Compulsory Automobile Liability Insurance Question Will Be Hot One Before State Legislature Soon

If you're fed up on politics, you can argue about this:

Should an auto driver be compelled to carry liability insurance before he has an accident? Or should he be compelled to prove he can pay damages after he has an accident?

The problem may bob up in a number of state legislatures next year. Here's the story:

The National Conference on Street and Highway Safety, back in 1926, helped draw up a "uniform vehicle code." This was a model traffic law recommended to the 49 states. More than 40 have adopted it in whole or part.

Every few years the conference—made up of representatives of federal, state and local motor vehicle authorities and of private organizations interested in traffic and safety—has a new code.

This was done to bring it up to date to meet changing conditions.

Now the conference's committee on uniform traffic laws and ordinances has done another reviewing job.

Conference Opposes Idea

The conference opposes compulsory liability insurance for auto drivers. One of the reasons: That it forces safe drivers to take out insurance because there are bad drivers.

Prior to its meeting this month the committee had proposed:

That a driver—convicted of a major traffic offense or against whom a court judgment had been rendered for an accident—would suffer suspension of his license until he had paid the judgment or made provision against future liability by taking out insurance.

More than 40 states had adopted this code in one form or another.

You see what this means: A driver didn't have to prove financial responsibility until he had a bad traffic record or lost a court suit.

But now the committee wants to change that a bit. What the committee says now is this:

Not only a driver who causes damage—but the person whose car is damaged—must show financial responsibility after an accident.

An Example

For instance: Suppose you left your car outside your house. A drunken driver smashes into it. Would the drunken driver be allowed to wait until he was found guilty or ordered to pay damages to prove himself able to pay the damages?

No. You—the innocent victim—end the driver right after the accident would suffer suspension of license if you couldn't prove financial responsibility.

You can argue: Doesn't this arrangement put an unfair burden on the safe driver?

For instance: You make \$10,000 a year. You're a safe driver. You've never had insurance. But if you had an accident, you could pay whatever damages were found against you.

But here's John Jones. He makes

\$18 a week. He has no money in the bank. And he has no insurance. He couldn't pay any damages against him. He drives an old jalopy. He drives into your parked car.

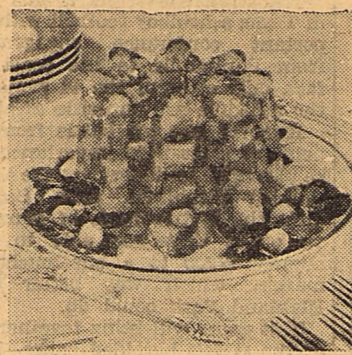
After that happens—before Jones is convicted or ordered by court to pay damages—you have to post a bond showing you can pay damages although in this case you know you were innocent.

And Jones, who really doesn't care whether his driver's license is revoked, not only doesn't have insurance but doesn't bother to post bond. In other words: You're stuck. So the irresponsible driver would fare better than the careful motorist.

The various groups which make up the conference will try to make state legislatures—most of them meet in 1945—see things their way and pass laws accordingly.

There'll probably be sturdy fights in the legislatures—if they listen to this proposal at all—before anything is done about it.

Use Fruits Often In Salads And In Desserts

Here are two seasonal fruit recipes using available fruits in delicious ways. The fruit salad, served on lettuce with mayonnaise, can be used also as a dessert either plain or with cream.

Jellied Fruit Salad (Serves 8)

One package lemon-flavored gelatin, 1 pint hot fruit juice and water, 1 can fruit salad, cut in small pieces.

Dissolve gelatin in hot fruit juice and water. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in fruit. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce and serve with mayonnaise, if desired. Can also be molded in individual molds and may be served with or without cream as a dessert.

Apple Roll (Serves 4)

One cup flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 4 tablespoons fortified margarine, 1/3 cup milk (about), 1 cup tart applesauce, dash of nutmeg, 1/2 cup water.

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, sugar. Cut into this two of the tablespoons of margarine. Add milk sufficient to make a soft, but not sticky dough. Roll out a pat to 1/4-inch thickness. Cover with the applesauce and, if desired, add a sprinkling of sugar to taste, and nutmeg. Roll up (like a jelly roll). Place on baking pan. Pour water into bottom of pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 40 minutes. Serve hot or cold.

So the husbands of those women are going to get to go home.

