### Tax Exemptions For Texans May Be In Danger

FORT WORTH-(P)- The Star Telegram says it has learned that "several of Texas' anti-fourth term electors have been approached with the argument that continued opposition to the national administration might endanger the state's community property law, with respect to income taxes, and 'depletion of reserves' allowance given Texas oil men on income tax re-

Basis for the argument is that other Democratic congressmen might withdraw their support of the Texas delegation for the two measures if the intra-party fight continues and the state goes against the administration in the general

election," says the newspaper.
"Pro-Roosevelt forces in the state were quick to deny that the arguments were offered as a threat," the Star-Telegram adds.
