

Announce 26 - House Project For Bovina

A new housing project, the first in Bovina in the past few years, has been officially announced.
At least 26 houses will be moved here on a three-block plot of land on Second and Third Streets south of Highway 86 and will be known as Eastview Addition.
The project, estimated at about \$300,000, was completed here within the past few days. Land has been purchased, paving paid for in advance, and arrangements made for moving houses here from Amarillo to be remodeled for the new owners.
Houses are already reported to have been sold to 26

families from other areas who have been employed by Missouri Beef Packers. The project is expected to raise population here by over 100 residents, according to Bob Fillpot, manager of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, one of the civic leaders instrumental in helping work out the details of the project.
Jerry Bradshaw of Lubbock and formerly of Bovina and Farwell is the developer. Land has been purchased from Clyde Blalock of Bovina and Joe L. Langer of Muleshoe. The houses are being sold through Ray Ault of Amarillo.

All are three-bedroom structures, which have been repossessed by FHA in that city.
Interim financing is being handled by a Lubbock bank. City Engineer Ralph Douglas of Muleshoe will this week survey the plot for installation of water and sewer lines. Payment for the development's part of paving Second and half of Third Streets has already been made to City of Bovina by Bradshaw. Bids for the paving will be let by the city. The project also includes First Street, but this will not be developed at this time.
Houses will be moved to the Third Street lots and over

half of those on Second. Long-range plans are to occupy the remainder of Second and all of First Streets at a later time.
Payments on home loans will include taxes and insurance, spokesmen say.
The development has been in the making for several weeks, but it was not until all details had been completed that an announcement was officially forthcoming.
Bradshaw states that a formal dedication of the project is planned and a date will be announced for this later.

This is the only town we know of where they gave away \$460 worth of groceries and 23,000 Gunn Bros. Stamps over the weekend. The groceries went to 23 different people to the tune of some \$20 per sack. The stamps were awarded to 23 different people with each getting 1000. That should make for 46 happy people.
That isn't bad for a town this size.

Said size of this town is expected to increase right away, however.

The official announcement of the new housing project, which we beat around the bush about in this space last week, has been officially announced. There's a news story elsewhere on this page which features all the facts and figures which could be readily found out about the project.

There are those who agree not with us, but we think the housing project is the greatest thing for Bovina folks since the slice of bread.

This is a major step from a growth standpoint, as we see it, and without growth we have nothing, but decline, and we can't afford much of that.

More houses mean more people. More people mean more business. And more business means a better town. We're of the opinion that this should be pleasing to one and all. But it really doesn't matter now, we guess, about who's happy and who isn't. The housing project has cleared all the red tape hurdles and only the physical aspects of getting it done remain to be accomplished.

Elated about the project, other than this department, are the businesspeople with whom we discussed it. The idea of having from 20 to 50 new families as prospective new customers in their town is highly appealing to them.

We'll predict here again that this project as it's planned now won't be the end of the additional housing situation. Either something will happen that this one won't turn out to be as good a deal as we think now it will or it will expand beyond its expectations OR another such project will develop.

That's a lot of optimistic and pessimistic thinking all wrapped up in one long sentence, but that's kinda the way we feel about it.

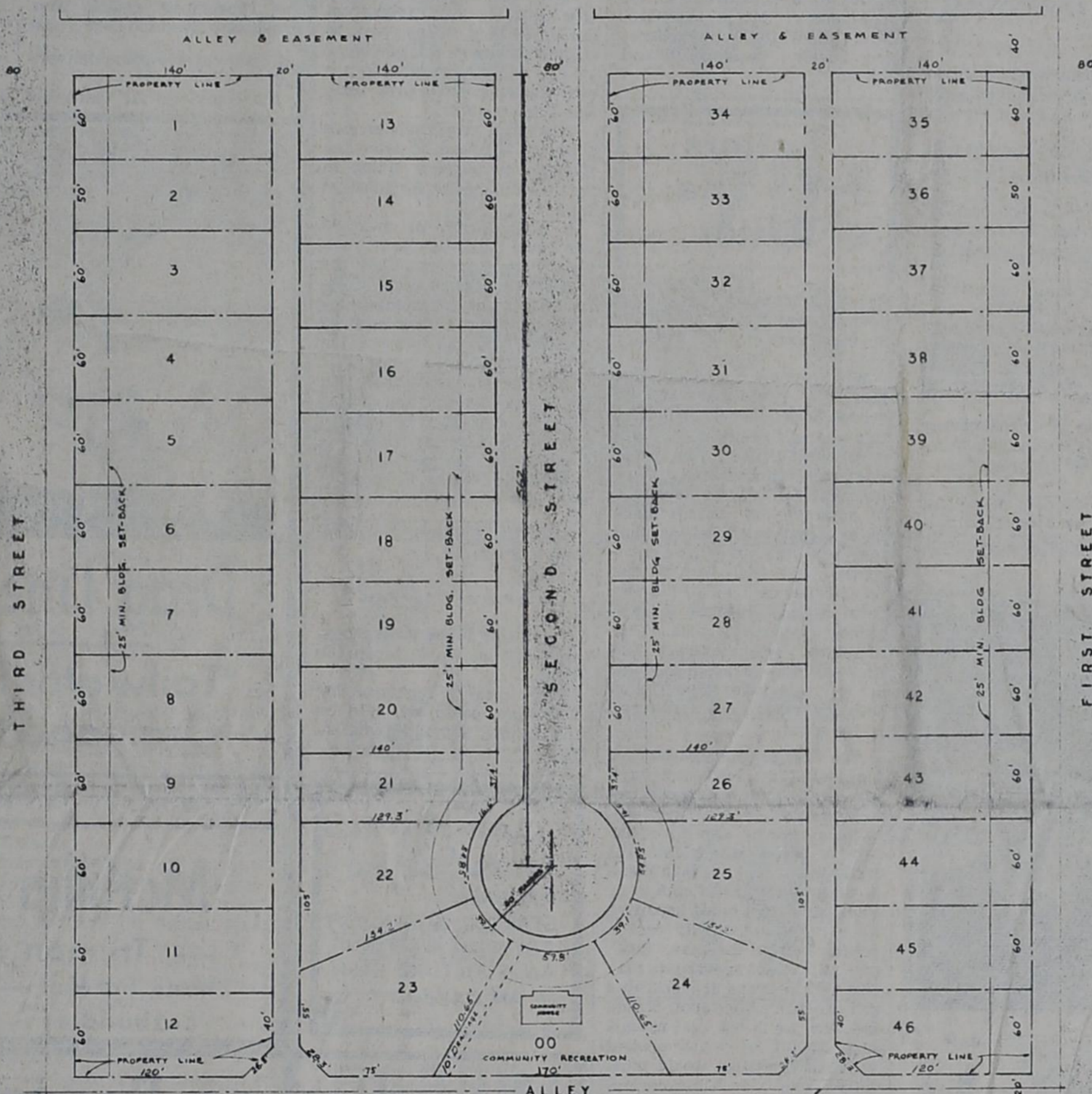
If you notice a slow down of the nation's economy, don't worry about it. The Republicans planned it that way. It didn't just happen; they're working at it.

