that an advance of a few more miles will enable us to flank this historic valley and render it untenable for the Hitlerites.

Meanwhile the British have launched a great offensive from their bridgeheads across the lower Seine and have thrust spearheads into Amiens on the Somme, not far to the north. This railway city is one of the key positions on the Somme.

**Have To Move Fast**  
This British advance, coupled with the American drive on the east, will compel the Germans to abandon their positions on the coast of the English Channel below the mouth of the Somme. They'll have to move fast, too, or get caught in another disastrous trap.

One of the most cheering aspects of the British offensive lies in the official statement that "the thrust was cutting off German flying bomb launching sites with every mile gained."

Supreme Commander Eisenhower has capped all this fine news with the statement that the campaign in Northern France is five days ahead of schedule.

That ten days means a lot at this critical juncture. Hitler is fighting for time, and we are fighting to deprive him of it. The Nazis declare the Allies are speeding an effort to win the war before winter comes—a claim which one would scarcely dispute—and five days saved may be worth a hundred after the bad weather comes.

## Jim Thomas Gets Death Sentence

**PLAINVIEW**—(AP)—Fifty-four-year-old Jim Thomas Thursday was under death sentence for the slaying last Oct. 26 of Dr. Roy Hunt, 38 of Littlefield, convicted by a district court jury of nine farmers and three automobile dealers.

A convict on parole, Thomas swallowed once or twice and looked at the floor as the jury Wednesday night returned its verdict two hours and 40 minutes after receiving the case.

Thomas was arrested in Galveston last Oct. 27, a day after the bodies of Dr. and Mrs. Hunt were found bound to a bed in their Littlefield home. He pleaded innocent. The case was moved here on a change of venue.

District Judge C. D. Russell read the verdict to a crowded courtroom, its stillness broken only by the sobs of a woman.

Thomas told reporters he was not guilty.

## Serviceman Death Pension Claim Bill Soon Ready

By JAMES MARLOW

**WASHINGTON**—(AP)—A family which has a serviceman reported killed or missing in action should keep in mind a bill just passed by congress.

It affects the death pension claims of a serviceman's dependent survivors. The president almost certainly will sign it into law.

This is the main point of the bill: It prevents a surviving dependent from receiving—for the same period of time—both pension money and allotments or service pay.

It also prevents the Veterans Administration (VA), which pays out death pensions, from making its own decision as to when a serviceman died.

**VA Must Accept**  
From now on VA—which sponsored the bill to avoid future confusion—must accept the findings of the War or Navy Departments, as to when a serviceman died.

**Example:**  
Private Jones was first reported missing 12 months ago. Today the War Department notified his wife that he must be considered dead.

So under the bill—VA must consider Jones dead as of today. Pensions to his dependent survivors therefore would start as of today.

The procedure generally worked like that in the past anyway. But there were cases in which VA could make exceptions, decide itself on the actual date of death, and make pension payments from that date.

The VA, however, still can decide—so far as insurance is concerned—on the date of Jones' death, no matter what the War or Navy Department says.

## UNIVERSITY TO STUDY VETERANS NEED PROGRAM

**AUSTIN**—(AP)—A helping war veterans find the course of study most suited to their needs, is being developed at the University of Texas.

W. R. Woolrich, Dean of Engineering, head of a nine-member veterans' coordinating committee, said the University plans to utilize the coming eight weeks fall term as a testing ground for this work.

No dramatic change in the University's present curriculum is contemplated, said Dean Woolrich, as adequate instruction is already being offered in the arts, sciences, professional and technical fields.

