# Japanese Suffer Heavy Losses In South Leyte Campaign

# Heavy Rains Halt Budapest Is U.S. Air And Naval Three Fourths Pounding Of Nips Surrounded

The Japanese suffered heavy losses in the southern sector of Western Leyte Island Saturday as doughboys of two American divisions, further compressed the trap in which a sizeable Nippon force faces total liquiration.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in his Sunday communique, said heavy tropical rains again halted air operations and drove to within 15 miles of slowed ground action. But despite bad weather the Yanks south of Ormoc port concentrated on destruction of the trapped Japanese. Simultaneously American forces, led had fled.

# 26th Infantry Cracks Maginot Line To Join

Associated Press War Editor The U.S. Third Army's 26th Infantry Division smashed through the Maginot Line and joined the 35th Infantry Division Saturday east of the Saar River for a concerted drive from the south on the industrial Saarland, already invaded and under heavy pressure from the west.

Doughboys of the 26th pierced the Maginot fortifications near Achen seven miles southeast of Sarreguimines, where other Third Army units are fighting house to house, and pushed ahead two miles to effect the junction. The 35th infantrymen were deepening three bridgeheads on the east bank of the Saar just below the German border.

# Youth And Experience

Appointment of Edward R. Stettinius as secretary of state emphasizes the speed with which burning issues and half-issues of a political campaign can be forgotten. We seem to recall Governor Dewey harping upon an administration grown "old, tired and quarrelsome," while his opponents heatedly emphasized his "inexperience."

Yet here we have a young man, neither politician nor government veteran, whose appointment to the highest cabinet post has called forth general non-partisan approbation. The Democrats have not cried that he is without experience. The Republicans have not claimed the youthful replacement as their own idea (though to say that Dewey included Hull among the "old, tired and quarrelsome" would be unfair to both men).

Certainly Stettinius does not bring long experience to his new job. But he does bring an excellent substitutehis record of successes in previous assignments.

He made a significant contribution to our industrial conversion early in the war. As lend-lease administrator he performed the delicate task of cutting the pie into unequal portions and keeping everyone happy. As undersecretary of state he conducted the Dumbarton Oaks conversations in an able, statesmanlike manner.

In addition to a good record, Stettinius obviously has the confidence of the retiring secretary as well as the President. He may hope for Hull's invaluable counsel when the latter's health has mended. And his relations with Congress promise to be cordial.

If the rural districts say they do not wish to become regrouped with Midland, then the school officials must adjust their sights at less facilities

An elementary school should house the first five grades, but Midland's school plants are so crowded at present only the first three grades are taught in the South Elementary, and the first three grades and part of the fourth in

the North Elementary.

A Junior High School should be for the sixth, seventh and eighth grades, but the Midland Junior High has pupils from the fourth through the eighth grades.

School officials know they must begin to plan now to remedy this situation, but shall they plan for enough facilities to include the rur-

Can Expand Plant The Midland district is sending at present an average of \$25,000 a year for debt service. With such an expenditure, the district alone could hardly afford to erect buildings with sufficent facilities to care for pupils from all of the six districts. If the other five districts elect to come in with the Midland district a school plant can be built which will take care of the pupils of all six districts. The cost of such a plant can be met with an estimated increase of only 20 per cent in the evalua-

tions for school tax purposes.

The grades would then be divided as they should be; five grades in the elementary schools, three in the Junior High and four in the High School. Additional subjects then could be offered.

If the districts become one children in the rural districts will not have to look ahead to attending a small high school offering the usual 14 subjects, but can look forward to attending a modern high school offering 51 subjects, not to mention the many outside student activities only the larger high school can offer.

His supervisor would change this direct statement to read "it was done with a little hatchet" and would call hi maside to explain that "in this agency we use an imper-sonal style."

And if George wanted to stay around he would learn to write in this indirect, impersonal manner which is safer anyway—even though is always verbose and frequently confusing.

The three paragraphs above are, word for word, from Milton Hall. He's in charge of training workers in the Social Socurity (SS) board. He Complained!

He was complaining about the mess that comes out of some gov-ernment typewriters, the stuff crit-cised as "Governmentese."

From here on this is the story of how Hall and Oscar M. Powell, SS executive director, are trying to get government workers to write clear, direct and simple English.

Powell told SS workers:
"I understand that many emoloyes and supervisors have the impression that they are supposed to write in the impersonal and stilted style typical of much writing in

no reason, for example, why any-one should write "it is suggested that consideration be given to the CHIN CONTOURS document attached hereto' when he means 'we suggest that you consider the attached report'."

Hall drew up six pages of printed nstructions—showing common mistakes in government writing and now to avoid them. This was done at weekly inter-

vals, one list of instructions following another. It started four months

# Australian Writer Opines On American Soldier's Qualities

By HAL BOYLE
AMERICAN FIRST ARMY
HEADQUARTERS — (P) — Harold Austin, correspondent of the Sidney, Australia, Morning News, has some interesting views on the American

Austin, known to his press colleagues as "The Kangaroo," hit the beaches with the First Infantry Division on D-Day, and since has covered the advance of the Ameri-can First Army through France, Belgium and into Germany.

I asked him what he thought of Americans in action. Here is his answer:

Austin's Answer "I saw American soldiers walking in Piccadilly Circus in London and thought: 'These men are not soldiers.' I didn't admire their appearance or their bearing.

"I landed in Normandy on D-Day with them and, within a matter of minutes, changed by opinion completely. Infantrymen advancing in the face of murderous enemy fire were doing all that could be asked. "So great was the volume of fire that many men must have thought they were going to certain deathbut they advanced and kept advancing. That, in my mind, is the essence of the American soldier. He gets the job done.

Dislikes Some Features "You have asked by views on the American soldier, and I must say frankly that there are some features about him that I don't like. Firstly, his standard of discipline is not

particularly high. one. Rather, he prefers to show his individuality to an extent which is not conducive to good discipline.'

To speed transmittal of emergency messages from U.S. servicement in Europe to their families at home, the American Red Cross has arranged direct com-munication service between Red Cross field directors in Europe and Home Service at national headquarters through the facilities of Army radio.