Just as a for instance, the Headstart program for preschool age children has been done away with. The program was designed under the Demos to give the youngsters who needed it just what the name implied. It's been done away with now for a lack of funds.

The Texas Land Program, which allowed veterans who are residents of the state to make purchases of small tracts of land has also been wiped out. Interest rates too high or something like that was the reason for doing away for this benefit to the citizens. Pensions for old folks have been lowered, which may cause many retirement homes to be closed.

Government payments to farmers have been withheld until mid-year instead of being made in two payments as has been the policy previously. This is an act which will supposedly make Nixon's budget appear better during this election year. By waiting until the next fiscal year to give the farmers their money it's supposed to make the Republican budget look better and give the GOP a better chance of getting their people elected in the 1970 elections.

To Fly Here --

Dr. Blesius Opens Clinic On Weekends

Dr. Cornelius Blesius will be in Bovina on weekends, except the last one in March, to see patients at Bovina Medical Center, Inc.

The arrangement was announced this week as a temporary measure to help out here until a doctor can be found, or more permanent arrangements made.

Dr. Blesius practiced here about 18 months before going into residency the first of January at Baylor University and Hospital in Dallas, studying cardiology.

He will fly back and forth from Dallas to Bovina in an effort to assist the clinic and patients here.

Mrs. Hazel Hemke, who has kept the clinic open here since Dr. Blesius left, says the clinic will be closed on Tuesdays during the time it is open on weekends.

Funds are needed to install an emergency sign at Bovina Medical Center and directional signs on highways leading into town, states a spokesman of the Civic Improvement Committee here.