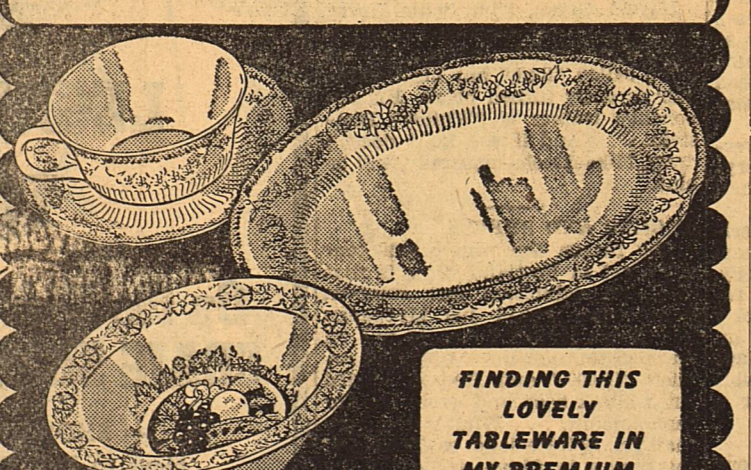
Fathers Favored

Oyster Stew Saves Points

Thanks to modern marketing methods and refrigeration, shelled oysters appear everywhere in the country, no matter how far inland. On a cold night, there's nothing better for a main dinner course than a large bowl of steaming hot oyster stew.

For supper after bridge or the movies, oyster stew is a welcome surprise. Easy to make, it provides flavor, nutrition and novelty. Here's a standard recipe. Some people like a few drops of Worcestershire sauce added to the stew.

Oyster Stew (2 to 4 servings) One pint shelled oysters, 4 tablespoons butter, 2 to 4 cups rich milk, or 3 cups milk and 1 cup light cream, scalded, salt, paprika.

Saute oysters in butter until edges curl. Add to hot milk, season with salt and paprika, and serve at once.

For a livelier bowl, try this delightfully seasoned recipe. Excellent for late supper parties.

Bluepoint Stew Supreme One small clove garlic, quartered, 5 tablespoons butter, 1/8 teaspoon paprika, dash of thyme, 1/4 teaspoon celery salt, 2 1/2 teaspoons salt, dash of white pepper, 1 teaspoon minced capers, 1 1/2 teaspoons caper vinegar, 4 cups milk, 1 pint bluepoint oysters, minced parsley.

Brown garlic in butter and remove. Add butter, seasonings, and caper vinegar to milk. Heat to just below boiling point; then add oysters and heat gently until edges of oysters curl. Do not allow to boil. Cover and let stand about 10 minutes to allow flavor to ripen. Garnish with minced parsley. Makes 6 servings.

Aachen Street Fighting Has 'Banking Hours' But It's Rugged Just The Same

AACHEN, GERMANY—(AP)—You have "banker's hours" in street fighting, but it is too much like trying to box Joe Louis to be any fun—one slip and you are through. You have to work only from 7 a.m. until about 4 p.m., when you knock off for the day and set up night outposts. It seems like that 4 o'clock whistle will never blow through when you are sweating out a sniper's bullet from every doorway, window ledge and rubble heap.

It's the guy you never see who gets you," is the first rule of street fighting. So you keep your eyes peeled.

Thetrapped Nazi garrison knew the cause was lost and fought chiefly to delay rather than avert American occupation of Aachen. Along was inevitable. The Army got splendid training at relatively slight cost in the type of the close-quarter fighting which may become much more deadly as the Allied armies leap-frog deeper into Germany.

Pretty Sight
It was a pretty sight as watching a pack of bird dogs flush quail to see how smoothly tanks and doughboys worked together to capture hidden Nazis in the ruins of the city, which had been damaged more by earlier Allied bombings than by the wear and tear of street fighting.

Directing men along a rain-soaked street on which shattered glass gleamed like ice cubes was tall Capt. Ozell Smoot, former Oklahoma City high school basketball player.

Sgt. Joseph Herbert, of Dawson, Pa., had a group of soldiers set up two machine guns at a corner and cover a street they had to clean up with crossfire. Doughboys waiting in the shelter of doorways looked on incuriously as guns opened up to pin down any Nazi sniper.

As a Sherman tank backed into the street from behind a wall shattered by shelling, Staff Sgt. William Stelma, Cleveland, Ohio, ordered a squad of four riflemen to move around it and it pick off any enemy bazookaman who might try to ambush it.

Tank Blasted Hole
The tank lumbered up within a few yards of a cement wall surrounding the nearest house and blasted a hole in it.