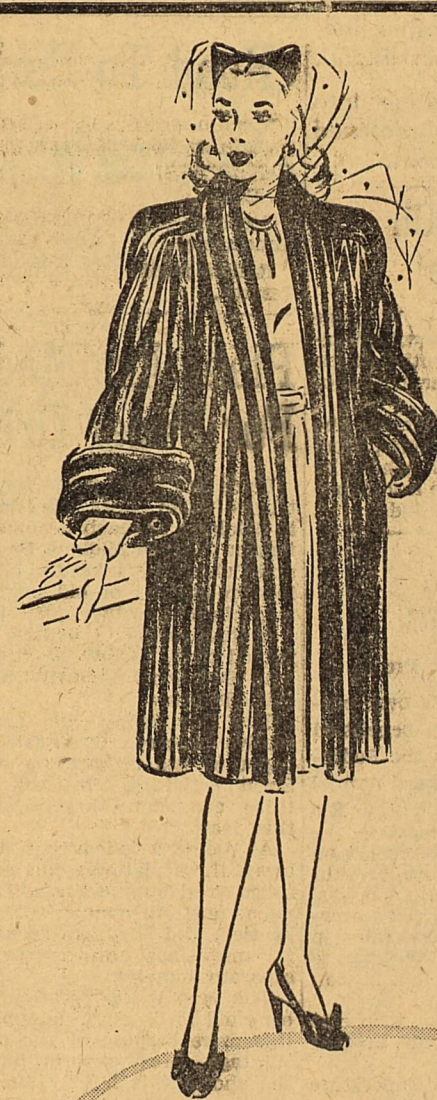

## Pvt. Glenn Parrott Leaves For San Diego

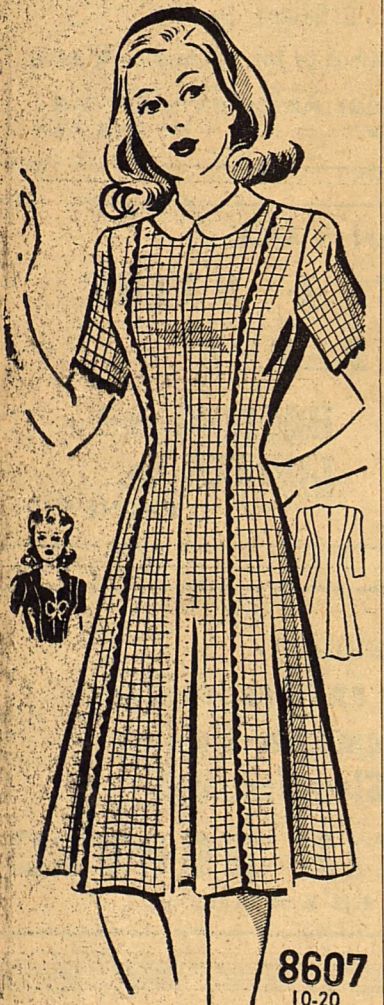

Chungking said defending forces still fought for Lishui, potential coastal air base near Japan. Japs Order Evacuation. Chinese also reported Tokyo had ordered Japanese civilians out of Shanghai and Amoy—both threatened by U. S. bombings. Two air battles over Yochow Tuesday developed into the biggest aerial combat of the China war, Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell disclosed in a revised report listing 49 Japanese planes destroyed or damaged. Previously he listed 19 as wrecked. Eight Zeros were shot down in a later raid on Hankow. Both Yochow and Hankow are major enemy air bases in Central China. Monsoons grounded planes in Burma and limited fighting to patrol action.

Another arm of Malinovsky's big command turned directly north through a pass leading to Erassy (Pop. 6,800) on the trunk line railroad from Bucharest to Budapest and Vienna. Large groups of Germans and Hungarians are known to be massed in Hungary-held Transylvania in the path of this force. Even after the Romanian army's big defeats on the Russian steppes, in the Crimea and Odessa, Red Star said it still had 30 to 35 divisions. King Mihai has pledged these to the Allies.

New Hunting Licenses Are Due Friday

AUSTIN — (P) — Hunting and fishing licenses for the fiscal year 1944 expire at midnight Thursday. Game Commission officials warned Texans who expect to open the dove hunting season Friday out of their home county in the north zone, to make sure to have new permits. Resident hunting licenses cost \$2, fishing licenses \$1.10.

Open season in the north zone for mourning doves begins Sept. 1, ends Oct. 25. In the South zone, it opens Oct. 20, closes Dec. 14. The bag limit on doves per day is 10, and no hunter may have more than 10 doves in his possession. Shotgunners must be plugged to three-shell capacity.

The zones are divided by a line running roughly from East to West across the State, with these the border counties in the North zone: Harrison, Gregg, Smith, Henderson, Navarro, Hill, McLennan, Falls, Bell, Williamson, Travis, Hays, Comal, Bexar, Medina, Uvalde, Kinney.