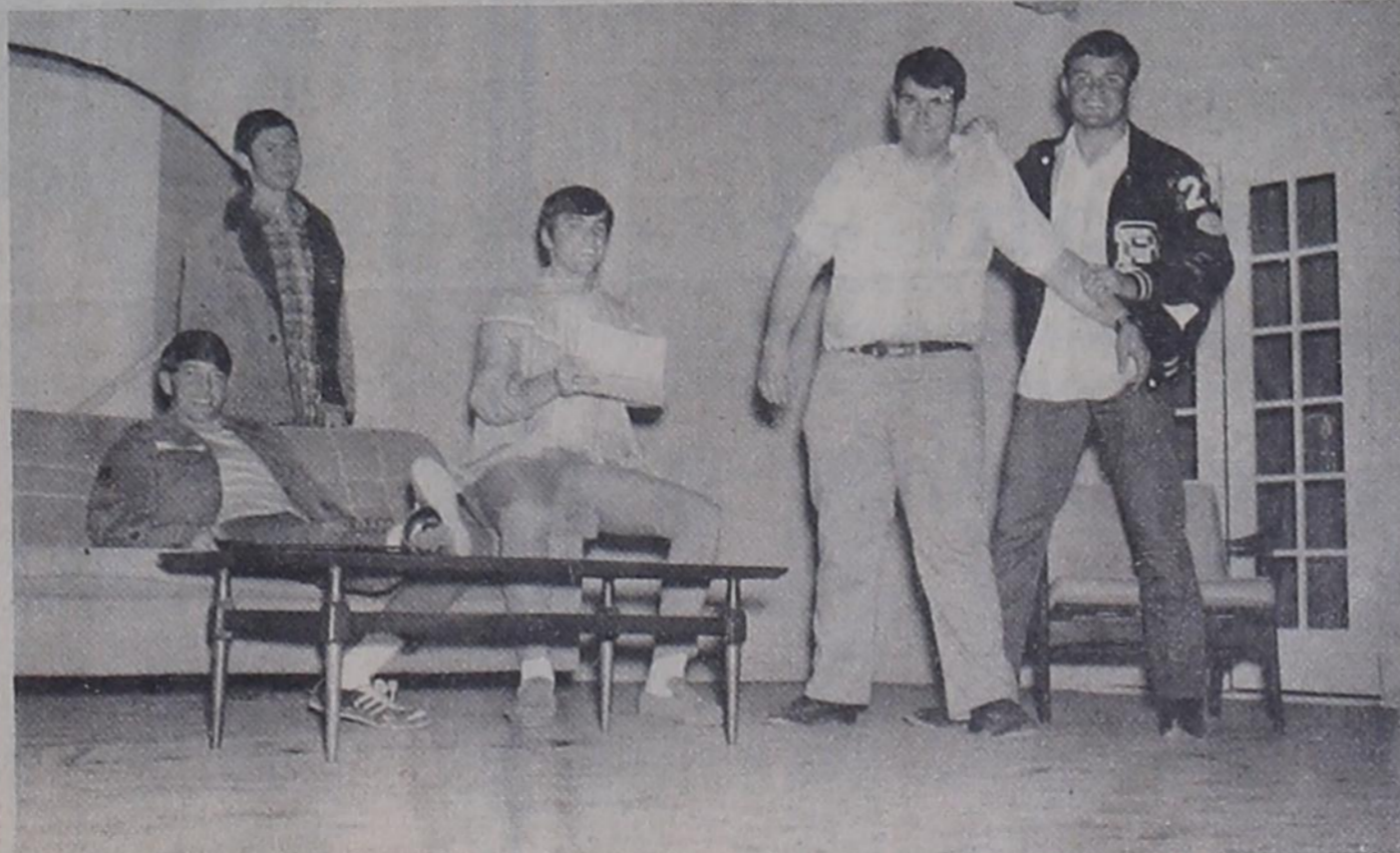
At the current time \$100 has been allocated by Bovina Woman's Study Club to purchase a lighted emergency sign for the clinic. However, the fiscal year ends in two months and unless the purchase has been made, the money will be recalled, reports say.

About \$80 will be required to install the sign, the amount needed. An area sign company has offered a good price for the sign itself, which can be purchased with the \$100 on hand.

The sign is needed at the clinic, and the ones on highways to aid those who do not know where the building is, the spokesman said. On several instances, people called the doc-

Meantime, board of directors of Bovina Medical Center is continuing efforts to secure a doctor for the clinic here. In December announcement was made that Dr. Michael Murphy of Rusk State Hospital had agreed to open practice here. After several delays, he informed the clinic board he was on his way to Bovina. However, he never arrived and no further word has been received. Since that time, several doctors have been contacted, but as yet, none has been secured. It was at this point that Dr. Blesius agreed to fly here on weekends for convenience of patients in this area.

Editorial Comment As Expected . . .

As expected, but with more enthusiasm than expected, many of the political powers that be in state politics are working to see that Democratic Senator Ralph Yarborough doesn't win his bid for re-election.

We didn't say they were for anybody. We get the impression that they're just against Yarborough.

It so happens that "their" candidate is Lloyd Bentsen of Houston, who is a former U.S. Congressman from the Valley. Bentsen's candidacy has been endorsed by a few of the more influential daily newspapers around the state --- the same ones who have probably been against Yarborough since the beginning of his political career. And many of these same ones, when Yarborough defeats Bentsen in the Demo primary, will decide that they "must" support the GOP candidate, Bush, in the general election.

The Bentsen people, led by former governor John Connally, are spending money like this was the last political campaign there will ever be. They appear to be desperate to unseat Yarborough, who has done an outstanding job of representing the common people of the State of Texas in his senatorial post in the nation's capitol.

On the bright side of the Yarborough campaign for re-election picture is the fact that his rich opponent doesn't have the backing of a pair of highly influential members of the Democratic Party in Texas. These are LBJ, who turned down a request to back Bentsen, and Governor Preston Smith, who has never had any formal quarrel with Yarborough.

Contrary to what the newspaper ads and the television stations say, our area and our state need to keep Ralph Yarborough looking after our interests in the U. S. Senate.

Let's vote to do that come May 2.

New Regulations --

Home Mail Delivery Available In Bovina

Bovina residents, living outside a quarter-mile radius from the U. S. Post Office, may be eligible for home mail delivery --- that is, if more than 50 per cent request such, says Gene Ezell, postmaster.

The major new postal service program will expand home deliveries to persons living in small communities for the first time.

If a majority, or over 50 per cent, make requests, persons living more than a quarter mile, but less than a half-mile, from their post offices may receive mail at their homes. Previously, they had to go to the post office for their mail.

Ezell noted the delivery will be at the streets, not at the door. Therefore, if enough requests are received, postal patrons would have to erect a mailbox at the street in front of their homes.