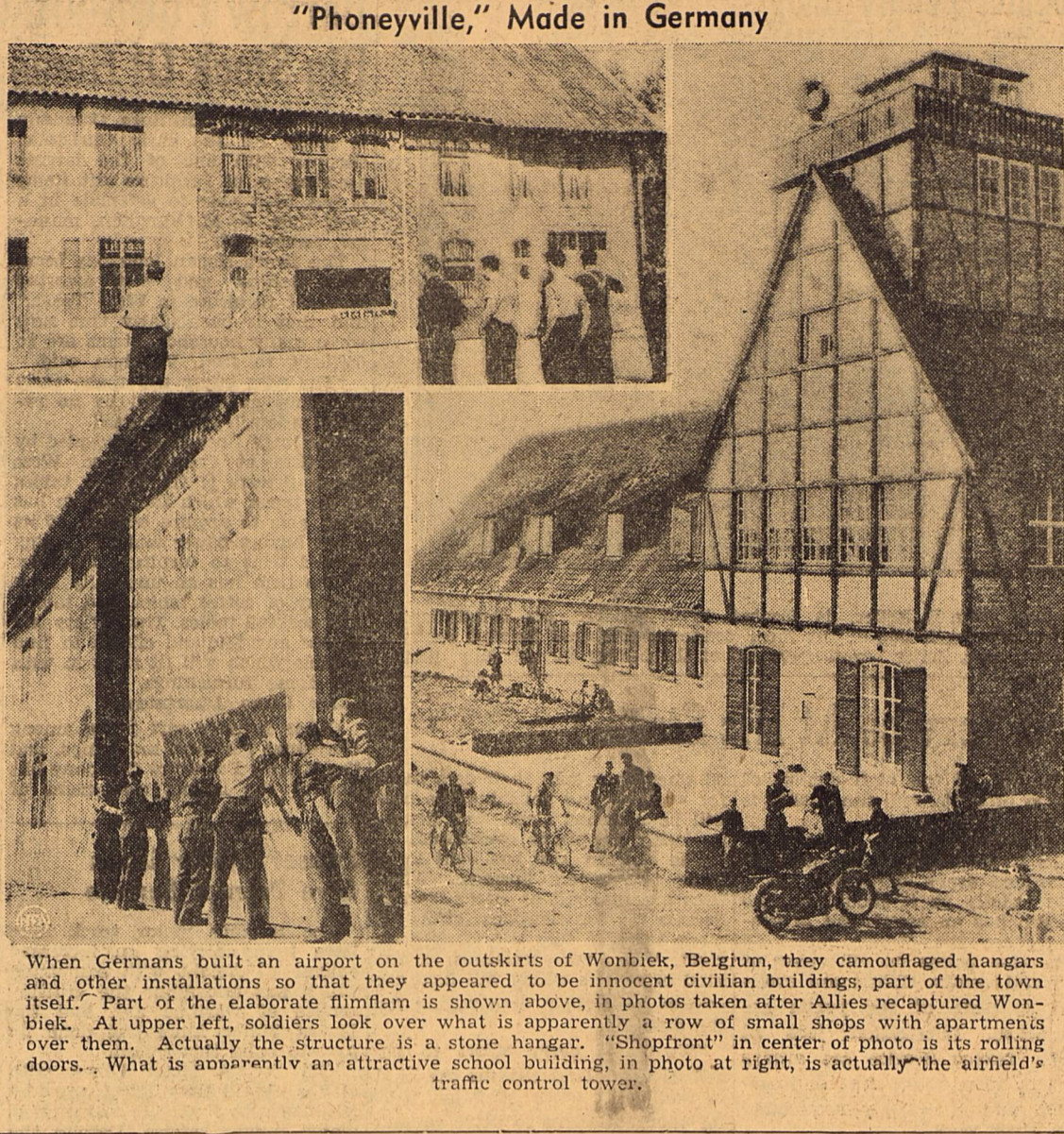
Tenseness spread among the group of waiting figures in the doorway although no enemy had been seen. In a moment they would slip through that hole into the backyard of the first house and begin a long, tedious, room-by-room search of every building in the block. Each man carried an extra bandolier, a rifle, five hand grenades and a day's rations in his pack.

The tank crawled slowly around the corner and down the street, its good nose poised to blow apart any house where Nazis were entrenched in force.

"It's no good—this street fighting," said a squad leader standing next to me in a doorway. "It's hard to keep from getting mixed up with your own men; those streets don't come out as they look on maps. It is not so bad if you drive these Jerryies into the basement first. You can give them a grenade. We have been using grenades by truckloads. We toss one in every cellar that looks the least bit suspicious—and this work makes you awful suspicious."