Hunting for mourning doves is legal in those and all counties north of them Friday.

4,000 School Teachers Short In State System

AUSTIN — (P) — Within three weeks of opening time, Texas schools face their third wartime winter, with little outlook for improvement. Teacher ranks show 4,000 vacancies, although the enrollment this September will be as heavy as ever.

Transportation troubles loom almost insurmountably in view of the curtailment of new buses, lack of repair parts for old ones, and shortage of competent drivers.

Mrs. Virginia Link of El Paso, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, who gives the estimate of a 4,000 teacher shortage, says that "most teachers do not like defense jobs, and would prefer to stay in school... but they also prefer to eat."

Teachers, particularly in the rural areas, are obliged to be chief cook and bottler. Although it has not been generally publicized, many teachers since the war have to round up the children in the school bus of a morning, teach them all day, and drive them home at night.

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Try Dressing Up Bologna To Save Valuable Points



Wrap bologna sausage in special biscuit dough, with parsley sauce, for main dish.

By GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Staff Writer Bologna sausage is unrational and popular. Serve it with a special biscuit dough wrapping with parsley sauce as the main dinner dish. It's a winner.

Bologna Biscuit Roll-Up (Serves 4-6) Two cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons lard, 3/4 cup milk, 1 1/2 pounds bologna, 1 piece, 1/4 cup prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish, 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 1/2 cups seasoned medium white sauce.

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in lard with 2 knives or pastry blender until particles are size of small peas. Gradually add milk, mixing with fork to form soft dough. Remove outer casing from bologna; slice bologna lengthwise in thirds. Mix mustard and horseradish; spread on cut sides of bologna slices. Put bologna slices back together, secure together with 2 toothpicks. Roll out biscuit dough in rectangle 1/4 inch thick. Place bologna on biscuit dough, wrap dough around meat. Moisten dough edges with water; seal together, wrapping bologna completely in dough. Cut a few gashes in top of roll. Place on baking sheet, bake in very hot oven (450 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Add parsley to hot white sauce. To serve, cut roll in slices and serve with sauce.

For winter meals, make this horseradish relish now. Horseradish Relish Grate soup horseradish roots. Measure about 1/2 as much vinegar as horseradish, add 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon salt for each cup of vinegar, and pour over grated horseradish. Pack at once into clean, hot, sterile jars. Fill jars to top; seal tightly.

American Boys Fighting In Resort Site

By NEA SERVICE Today a battleground, the French Riviera, that fabulous stretch of the Mediterranean seaboard extending from Marseille to Mentone, is best known to the world as a glittering playground without rival. The movies and the novelists have brought its wonders to the bored housewife, the romantic shopgirl and the tired businessman who never found time to travel. They became familiar with stories of fortunes won and lost in a single evening; the jeweled women, suave men with imposing titles, notables in the fields of finance, statesmanship, literature, art—and not one whit of it was exaggerated.

Tourist Haven The natural beauty of the Cote d'Azur alone would be sufficient to entice the thousands of tourists and health seekers who have swarmed to the southern coast of France for the winter season of the past several decades. The unrivaled blue of the Mediterranean washes a gently curved shore of deep sea crags interspersed with sandy, snow-white beaches. An amiable climate fosters the growth of stately date palms, pomegranates, bananas. A vast profusion of rose fields, violets, hyacinths, flowers for the daily refrigerated train which bore them to the Paris and London markets—made it something of a paradise, and with gambling casinos, yachting facilities and international tennis tournaments thrown in, the Azure Coast became a magnet to pleasure seekers from all continental Europe and the United States. Cannes was perhaps the most fashionable of the resort cities; there were the 200-foot yachts and the creme de la creme of international notables—Lord Louis Mountbatten, with his blue flannel yachting jacket and his yellow polo shirt open at the throat; Noel Coward, the Duke of Windsor, W. Somerset Maugham, the King of Sweden, India's fabulously wealthy Aga Khan, King Carol and, too, phony fortune-hunting noblemen.