These citizens living within the subscribed radius have previously lived too near a post office to receive home deliveries.

Ezell says so far there has

been little interest shown in Bovina for home delivery. However, he feels that few people have known about the available service.

Anyone wishing home delivery should contact Ezell.

With the solar eclipse due March 7, 1970, there will be scores of people across the nation who will be either partially or totally blinded trying to see this rare phenomenon. You might wish to warn your readers of some of the hazards since many people still believe that they can view an eclipse comfortably and safely with various home-made devices all the way from a smoked glass to dark photographic film sheets. This simply is a mistaken idea. The only safe way is to wait and view it on television after professionals have made pictures of the event.

The real danger comes from the invisible infra-red rays which can cause damaging burns to the eye's light-sensitive retina in a manner similar to the way a magnifying glass will focus the sun's rays on a piece of paper and burn a hole in it. The retina, not being sensitive to pain, would hardly feel a retinal burn at the time. However, all vision specialists realize retinal burns are incurable and produce a blind spot. Should the burn be in the vital macula area (point of most central vision) the patient would most likely lose all usable central vision in that eye permanently.

Other complications of solar damage seen by eye specialists following the last partial eclipse of the sun on May 20, 1966, include bilateral central scotomata, macular hole, severe macular lesions, macular burn, obstruction of central retinal vessels, retinal hemorrhages, etc.

I hope it is possible for the people of our area to get by without a single incident of damage. This is only possible if they fully understand the dangers. The only recommended way to view an eclipse is indirectly. This can be done by taking two pieces of white cardboard and make a pinhole in one, then with the sun at your back focus the eclipse image through the pinhole board onto the second cardboard. Better yet, wait and see it on TV!