He and his men ran through the blasted wall with the furtive, crouching, flatfooted gait familiar to all infantrymen. The tempo of covering machinegun fire stopped up. A few seconds later the smothered sound of a grenade burst came from inside the first building.

The Yanks were given Aachen a good, old-fashioned fall house-cleaning.

15th Air Force Has Remarkable Record In Italy

15TH AIR FORCE HEADQUARTERS, ITALY—(AP)—Just one year ago, the 15th Air Force was activated as a strategic long range bomb group; today all the folks gathered round to marvel at how the child has grown.

The 15th was weaned on Ploesti oil, and enemy factories and railroads. It cut its teeth on 5,624 Luftwaffe planes wiped out in the air and on the ground.

Altogether, the 15th has sprayed close to 260,000 tons of bombs over the Balkans, Germany, Greece, Austria, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Poland and France.

8,000 Rail Cars Destroyed
More than 8,000 railroad cars and hundreds of locomotives have been blown up; 15 per cent of the Axis ballbearing manufacture has been wiped out; Nazi plane production is short because of the hammering of the heavies on Austrian, Yugoslav, Southern German and Hungarian assembly lines.

Operating alongside their big brothers, the Liberators and the Forts, Lightning and Mustang fighters under Brig. Gen. Dean C. Strother of Austin, have done overtime work as escorts and as offensive spearheads in wrecking trains, shooting up enemy concentrations and strafing enemy airfields.

One Mustang group commanded by Col. Yancey S. Tarrant of Brownwood has blasted more than 500 Jerry planes out of the sky. But the bombers are the big story. Since April, they have wiped out 80 1/2 per cent of the capacity within their range, 40 per cent of the aggregate available to the Wehrmacht from all fronts.

Squadron Two Ace Enjoying Furlough

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Lieut. Comdr. Leroy "Tex" Harris of Brownwood, executive officer of the Navy's hardhitting Fighter Squadron Two and an Ace, was in San Francisco seeing the sights this week, the Navy disclosed.

Squadron two, since it went into action in the Gilbert Islands last November, has destroyed 506 Japanese planes.

First Squadron Ace
Commander Harris was the first member of the squadron to become an Ace by downing five Japanese planes. Since he has added three more to his tally sheet. He wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, and two Air Medals.

He participated in actions over Meik in the Gilberts, Guam, the Volcano Islands and Manila.

High scorer for the squadron is its skipper, Comdr. William Dean of Coronado, Calif., with 11. He, too, is in San Francisco.