Open Season Nice, a prosperous city of 200,000, threw open the doors of her hotels for the opening of the season in December. American millionaires and remittance men from the Continent and the British Isles, the elderly rich in search of the warm sub-tropic climate, thronged south on the famous "Blue Train" from Paris. The Riviera was alive again, and would burn through six months of gay life and millions of dollars. Marseille, France's largest seaport, and Toulon, her great naval base, came in for their share of tourists too, but the great playland lay to the east.

Centuries before the floodlighted highways led from one casino to the next, this area was settled by the Greeks and Romans. Marseille, originally Massilia, was founded by the Ionian Greeks in 600 BC, as a trading post, became a rival of Carthage as a port, and in the Punis Wars took the side of Rome. It became in fact "The Gateway to the Orient" in 1669, with the opening of the Suez Canal, and received the exotic products of the east for distribution to Europe. Historic Strife Toulon, a great natural harbor, became a naval base in the 16th century, when it was fortified by Louis XII and Francis I, and for centuries was an objective in the wars with Spain and England. Napoleon's career really began there, when, in 1793, he forced the besieging ships of those nations to withdraw. Nice bears a great Greek name—"Nike," for "victory," and Monaco has its Port of Harakles. The Roman conquest of this area dates from the year 124 BC, and the roads they constructed can still be traced at various points. During the Middle Ages strife among feudal families of the territory was almost continual, but it became part of France upon the death of Renee of Anjou, King of Sicily, when Louis XI made sure it would become the perpetual property of the French crown.

Many Shows Reported The test was shutdown for rig repairs at last report, with between 5,500 and 2,000 feet of oil in the hole. Oil shows have been reported in this test from around 4,055 feet. A string of 7-inch casing was set at 4,155 feet. Some observers think some of the petroleum now showing might be coming from behind the pipe and from sections up the hole, and between the bottom and the casing seat.

Several operators express the opinion that the operator could have made a commercial well of the prospector at several different levels before reaching the present total depth. Some sources credit most of the oil now indicated as coming from the formation between 6,800-10 feet. Shell and Cities Service No. 1 TXL, section 7, block 45, TP, T-1-S, which has shown for production in a formation thought to be the Devonian had reached 7,999 feet in chert and lime, and was preparing to take a drillstem test. Operator's reports show the project made 20 feet of new hole in the last four days which indicate the formation is slightly hard.

Nazis Introduced Black Markets In Paris Only To Become Victims

By HAL BOYLE PARIS—(AP)—The Germans introduced the black market to Paris and then became victims of the Frankenstein financial monster. "The black market was the only business in France making money," said Alec Jean Greciet, a floor waiter who has been opening hotel doors unexpectedly for 29 years and says nothing any longer surprises him. Black Market Popular "Everybody in France buys in the black market as much as he can afford," he related, "but most workmen in factories receive only about 125 francs a day—that is about \$2.50 in your money—you can see he had a hard time of it." The "Marche Noir" or black market originated with the Germans because they were the only source of supply, Alec said, "but then later they too had to buy in the black market for many things if they stayed on." "Many of them had plenty of money because they had goods to sell in the black market. They played one Frenchman against another but you had to buy in the black market—everybody from workers to bankers did so, just as much as they could afford and there wasn't anything—not one thing—you couldn't buy if you only had the money." Only Three Months Penalty The only penalty for black market dealers caught violating the Vichy restrictions was three months in jail and then they could go back, rested and refreshed, and reopen. "Of course anybody who had anything anybody else wanted was in the black market," Alec continued.

"Goods have meant more than money here all through the war." The French for the last four years had been allowed but two pairs of shoes annually with ration tickets and they cost about 800 francs or \$8 a pair. "On the black market," Alec said, "they cost 2,000 to 2,300 francs a pair—\$40 to \$46—without tickets." Alec said a suit of clothes of ordinary good quality cost about \$28 to \$32 with tickets. But on the black market they cost \$160. Smoke Shortage Bad "But the cigarette shortage troubled us almost as much as anything because for many of us it was our only luxury and you have to have some small luxury to live," he said. "We could only buy four packages of cigarettes a month with tickets—they cut us from six to four," Alec related. "The packages cost only 13 francs, but lasted only a few days. Most of the cigarettes were sold on the black market and came from Belgium. They cost 140 francs a