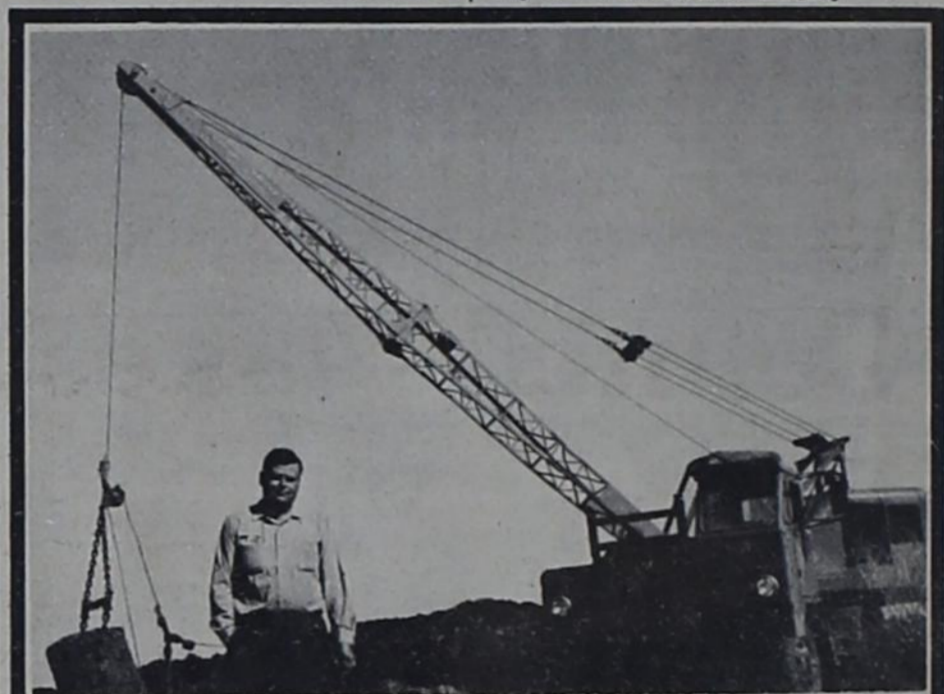

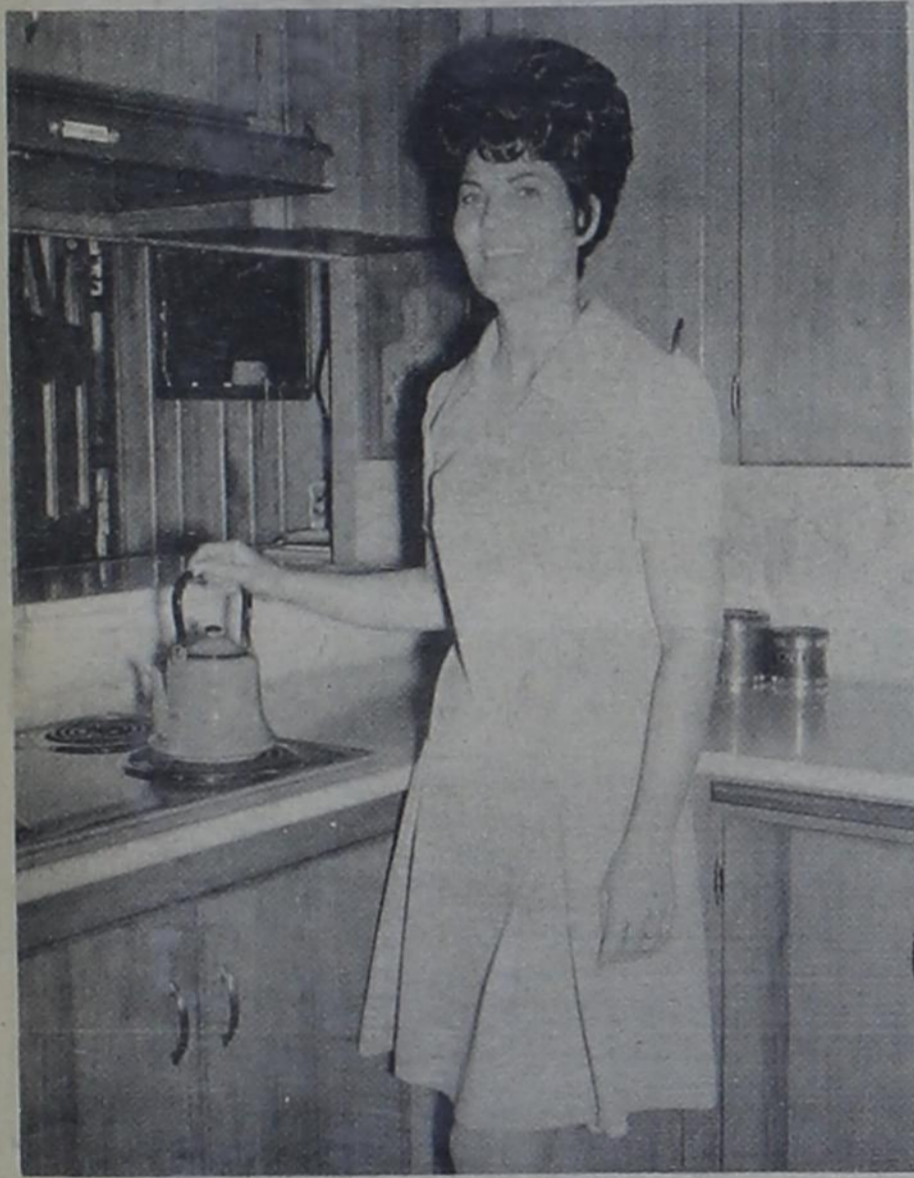

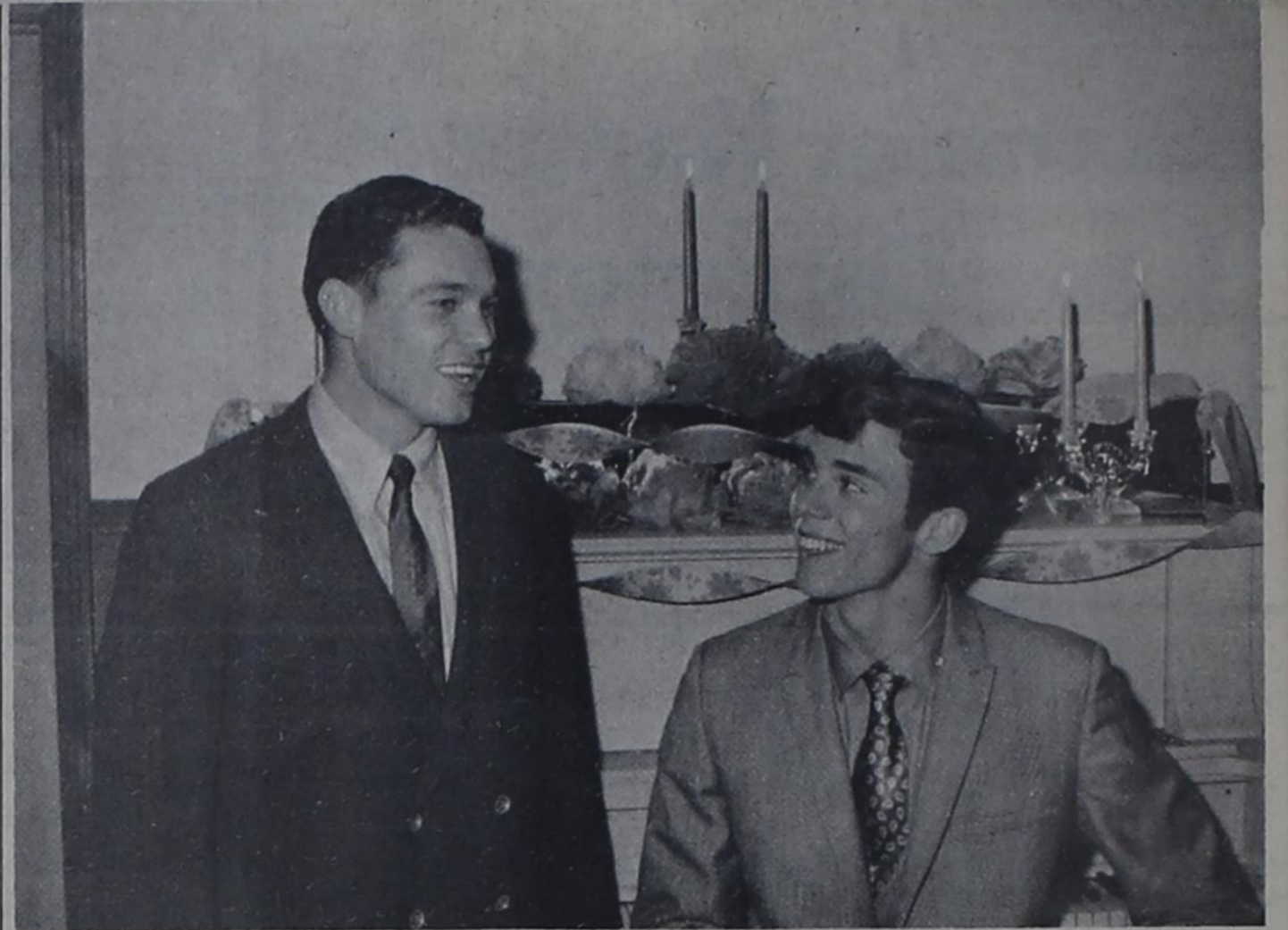

On The Farm In Parmer County

HOG MEETING

On March 11 a meeting will be held to look at pork production as another economic opportunity for Parmer County.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. and will be held in the Hub Community Center.

Extension Service personnel from College Station and Amarillo will appear on the program. "Factors to Consider When Entering the Hog Business," "Profit Potentials," "Feeding Grain Sorghum" will be three of the subjects discussed by these men.

Representatives from banking business, Farmers Home Administration, and the Production Credit Association will appear on a panel to discuss how they can help in financing hog operations. Make plans to attend this meeting.

FERTILIZER RESEARCH BOOKLET NOW AVAILABLE

A booklet which summarizes fertilizer research and demonstration work on the Texas High Plains over a 10-year period is now available from the county agricultural agent's office.

Title of the report is "Fertilizer Research and Demonstration Summary for the Texas High Plains, 1958-67." It was prepared by James H. Valentine, area soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr. Arthur

B. Onken, assistant professor of soil and fertilizer at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

Information on a large number of the more than 200 research tests directly pertaining to fertilizer use and response on the High Plains is contained in the booklet. The publication summarized fertility research conducted with cotton, grain sorghum, wheat, alfalfa and sugar beets. Also, a general description of area soils and their fertility status, fertilizer use history and a soil test explanation is included.