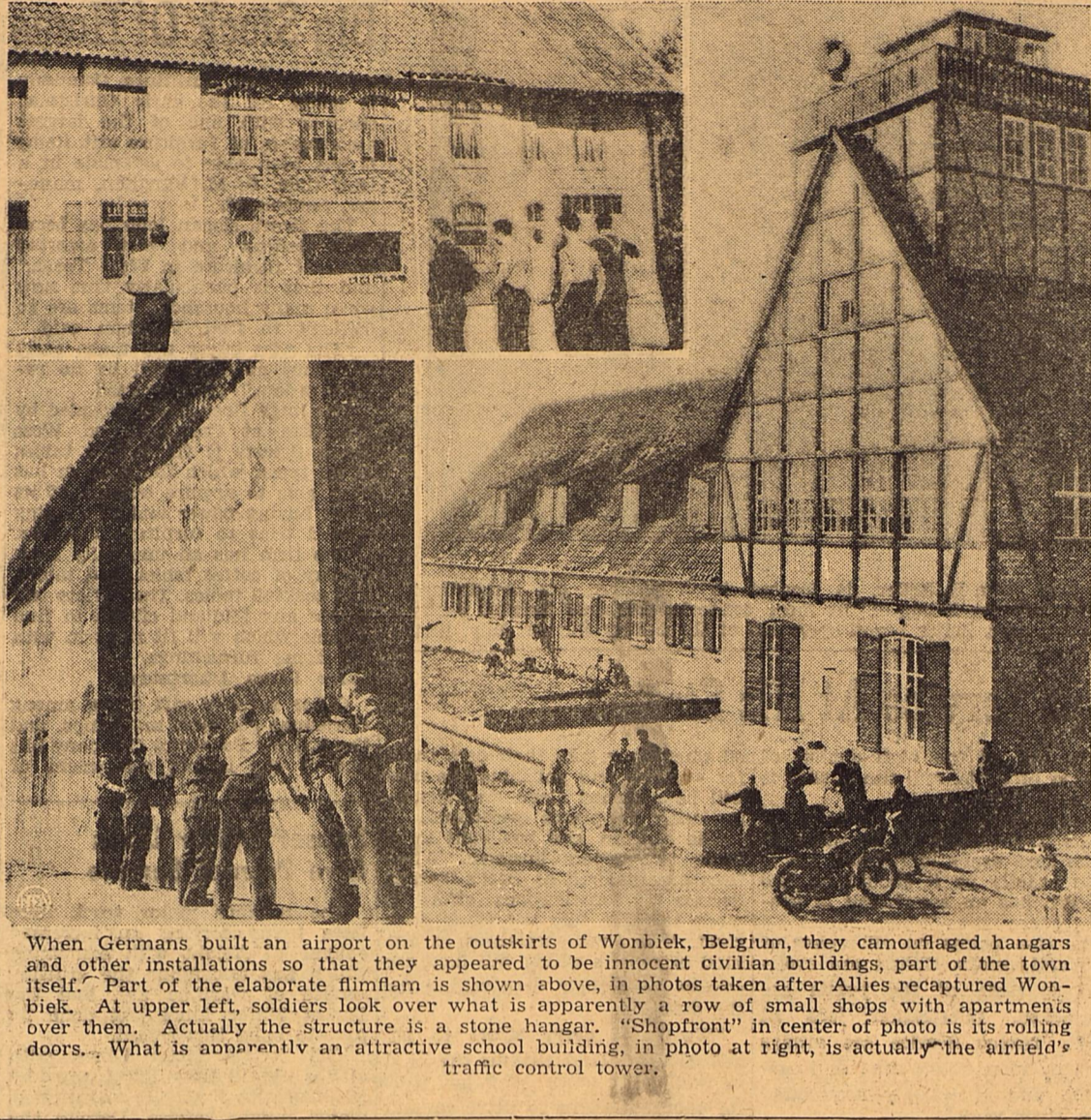

WASHINGTON—(AP)—There is good news about Christmas trees. The Agriculture Department's forestry service expects enough trees to meet demand. Cutting began about two weeks ago.

And the trees will be moved to market, it was stated at the office of the Association of American Foresters.

Because he expects a good tree supply, an official of the forestry service says:

Last year stories got around that there would be a shortage of Christmas trees. So transient vendors went out, cut trees locally, and tried to sell them.

These, added to the trees which moved through the regular channels, glutted the market. There should be no need for such vendors this year.

The forestry service, which has just made a survey of Christmas tree prospects through its regional offices, reports:

Usually between 10 and 15 million trees are used for Christmas. Half of them come from the Pacific Northwest.

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Texas Hellcat Pilot Follows Japs Nearly To Manila, Bagging Six

ABOARD A U.S. CARRIER IN THE PHILIPPINES SEA—(AP)—The Navy's top carrier-plane ace—with 30 planes to his credit—said recently that he and two other Hellcat pilots chased a formation of Japanese fighters and bombers all the way to Manila on the day he himself shot down nine of the enemy aircraft in a single flight.

One of the trio was Lt. (JG) A. C. Slack, Lutkin.

The Ace, Commander David McCampbell of Los Angeles, said "there were only two of us at the outset against 40 Japs. We really scrambled like wounded eagles for help."

Top At 22,000
"The top enemy fighter was at 22,000 feet, so my wingman Lt. (JG) Roy Rushing, 22, of McGehee, Ark., and I went to 24,000 before attacking. The Japs must have thought there were more of us because they made a couple of circuits and headed back for Manila.

"Roy and I followed them, work them over. We always maintained an altitude advantage, attacking any planes that straggled behind, climbed or pulled to one side.

"After half an hour, Slack joined up on us. The three of us continued to tackle them until they got nearly to Manila. By this time there were only 20 enemy fighters left."

The day's score credited pushing with six planes and two probables to add to the six he already had. Slack got four Japanese definitely and one probably.

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ARGENTINA VEERS TO THE RIGHT

Buenos Aires—(AP)—Highway traffic will switch from the left to the right side of the road in Argentina next year.

The prospect of greater tourist travel after completion of the Pan American highway is the reason for the change. Except for Uruguay, Argentina is the only country in the hemisphere which has traffic on the left—an offshoot of early British influence.

Standardization of traffic rules will tend to reduce accidents involving foreigners accustomed to driving on the right and avoid the cost of equipping new cars with left drive steering mechanisms. The new system starts June 19, 1945, a winter month when vehicular traffic is at a minimum.

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