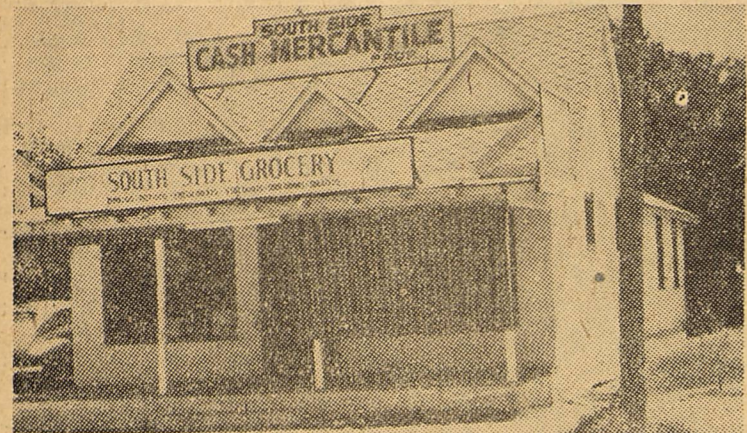

## Bulldozer, Airdozer, Beachdozer, And Tankdozers Accomplish Job

WASHINGTON—Roaring and snorting around the world is a new American weapon of war—a steel-bladed behemoth dedicated to pushing things around.

The bulldozer is a common sight in America, but few Americans realize that this revolutionary earth-mover is barely 15 years old and that it does a lot besides spade-work in this war.

It pushes things where they're wanted, pushes them away when they're not wanted and acts in a pinch as a combat weapon.

Still Critically Needed  
Basically, the bulldozer is a crawler-type tractor with a heavy shovel blade on its snout. By pushing dirt into place instead of using the old method of lift-carry-dump, it has speeded up the building of countless airfields, ramps, revetments, jetties and road grades. Around the world it has amazed our Allies with its speed in leveling air strips and clearing rough ground.

Bantam airborne dozers fly into jungles in gliders and go to work gouging out landing strips. The Army has specialized dozers with a high blade to clear extra thick jungle. There's a giant beach-dozer with a crane-boom mounted on its stern which is used to move heavy equipment across newly won beaches. Newest member of the dozer

family is the tank-dozer, which whizzed the Normandy hedgerow. This is simply a medium tank with a dozer blade mounted on it. This blade was specially designed by Army engineers, and can be thrown off by the driver in ten seconds if he wants to get back into the tank business.

In the Southwest Pacific, bulldozers long have been used to spearhead infantry thrusts through the jungle. They were not armored at first, but the drivers took them through with their dozer-blades elevated to shield them from enemy fire. Then armor was improvised on the spot. Now armored cabs are built in this country and shipped out to be mounted on the machines.

The U. S. Army was the first to adopt the bulldozer as standard troop issue. It was intended originally, only as a construction tool, but so many new uses have been discovered for it that the military bulldozer practically wears a uniform these days and edges ever closer to the category of a tactical weapon.

A Shovel Of Death  
In Pacific jungles there are even a number of reports about irritated bulldozer drivers who buried Japanese alive in their foxholes, tipped over small pillboxes, and upset whole embankments complete with Jap machinegun nests.

So useful is the new tankdozer in clearing the way for tanks and mechanized equipment that one engineer colonel reported: "It may be decisive in rough terrain. The old conception of 'tank country' can be considered obsolete."

In other words, if the ground is too rough for a tank, the bulldozer trims it down.

Despite rationing the menu always has a wide variety of choice foods. Great care is taken in the preparation of the foods served and the regular dinners are always well balanced.

"We plan to remain in business here after the war, and we are never too busy or too short of help to let our customers know we appreciate their business," the owners said.

Mr. and Mrs. Wallace expressed their appreciation to their customers for their cooperation and patience at times when the cafe is unable to give a prompt or as good service as the owner would like.