In addition to this research information, fertilizer demonstrations are also conducted in the county each year with cooperating farmers. This information is published at the beginning of each year in a result demonstration handbook that is also available at the county agent's office.

As yield potentials increase due to improved management and production practices, fertilizer use can be increased profitably. All farmers and fertilizer dealers in the county are urged to come by the office to pick up a copy of the booklet described above as it contains valuable information that may be helpful in planning a fertility program for this year's crops.

Industrial Arts Show Completed Projects

"Our class is teaching boys to use their hands and to see the results of their efforts," said Gilbert Hough, industrial arts instructor at Bovina Schools. This is the first year the industrial arts program has been utilized here and Hough feels

the 37 students in his two classes are "getting tremendous benefits."

Not everyone can go to college, Hough says, and industrial arts is something a boy can use as a vocation.

Three pieces of machinery were installed for the first year's class, an 18-inch planer, a 10-inch tilting arbor table saw, and an eight-inch jointer. The class shares hand tools with the agriculture shop.

First problem was finding space for the shop. With a little renovation, the agriculture shop became a place for both groups to work.

During the first semester of school, the boys spent their time entirely in drafting classroom situation, learning how to draw plans for their projects.

The fun began the second semester when their knowledge was put to work. The boys buy their own materials, cedar, ash

