### A Long War

How long is the war going to last? For the country and most of its fighting men, perhaps another year or two. For the many who won't come back, another day or week or month. But for thousands upon thousands of others it will last 20 or 30 or 40 years, through the daily reminders of infirmities, shocks, fears and shattered nerves.

The causes of these thousands' misfortunes will be forgotten by others as the years pass and today's sharp events blur and fade. Only the evidence of the misfortunes will remain. And the thousands will become pitiable or eccentric old men to their families, their friends, and the casual passers-by.

It is always so with war. This year the number of neuro-psychiatric patients of World War I admitted to veterans' hospitals is higher than ever before. The peak is expected in 1949, 31 years after Armistice Day.