## Hal Boyle Receives Injury In Paris

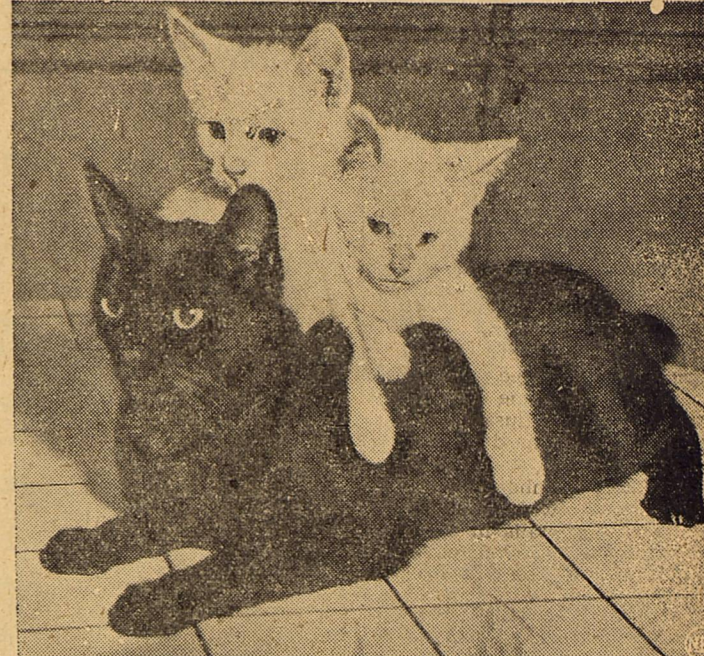

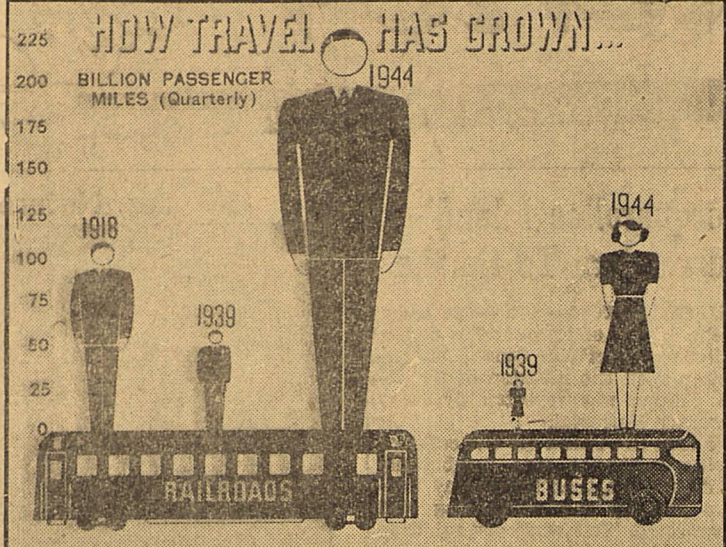

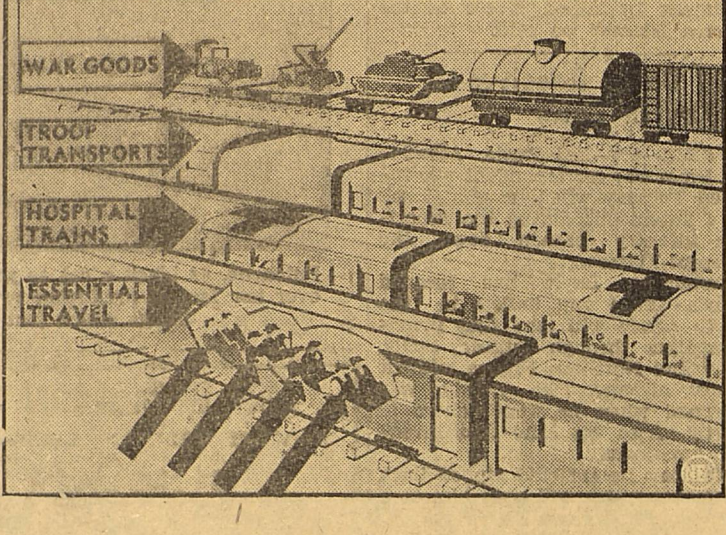

Conditions were bad but liveable in my country for the last four years, but they have been terrible ever since the invasion and particularly the last six weeks, since the trains stopped coming in from country and we have had no food.

He said that families who had no such forethought, however, fere fortunate to escape starvation, because the city was terribly short of meat, vegetables and other foods, due to the breakdown in transport.