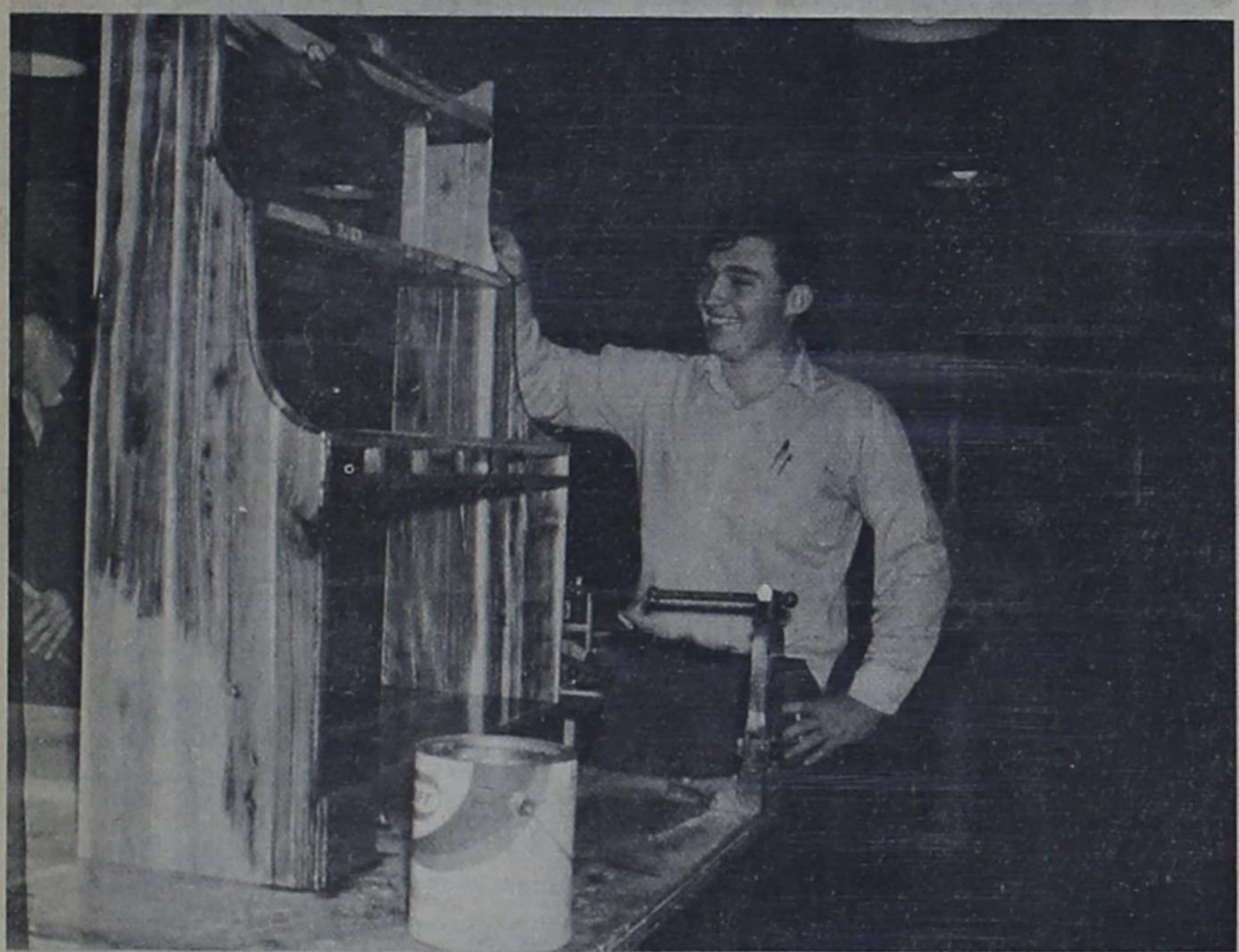
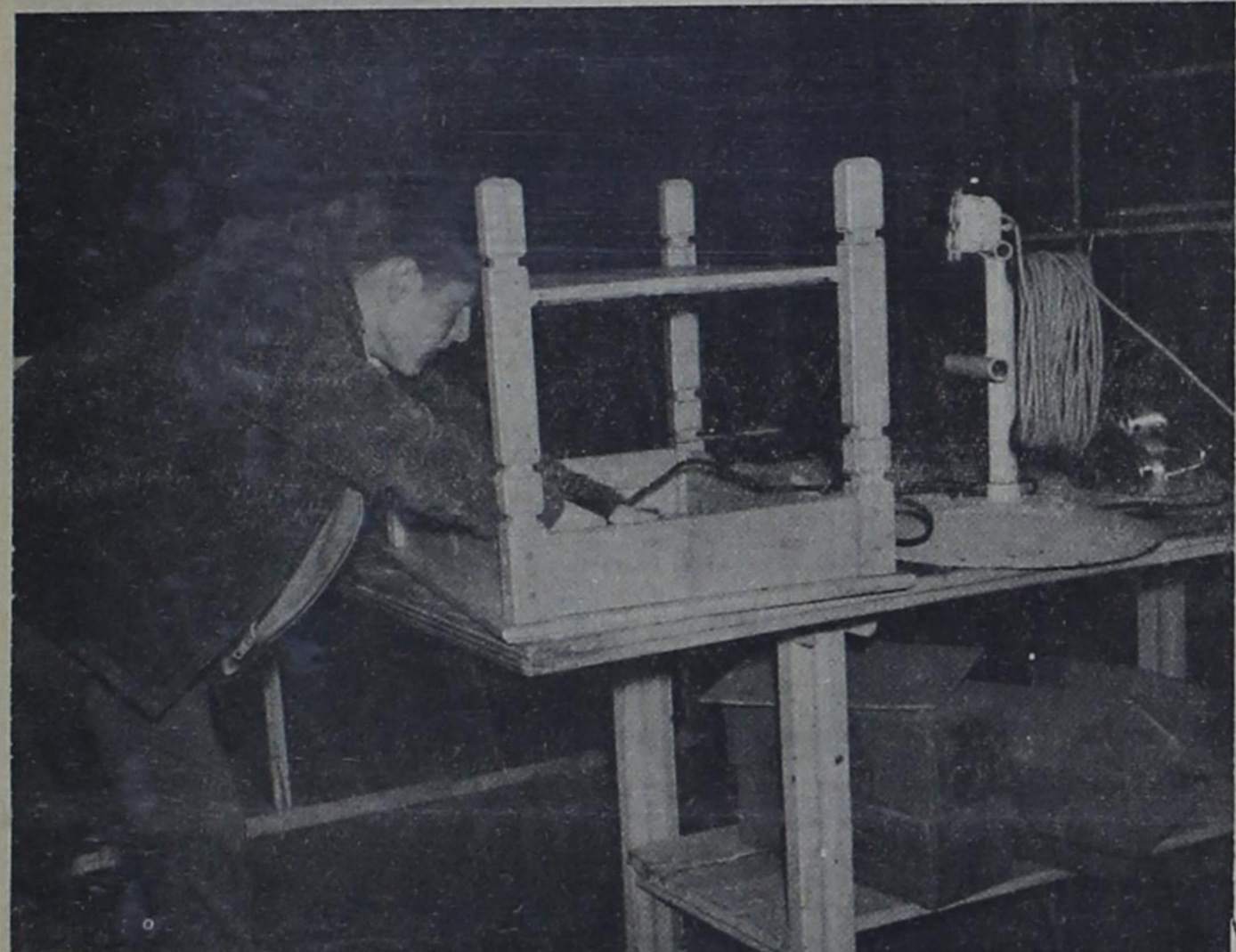
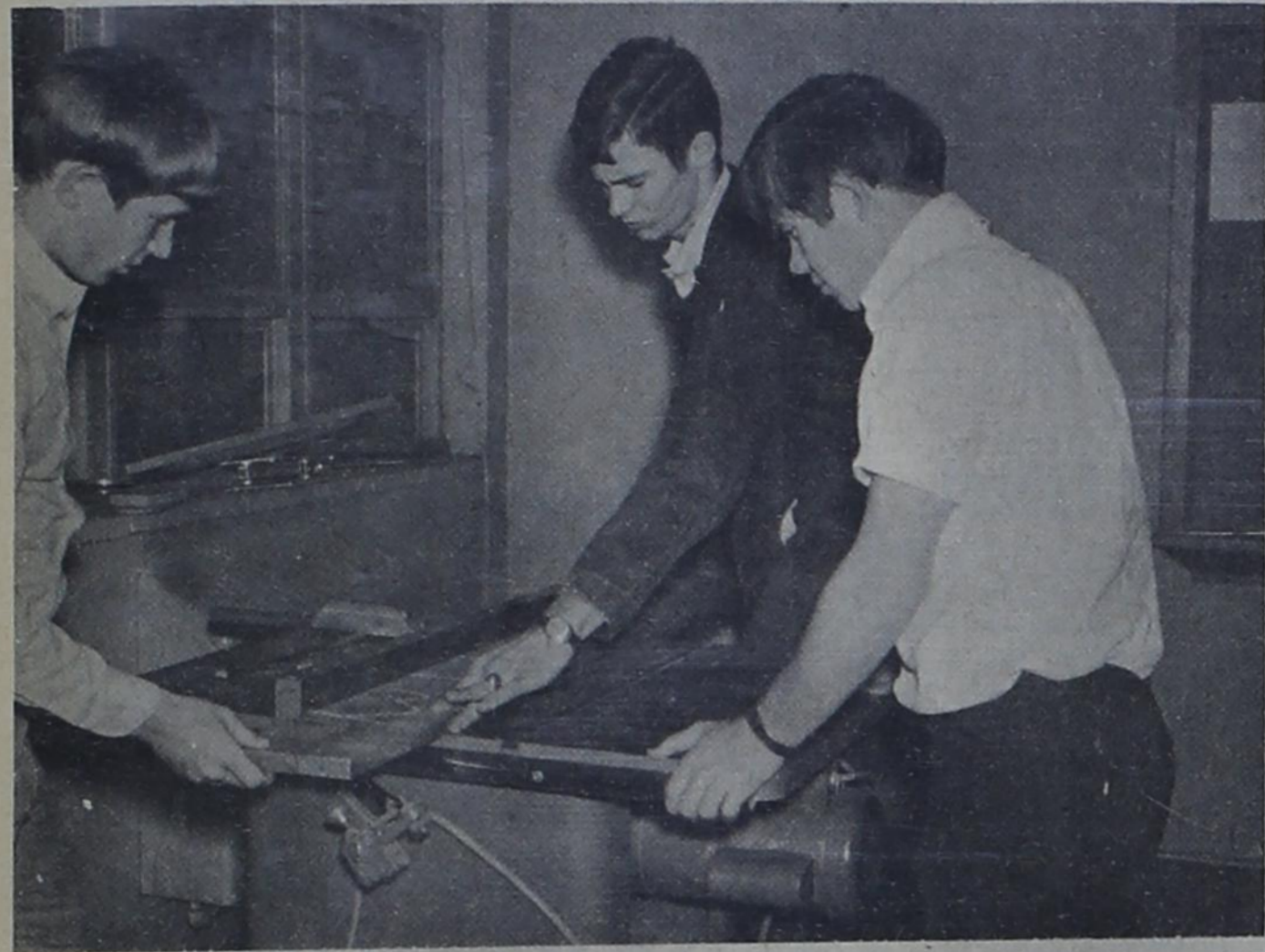
or walnut. From raw material, the students have built bookcases, tables, lamps and various other type wood articles and have completed many including the finish work.

Finished products were on display at open house Tuesday night during Public Schools Week.

The display drew considerable interest from patrons attending the event since this was industrial art's "debut."

Hough says some of the boys he has taught in previous years before coming to Bovina have gone on to become cabinet makers, one of whom now owns his own shop.

"Working with one's hands gives a person a feeling of accomplishment," Hough says, "and proves to the student there may be other fields, not yet known to him, where he might succeed."
